Thus, the 1984 KANAWHACHEN staff offers you "GSC ... Naturally."







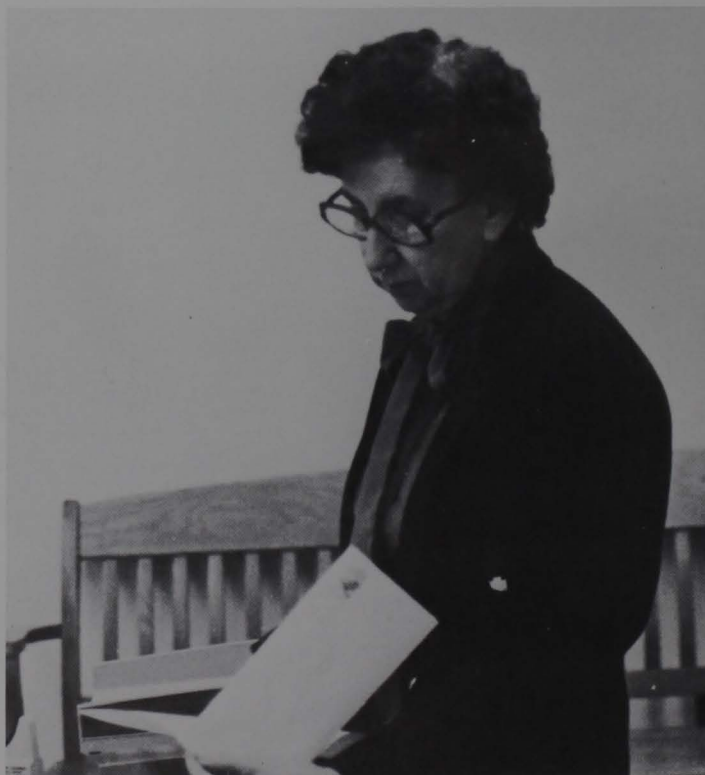

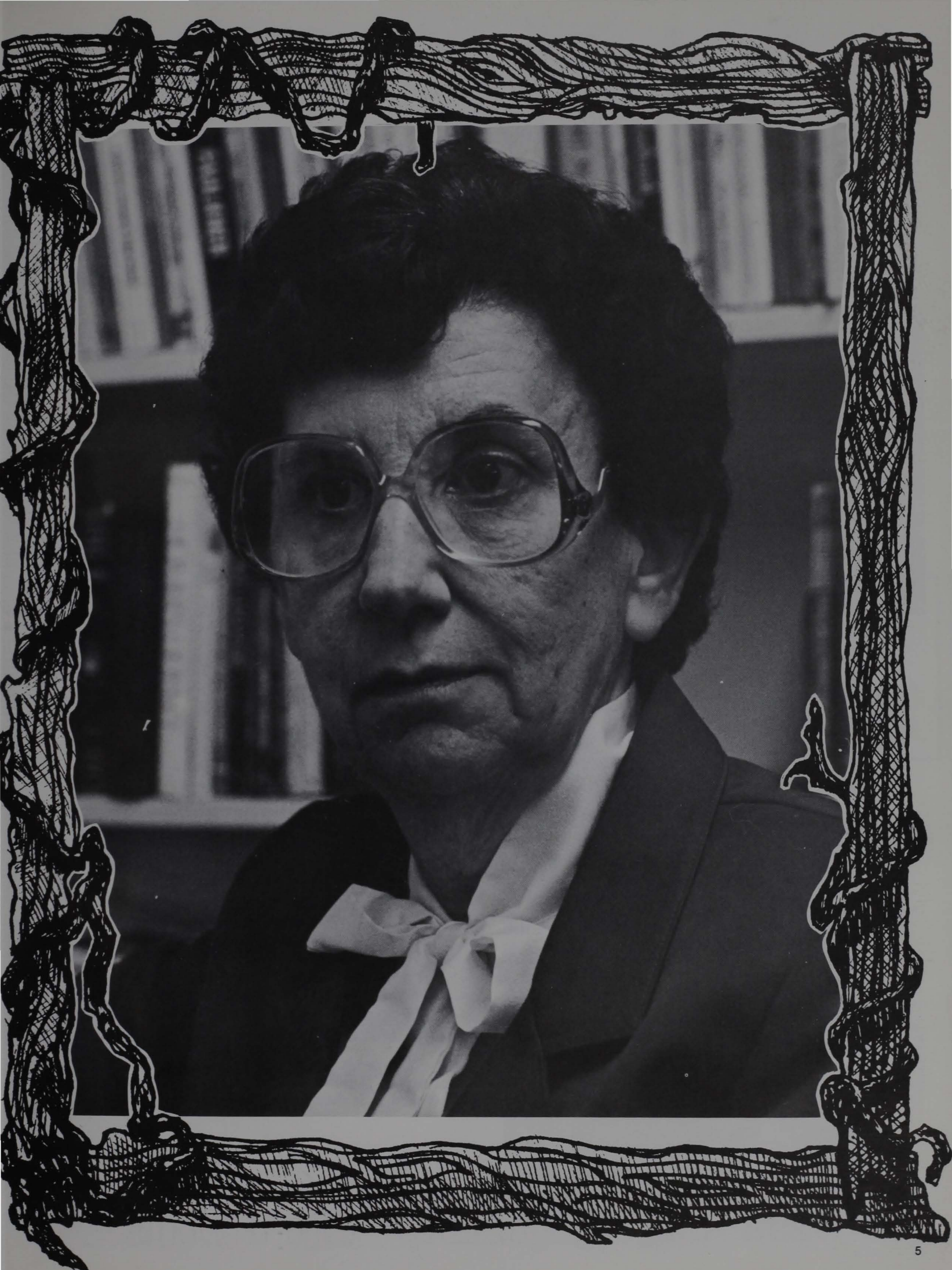

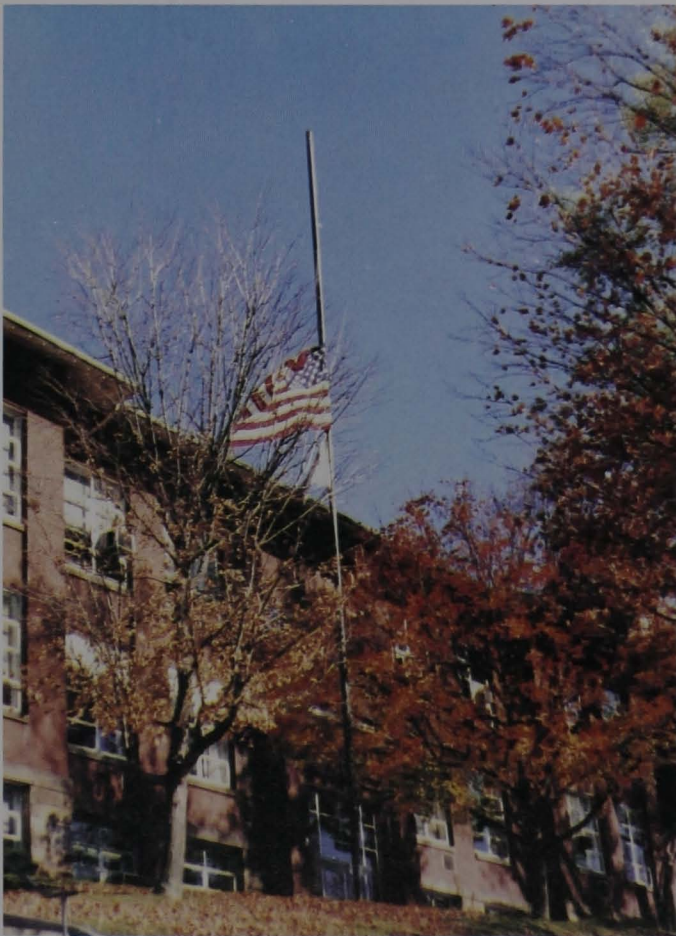






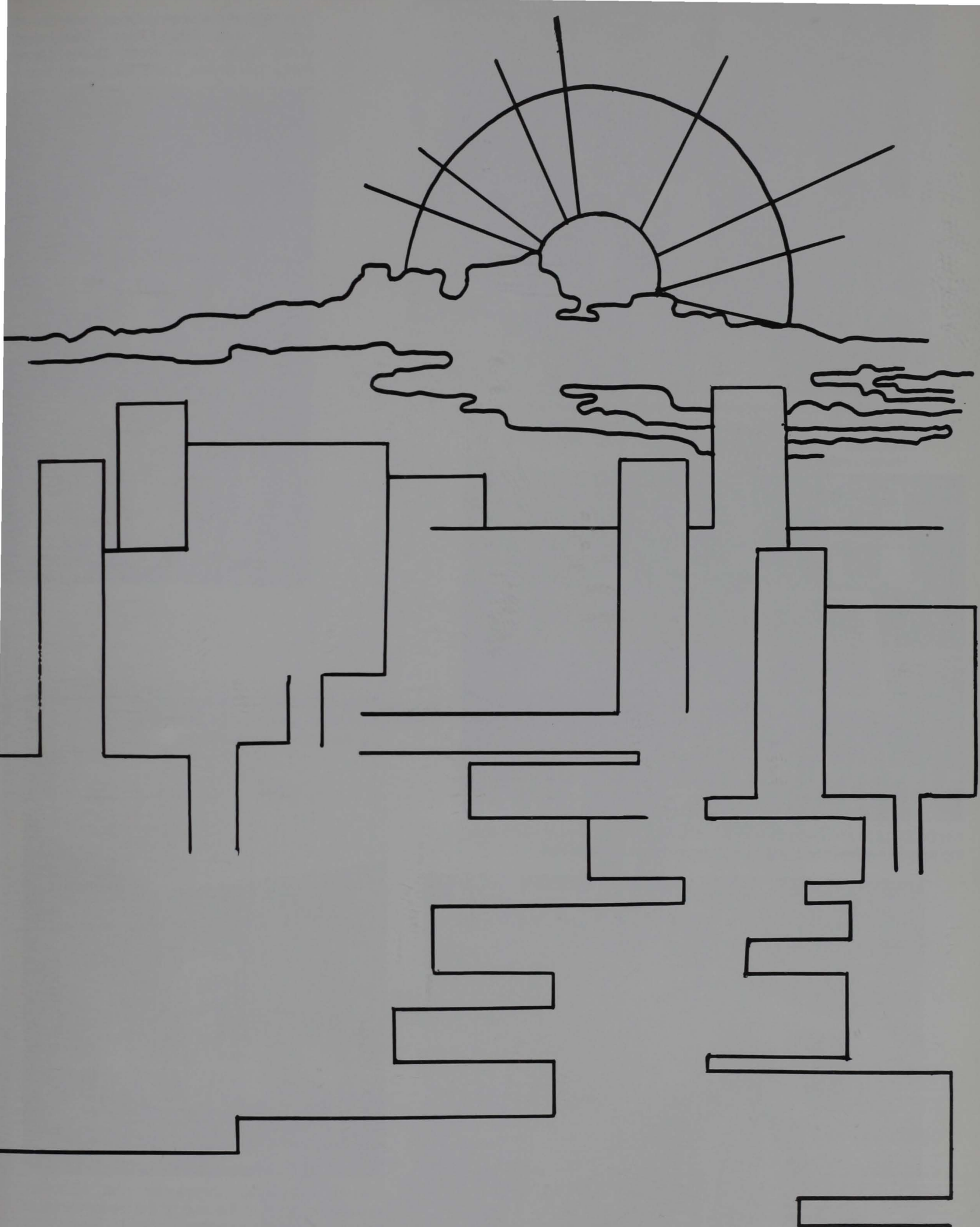

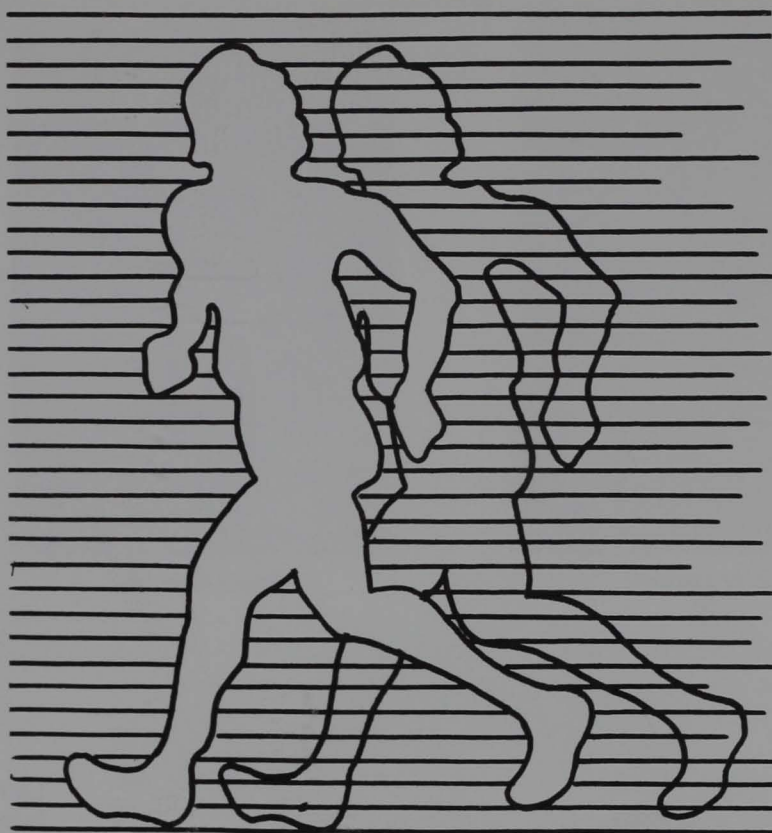

Larry Taylor closed out a spectacular career by winning his third individual championship in four years. For this, he was named Runner of the Year and was awarded All-WVIAC status.

The year 1983 saw the GSC Cross Country Team continue its stranglehold on the West Virginia Conference Cross Country Competition. Dr. James Hilgenberg's Harriers won their third straight Conference title this year, giving them three championships in only six years' existence.

Once again, the Pioneer Runners went through the regular season in the shadow of the Fairmont State Falcons, obviously a more talented team. Fairmont defeated Glenville in nearly every regular season meeting, but on November 4, 1983, Hilgenberg and his squad proved who had prepared the best by winning the WVIAC meet at Oak Hill. The score was close, 40-42, but Glenville was again number one.

Also earning All-Conference status was another senior, Steve Keenan. In 1983, Keenan placed fourth, vastly improved from a 49th place showing in 1980.



Freshman, David Antonik, Senior, Chris Keister and Junior, Steve Meckfessel were the remaining scoring members for GSC in the WVC meet. Antonik placed seventh, Keister finished 13th and Meckfessel was 15th to pace GSC to victory. Also participating were Freshman, Shawn Shockey (24th) and four-year member Steve Roberts (25th). The alternate was Lloyd Willis.

As a climax (really an anti-climax) to the season, the Pioneer squad competed in the NAIA national meet at Kenosha, Wisconsin two weeks after the conference meet. Hilgenberg's squad placed 35th of 37 teams, as compared to 30th of 36 the previous year, but the Blue Flex had left its mark one more time.

