The story involves a couple, Sam and Susy Hendrix (Malcom Ross, Mercedes Finley) living in Greenwich Village, who suddenly get involved with a very complex drug smuggling operation. Sam is called away on a photography assignment, leaving Suzy, blind from a car accident, alone.

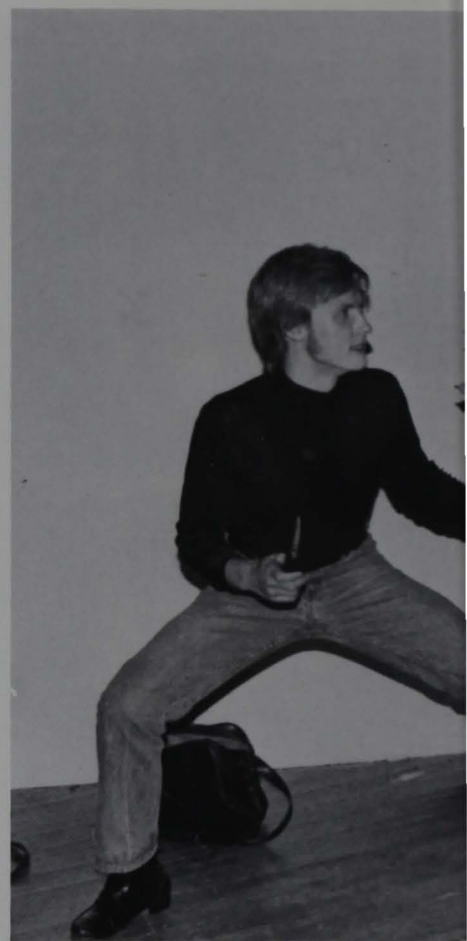

The plot travels down a wide and twisting road of deception and friendship, which comes to a climax with a murderous confrontation between Roat and Suzy. And of course, the good guys always win.

GSC Theatre experienced the past as they performed *Lysistrata*, an ancient Greek comedy written by Aristophanes over two centuries ago. Although much of the same "flavor" of the original remains, this production was updated and adapted by the show's director, Dennis Wemm.

Lysistrata deals with the Peloponesian War, which has continued for 14 years. The women have grown tired of the constant bickering among the cities and husbands that are always going away to fight. They hit upon a novel solution to end the war. They call a meeting in Athens, and led by Lysistrata, they agree to use their only weapon . . . what all the men want (SEX) . . . and take an oath of abstinence until the war ends. Through a provocative performance, the characters dance their way to peace and the inevitable happens — the war is ended.

