"If I don't run eight to ten miles a day, I don't feel like I've done anything," stated Pat Godfrey, a junior English major from Parkersburg, WV. Pat keeps a very strict log of the miles he runs and finds that he runs approximately 100 miles a week.

He began running four years ago, to get in shape for basketball. He found he had a natural ability for running long distances and has become a road racer and marathon runner.

Pat ran on the CSC Cross Country team for one year, and got to help represent West Virginia in Wisconsin at the Nationals of Cross Country. Pat is now an independent runner who has run in ten different states to compete.

However, Pat and his marathons and road races have some harrowing experiences. For example, in an Indiana marathon he ran, he and the other top nine racers got lost on the track and later found they were eight miles off the course. An overall record of 11-17 was achieved by the Pioneer Men's Basketball team in the 1981-82 season. The Pioneers were 8-14 in the West Virginia Conference, including an exciting upset of Fairmont State College at the GSC gym.