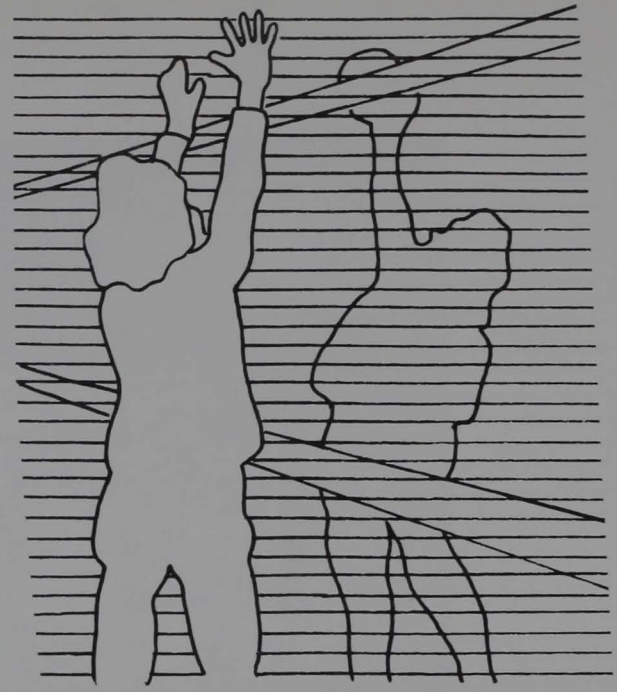

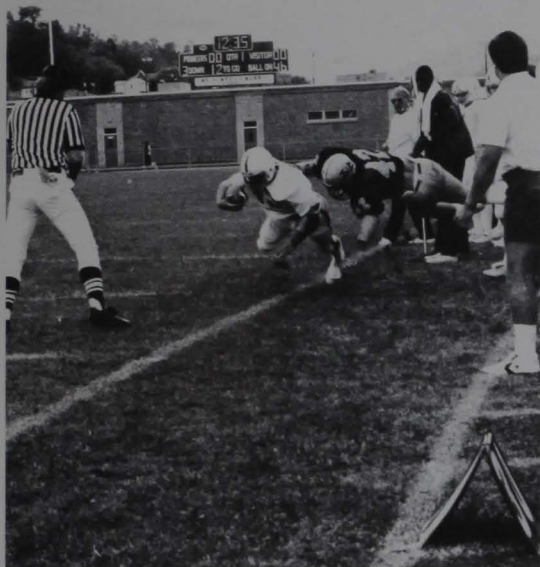

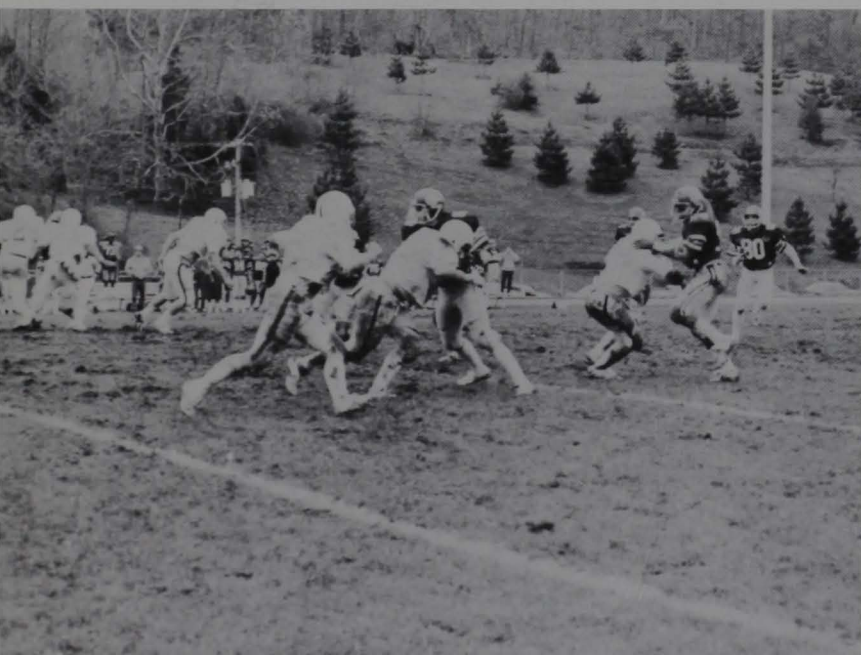
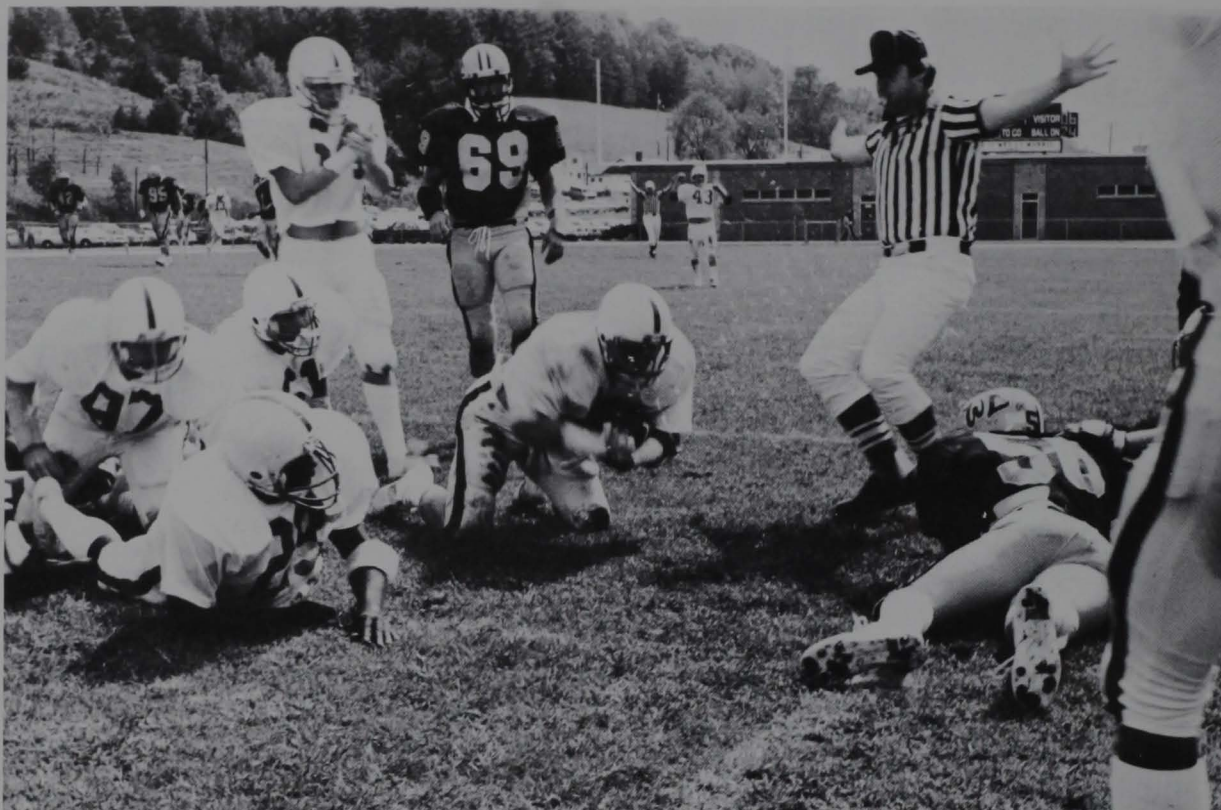

The year 1983 brought good fortune upon the Glenville State College football team for the first time in a while. The season was a successful one for Coach Frank Vincent's Pioneers.

GSC finished 1983 with a fine record of 6-2-1, which was a considerable improvement upon the year before. The Pioneers tied their opener, lost two of the next three games, then proceeded to win the remaining five games on the schedule for their 6-2-1 mark. The gridders placed second in the final West Virginia Conference standings.

Vincent had many outstanding individual performers over the course of the season. Different players were selected as players of the week in the WVC. Also, Terry Kendall, Mike Payne, Larry Loughner, and Byron Brooks received All-WVC honors.

Brooks continued to turn in impressive performances in 1983. The junior, although not gaining as much yardage as in the previous year, surpassed 1,000 yards and moved into first place on the all-time GSC rushing list. Also, Brooks was selected as a first-team pick on the Kodak All-American team.

On October 14, 1983, the first of seven student-directed one-act plays was performed on the GSC stage. The first show was written by John M. Houston and directed by Kent Woofter. The cast was made up of four members, two of which were newcomers to the GSC stage. The title of the production was *STRANGE ROAD*.

The play dealt with the love of Alan Talbot and Annie Kadan — a love so strong it transcended even death. Tim Brown played Alan Talbot, the only male member of the cast. Brown's portrayal was adequate — at times he could have been quite good — but all his attempts at realism were defeated by ever-present strains of eerie music which at times were louder than his speaking voice. His leading lady, Annie Kadan, was Lisa McHenry in a debut performance, she had a good delivery and she knew all her blocking, but her characterization of Annie lacked the needed flair to carry it over the hurdle from good to great.

The other two characters on stage, while not the romantic leads, had meaty roles, which they handled quite well. Kelly Boggess, a novice on the GSC stage, portrayed Mrs. Kadan. While Boggess did a fine job portraying her character vocally, her physical movement did not entirely convince one that she was an aging mother. Playing the part of Mrs. Talbot was Cheryl Keenan. Keenan truly made her character believable. She made the transition from crazed lunatic (in last spring's *THE INSANITY OF MARY GIRARD*) to that of a concerned parent very well.

The play was a success overall (as evidenced by its winning the Best Technical Production Award for the fall). It did lag in spots (the violins), but the cast overcame the mediocre script and prop goofs to bring a *STRANGE ROAD* to the Glenville State College stage.

Edward Albee's THE AMERICAN DREAM, an offering of theatre of the absurd, was presented on the GSC stage on October 28, 1983, under the direction of Bill Anderson. Cast members of the one-act production were: Daddy — Randy Harper; Mommy — Mahala Strauss; Grandma — Lou Davidson; Mrs. Barker — Beth Krantz; and the Young Man — Tony Leonard.

The show was a picture of the stereotypical American family from quite a different view. Daddy's character was portrayed by Harper with all the impotence the script called for. Harper carried off Daddy's air of detachment very well. Mahala Strauss, in her debut performance, portrayed Mommy's spastic lunacy adequately, balancing Daddy's lack of emotion.

Miss Davidson, as the feisty Grandma "doddering in the corner," gave what this reviewer felt to be her best performance ever before a GSC audience. Davidson mixed feistiness with tenderness and created a rapport with her audience throughout the course of the play until the very final scene when she wrenched a few hearts and caused a few tears to flow with her good-bye.

Both Krantz and Leonard gave decent performances in their debuts. Krantz's sleazy character managed to chase a few forgotten emotions from Daddy.

The set for the play was minimal yet it served its purpose and only enhanced the fact that the script is classified as theatre of the absurd.

Overall, the play was enjoyable and the director, cast, and crews are to be commended.

The second student-directed play was THE VALIANT by Holworthy Hall and Robert Middlemass which was presented on October 21 by Tammi Igo. Cast members were: Joe Stephens — Warden Holt; Mitch Moore — Father Daly; Tim Mace — James Dyke; Steve Keenan — Dan, the Jailer; Cara Keenan — Josephine Paris; and Paula Brown — the Attendant.

Stephens and Moore portrayed their characters well with the high degree of concern and frustration called for in attempting to determine the true identity of Dyke and the true story behind his imprisonment.

Mace and Miss Keenan held the audience in their hands throughout most of their performance, drawing them along through the unfolding story until the moment Josie leaves the prison as Dyke prepares for his execution — and Dyke reveals to the audience that he really is the brother she was searching for.

Keenan and Brown displayed fine performances in their minor roles.

THE VALIANT is a tribute to the actors, the director, and everyone who worked on the show. THE VALIANT achieved the purposes of theatre — to draw the audience from their worlds into the world of the characters and to so involve them in those characters' lives that they laugh with them and cry with them and hurt with them.

Neil Simon's comedy CALIFORNIA SUITE was produced on the evenings of November 16 and 17 by student directors Jack Kalmar, Mark Kozlowski, Randy Harper, and Joe Stephens. The play was divided into four groups of visitors to suite 203-204 to the Beverly Hills Hotel and each director presented a playlet.

The cast of "Visitor from New York," directed by Jack Kalmar, included Mike Dotson as Billy Warren and Kris Bush as Hannah Warren. Mark Kozlowski's cast for "Visitor from Philadelphia," included Gary Ross as Marvin Michaels, Pam McVey as Bunny, and Kelli King as Millie Michaels. Bill Anderson as Sidney Nichols and Kelly Davis as Diana Nichols were cast in Randy Harper's "Visitors from London." The cast of "Visitors from Chicago," directed by Joe Stephens, included Tim Mace as Mort Hollender, Tammi Igo as Beth Hollender, Tim Pittman as Stu Franklyn, and Mitzi Whited as Gert Franklyn.

In the first playlet, "Visitors from New York," Dotson and Bush portrayed a divorced couple deciding on their daughter's future. Though at times Bush seemed a bit uncomfortable with props (mainly her cigarettes), the act went off well. Dotson performed with the fatherly concern called for, and played off Bush's character's scathing comments fine. The high point for Bush, as far as her acting was concerned, came as her character decided to let their runaway daughter live with her father for the summer.

Simon's script switches to high comedy for the next playlet, "Visitor from Philadelphia." Ross portrayed the erring, harried husband with much hilarity, while King performed decently as the wronged wife, although at times it seemed the pouty King was modeling in a fashion show rather than acting. Ross's spastic energy, as the tense husband, was very good. McVey's minor role as Bunny, the body of Ross's (Marvin's) partner in adultery, added many laughs to the show with her limp, rag doll-like body.

From high hilarity, Simon returns to the "wit and parry" of Sidney and Diana Nichols, a gay antiques dealer and his wife, an Academy Award-nominated actress, in "Visitors from London." Anderson and Davis performed well in their roles, keeping up a good pace with the vicious verbal blows of the characters and easing gently into the bittersweet ending. The accents may have lacked a bit in smoothness — they were erratic at times — but the ability with which the actors played off each other made up for it.

Slapstick comedy at its wildest was portrayed in Simon's fourth playlet, "Visitors from Chicago." Mace and Pittman portrayed the insane antics of Mort and Stu with the energy and intensity required to keep the audience rolling in laughter. Igo and Whited did fine jobs in portraying Beth and Gert, complementing well the characters of their husbands. Perhaps the funniest moment in the entire show was the climax of slapstick when the two men, carrying the injured Gert to the bed to lie beside the injured Beth, collapsed in a chaotic tangle of bodies with appendages sticking out in every direction.