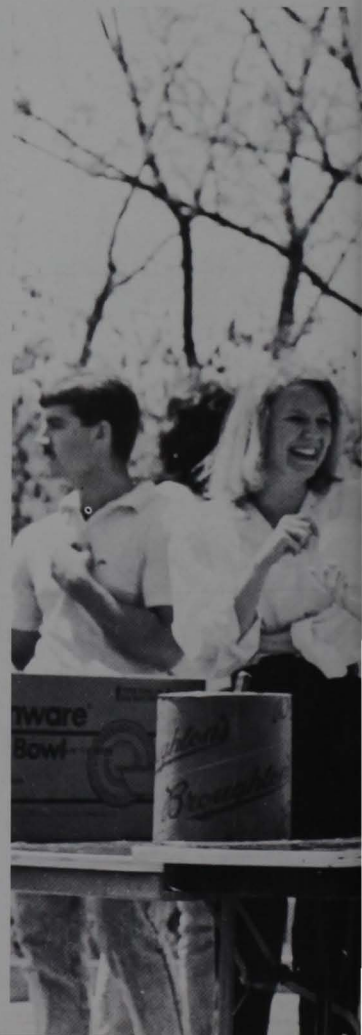

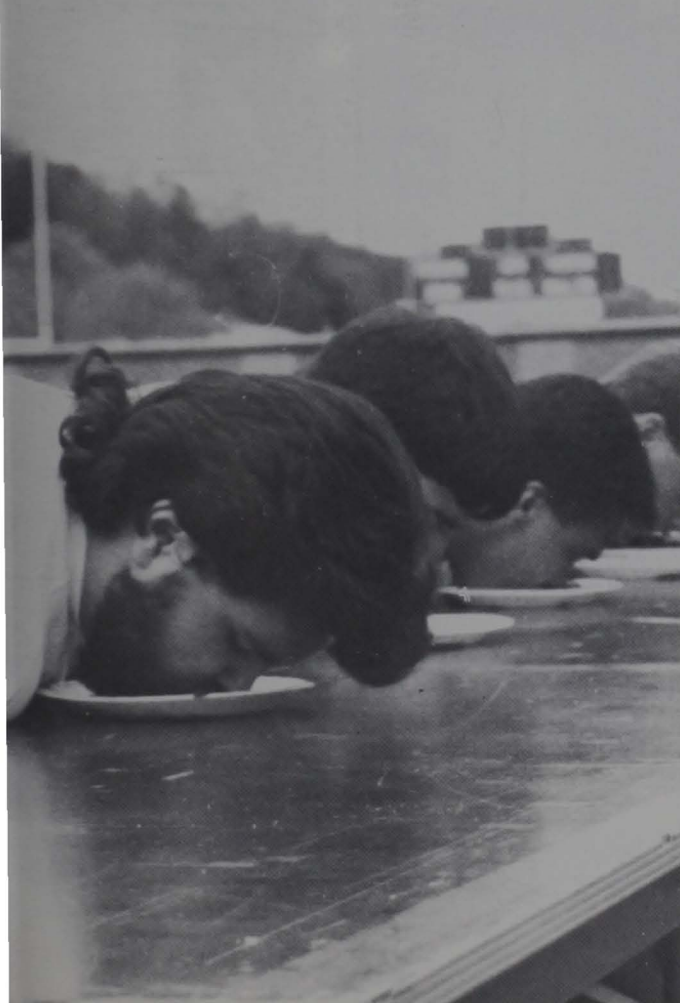


Perhaps the favorite part of GSC Week is the spring carnival. Our Pioneer field was the host for the activities of the game.

On November 4th, 1987, Andy Andrews appeared in the Glenville State College auditorium at 8:00 p.m. Andy Andrews has received two awards at the annual award ceremony of the National Association for Campus Activities and for the award of Campus Entertainer of the Year. He has been voted Comedy Entertainer of the Year, for the second year in a row.

He began his career with talent shows in colleges, in which he has performed over two hundred and fifty colleges and universities and has done concerts all over the country. He has also appeared on *The Late Show* — starring Joan Rivers, was a guest host on *Nashville Now* and continues to appear on the show on a monthly basis. Mr. Andrews has also appeared at the *Improv* and *The Comedy Store* in Los Angeles, Lake Tahoe and Disney World; and he is a frequent headliner on the world's largest cruise ship, the *SS Norway*.

The 26-year old comedian really involves the audience in his act. His comedy is a clever but refreshing clean brand of humor. His comedic style is fast paced, related to common experiences and delivers the "good 'ole boy accent." Paul Harvey on his ABC News Commentary noted that "Andy entertains everybody, offends nobody, and he's getting standing ovations . . ." But his humor has a difference: He never uses foul language or profane gestures. Andy explains why he keeps his act clean; "that way, I can perform for any audience anywhere and not offend anyone. I think everyone is more comfortable in my shows because of that."



On Oct. 22, 1987, the GSC campus was honored with a performance by the Toni-Award-winning National Theater of the Deaf. "The Dybbuk: Between Two Worlds" uniquely blended the magic of sign language with the splendor of the spoken word. The play, written by Shloyme Zanvl Rappoport with the penname of S. Ansky and translated by Joseph C. Landis, kept the audience intrigued by exploring the depths of passion and possession.

Ralph Votapek

On November 2, 1987, in the college auditorium nationally-known pianist Ralph Votapek performed.

Ralph Votapek is one competition winner (Gold Medal '62: First Van Cliburn International Quadrennial Piano Competition) who has emerged a winner in the more competitive field of professional concertizing. Critics and audiences alike extol his artist maturity, technical proficiency, and the charm of his easeful platform manner. He performs in repeat engagements throughout the length and breadth of the Americas. Reviews from Canada to Argentina remark on his ever consistent artistic growth since his prize-winning days when he also captured the prestigious Naumburg Award in 1959 and gave his New York debut at Town Hall.

At this juncture in his career, Ralph Votapek's appearances with the major orchestras of the United States alone number in the hundreds, including many performances with the Chicago Symphony and the Boston Pops. With the latter orchestra, he performed on the last recording conducted by the renowned Arthur Fiedler (a Gershwin album). His biennial tours of Latin America are sold-out

events.

In Buenos Aires he plays repeated engagements on each tour, always performing a different repertoire. In the summer of 1986, he made his 12th tour of South America. United States audiences frequently hear him on the PBS-TV and National Public Radio Network.

Mr. Votapek has performed throughout the European continent. At the invitation of the Soviet Government, he has performed throughout the U.S.S.R. in recital and as a soloist with orchestras in Leningrad and other major cities.

Born in Milwaukee in 1939, Mr. Votapek began his musical studies at the age of nine at the Wisconsin Conservatory. Later he studied four years at Northwestern University; a year at the Manhattan School of Music, and another year at the Julliard School. His principal teachers were Rosina Lhevinne and Robert Goldsand. Mr. Votapek is presently serving as Artist-in-Residence at Michigan State University in East Lansing where he resides with his family.

Julius Caesar



On November 18, Glenville State College was visited by The National Shakespeare Company, a touring company that boasts 120 performances a year in many places that have very little access to theatrical productions. The 1987 tour marked the 25th anniversary for the group.

The production was probably the best visited event of the year with over 650 people from the school, community, and surrounding schools. It was far beyond standing room only when the show began.

