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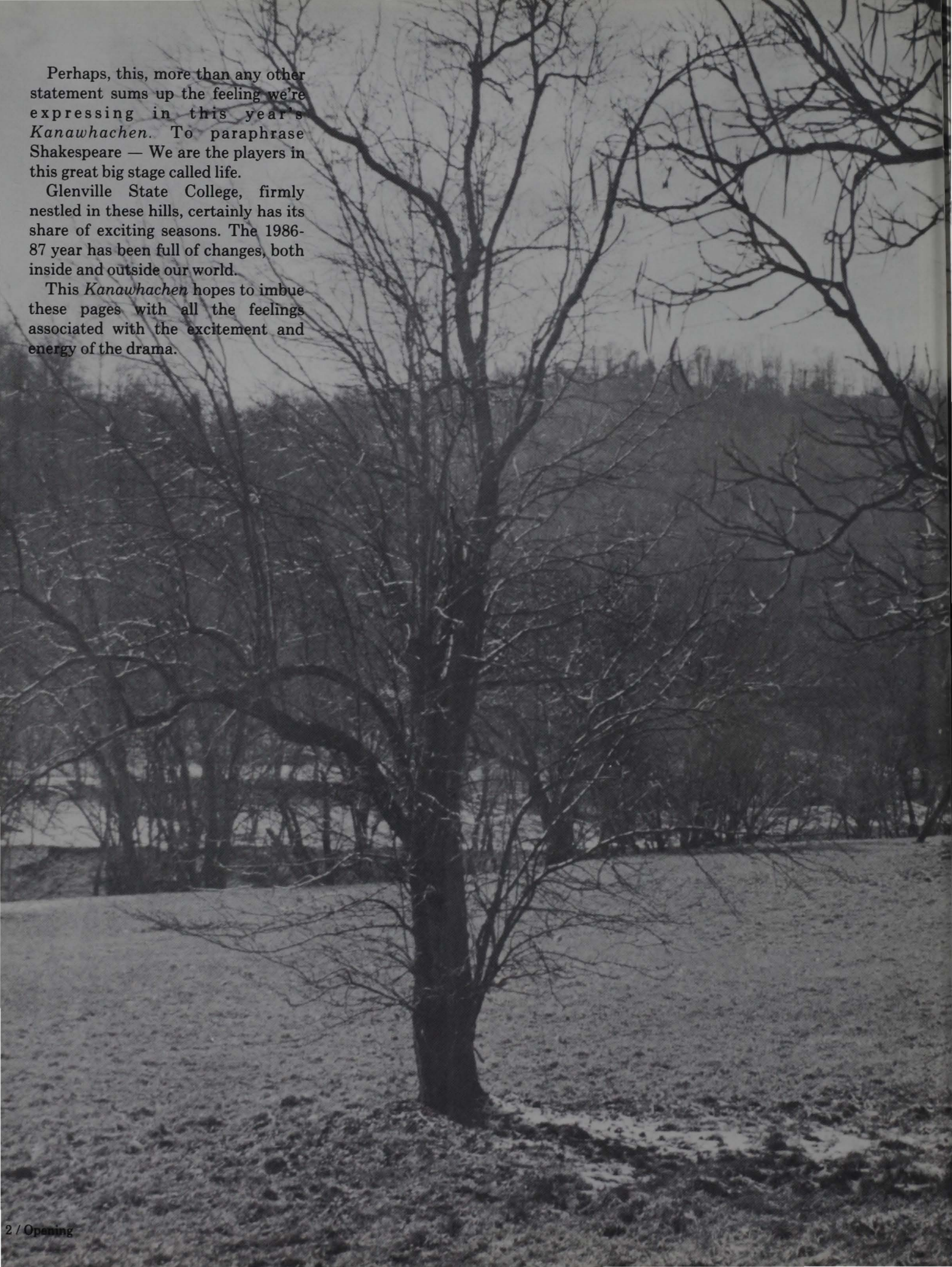

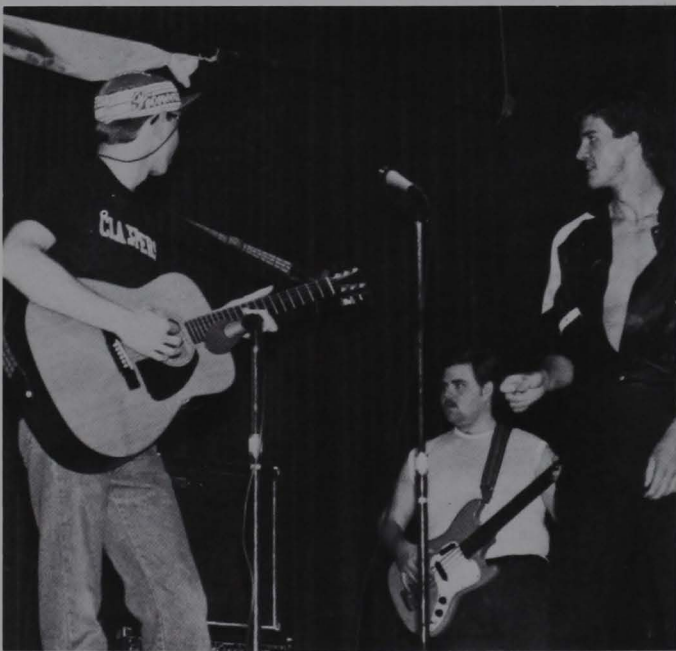




# G.S.C. Week 1987

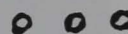

The dance turned out to be a success with the help of the two D.J.'s, Kevin Carr and Kirk St. Clair, and everyone danced the night away.





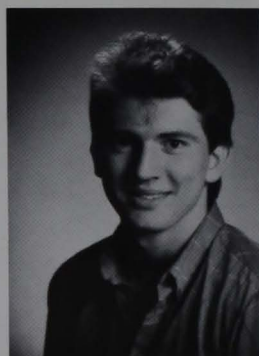

## GSC Professors Tour China

Dr. Hilgenberg and Dr. Hymes, along with sixteen other WV instructors, departed on June 5 for a tour of the world's most populated country — China. Both of our instructors were chosen from thirty state-wide applicants to tour China for six weeks during the summer vacation.

Prior to departure the group attended many lectures given by experts on China from the University of Pittsburgh. The group couldn't really absorb the information until they had experienced China for themselves, which is what they did while visiting twelve of the twenty major cities in China.

The members of this project were hosted by two universities in China who hoped to develop an interest in Western society. The citizens of China also helped to make the Westerners feel at ease in their culture. Both instructors said the Chinese people were very nice and anxious to welcome Westerners into their country, even though they had little experience in dealing with them.

The Chinese people were quick to demonstrate pride in their history and traditions, but at the same time displayed their advances in industrialization. Some of the factories toured were very much up-to-date while others were very primitive. This country is trying very hard to catch up with the West and is doing a remarkable job considering their late start.

On July 19 sixteen very tired instructors returned to their respective colleges with the assignment of preparing a twenty page module for the program and devoting 20 percent of their World Cultures classes to the study of China.

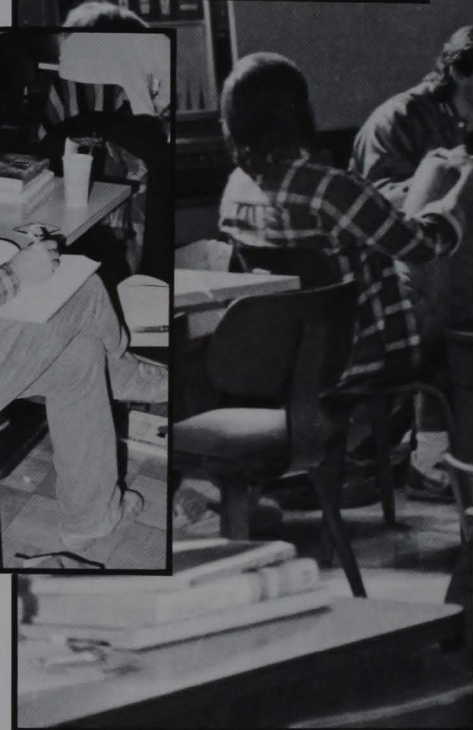
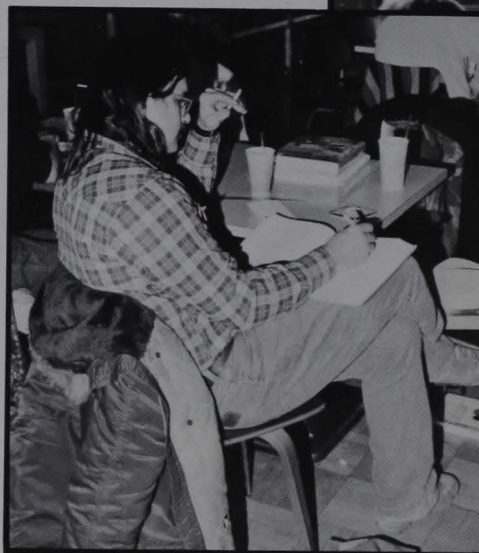
Glenville State students are very lucky to have two experienced professors in their classrooms who can bring to them a part of China through their slides and lectures.

Commuters account for 658 of the 1076 students that attend classes at GSC. That is more than half of the school population. There are 502 of those students travelling from outside of Glenville.

For some, bad weather deprives them of another hour's sleep because they have to allow time to get through the snow. It is not unlikely to find a GSC commuter cutting the snow path at five-thirty one cold morning.

After making it to campus, still another problem awaits — parking.

"I've developed something called creative parking," says one frustrated student.

Another laments that she parks farther from her classes than most kids live from theirs.

Parking tickets have a common place in a commuter's life, as do weather reports and flat tires, but there is one thing to be said for driving a car to school: it is the one quiet place for a nap on slow afternoons.

They are GSC's unconventional students. That is, the older segment of our school population, and they know something most of us do not.

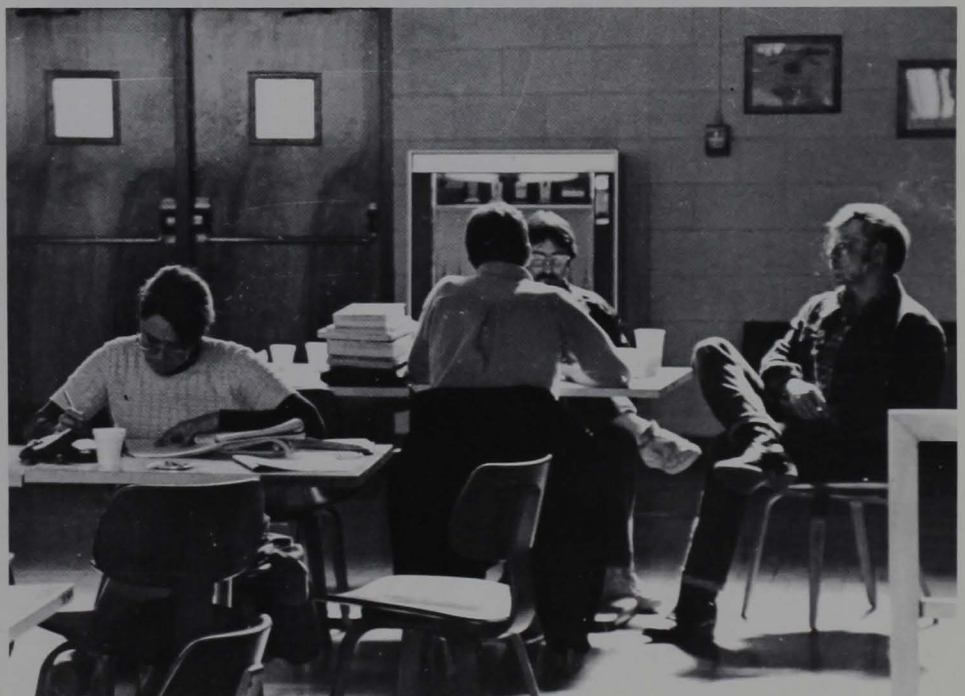
"We've been in the real world, and we know this is the easy life," says a 33 year-old student.

Another student comments that he always wanted to attend college and he plans to enjoy it now that he has the chance.