Overall, CALIFORNIA SUITE, despite some technical problems, offered something for everyone — slapstick comedy, cutting wit, and bittersweet romance; and the audience re-entered the "real world" still chuckling.

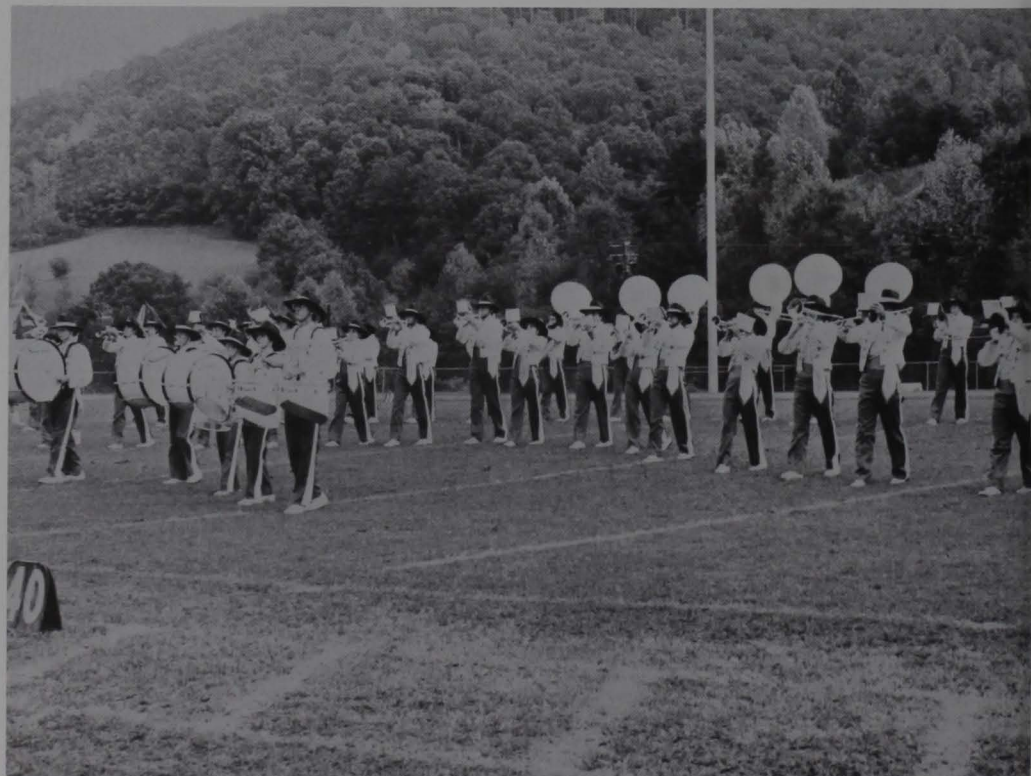

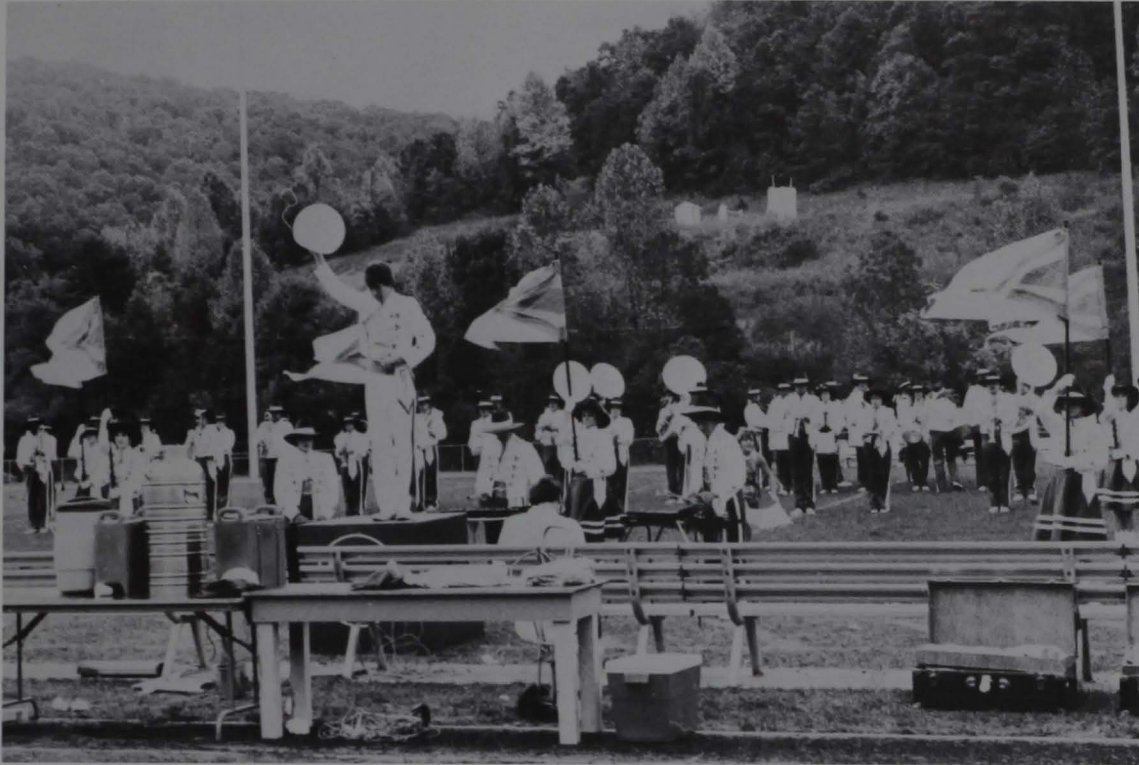


The majestic GSC marching band poses in formation.

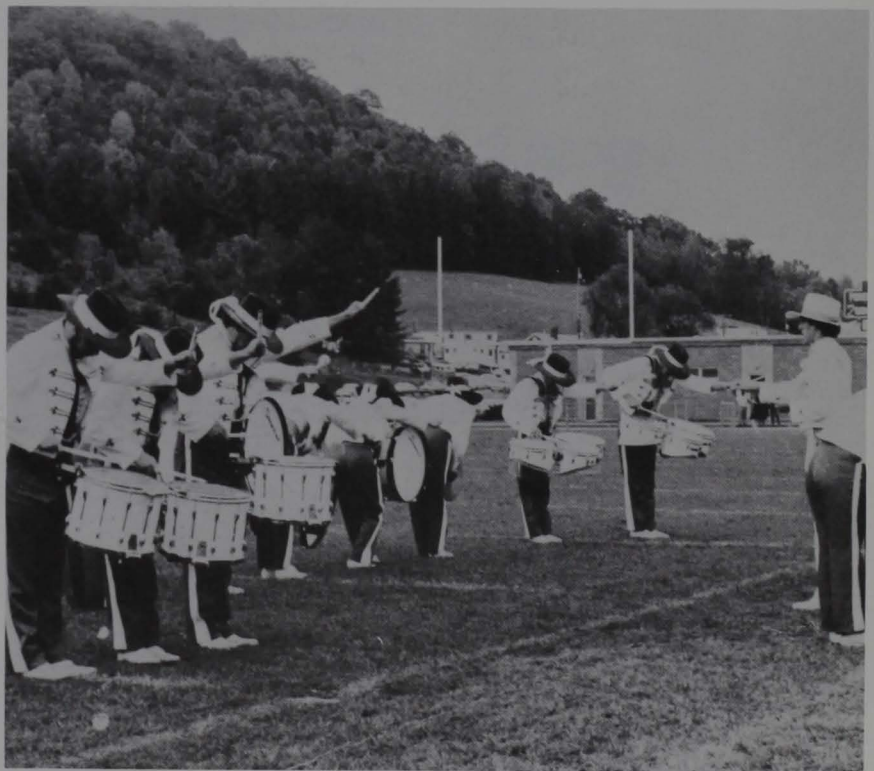

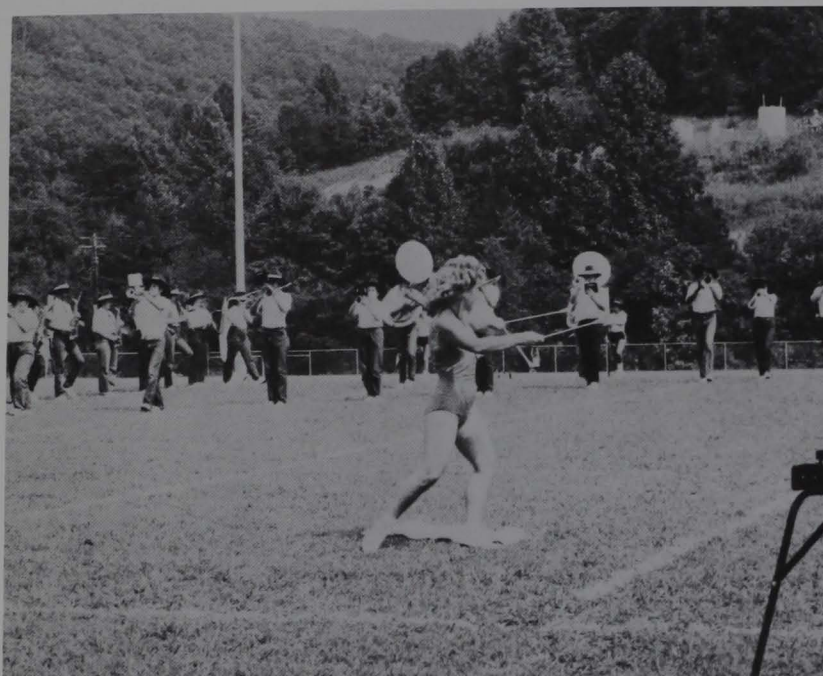

The percussion section is featured during one portion of the show.