For the most part the production was all that it promised to be, as "essential Shakespeare" performance, meaning that it tried to make the play more understandable to people who were not used to Elizabethian English. That part was successful. All of the actors did a commendable job, changing characters at the drop of a hat and doing well with all of their roles.

After one looked past the acting, problems started to be more evident. In the directing and designing of the show there were major flaws. Everything seemed to rotate around a theme that really was not clear. The costumes and set made it seem post-modern (a.k.a. Mad Max). The tights and Italian costumes were replaced with jogging suits with multi-colored belts and arm bands to indicate the rank of the character. But the idea began to take different alleys when the weapons (classic swords and daggers) were incorporated, and the whole show became almost a vaudeville with the slaying of Caesar, who made an interesting, but also very comical, use of his costume. Basically, the actors did meet their mark in trying to perform one of Shakespeare's most memorable plays in a fashion that anyone could appreciate, but the visual elements of the show only added confusion.

Dr. Simmons Assumes Post of BOR



The GSC campus has been a part of Dr. Simmons' life for a lot longer than most of us realize. He attended second, and third grades in the Administration Building and was an undergraduate at GSC. He taught English and was Academic Dean before assuming the Presidency, a position he has held for nearly 11 years.

Dr. Simmons feels pride and a sense of fulfillment from his experiences here and believes that GSC has become stronger in size, quality, and variety during his tenure. He hopes to apply what he has seen improve GSC to the state system.

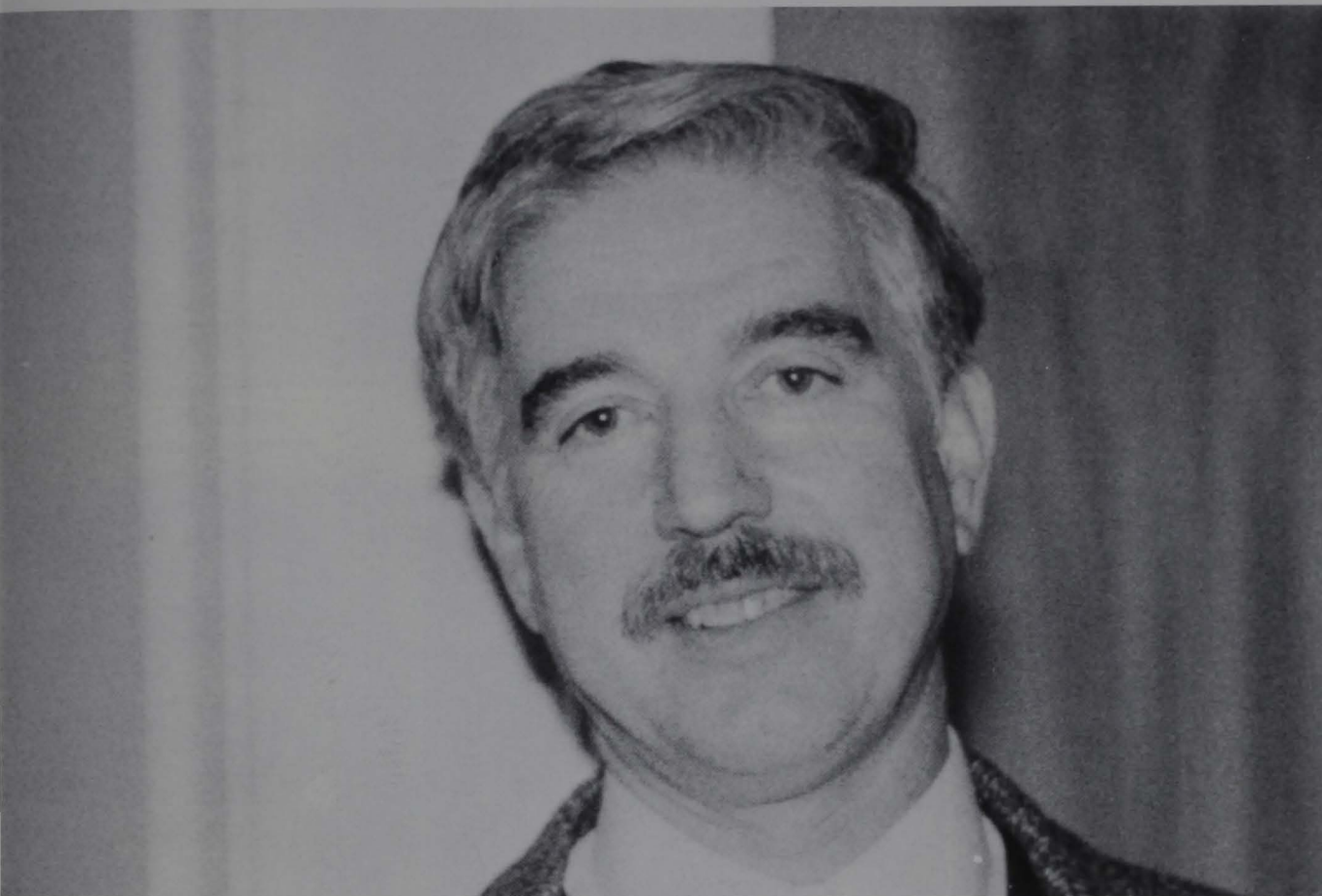
Dr. Simmons believes that the time to move is before one becomes complacent in his position and that the time comes to look at ourselves and have the courage to face challenge.