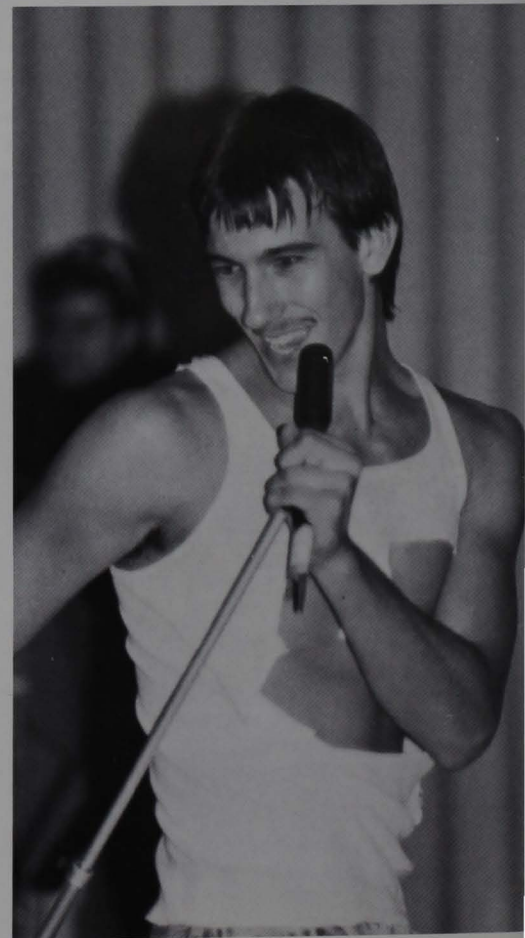
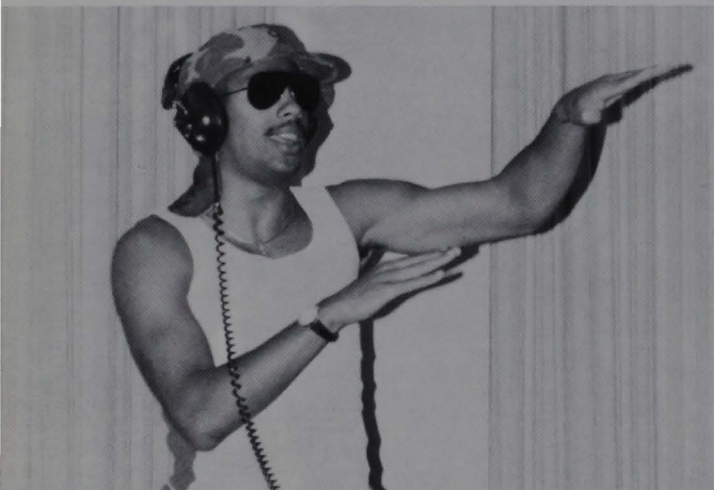
This enthusiasm is especially evident in the classroom. In class they are the ones who always have their assignments finished on time and never hesitate to answer questions.

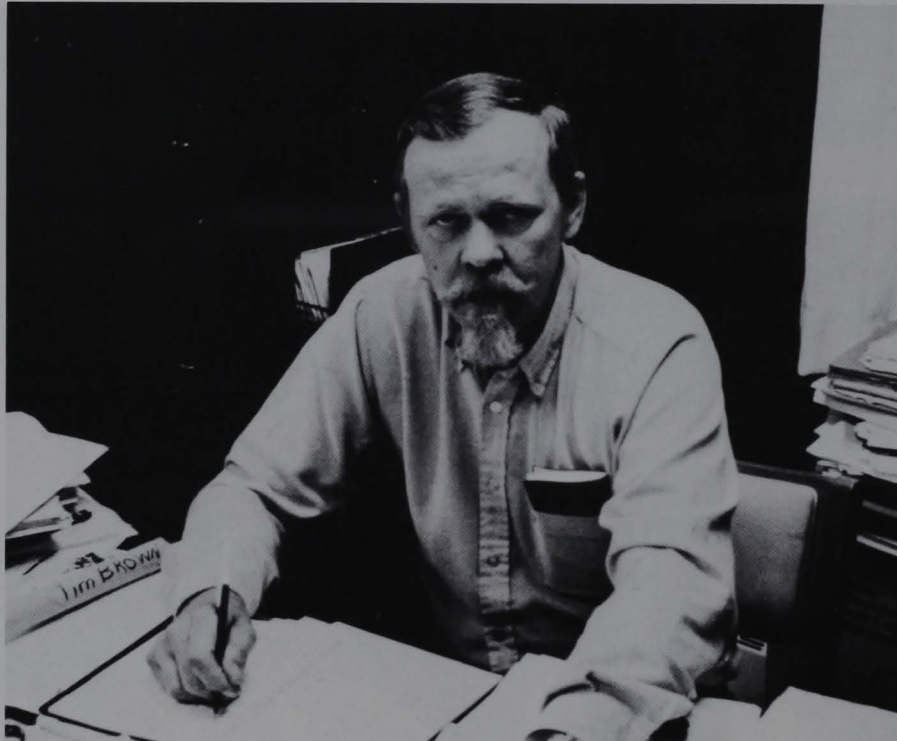








# TEACHER EXCHANGE SLATED



A. Edwin Grafton, Chairperson of the Division of Forestry and Land Resources, has been selected to participate in a teacher exchange for the academic year, 1987-88.

Robert Dunsmore, Professor of Forestry, at the University of New Caledonia, at Prince George, British Columbia, Canada, sent out a request stating his desire to exchange with someone, preferably someone in the Eastern United States who worked in hardwoods area. Mr. Grafton responded, and as a result, will be going to the University of New Caledonia to serve as an exchange forestry professor there. Mr. Grafton is excited about the exchange for the fact that it will allow him the opportunity to work in the "big conifer" region. In addition to that, this experience will ultimately afford more involvement with the International Business program. It is interesting to note that of all the wood products exported to the U.S., 80% of it comes from British Columbia. The U.S. is interested in improving our exportation in the wood products area.

Ed Grafton received his M.S. in Forestry from W.V.U. in 1963, and briefly served on the faculty there. He taught Forest Technology in Kenya from 1965-68. He has served on the faculty at Glenville State College from 1972, excepting one year from 1982-83, during which he served as an instructor in forestry in Zimbabwe. Mr. Grafton is a native of Fayette County, W.V., and currently resides in Braxton County, where, in his spare time, he runs a Christmas tree farm, having the dubious distinction of being the number one tree farmer in Braxton County. 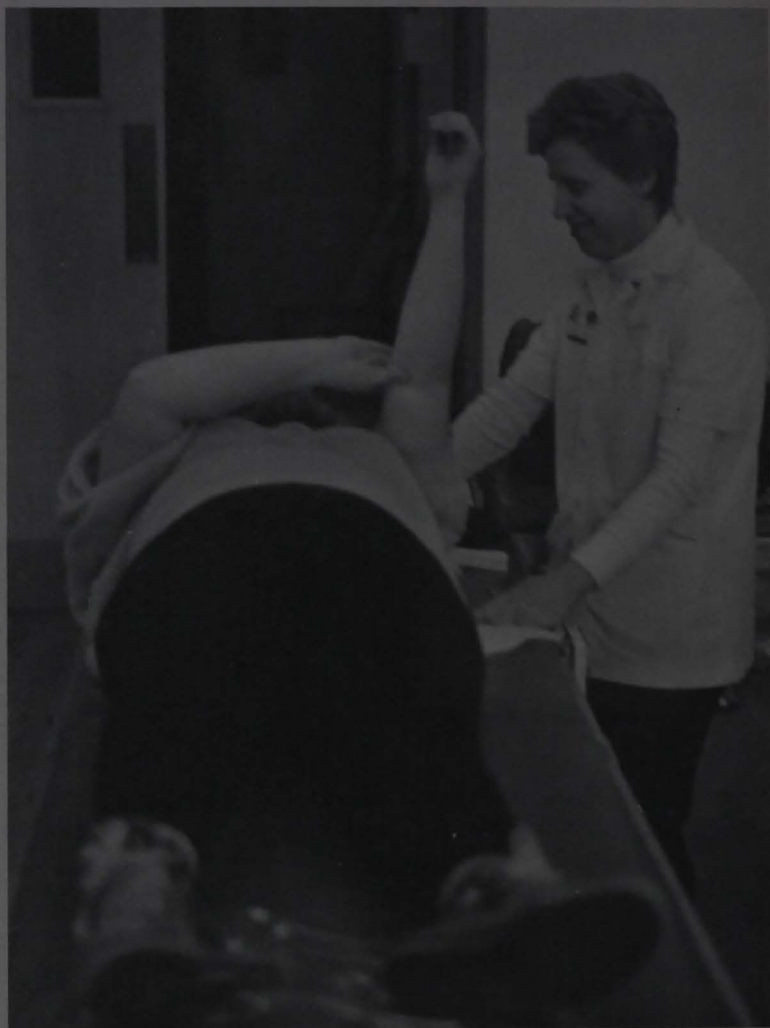
# Get In Style

From time to time on the GSC campus one might notice a peculiar mode of fashion — band-aids on ears and arms or Red Cross stickers on shirtfronts. No, it is not the latest Parisian trend, but it is becoming the thing to wear among Glenville students. On blood drive days an increasing number of students make trips to the Wesley Foundation to donate blood for the Red Cross. Of the 136 donors in April, 50% were college students, reports Judy Duelley, chairperson of Gilmer County Blood Drives.