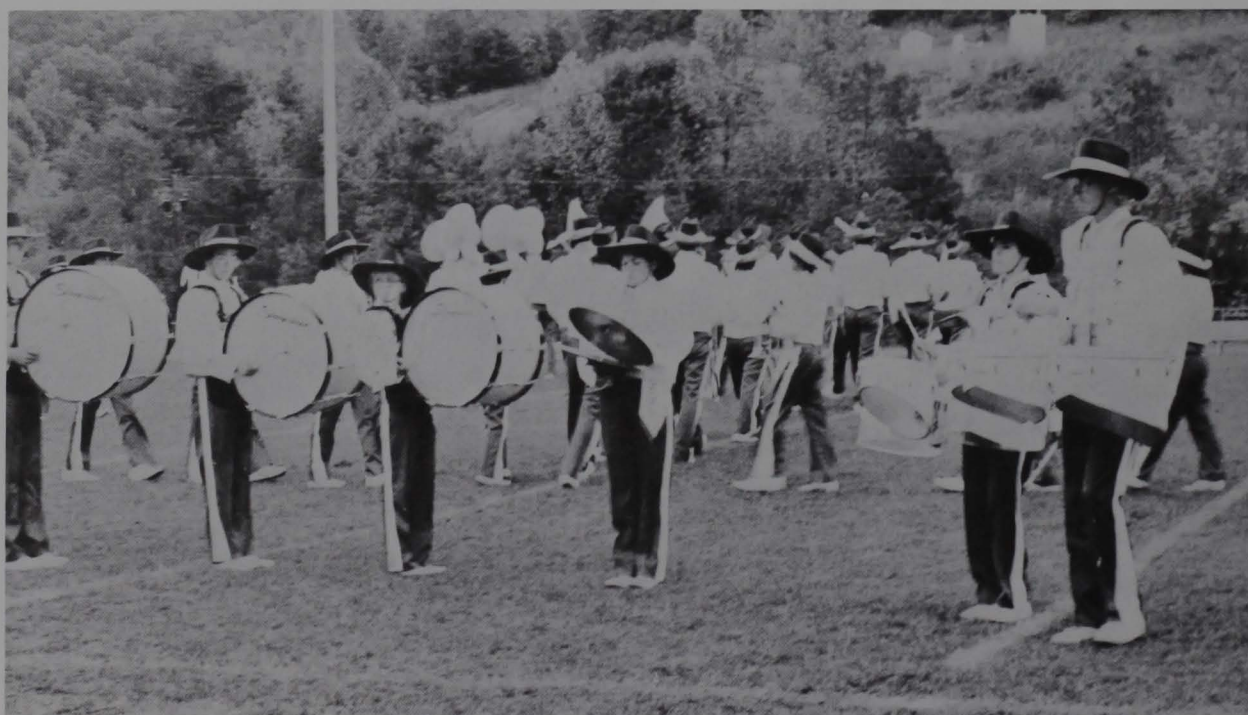




Beth Krantz, feature twirler for the band, is spotlighted during half-time of a football game.



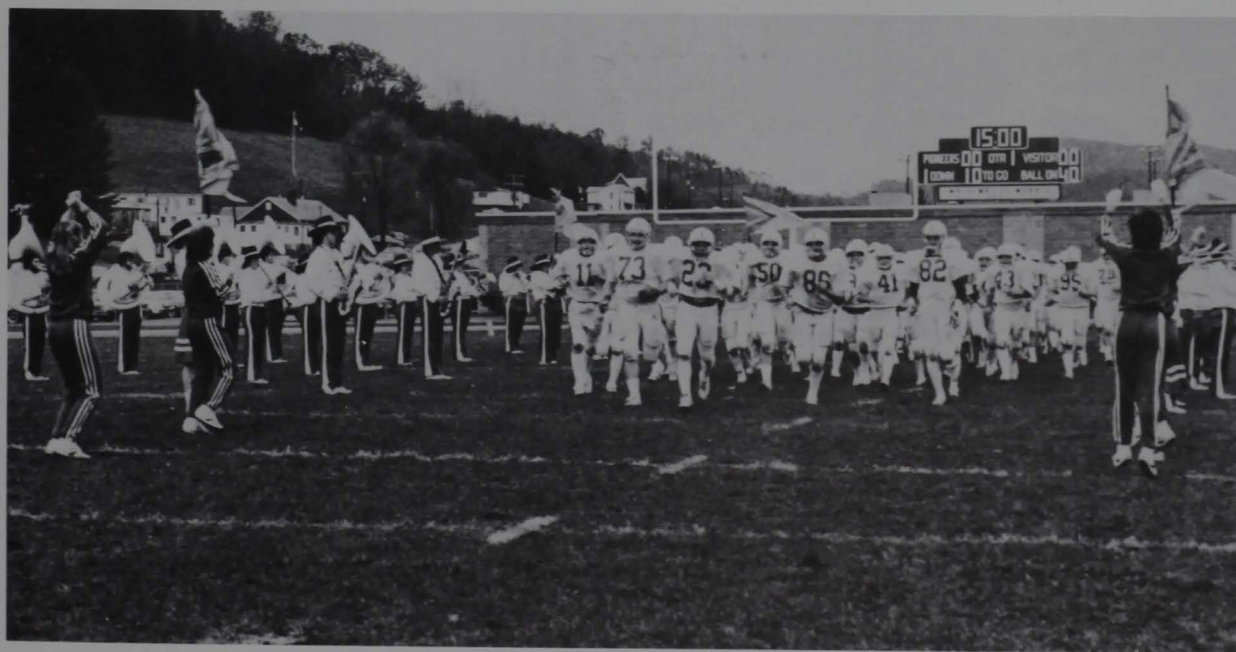

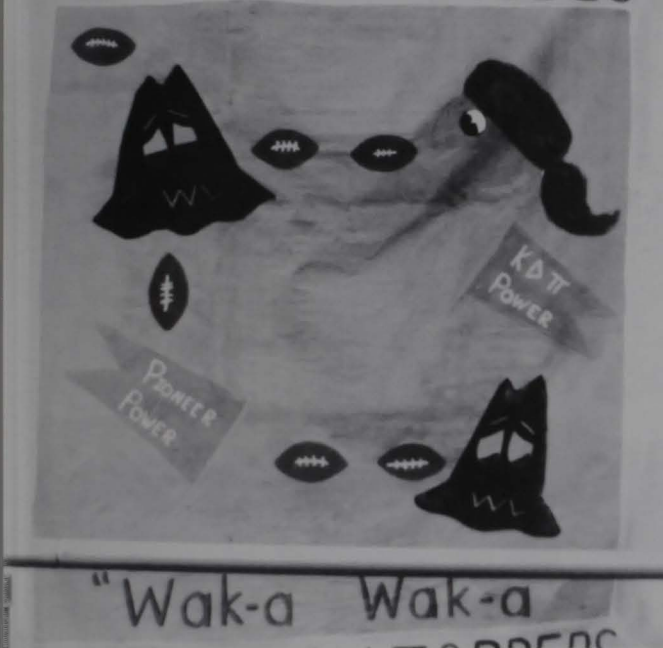

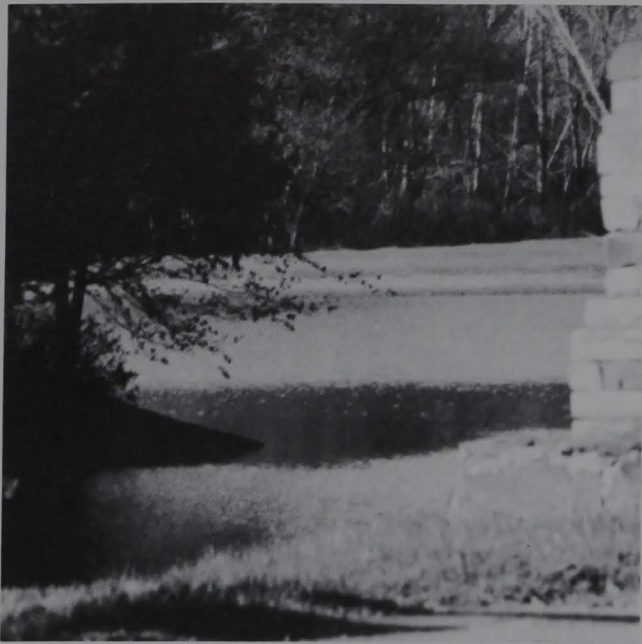

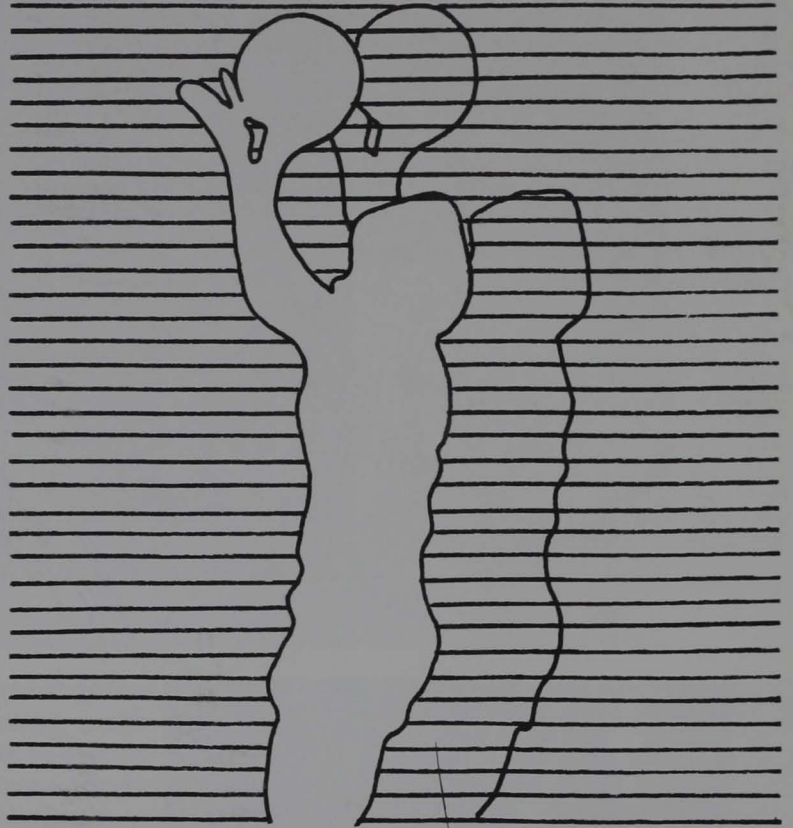

An upset occurred, however, in the post-season tournament in Charleston. Lowly West Virginia State stunned GSC, 94-92, in a first round game to bring an abrupt halt to the surprising season. It still had been a good season for GSC.

