Some of the steps used daily are built for attractiveness, such as those in the Library, others, such as in the Ad Building, are useful.





Fall left us, as the season changed and the leaves fell from the trees, leaving them bare. The sun shone less and the warm days fled as winter imposed itself on the campus.


Winter, as the seasons called for, dumped snow and hit us with blast after blast of cold air. Finally it was over, spring seemed right around the corner, as the old cliche goes.





Running is an individual sport that can be done in competition or for getting into shape.


"If I don't run eight to ten miles a day, I don't feel like I've done anything," stated Pat Godfrey, a junior English major from Parkersburg, WV. Pat keeps a very strict log of the miles he runs and finds that he runs approximately 100 miles a week.

He began running four years ago, to get in shape for basketball. He found he had a natural ability for running long distances and has become a road racer and marathon runner.

Pat ran on the GSC Cross Country team for one year, and got to help represent West Virginia in Wisconsin at the Nationals of Cross Country. Pat is now an independent runner who has run in ten different states to compete.

However, Pat and his marathons and road races have some harrowing experiences. For example, in an Indiana marathon he ran, he and the other top nine racers got lost on the track and later found they were eight miles off the course. In another race, where he was a top contender, he was pointed in the wrong direction and finished fourth, from the wrong direction!

Leading running magazines, **Runner's World** and **The Runner** have both made mention of Pat as a top runner. **Runner's World** in Jan. of 1981 and **The Runner** in Mar. 1981. Pat had these parting words to say of his running career, "I've done everything I wanted."

The Pride of the Pioneers



auditorium on Dec. 13. Christmas music was played under the direction of Ed McKown. Four instrumental pieces were conducted by students, who are music majors.











Christmas dance for their residents with refreshments.










Lori Euler and Everette Sparr are both freshmen from Clendenin. Lori is an Elementary Education major and Everette is majoring in Business Administration.








Although the GSC Football team did not finish with a good record in 1981, however the Pioneers did provide some excitement and gained valuable experience while doing so.




With only two players leaving, GSC should have a strong nucleus for next years' squad.







Dr. Hilgenberg remarked, "The guys put a lot of work into the season. They deserved to be Conference Champs."











An overall record of 11-17 was achieved by the Pioneer Men's Basketball team in the 1981-82 season. The Pioneers were 8-14 in the West Virginia Conference, including an exciting upset of Fairmont State College at the GSC gym.

Three seniors, Don Bullett, Mike Forbes, and Bill Lilly finished their careers at GSC. Bullett, who was an All-WVC selection in 1981 and a strong candidate for the 1982 team, finished his career with 1,854 points for a 16.1 average. Forbes had 658 career points for a 6.3 average, while Lilly saw little playing time in four years.

Leading returners for next years squad will be Scott Ludwig, Randy Anderson, and Clay Young. Ludwig averaged 15.6 points a game in his junior year and Anderson averaged 4.9 points and 4.5 assists in his junior year. 






Maria Lothes makes a shot from the baseline against the Fairmont State Lady Falcons.
































Overall, the third annual GSC Week and Field Day was a success. All those who participated received mugs and ribbons and some cash prizes.