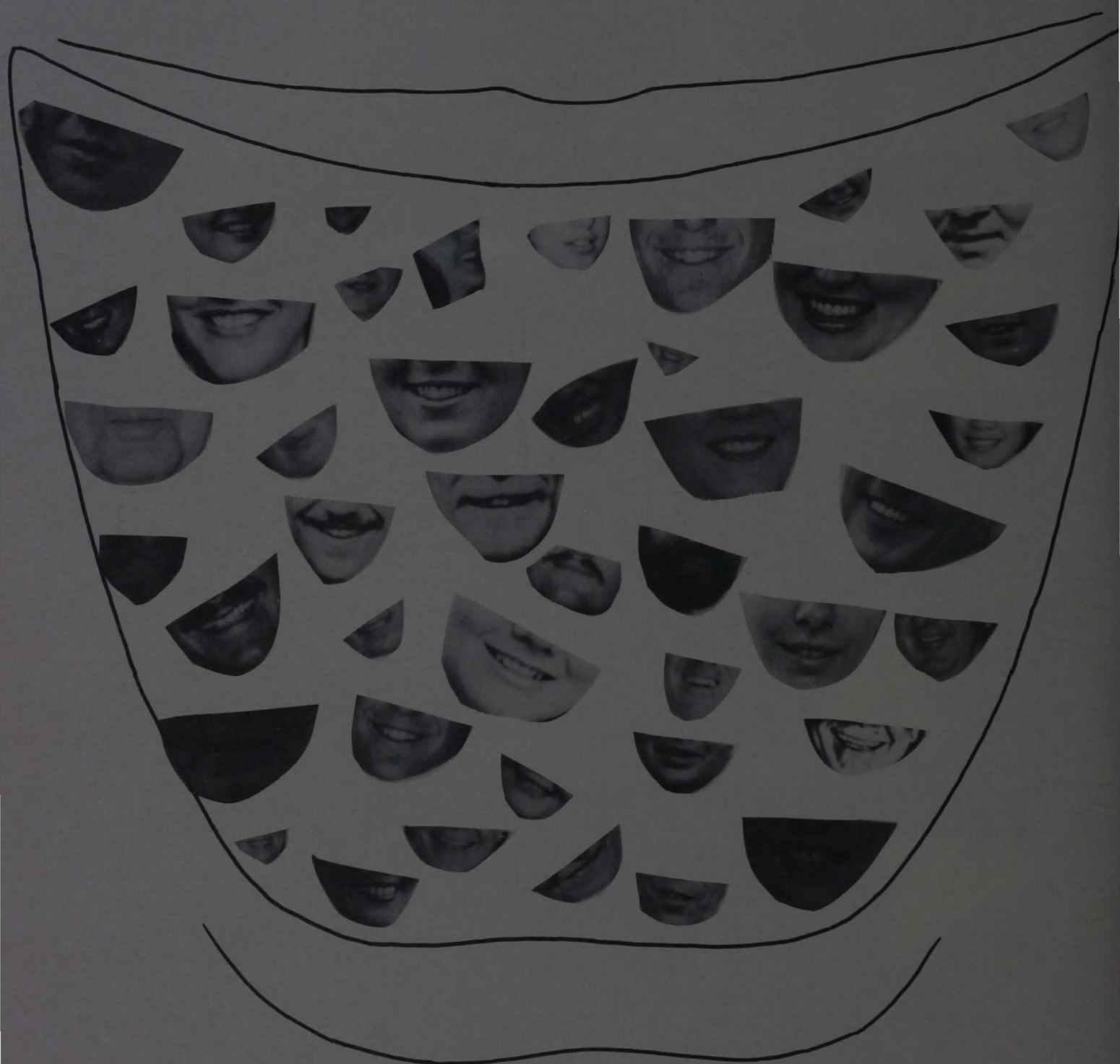

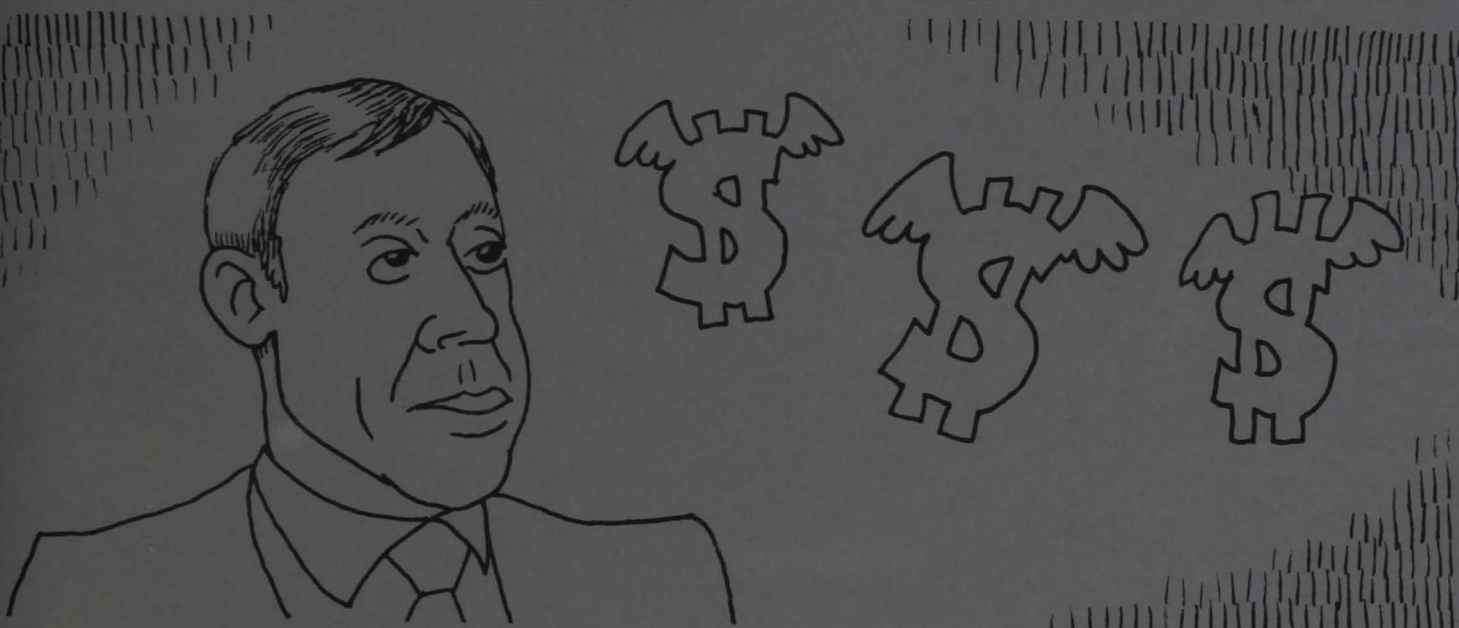

# IVAN THE TERRIBLE

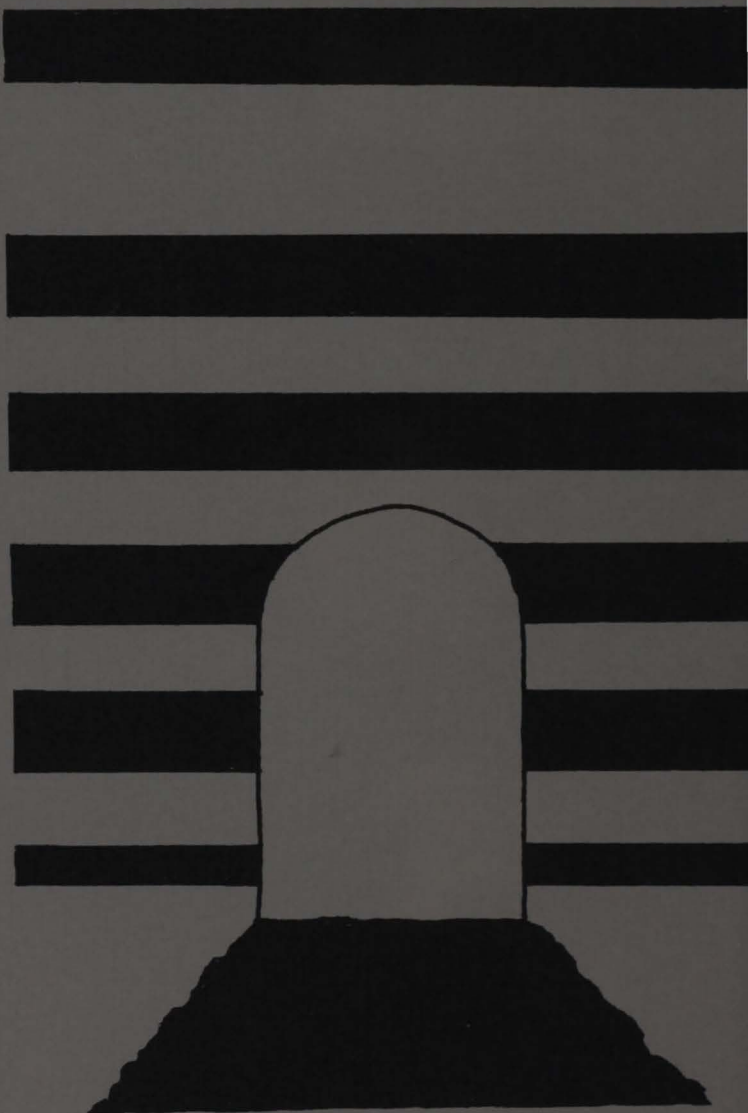

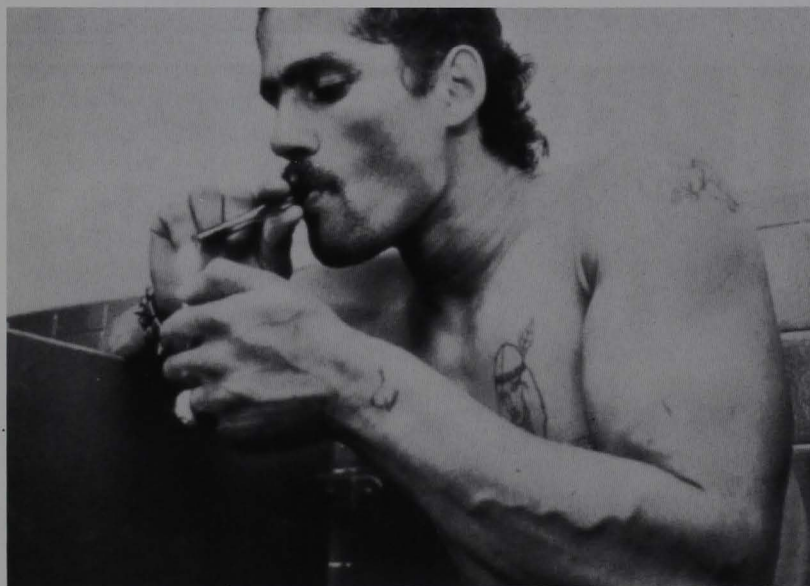
# A DRUGGED NATION

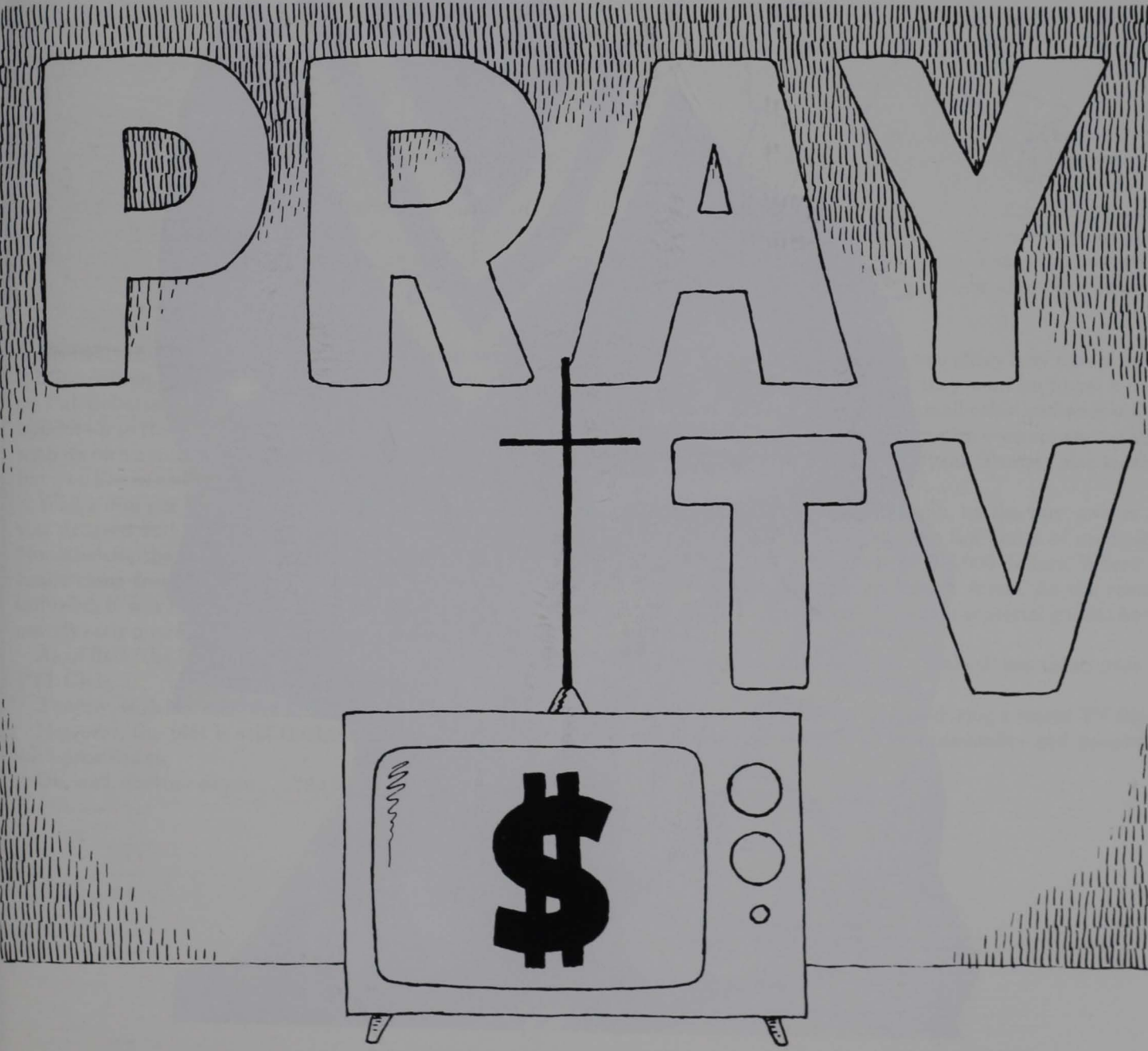

Oh, well, another day in . . . "As Our Stomachs Turn . . ."



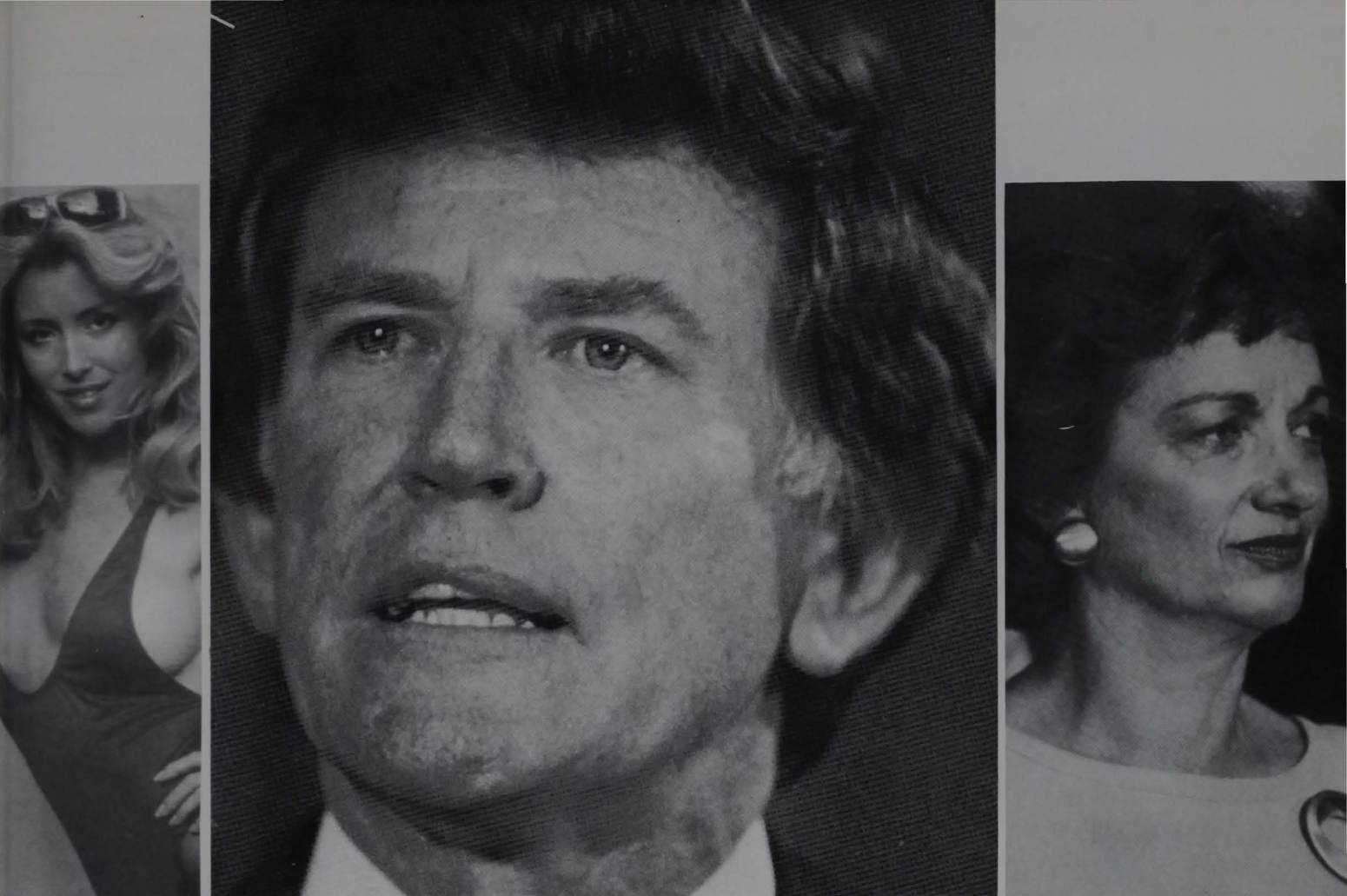
# WILL GOD CALL ORAL HOME?