The challenge facing him as chancellor is not completely new as he held the position in 1983-84 in a temporary capacity as acting Chancellor. That experience will be valuable in the turbulent times ahead for West Virginia education. Dr. Simmons feels he knows the state and its many regional differences and problems and hopes to avoid some of the mistakes a lack of awareness could create.

He feels that education in all its aspects is the key to W.V. making the transition from a manufacturing and mining base to whatever the future may hold. He also feels that what is seen as economic decline in the state is a reality economic change and pointed to the age of the average college student (27 years) as an indicator of the public preparing for the change or maintaining their credentials for the future. He stated that educating for the future is a must to take advantage of the natural beauty of the state and to prepare for technological advancement.

Dr. Simmons nurtures a hope of someday returning to GSC as a teacher. His home is Gilmer county and his roots go deep in our red clay soil. He said, "I'm at home in blue-jeans or a suit. I'm where I am because people here need me, and I want to help others to find meaningful lives."

Dr. Peterson Assumes Position of Acting Glenville State College President



On February 1, 1988, Dr. Lowell Peterson officially began his position as Acting President of GSC. He will preside as president in the absence of Dr. William Simmons, who is serving as Chancellor of the WV Board of Regents.

Dr. Peterson does not anticipate any major change in policy or format for GSC, although he is in a position to exert this authority. However, according to Dr. Peterson, if any changes do occur, it will be with the recommendations made by the three current Vice-Presidents. He will rely heavily upon their leadership and advice from the Vice-Presidents, who have served here for some time.

In his own personal opinion, Dr. Peterson feels that the Board of Regents still has a future regardless of its current instability. At the time it is uncertain how the legislature may handle this situation, but the BOR is essential in regulations of higher education. So, although aware of its uncertainty, Dr. Peterson does not believe Dr. Simmons will return as President of GSC. Dr. Peterson, nevertheless, is not interested in becoming President of GSC if Dr. Simmons does not return.

