The Wesley Foundation campus ministry is a source of many activities for students on campus. Not only does it provide activities for students but is a link to the community



Glenville Students Help Fight World Hunger

Twenty-five African countries are appealing for emergency aid to ward off famine. As many as 150 million people face critical shortages of food, medical supplies, health care and water. Drought affects onethird of the African people and every year the Sahara desert expands by a few million more acres. By concentrating on longrange agricultural and economic development, we can help the African people once again help themselves.

The GSC students have shown

their support concerning the issue of world hunger. During the year Student Congress sponsored a Congress member to represent Glenville at a Bread for the World Conference held at Randolph-Macon College in Virginia. They also sponsored a dance in which all proceeds went to African Relief. In addition, the Wesley Foundation sponsored a day of letter writing. This was set up so that concerned students and faculty could write to their congressmen urging them to pass legislation concerning African relief. By showing their support, Glenville students proved that hunger is something everyone should be concerned about because "We Are The World."

Poronation rowning a Homecoming Queen has long been a tradition at GSC However, this year's ceremony did not go unchanged.


Due to construction conflicts behind the library, the crowning ceremony was held on the steps of Clark Hall, rather than the Ampitheater. The new site lent itself well

Have you ever heard the expression "What you see is what you get?" This may be true, but often times what goes on 'behind the scenes' is a vital step to what we the audience or spectators view.






