The Columbus, Ohio native graduated from Glenville State in 2014 with a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration degree in Computer Information & Systems. During his time on campus he was captain of the men's basketball team from 2011-2014 and was a member of the Student Athlete Advisory Committee. He tallied up 1,202 points on the court with the Pioneers, helped lead the team to its first NCAA Tournament appearance in 40 years, is second in all-time 3-pointers made, fourth in all-time 3-pointers made in a single season, and was a two-time Mountain East Conference Player of the Week.

Kevin is married to Kenyell Goodson '14 who was a member of the Lady Pioneer basketball teams that won the WVIAC Championship in 2011 and the MEC Championship in 2014. She was a member of the MEC All-Tournament Team and racked up 1,240 career points. Kevin and Kenyell have two children, Kevin II and Kaymonie.

After leaving Glenville State, Kevin played professional basketball with the Basketball Ireland Super League Team Killorglin KCYMS BC. He played in Ireland, Norway, and Lithuania. He and the team won a championship in Ireland for KCYMS BC. Additionally, he was a three-time All Star, a two-time Golden Ball Winner (Player of the Month), and earned a club record with 10 3-pointers made in a single game.

In his spare time, Kevin enjoys spending time with his family, scaling up his business, playing video games, sports, and helping athletes reach their potential.

## **Deferred Maintenance Funding to Facilitate Upgrades, Changes at GSU**

Last year, it was announced that Glenville State University would receive nearly \$12 million in deferred maintenance funding from the State of West Virginia. Deferred maintenance projects have piled up at institutions all around the state over the past decade due to decreased appropriations. This funding will allow state universities to tackle many long-overdue projects.

At Glenville State, the funding will go toward heating and cooling system controls and upgrades throughout campus, security camera and exterior lighting replacement and installation, and technology upgrades such as new Wi-Fi hotspots and a server replacement. The monies will also be used to upgrade and expand usage of the campus amphitheater and to facilitate partial demolition of Louis Bennett Hall.

Architectural and engineering contracts have been completed for the building projects and the campus Physical Plant and Office of Technology employees are gearing up for the upgrades. The funding is being dispersed in 25% increments and Glenville State received its first \$2.9 million in December 2023.

## Skiles to be Inducted into WV Wesleyan College Athletic Hall of Fame

Glenville State University Athletic Director Jesse Skiles '87 has been named to the 2023 Hall of Fame Class at West Virginia Wesleyan College.

Skiles coached men's and women's cross country and indoor and outdoor track and field at WV Wesleyan where he won over 50 conference titles. Thirty-four of his athletes qualified for nationals at



Wesleyan and 10 were named All-American. On four separate occasions at Wesleyan, Skiles' teams won all four league titles in the same academic year; 1995-96, 2008-09, 2009-10, and 2014-15. His career (at Wesleyan and Glenville State) resulted in a total of 64 conference championships and he was named Coach of the Year 53 times.

Skiles and the other members of the 2023 class will be inducted at a ceremony on Saturday, April 20, 2024.



## Alumnus Finds Success with Tattoo Shop

Tvaris "T" King '16 has become the go-to tattoo artist for many Ohio State University student athletes and other professional athletes – and the wall of his shop proves it. The interior of his [Tattoo Kings](#) shop in Columbus, Ohio is lined with photos of satisfied customers who proudly sport his artwork.

"They are allowing me to leave my mark on them, they're entrusting me with doing this for them. I don't think I could ever take it for granted. It's a constant appreciation," King said in an interview with [The Lantern](#), OSU's student newspaper.

King says that he first was exposed to art as a child watching his mother paint, but it wasn't until years later that a friend asked him to use his artistic skills for a tattoo.



# Wrestling Nabs MEC Championship, Boxing Picks up Two Wins

Glenville State has claimed the 2024 Mountain East Conference Wrestling Championship and two Pioneer boxers were victorious at the War in the Waco VIII.

The Pioneers dethroned reigning MEC wrestling champs West Liberty at the tournament that was held in late January. Five GSU wrestlers took home individual championships in their weight classes: Hunter Ross (125), Gavin Quiocho (133), Guy DeLeonardis (157), Brady Ross (165), and Isaiha Casto (174). The win marks Glenville State's first MEC Championship in wrestling since the program relaunched during the 2020-21 season.

At the War in the Waco, GSU senior Daniel Hinger fought back in his final round to defeat Leo Cuellar in one of the most exciting fights of the night. Sophomore Payton Packer's was the final fight of the evening; he picked up the win by unanimous decision. The War in the Waco featured seven fights with four Pioneers competing.