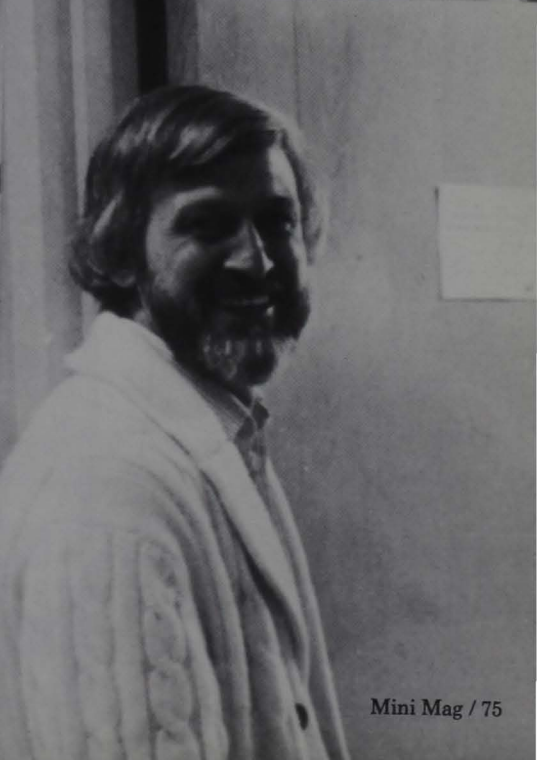
Apparently this breach of discretion raised too many eyebrows and a flurry of publicity — that even the charming Hart couldn't live down.

