By 1910, the College enrollment had exceeded the population of Glenville and grew into a full four-year College by 1931. Teacher preparation continued to be the central mission as over the years, the campus became known as 'the Lighthouse on the Hill' for both the quality of the teaching and the quality of Glenville State graduates.

Glenville State College Foundation

The Glenville State College Foundation, Inc is a private, non-profit tax-exempt [501(c)(3)] corporation which was founded to acquire and manage a wide range of funds that are used for scholarships, awards, and special projects for the College. Overseen by an active and dedicated Board of Directors, the Foundation was established to:

- Provide funds for scholarships, endowments, educational research, improvements and additions to school facilities and general
 educational purposes for Glenville State College and for the students at Glenville State College;
- Engage in and promote educational, literary, scientific, charitable, philanthropic, fraternal and benevolent activities;
- Receive and use for its purposes, gifts, donations, bequests, and endowments;
- Establish, maintain, manage, handle and administer trust funds for scholarships, endowments, educational research, and other educational, literary, scientific, charitable, philanthropic, fraternal and benevolent purposes;
- Acquire, own, hold, lease and sell property, real and personal, in connection with its purposes.

Ms. Ronna Dittman serves as Director of the Foundation. The Foundation office is located in the Administration Building.

The 2004-2005 Annual Fund raised \$74,000 of support for the College. Eighty percent of those funds were received from alumni and friends, five percent from business and industry, and fifteen percent from faculty and staff. Sixteen percent of faculty and staff participated in giving to the Annual Fund. Fund disbursements were as follows:

- 58% Scholarships
- 15% Recruitment and Communication
- 6% Academic Support and Instructional Equipment
- 6% Facilities and Technology
- 5% Faculty and Staff Development
- 5% Fundraising
- 3% Special Projects
- 2% Student Internship