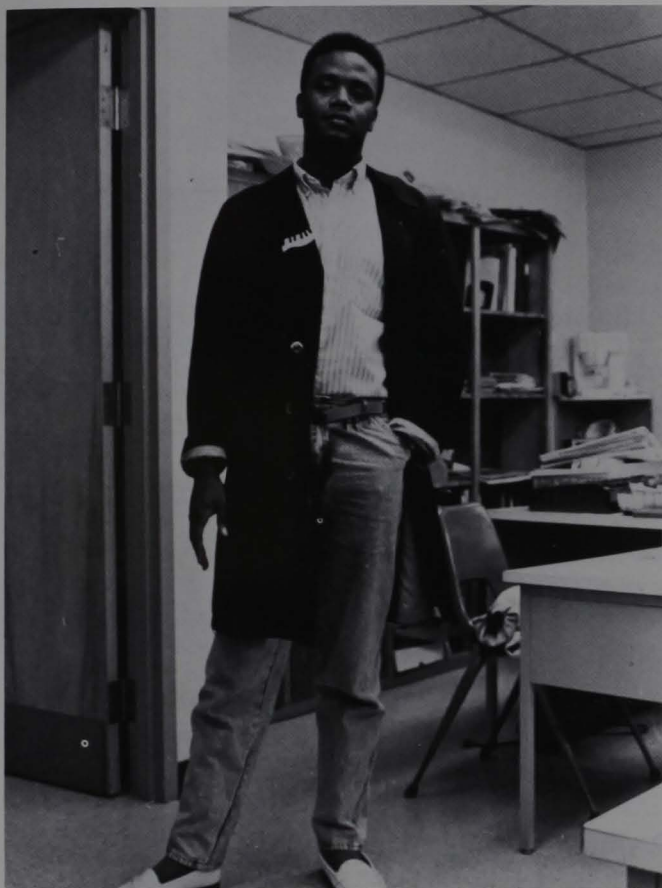

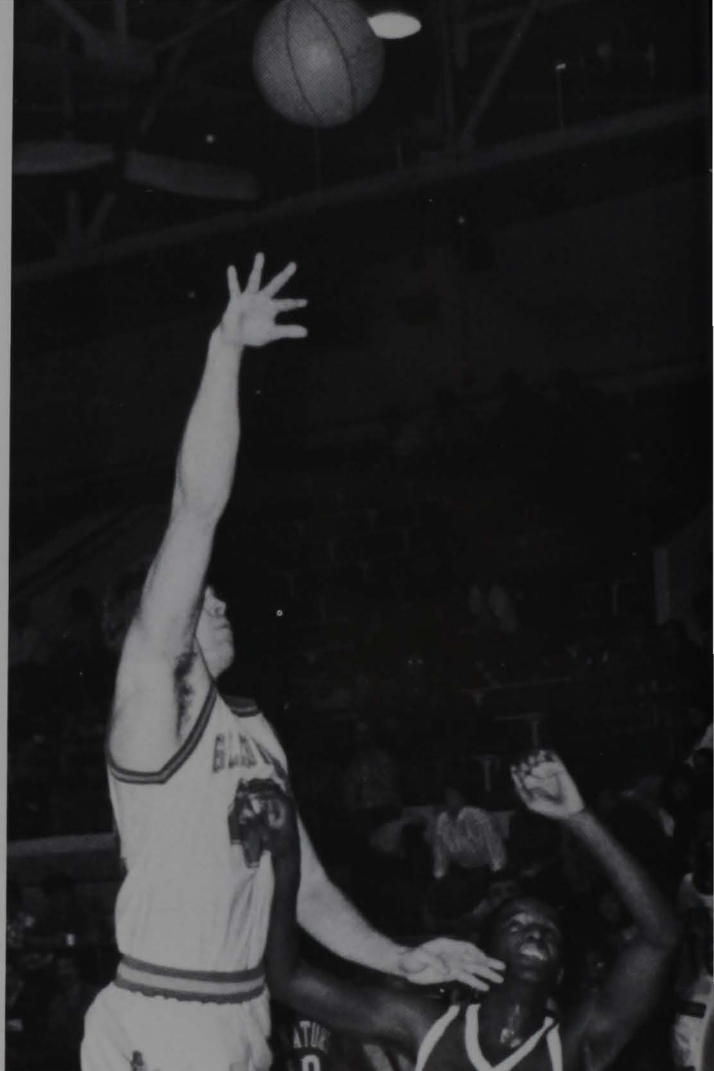

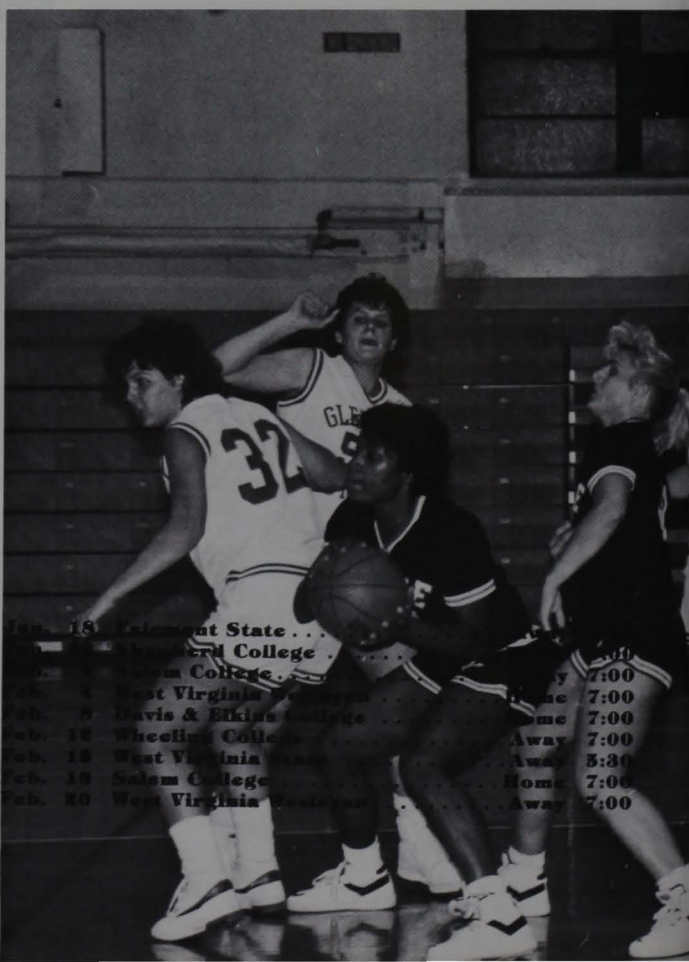

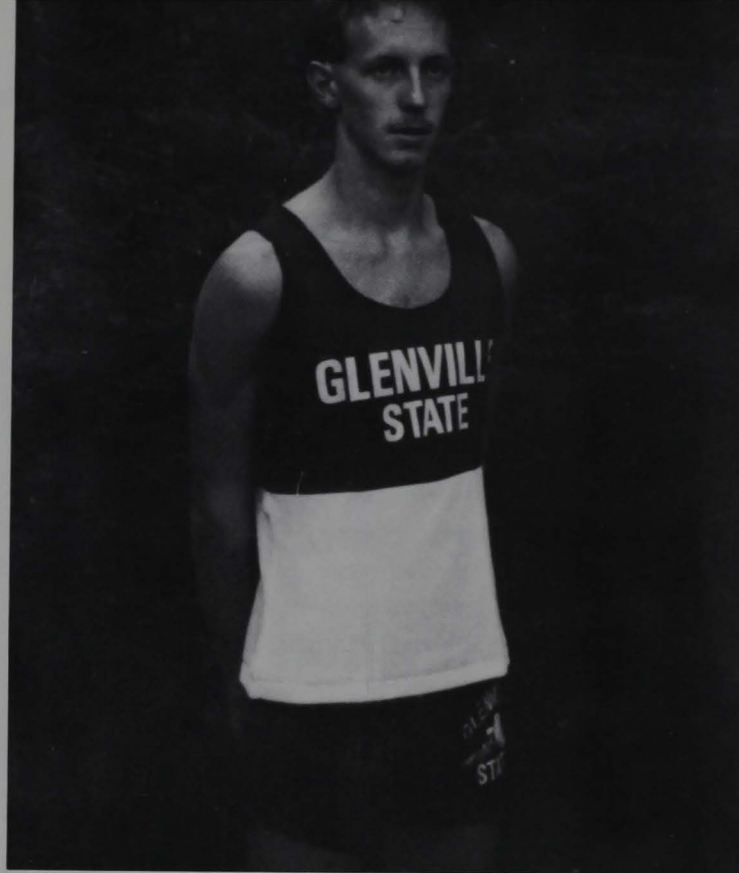

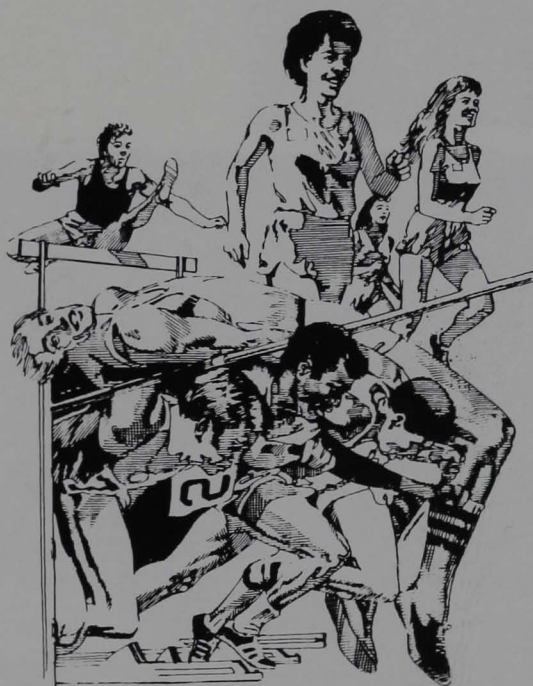