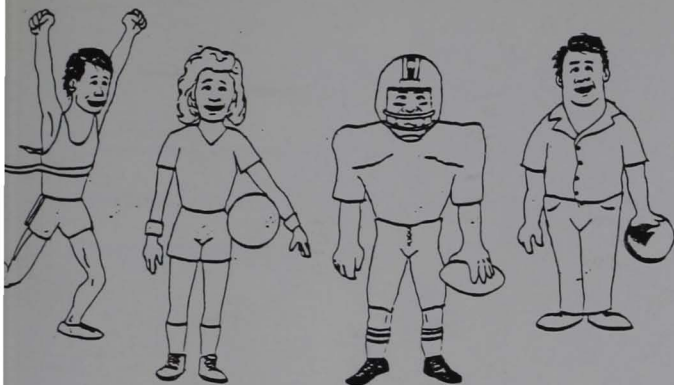
## INTERCOLLEGIATE

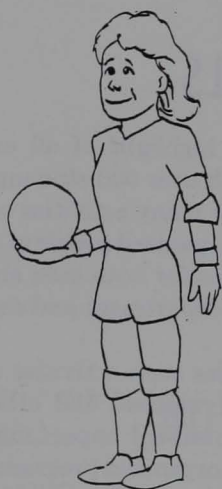

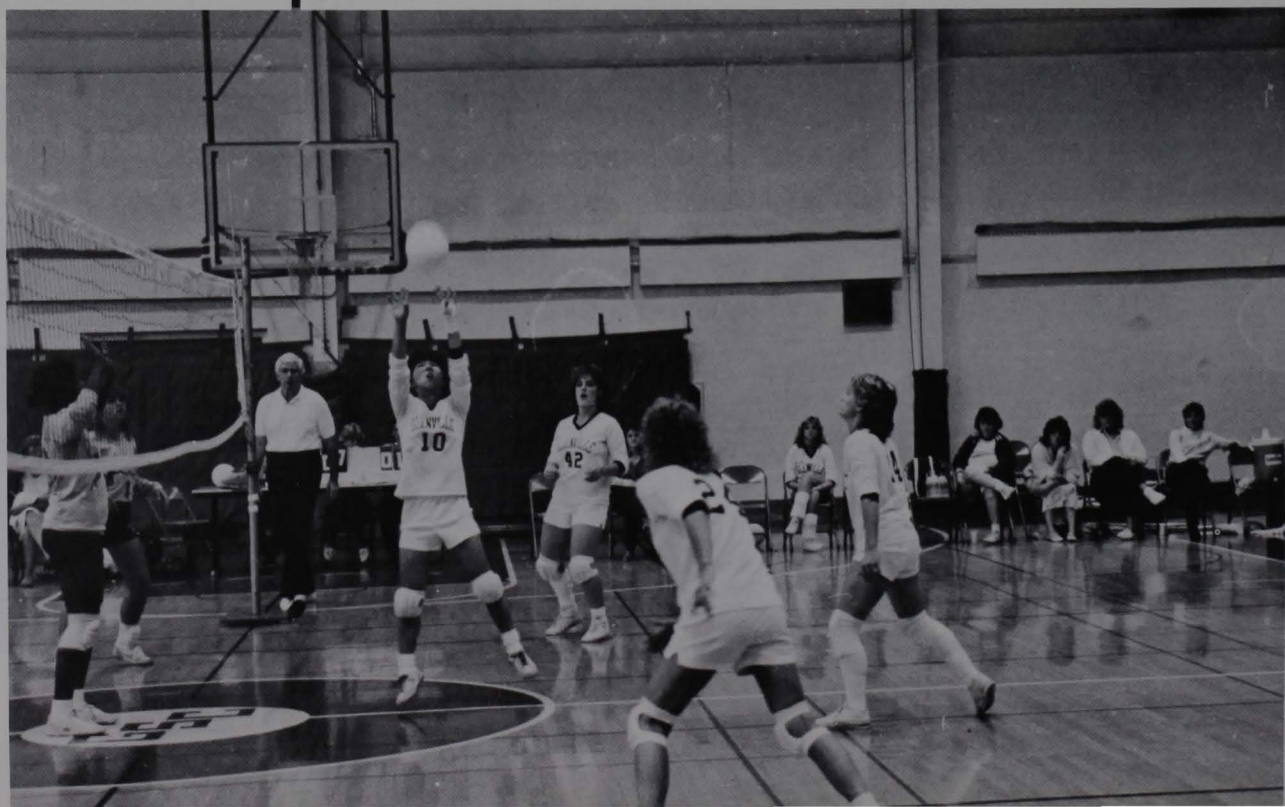






## WOMEN OVERCOME INJURIES

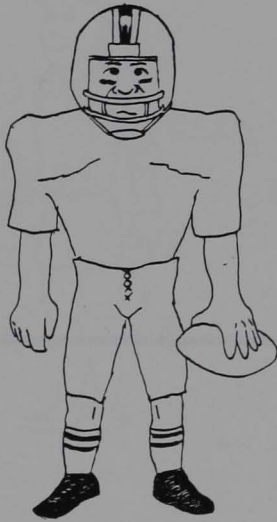

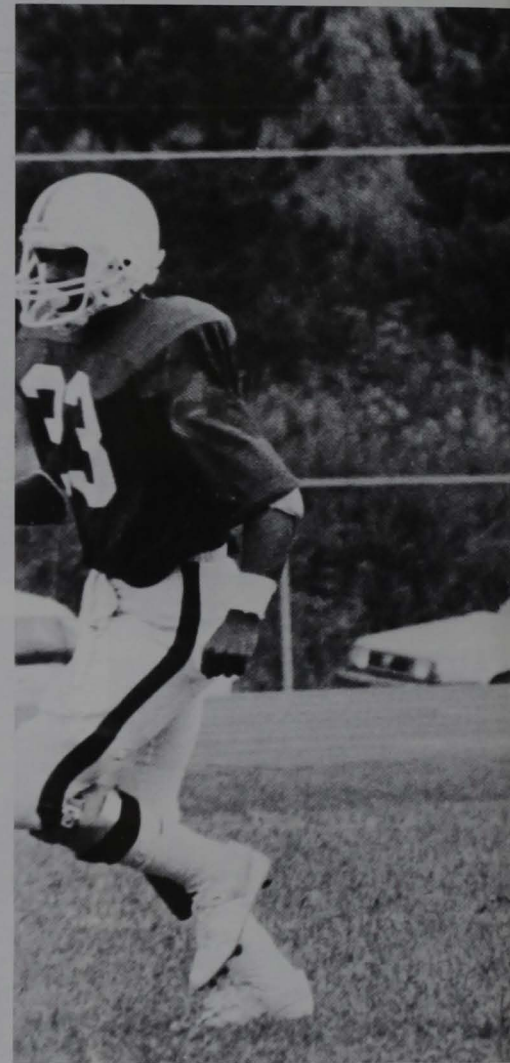


## ERIC MITCHELL LED THE NATION IN KICK-OFF RETURNS

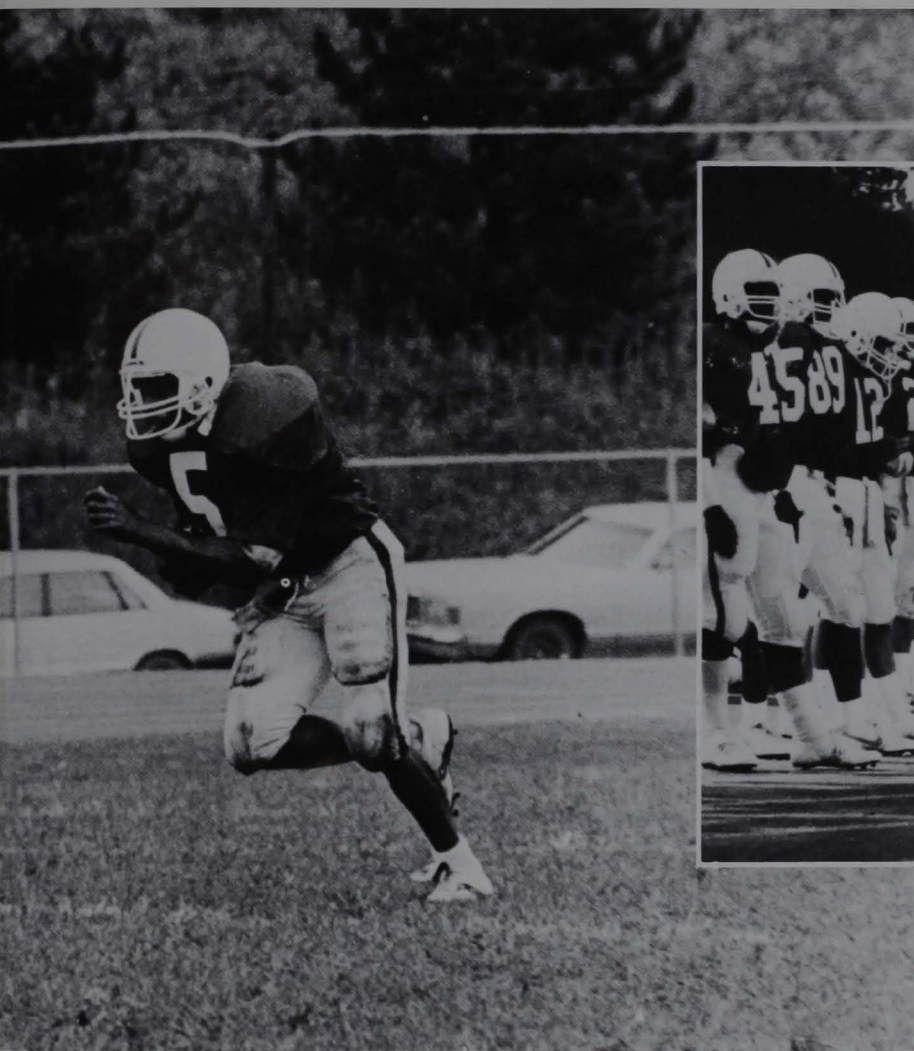

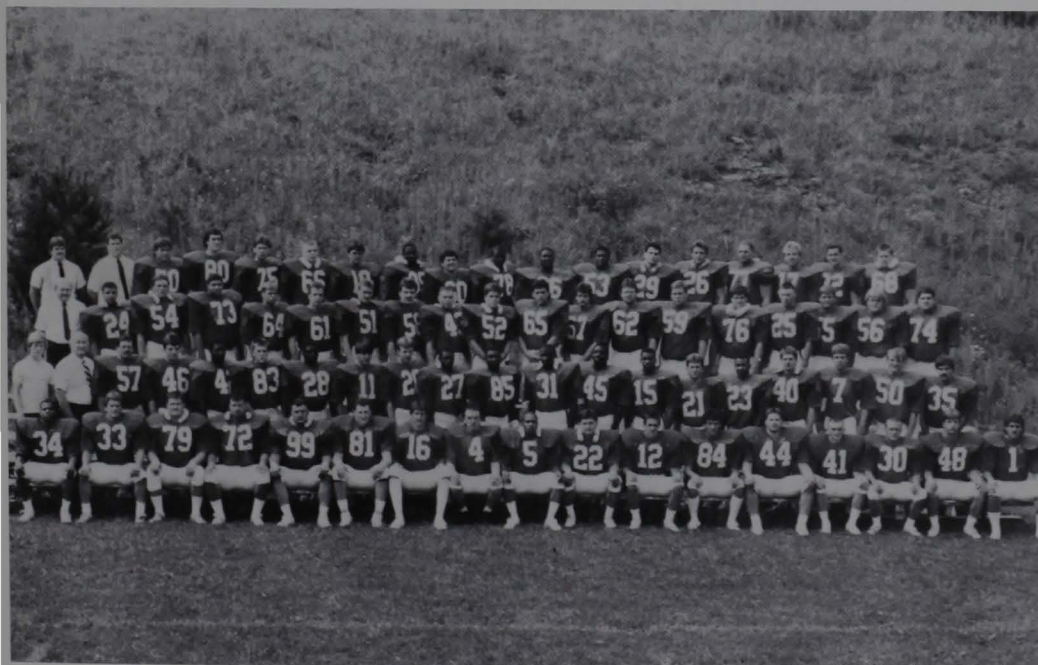

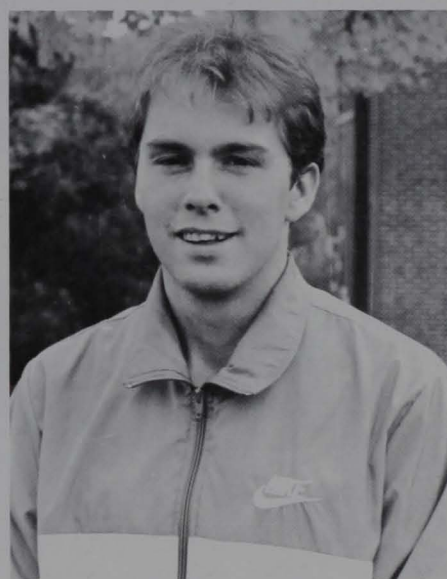
# GSC COACHES CHANGING TRENDS

The 1986-87 school year brought about a change in the football coaching staff. Frank Vincent, head football coach, resigned from his post after serving for seven seasons. Vincent's tenure at GSC was highlighted in 1983 and 1984 when the Pioneers turned in 6-2-1 and 6-3 seasons. The 1983 team finished second in the conference. His total of 21 victories places him 4th among the 19 coaches who have called the shots here at Glenville. Coach Vincent came to Glenville in 1980 after posting a 101-74 record at Charleston High. While at CHS, he led the Mt. Lions to three Class AAA state championships. He will remain on the GSC faculty in the Department of Physical Education and will also serve as Assistant Athletic Director.

Vincent's successor is Lou Nocida, head football coach at Sistersville High School. A native of Glenville, Nocida graduated from Glenville High School in 1959 and Glenville State College in 1965. Later, he obtained a master's degree from the University of Dayton and played defensive back with the Wheeling Ironmen in the old Continental Football League. He led his teams to seven successive Class A state championship games, in which Sistersville won five. Nocida is a coach who will bring out the highest potential level in each and every player. He expects a high commitment level and works at motivating his players to overachieve with their capabilities.

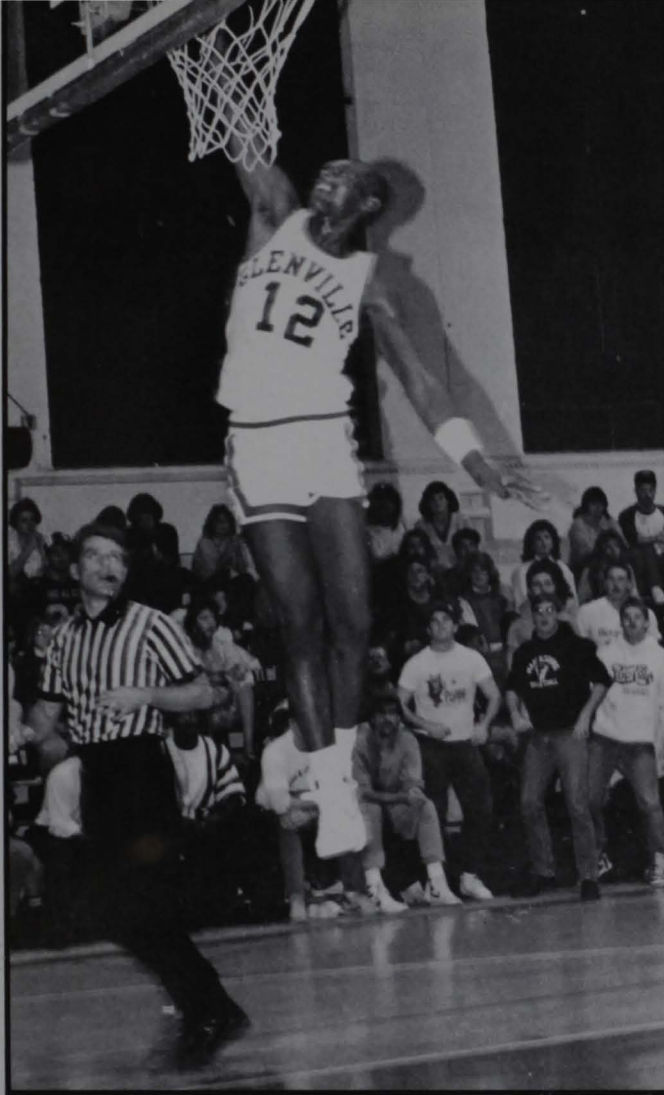

# Ladies End Season Big

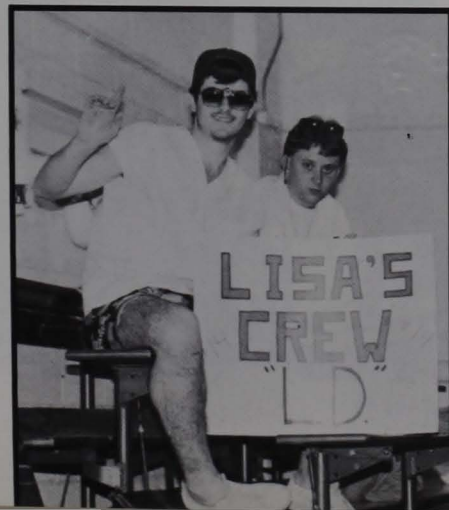

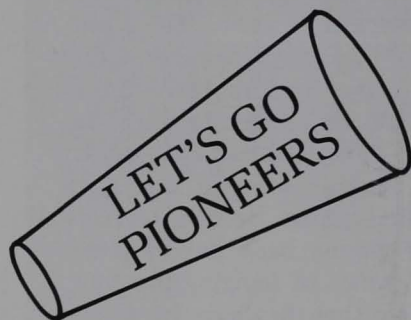

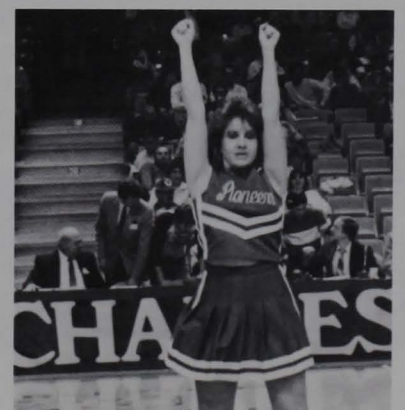

## CRUSH CREW DOES IT AGAIN

For Glenville State College track coach Lou Geary, his tenure at GSC has been filled with glory and championships.

Last spring, Geary took over the Pioneers after the squad had finished third in the WVIAC in 1985. Glenville promptly captured the league title and ended up 20th in the nation.

Last fall, Geary took over the Pioneer cross-country program, which had finished fifth in the WVIAC in 1985. Again, the Pioneers vaulted to a league title, the school's fourth in six years.

Now, Geary has assumed the duties as women's track coach as well and the spring is looking pretty good.

Geary's women's squad is a young and small unit, but there is some talent there that should send the program in the right direction.

One issue that is causing problems for both programs is the state of the conference. Both West Liberty and the University of Charleston have dropped track, thus lowering league membership to three teams.

Geary has cited money as the primary problem for track in the WVIAC. "Track is slipping even though cross-country is growing in the league," said Geary. "Our track program is okay. We have been forced to shift our goals more to the national level."

Tammy Pence broke three GSC women's track records. They included 100HH with a time of 16:14, javelin with a throw of 99'5", and the triple jump with a distance of 32'10½".

Bubby Dent set GSC records in the 800 and 1500 meter runs with a time of 1:56.6 and 3:59.9 respectively.

Andy Jarrell won the 10,000 meter run with a time of 32:53 which was also, a new school record.

Senior captain Lloyd Willis was the big story of the day as he set his own GSC triple jump record and qualified for nationals in the event. Willis jumped 47'11½" to etch his name into the record books once more.

In the finals, Dent ran a 1:57.34 for a seventh-place finish, five-tenths of a second behind the sixth place runner, the final All-American. Dent stated, "I ran as good as I could have. I felt good Friday, but Saturday I felt a little tight. ESPN was taping the event and I felt some pressure. I couldn't eat while I was there, but I improved from last year and if I keep improving, I should win."

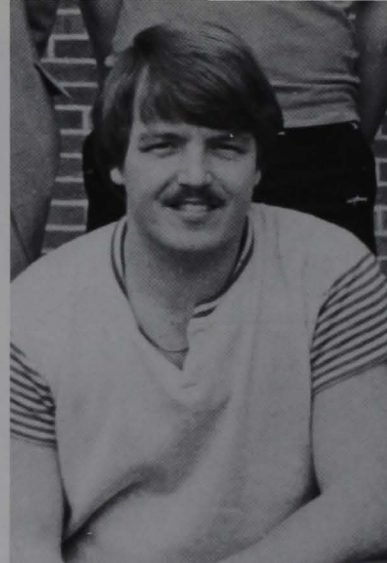

# A DEDICATION TO CLARISSA K. WILLIAMS

Students, staff and faculty at Glenville State were saddened by the passing of former GSC physical education instructor, Clarissa K. Williams. Miss Williams died Wednesday, December 31, at her home in Glenville. Her teaching career at GSC began in the summer of 1947, and she retired from teaching in 1964. In 1983, the first Clarissa Williams Award to the college's most outstanding woman athlete was presented in her honor. This annual award is presented during GSC Homecoming. The Williams wing of Picken Hall was dedicated in her honor on April 27, 1974.

She achieved her bachelor degree from Marshall College while teaching at Huntington High School in 1928. Her graduate work was done at the University of Iowa and Ohio State University. Her master's was obtained from Columbia University in 1933. In 1965, she was one of the founders of the Gilmer County Association of Retired School Employees. But, perhaps one of her most cherished honors was being named Honorary Grandmother by Sigma Sigma Sigma Sorority.

She was the last surviving member of her family, being preceded in death by her parents Dr. Oscar F. and Martha Brockwell Williams of Springboro, Ohio, one brother and two sisters. Miss Clarissa K. Williams was a fine instructor and a fine person and she will be greatly missed, but her memory will remain.

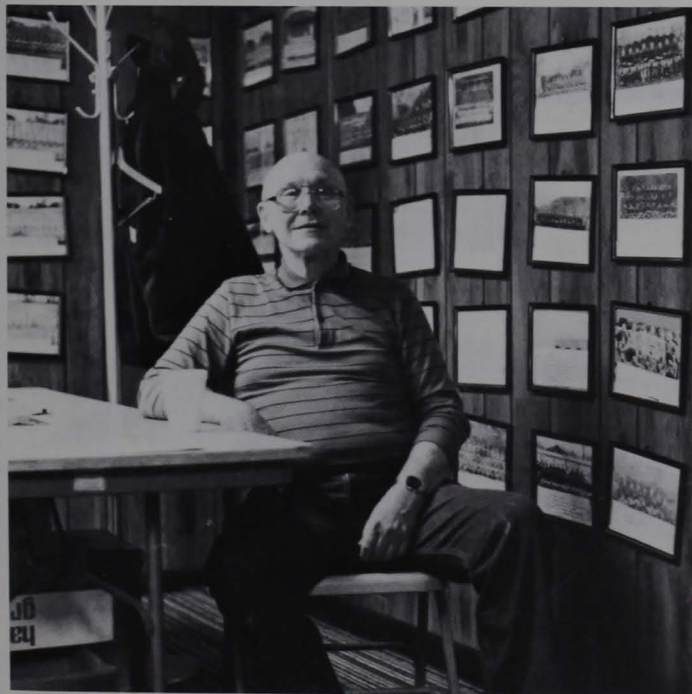


The End Zone Club provides an invaluable service to the athletic association of Glenville State College. Over the past seven years they have raised over \$160,000 for the athletic scholarship fund.