For his outstanding effort, the young Nottingham was first of all named as permanent head coach of the Pioneers near the season's end, then he showed that he had gained the respect of the state by being named runner-up in the balloting for Coach of the Year.

An outstanding three-year player for GSC, Clay Young, finished his career in fine fashion by being selected to the All-West Virginia Conference first team for the season. He was one of the league's top players, game in and game out, and he scored 35 points in the tourney game. Young is high on the list of GSC all-time totals in rebounds and scoring. He scored 20.6 points a game.

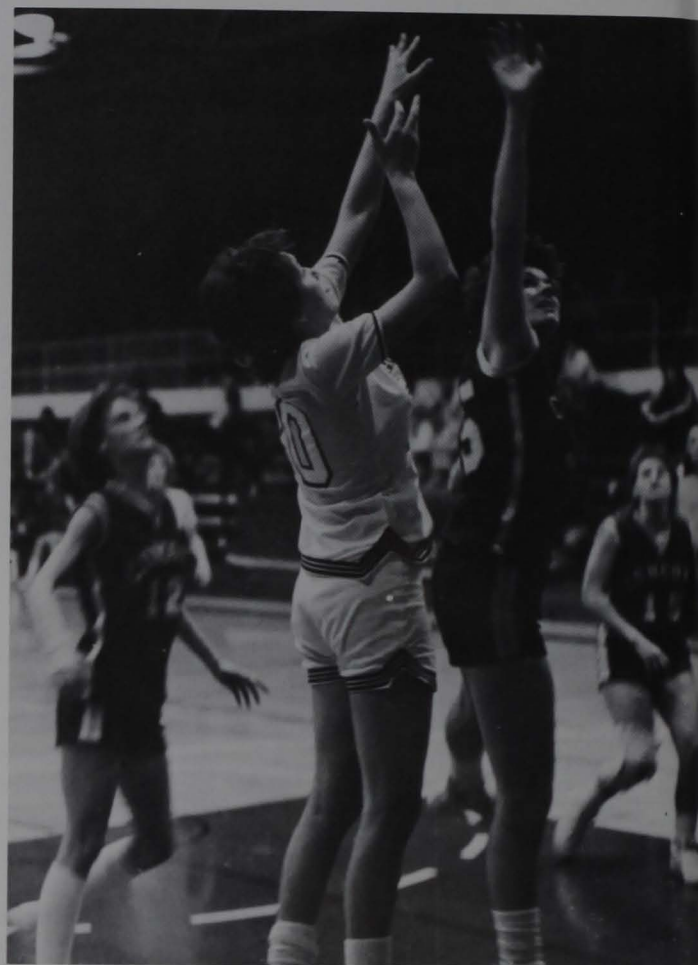

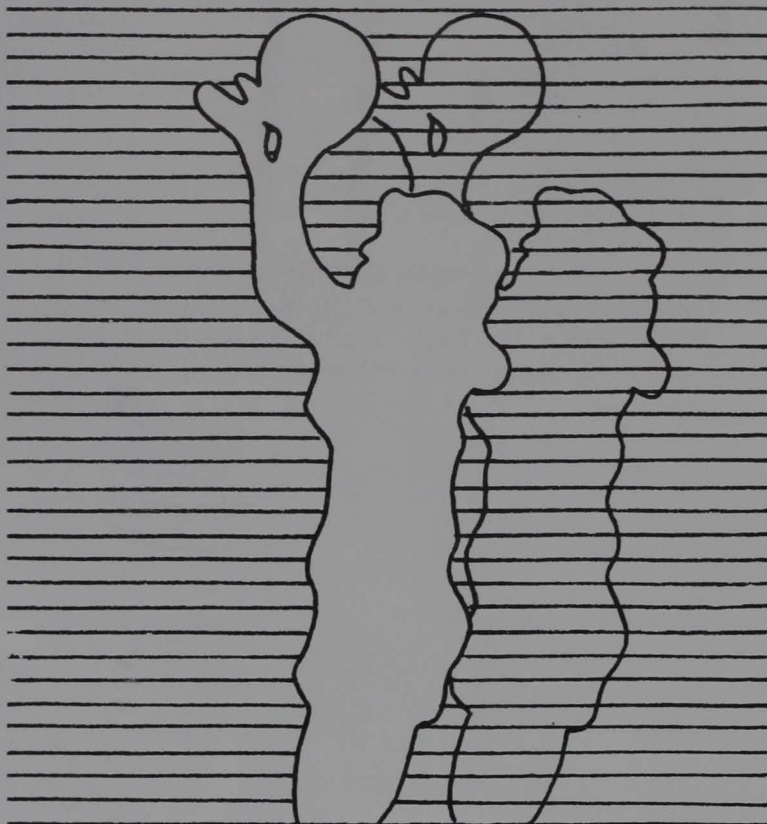
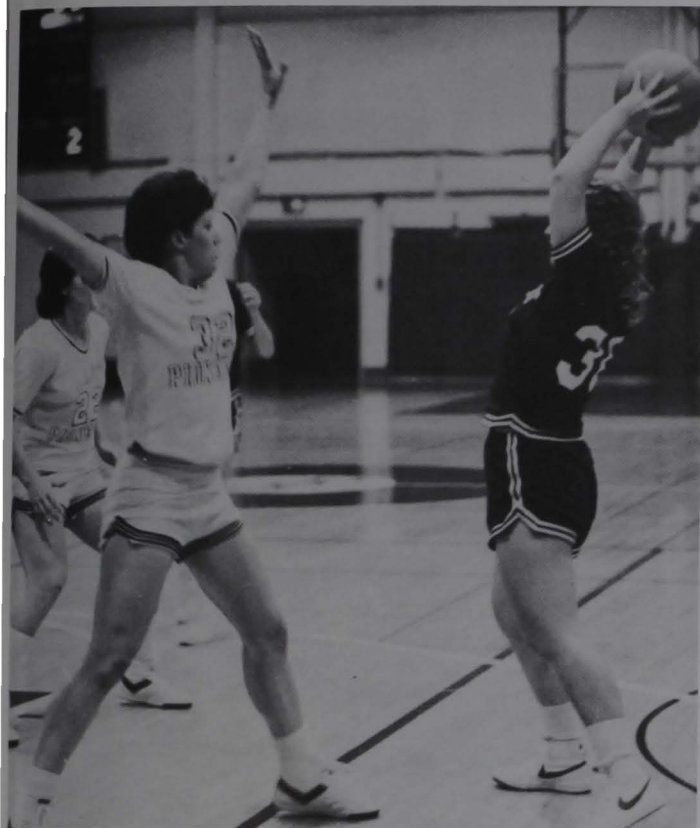


Kim Maynard takes a short jump shot over the out-stretched arm of a Concord defender.