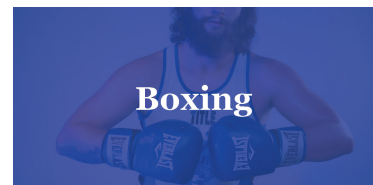
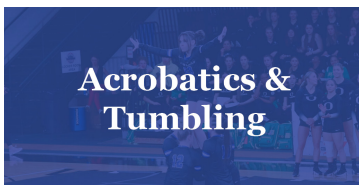

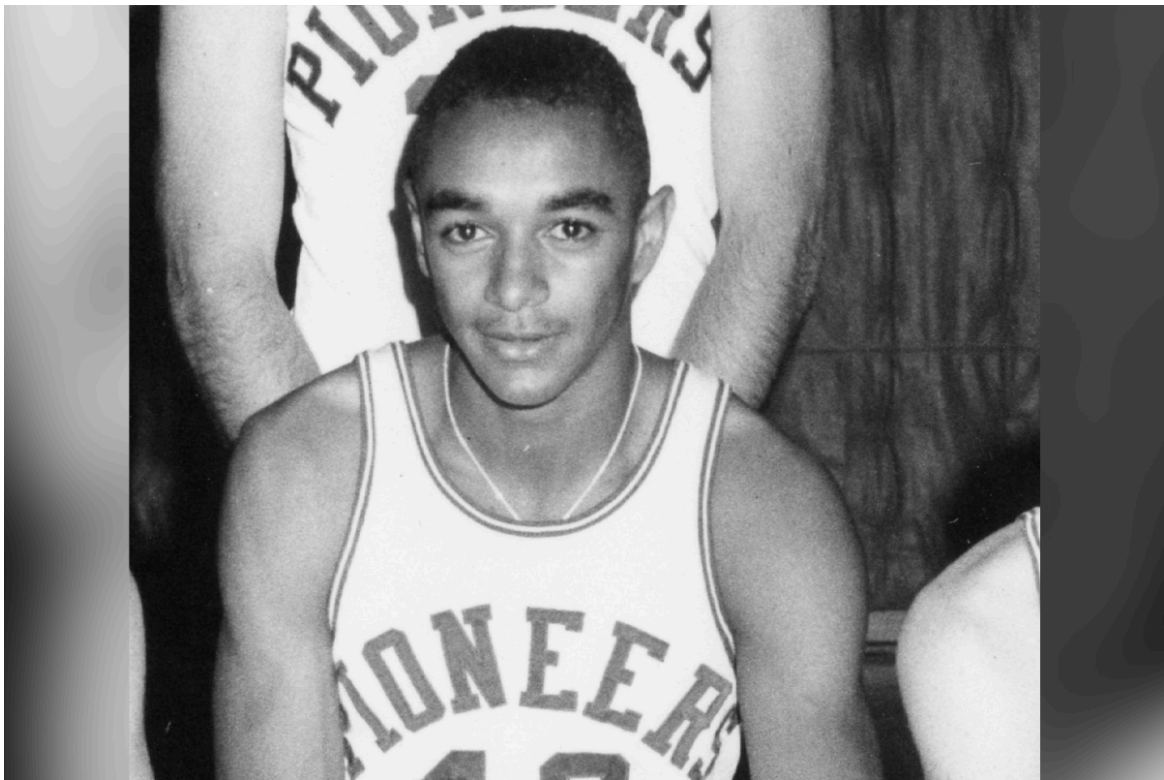


## Scholarship Corner

*A monthly spotlight on one of the scholarship funds managed by the GSU Foundation*







### **Bob “Skinny” Minnieweather Scholarship**

Bob “Skinny” Minnieweather '67 came to Glenville State in the fall of 1963 with his friend Sammy Burns to play basketball. He would compete in both basketball and track, and held the Pioneer rebounding record for some 35 years.

Being the first persons of color on GSC’s campus, Bob and Sammy paved the way for the likes of Hall of Famer Jackie Joe Robinson '70, Marion Gordon '70, Willie McGee, Bill Perry, and Roosevelt Lynch to find their way to campus in the 1960s. This ushered in Glenville State teams that won the WVIAC Conference and went on to Kansas City in both 1970 and 1972; these teams included greats such as Hall of Famer Steve Datcher '73, Hall of Famer Earl Hawkins '74, Hall of Famer Ron Jones '73, Ken Ledbetter '73, and other black student athletes of that era.

Bob earned the prestigious Frank Montrose Award in 1967. Following graduation, he served as a counselor at the Job Corps Center before joining the U.S. Army and serving on active duty in the Vietnam War. He enrolled in the Sears Roebuck Managerial School in 1972 and continued with the company as a credit service manager in several locations. Bob was active in the Baptist church where he taught Sunday School, served on the Usher’s Board, and was a member of the brotherhood.

Minnieweather was an inaugural (posthumous) inductee into Glenville State’s Curtis Elam Athletic Hall of Fame in May 2001.

The Bob “Skinny” Minnieweather Scholarship was first established by African American alumni from the 60s and 70s. Created in Bob’s memory, it is designed to provide financial support for African American students enrolled at Glenville State.