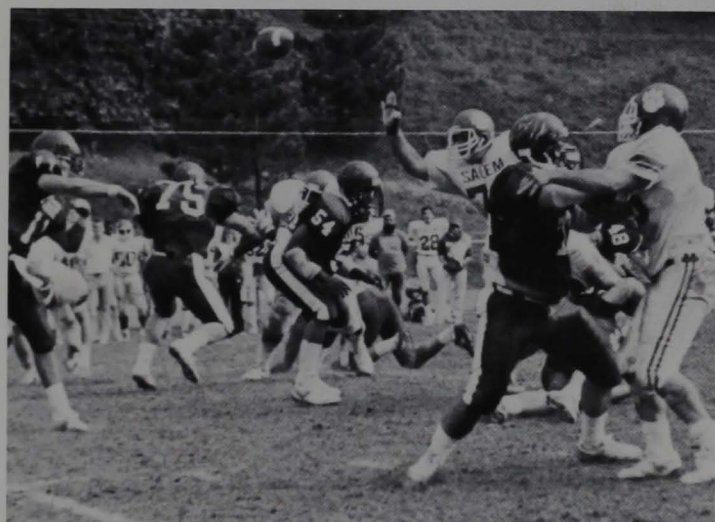

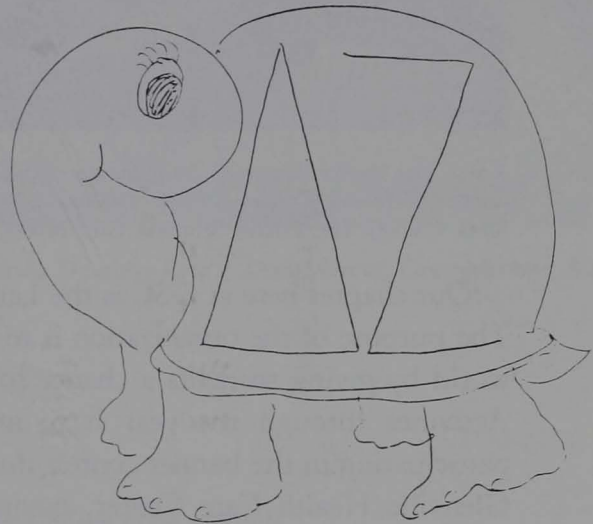
Delta Zeta Sorority

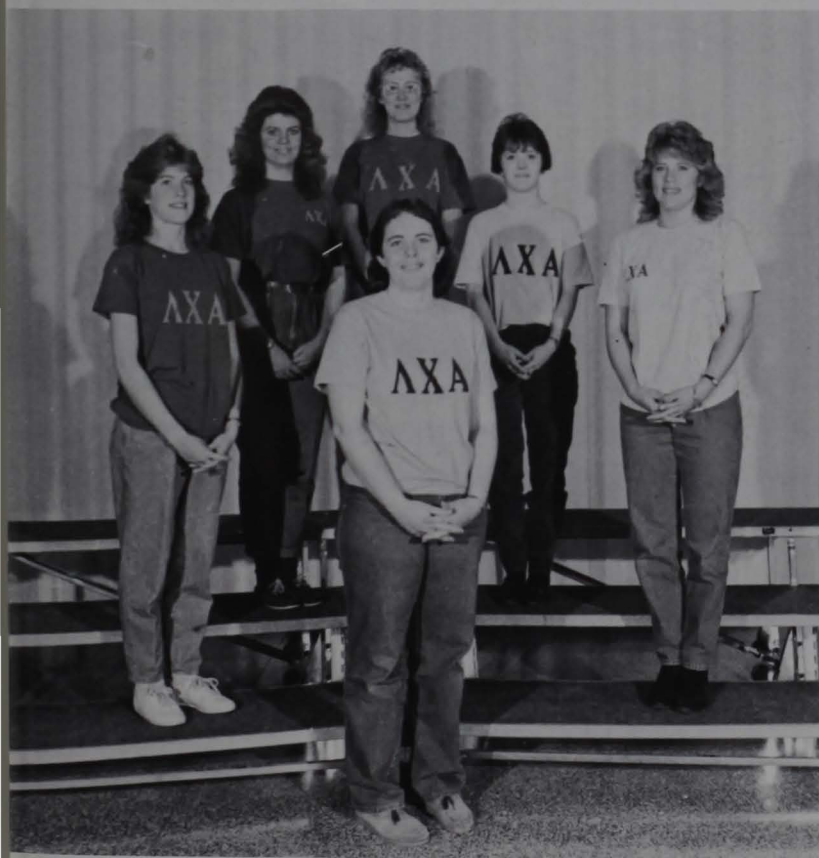

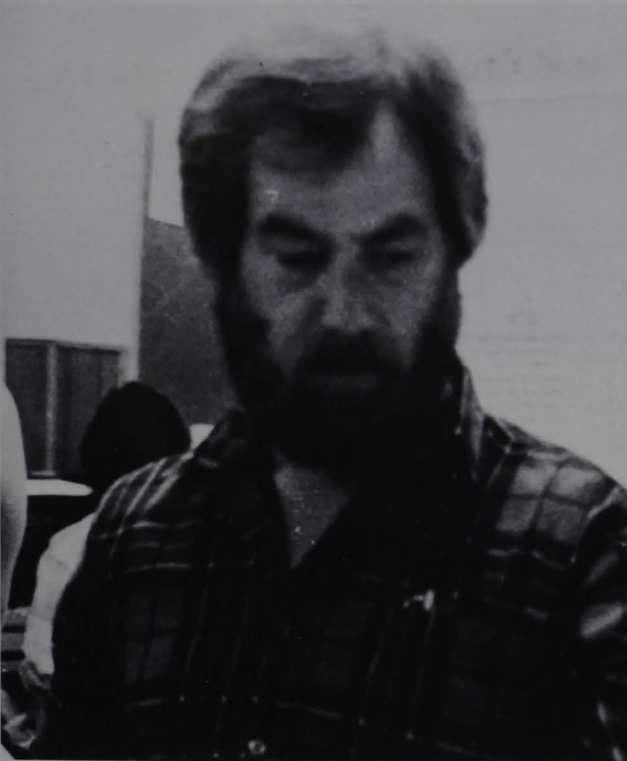

On May 14th, GSC sent several students on their way to begin careers of their own, ones they have studied for for years. Good luck to those who are beginning a new endeavor.