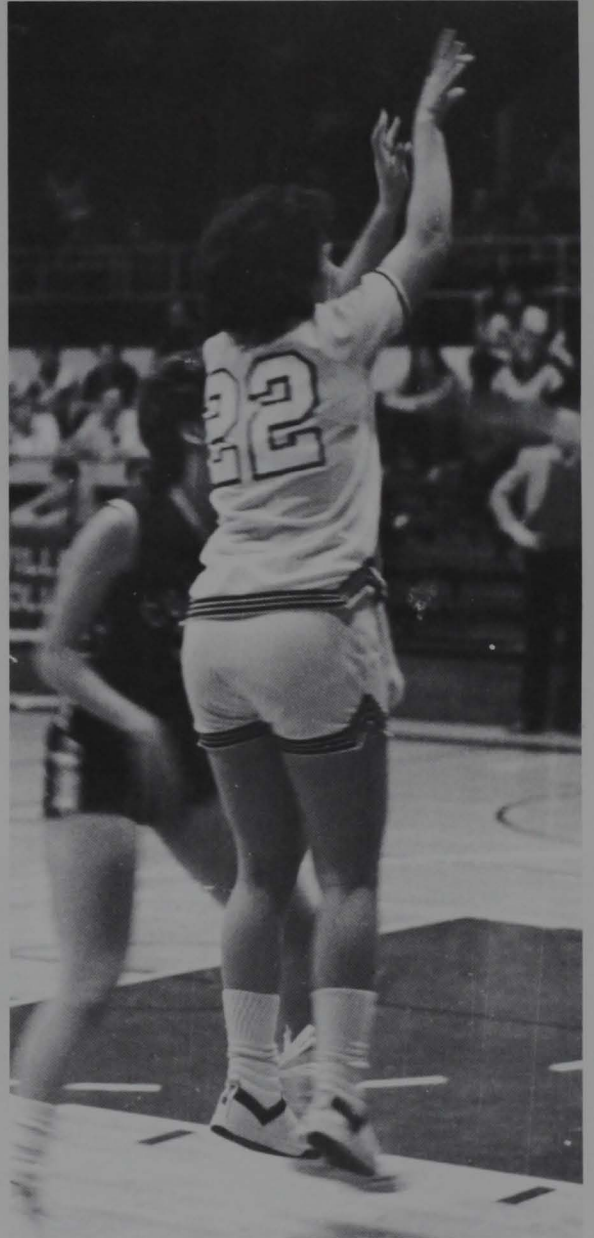

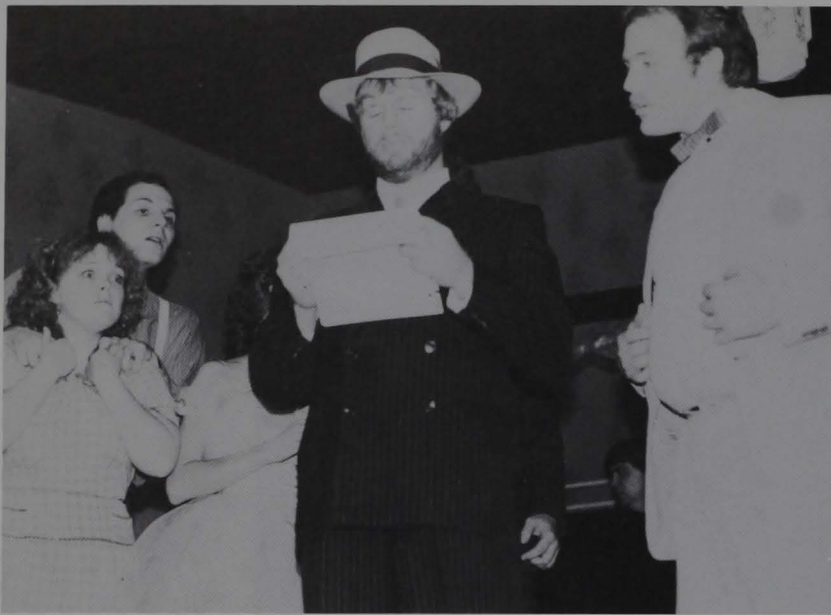

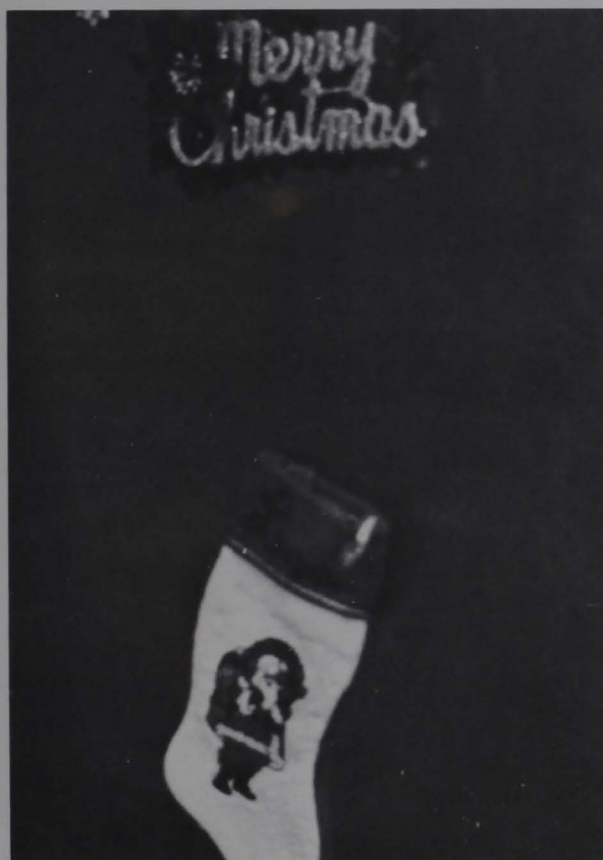

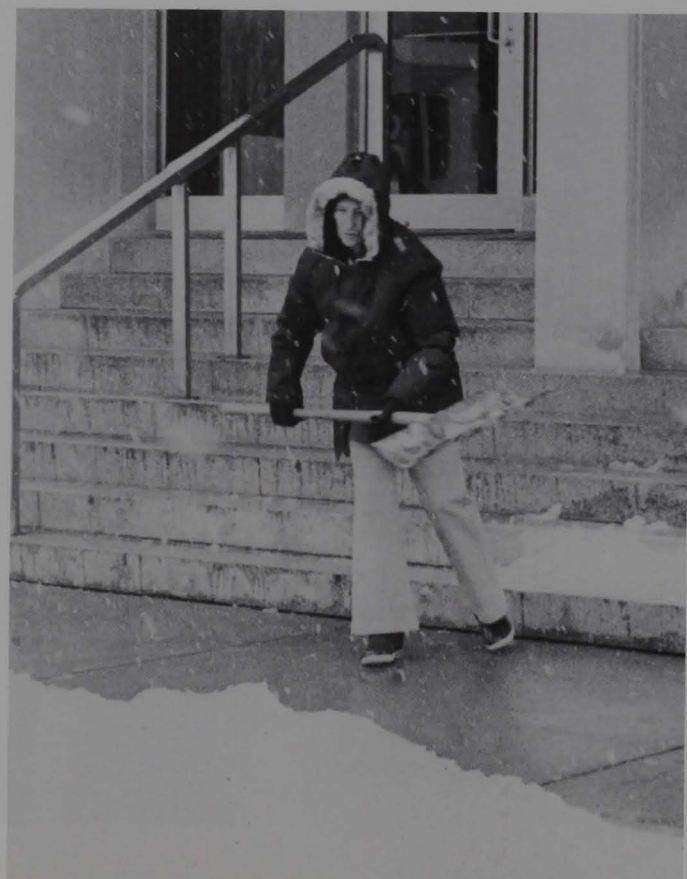

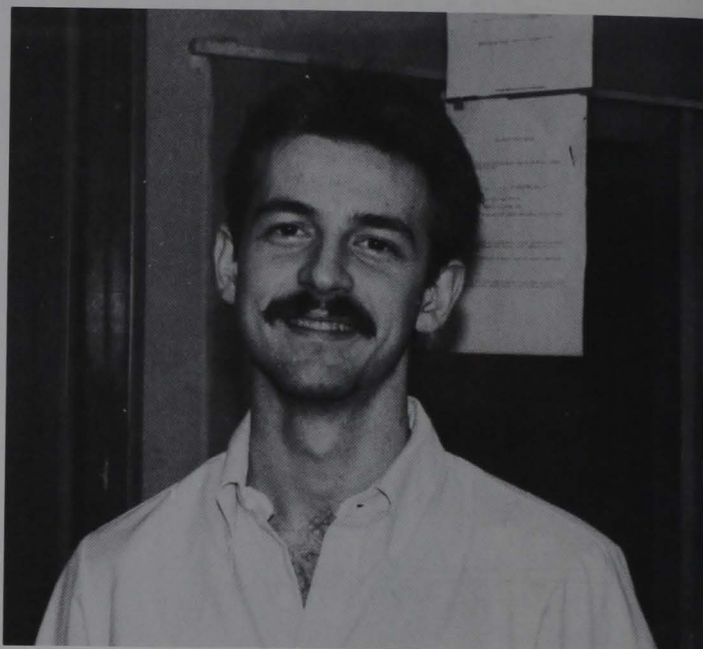

After several frustrating years of coming close, the Glenville State College men's track team finally captured the elusive West Virginia Conference team championship last spring. Joining the Cross Country squad as the only conference winners on the GSC campus for the year, the Pioneer tracksters defeated West Virginia State and three other schools to claim the title.

Glenville piled up enough points in the field events and the distance events to overcome State's superior sprinting corps. Coach Jerry Milliken's team scored 193 points, as compared to 182 for the Yellow Jackets. In 1983, WVSC won the conference crown by nearly 30 points over Glenville.

Larry Taylor, Mr. Consistency, finished his outstanding career at GSC with a bang. The St. Marys native won four distance running events at the conference meet to tally 40 points and earn Trackman of the Year honors for the second year in a row. Taylor won the 800 meters in 2:00.3, the 1500 meters in 4:10.6, the 5,000 meters in 15:46.7, and the 10,000 meters in 33:32.5. In obtaining four first place finishes, Taylor kept up his record of never placing worse than second in any event in track or cross country during four years of conference competition.

For guiding his squad to the WVC Championship, Jerry Milliken earned the title of "Track Coach of the Year," an award which he certainly deserved.





# Women's Track Squad Struggles

The 1984 version of the Lady Pioneers' track squad never had a chance. The women, all four of them, gave it their best, but the small numbers killed them. The head coach for the 1984 team was Sandra Piercy, with Ollie Pottmeyer as assistant.

Mary Davis, Sharon Hayes, Pam Carson, and Judy Jones were GSC's four participants. Davis, a previous All-WVC performer, was unable to perform at the West Virginia Conference meet.

At the WVC meet in Glenville, GSC placed third behind West Virginia Wesleyan and West Virginia State. All three women scored points. Carson won the long jump and the 100 meters and placed second in the 200 meters. Hayes won the 800 meters and finished third in the 400 meters. Jones placed in the shot put and javelin.

Mrs. Piercy was tabbed as the women's "Track Coach of the Year" by the WVC.