# Peace On Earth Good Will Toward Man . . .



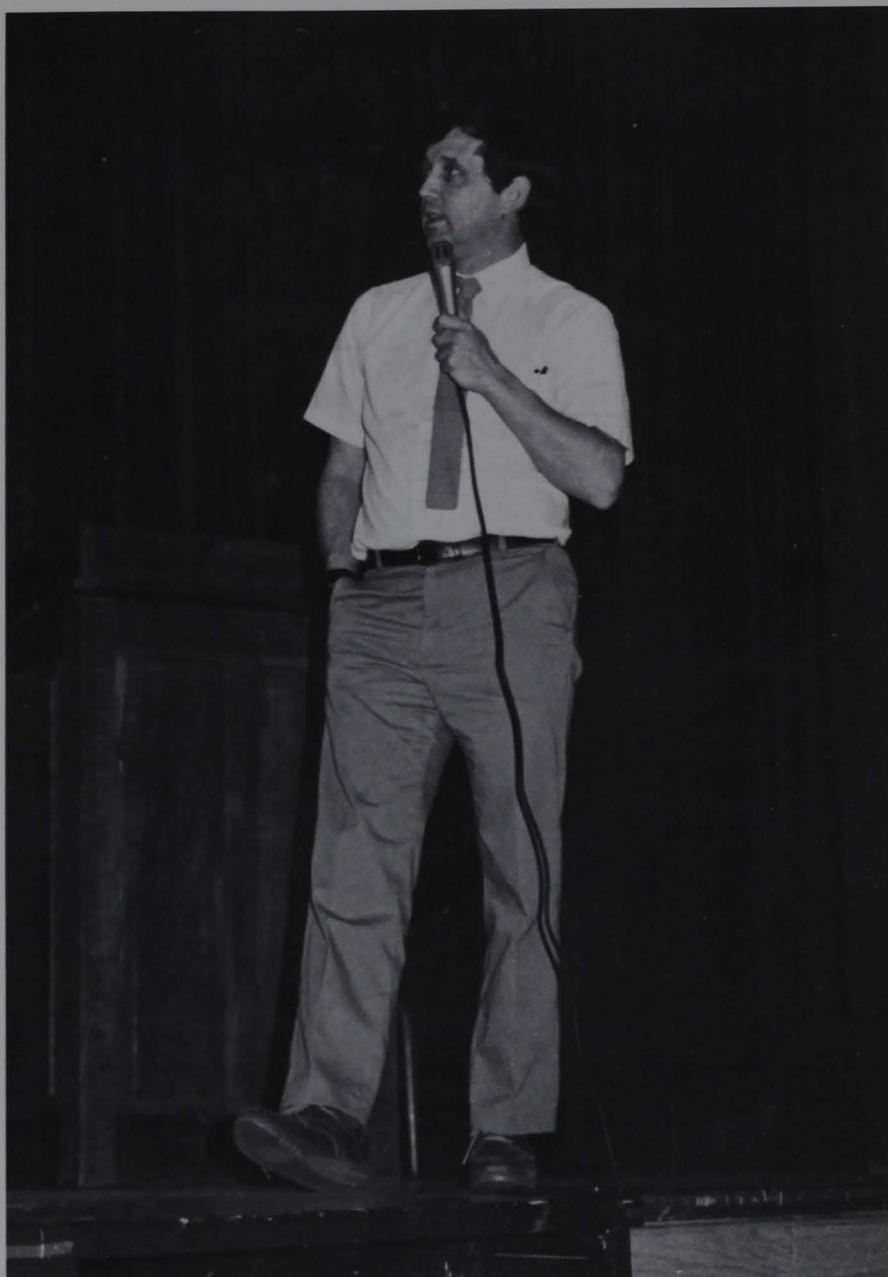

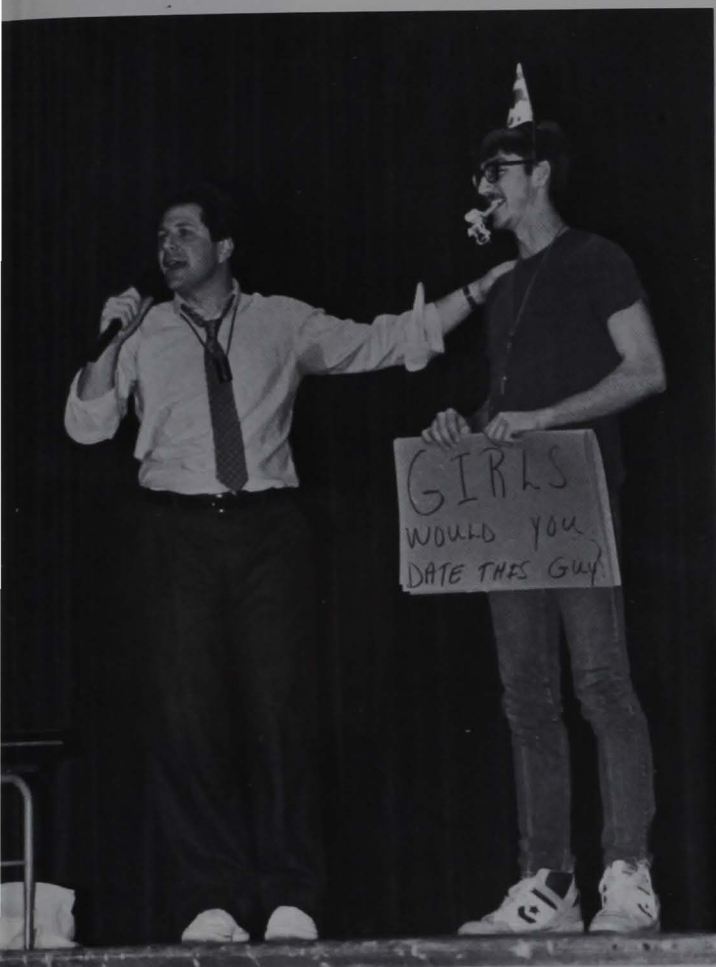
## Tom DeLuca

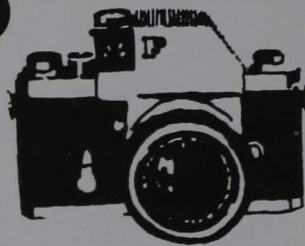

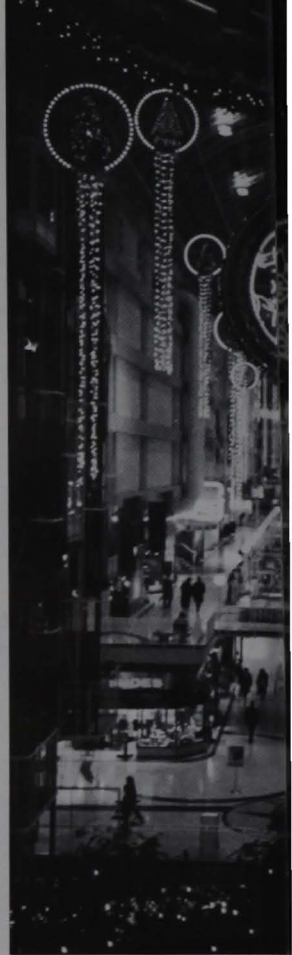

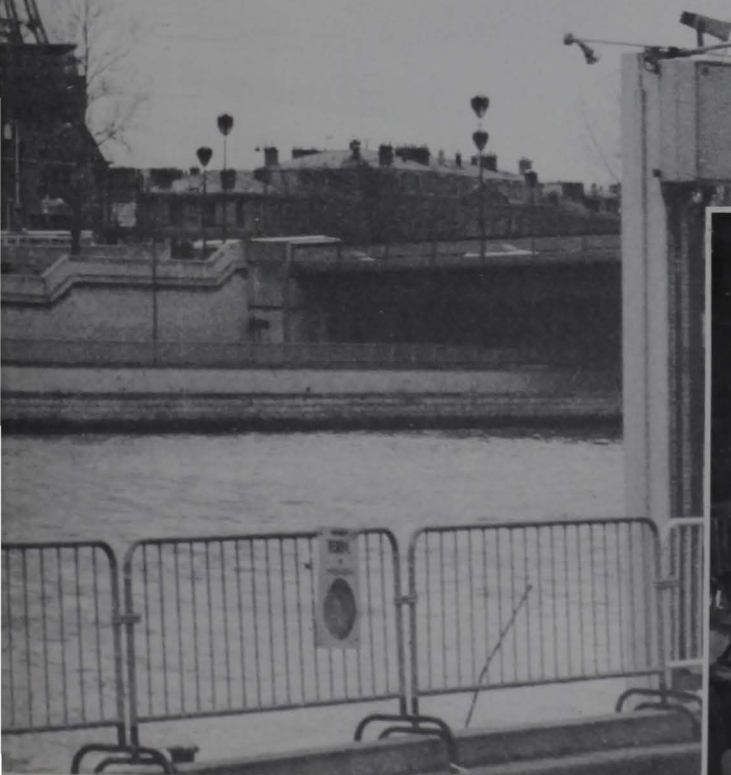
# ATTACKING THE TOWN...

Yvonne King can often be found burning the midnight oil — even as late as two o'clock in the morning. Having had the privilege of working with her for two plus years, I know, truly, how much work she puts into every paper and yearbook.

A native of Clay County, Yvonne attended GSC graduating with a degree in English and Journalism. She later received her M.S.J. from WVU. King taught in the public school systems in both Clay and Wood counties. She has one daughter, Marilyn Dinkler, who is in the school system at Wood County.

When asked what changes she had seen take place since her arrival at GSC she responded, "When I arrived in '66, girls had to sign out, be in by 11 o'clock, 12 o'clock on weekends, and received one 1 o'clock once a month. No slacks were permitted to be worn either to town or dinner."

For those of you who have never seen the newspaper office, it is located in the basement of Clark Hall. It has always been here, except this used to be the library. Mrs. King remembers the *Mercury* only having two typewriters, with the paper only being a bi-monthly. With the completion of the new Kidd Library, students, faculty, and staff hand carried the books down to the new facility. The *Mercury* became a weekly in 1967, and in 1970 they purchased a composer and began setting their own paper.

Yvonne H. King has supervised some 600 issues of *The Mercury*. Not only that, but her name is synonymous with the banner. She was a staff member for four years, and served as editor for two of the four. All totaled, she has been associated with the *Mercury* for 25 of the 58 years of its existence. She has advised 10 issues of *The Kanawhachen*.

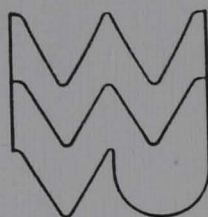
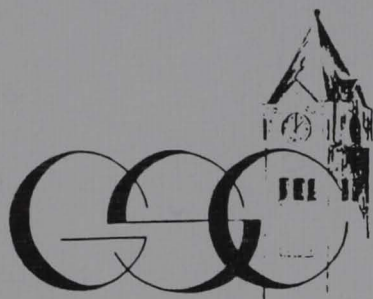
Mrs. King summed up her feelings about working with the Journalism program at GSC.

This group is a close-knit family. I become involved in their loves, their lives, their problems, their families. I'm kind of a 'Mom away from home.' They return, they keep in touch, and that makes it all worthwhile. Pressures are nerve-racking, but I've always lived by deadlines. When I was in high school, I was newspaper editor and worked often at the local newspaper shop learning to read letterpress print upside down. One day I got ink on me and the shop owner said 'Oh, you've got the printer's ink in your blood now — you're hooked,' and I guess I was! (And am)! I started out as 'Gossip Gertie' with my own weekly gossip sheet in high school that sold for a nickel. I went on to become a Newspaper Fund Fellow, winning a scholarship to WVU for Masters work from *The Wall Street Journal*. I've always liked media work — where would we be without the media?

Again the staff of the *Kanawhachen* would like to take the time to salute Yvonne H. King, who has been such a rock for each and every one of us. Undoubtedly, she has been a major shaper of journalism at GSC.

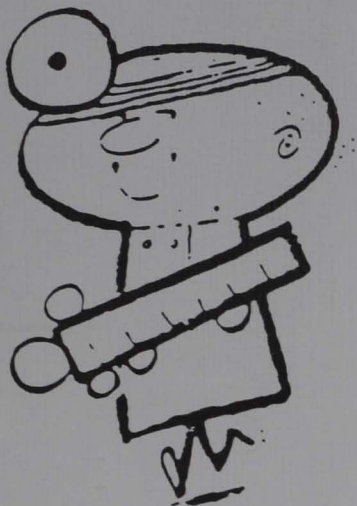

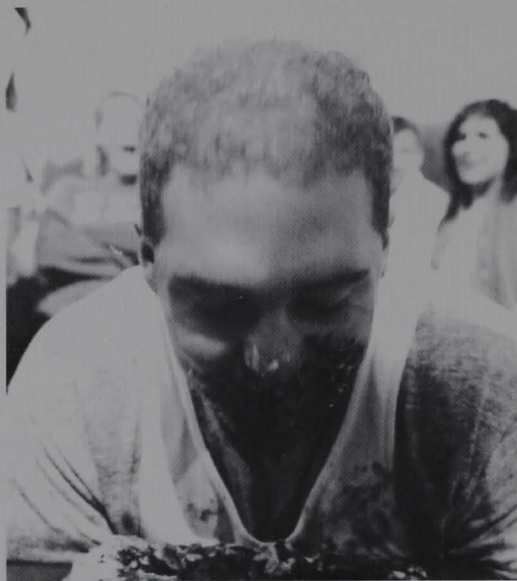
The Nursing Program which is under the direction of Mrs. Onnalee Johnson was brought back into the Glenville State College curriculum in the fall of 1984, after a great deal of interest was shown regarding its restoration.

The program is a joint program with WVU, with the Glenville State campus teaching the non-nursing courses while WVU teaches the nursing courses. The nursing students are at GSC for the first two years of the program, then transfer to the Charleston Division of the WVU School of Nursing in Charleston, WV to complete their third and fourth years of the program.