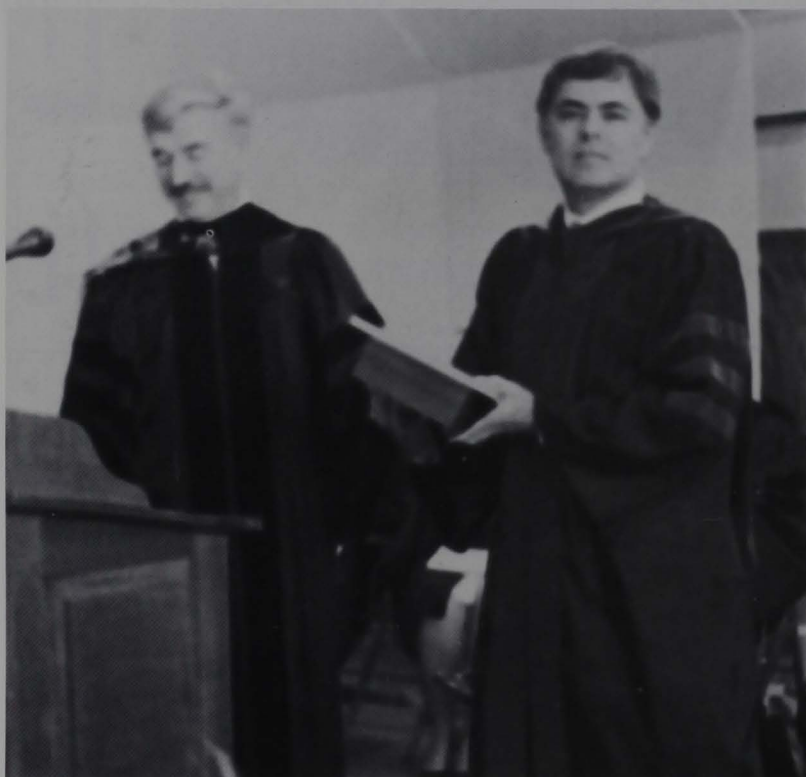

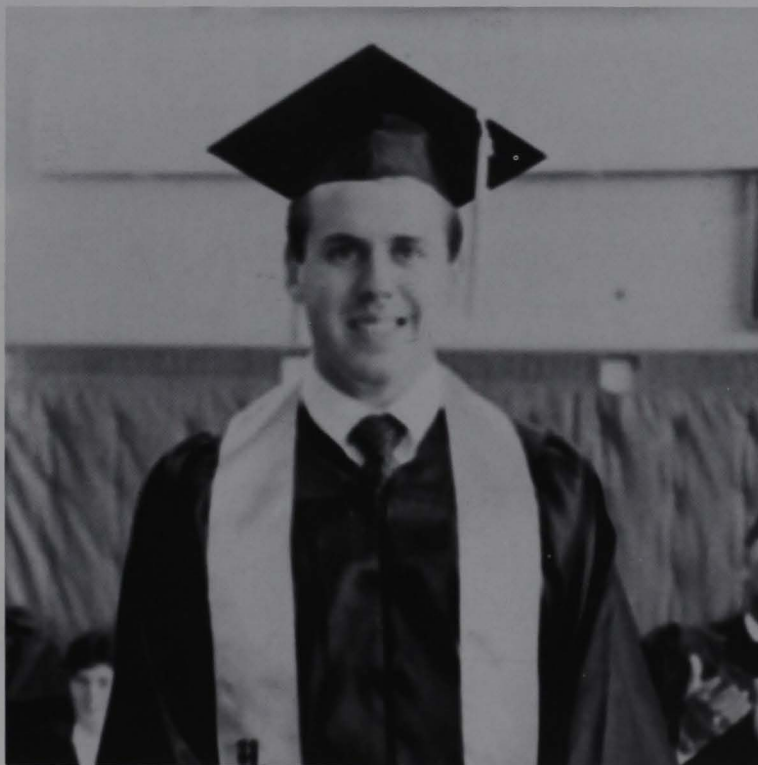

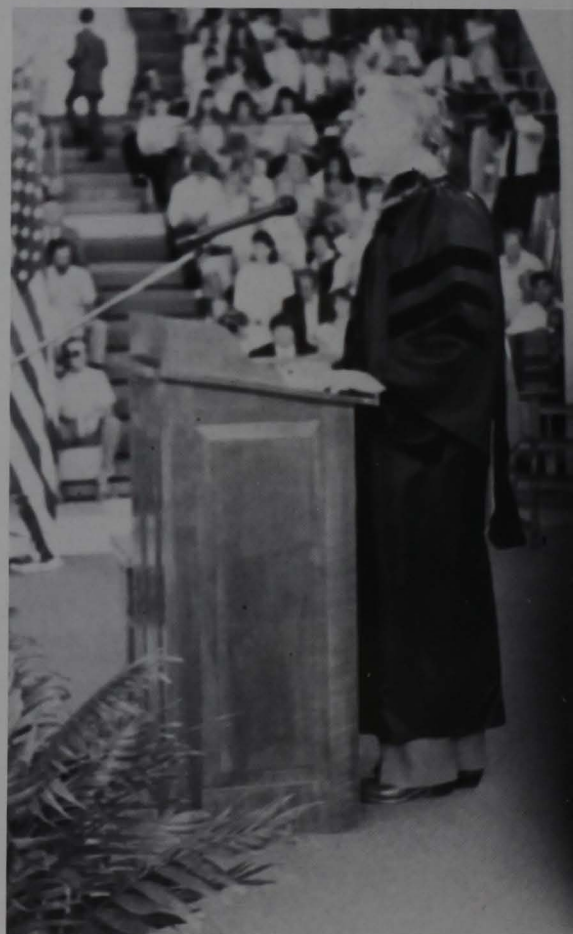

I hope everyone enjoys this edition of the *Kanawhachen* as much as we did have putting the book together. Before I say goodbye, I would like to leave you with this poem:


The journey of a lifetime