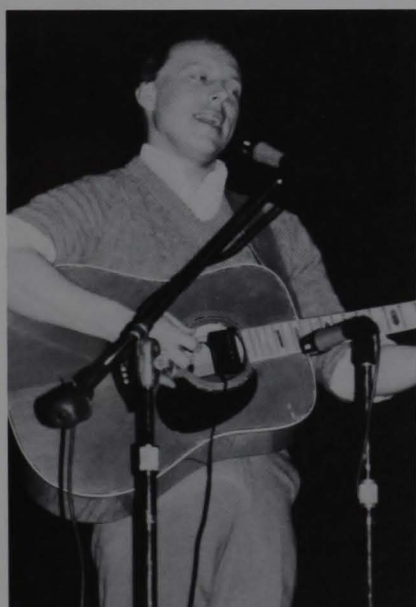

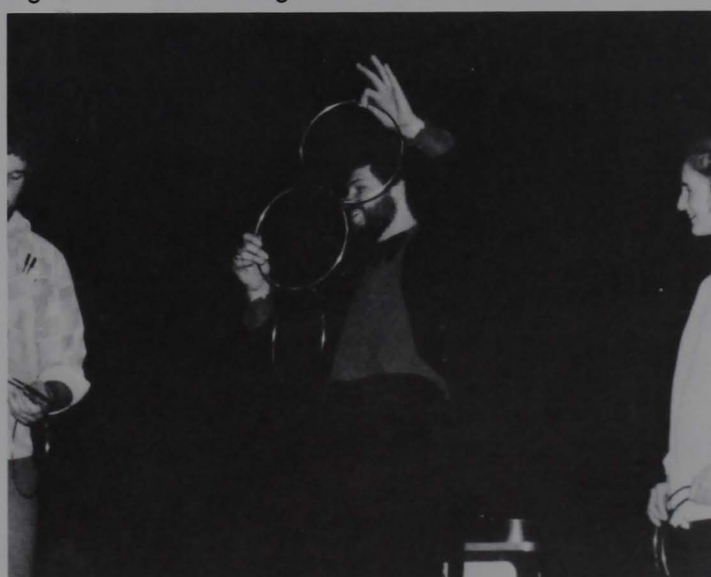

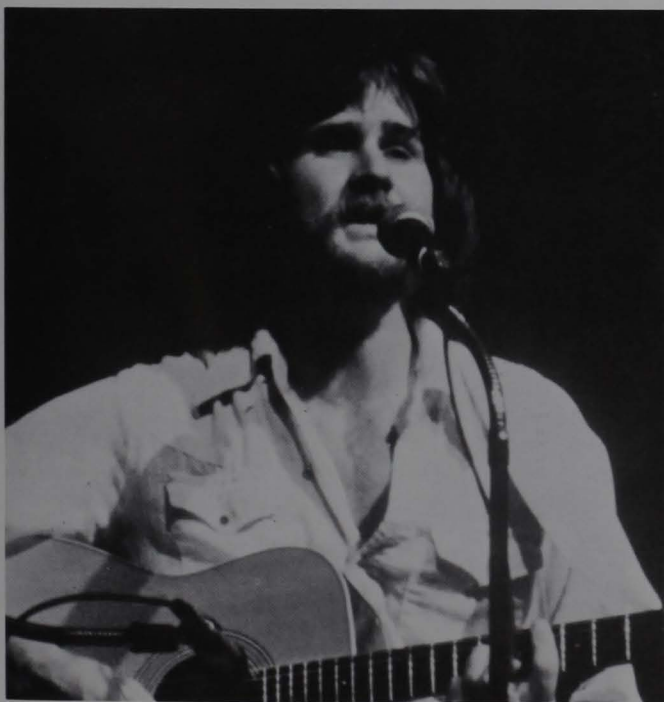

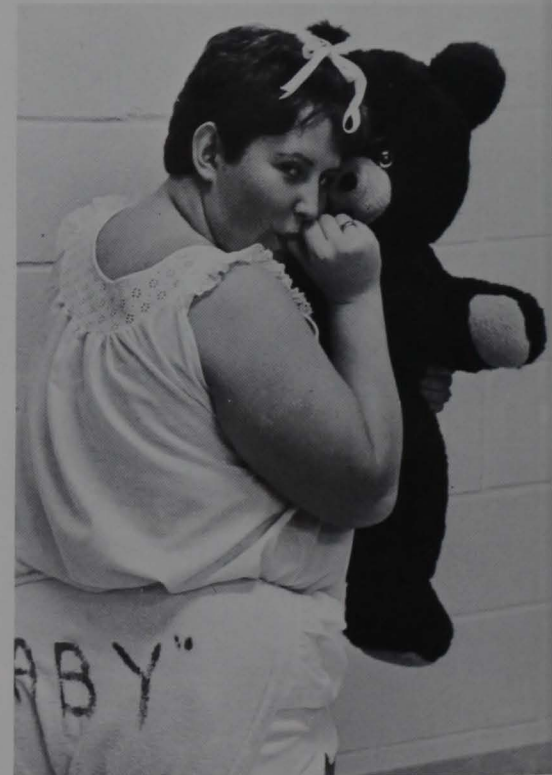

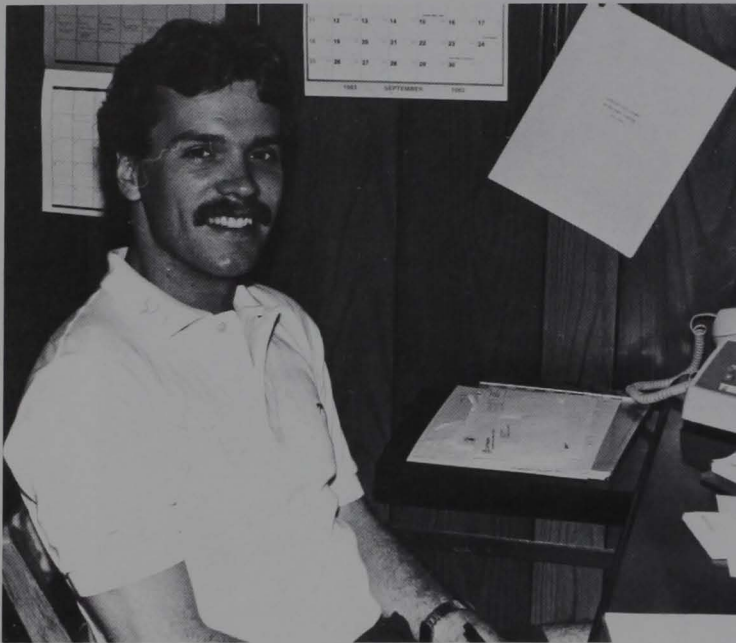

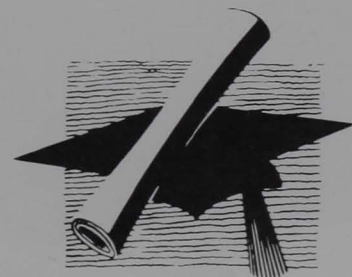

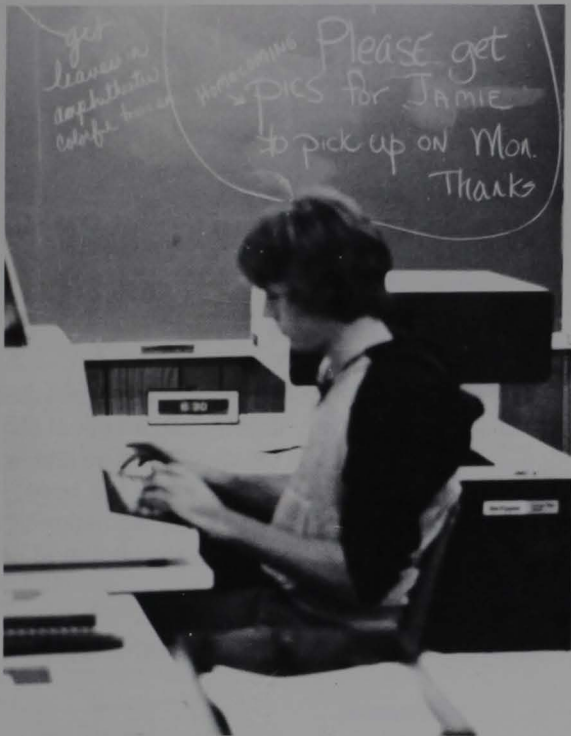

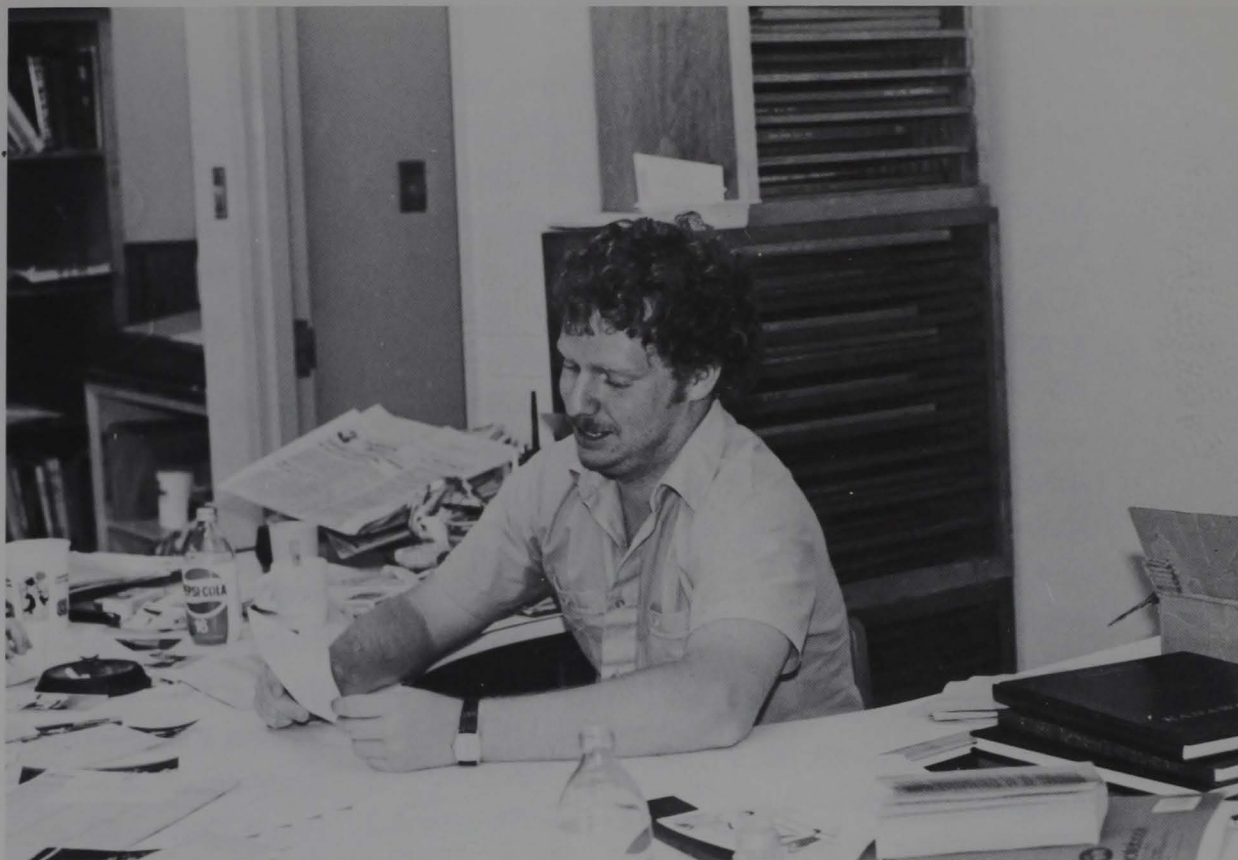