The facilities will help the nursing students at GSC providing them hands-on experience in the nursing program. The facility, which is set up like an actual hospital room, contains 3 beds and ample space for the treatment of "patients" (mannequins are used in the program) by the students in the program. The room has everything a hospital would have and will provide the future nurses with individualized training. The instructor for the Nursing Program at GSC is Alison Witte.





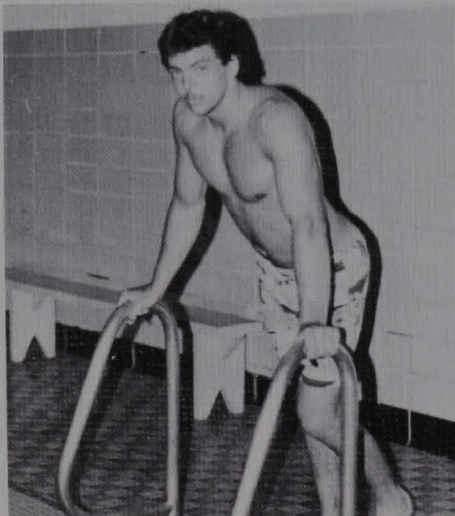
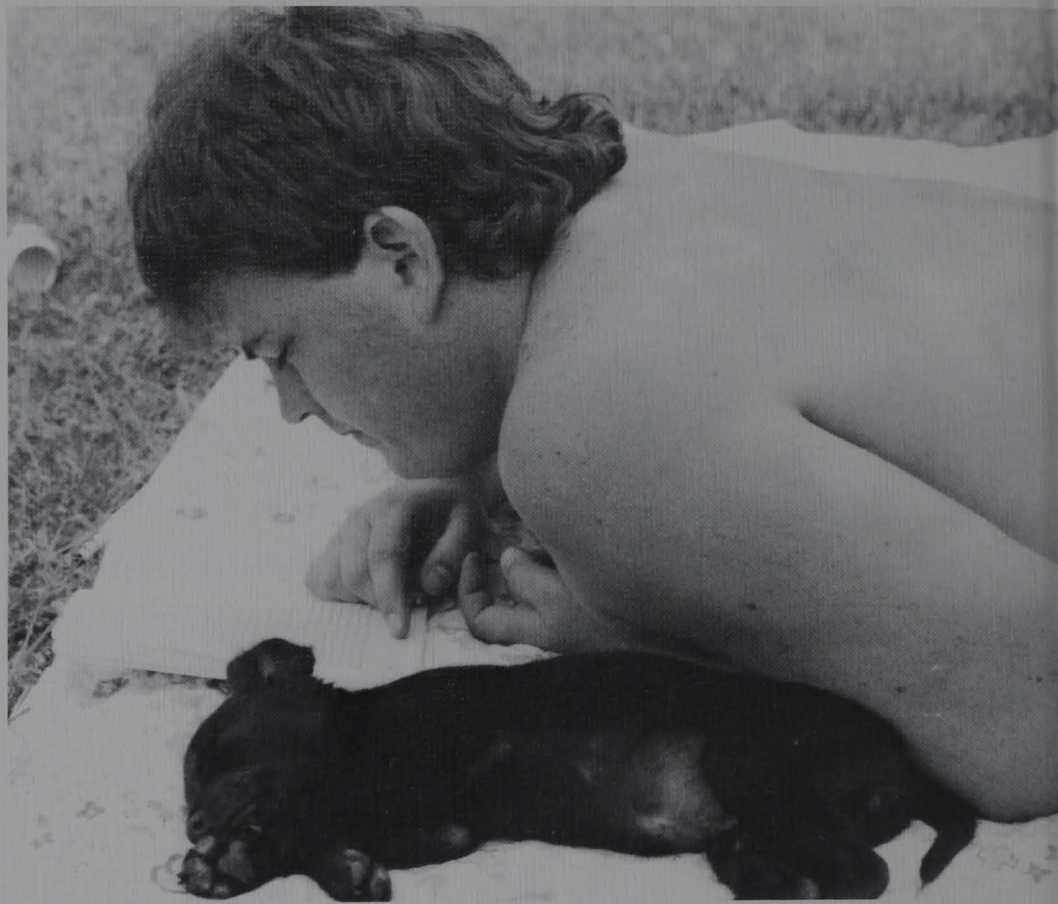




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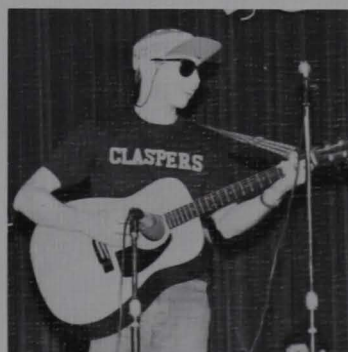
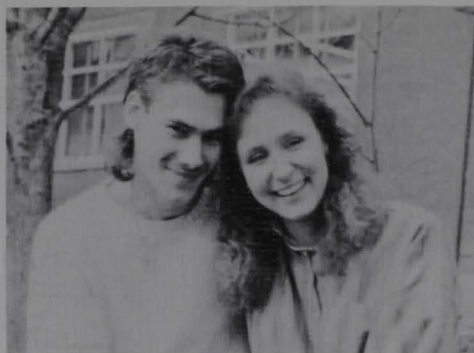








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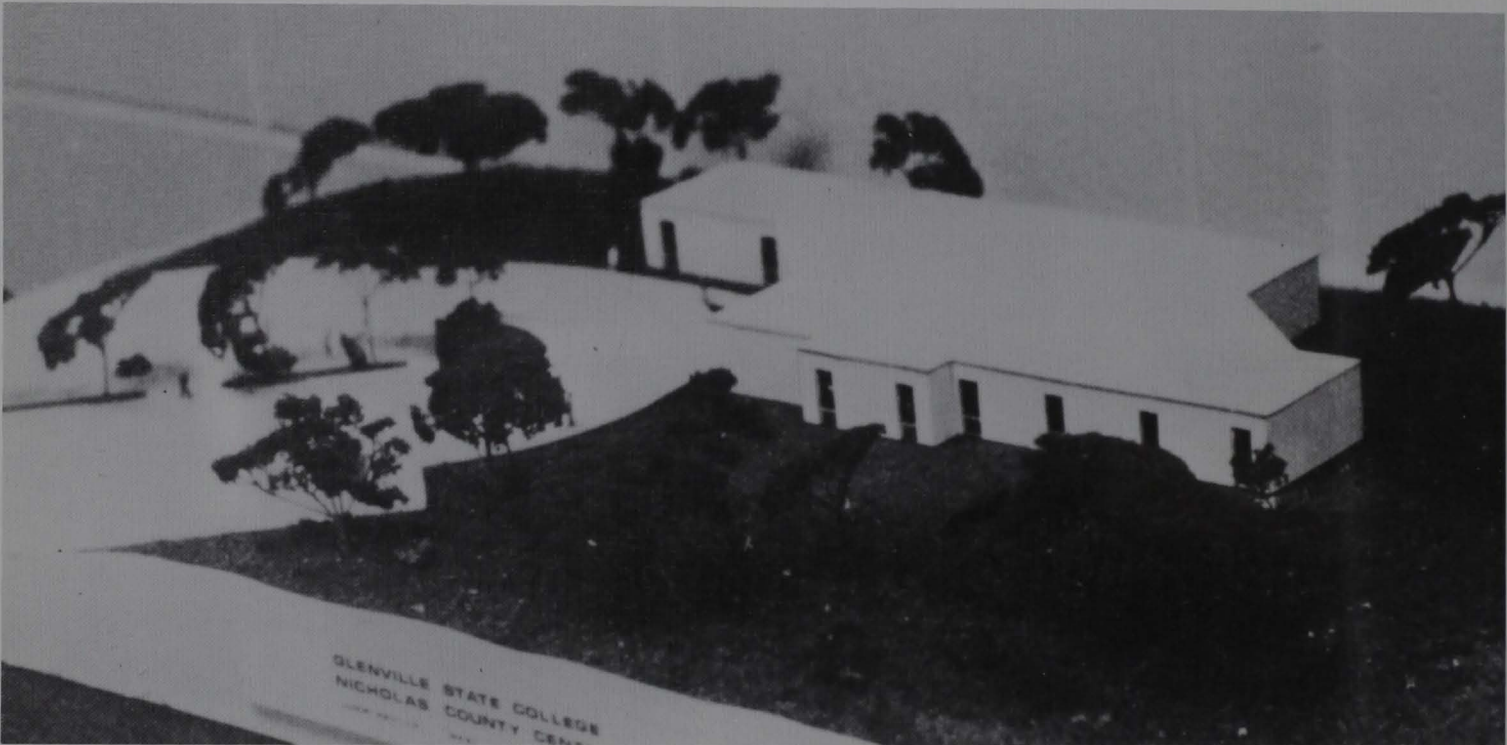
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# SUMMERSVILLE EXTENSION



Early in September of 1986, the Glenville State College, Nicholas County Center, located in Summersville, West Virginia, was dedicated, with many state, local, and college dignitaries present. The dedication address was given by WV Governor Arch Moore.

The Summersville facility provides a home for extension courses and for the College of Graduate Studies. During the summer term the enrollment is around 100 students, but during the winter term the enrollment rose to 400 students with average age group ranging from 25 to 35 years of age. Students from Nicholas, Clay, Webster, Braxton, Greenbrier, Raleigh, Randolph counties and also students from the main campus in Glenville use the facility.

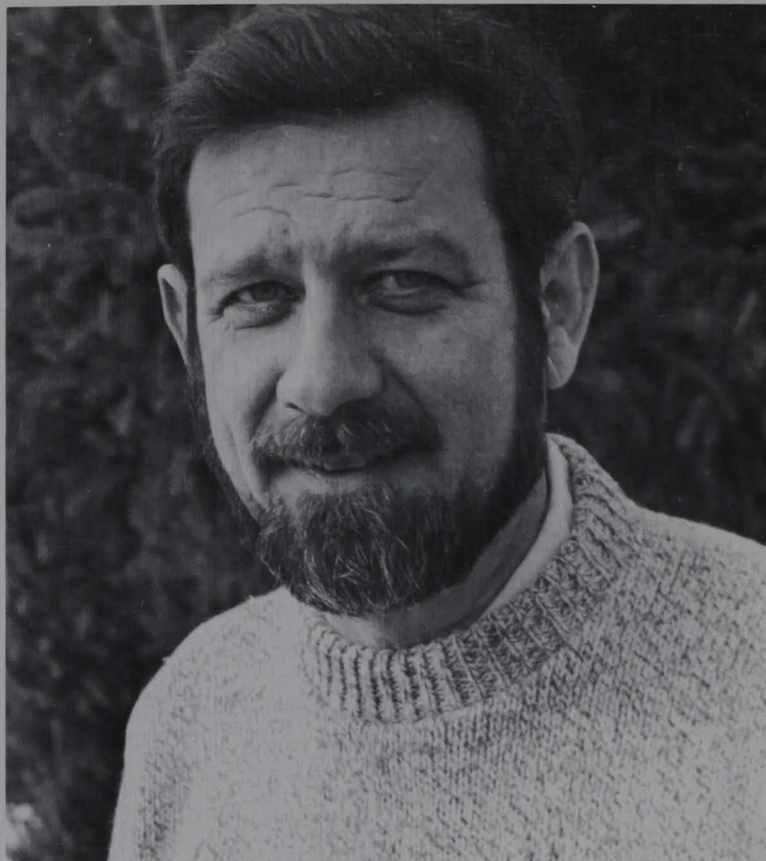
The center has a positive attitude of serving the community of Nicholas County and other areas by allowing different groups to hold workshops or seminars at the facility. With three (3) standard size classrooms, each will house 30 to 40 students at a time. While obtaining credits at the Summersville Center, these credits will transfer to the Glenville State College main campus.

While at the Center, Dr. Gary Gillespie (Outstanding Faculty member for 1986-87) has volunteered his time to teach classes for the summer term. Dr. Gillespie has 25 students enrolled in his class. He has taught at the center on three previous occasions. When asked if he liked teaching at the Nicholas County Center, Dr. Gillespie quoted, "I love teaching here at the center."

Mr. Joseph Hickman, former Placement Office Director at GSC, has been named Director of the Nicholas County Center. Mr. Hickman has been with GSC for 20 years. While at the Nicholas County Center, he spends his time teaching classes, scheduling classes, and also works with the public. When asked about any expansions for the center, Mr. Hickman quoted, "It is too early to say," although the parking lot has been increased.

The dedication of the Glenville State College Nicholas County Center was the culmination of several years of dreaming and planning, that with cooperation between state and local governmental agencies, took less than two years to complete.

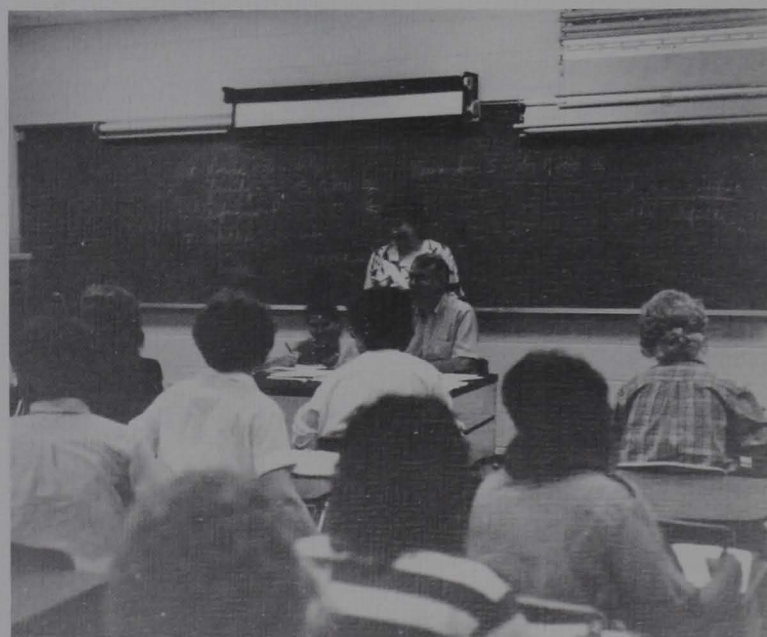

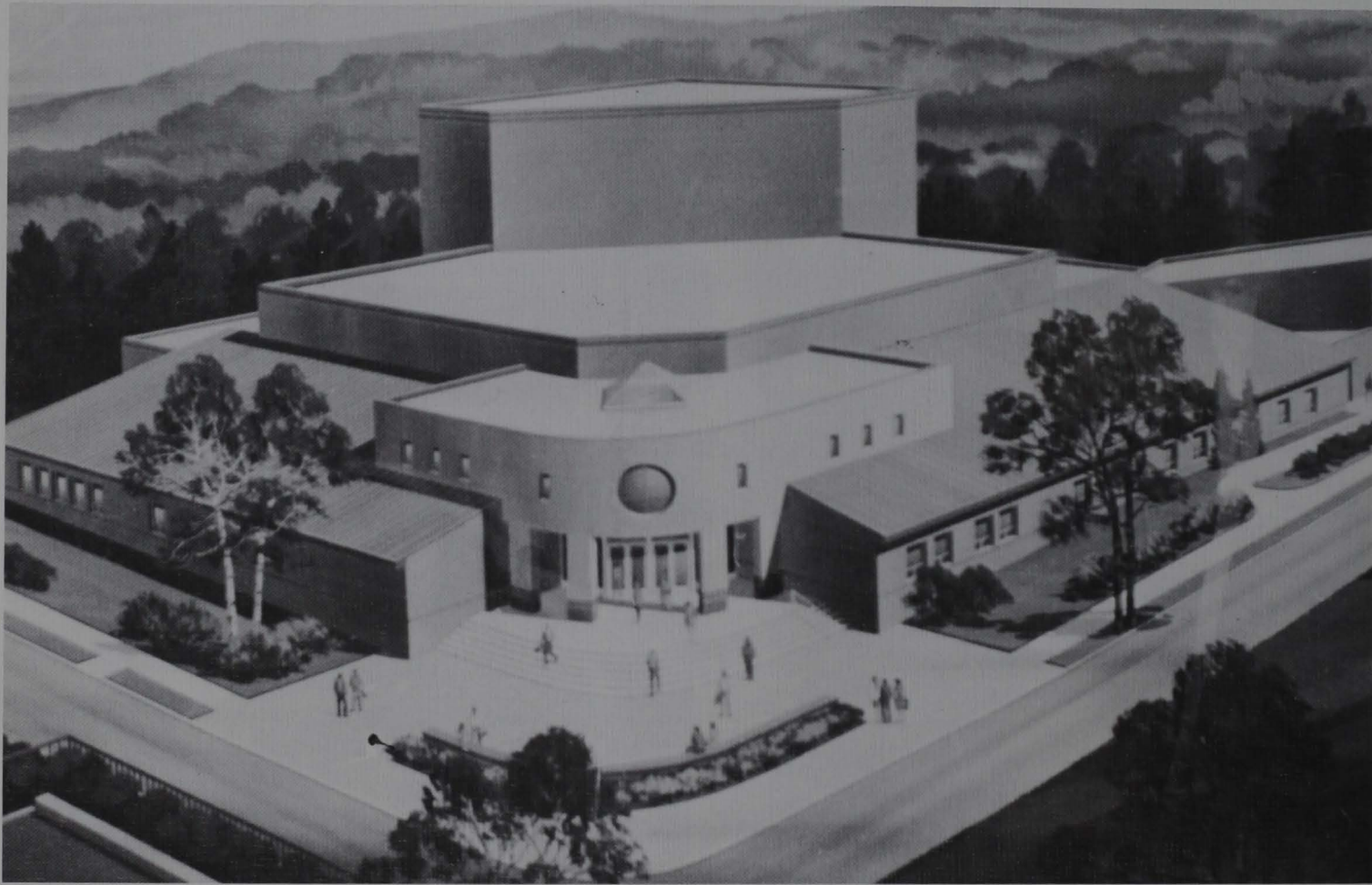

# MUSIC AND ARTS COMPLEX



The administration of Glenville State College and the WV Board of Regents with a representative of the architectural firm of Hoblitzell, Daley, and McIntyre of Charleston, broke ground for a new Music and Art complex on the Glenville State College campus Saturday, May 9th, 1987. The new Music/Art Building will sit on the corner of High and Court streets, across from the Robert K. Kidd Library.

The building will contain a 500 seat theatre with a stage of 40' x 30' that can accommodate full symphonies and professional dance companies as well as any size theatre production. The stage will have full wing space and orchestra pit.

The theatre section of the complex will house a scene workshop with storage space, a costume workshop, a greenroom (gathering room for actors), office space and men's and women's dressing rooms with showers.

The Art wing will feature a gallery off the main lobby, office space, a drawing/painting studio, and a printmaking studio.

The Music wing (two stories) will have six office/studios, piano lab, piano studios, twelve practice rooms, and instrumental rehearsal room, a choir/recital hall, a percussion room, a library and a large classroom.

In statements addressed to an audience of nearly 100, Glenville State College President William K. Simmons expressed his hope that the complex will become a cultural center for central West Virginia.

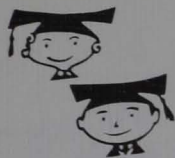

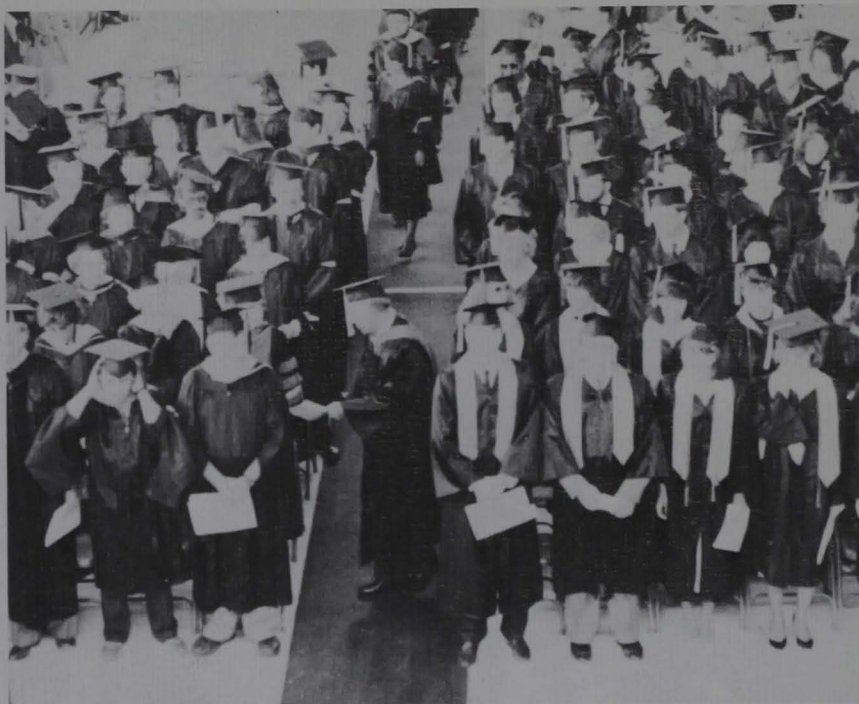

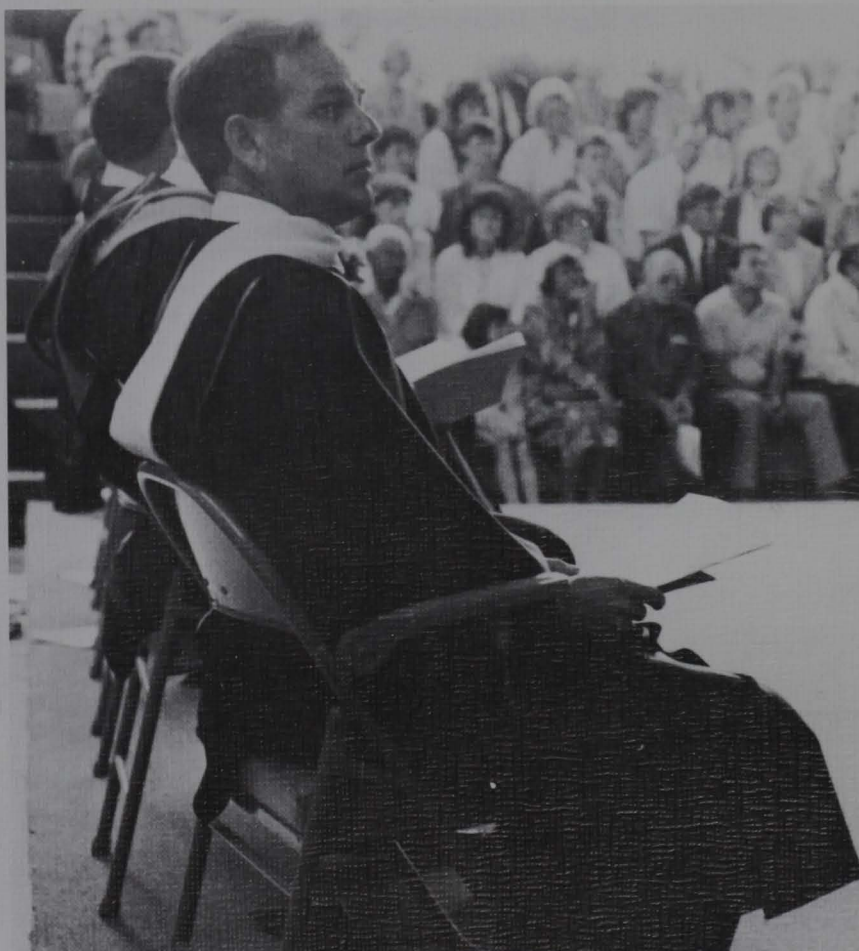

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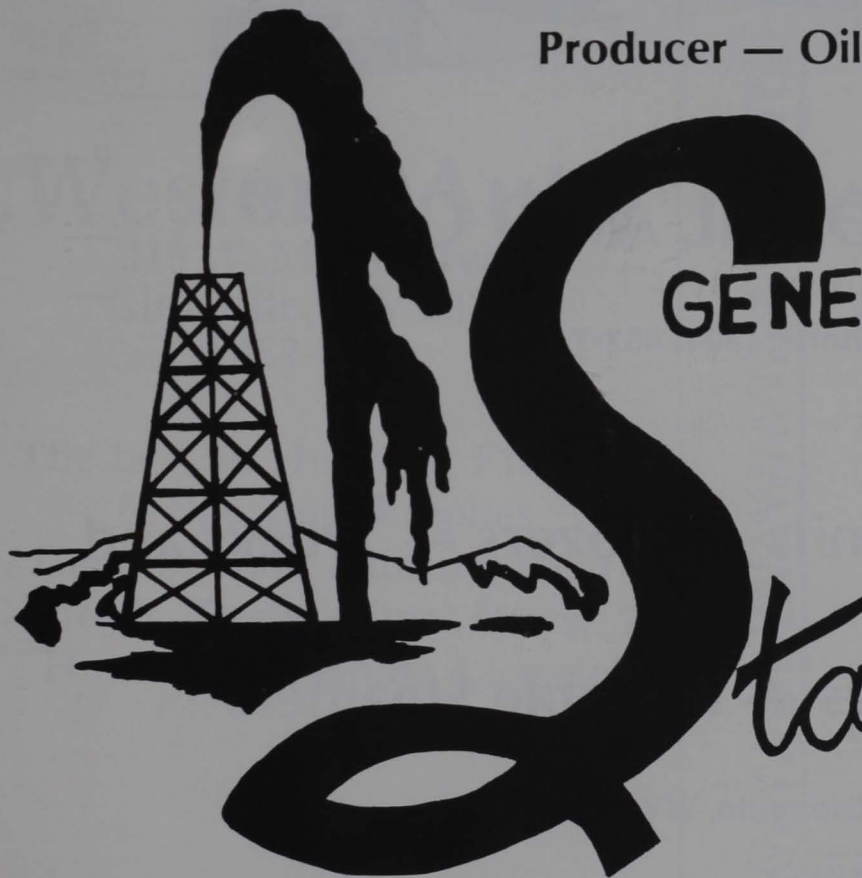

Yvonne King was a rock — as always — “hey, are there still two page 201’s?” Bless her for her unending patience.


