




# Homecoming







# In Memory Of . . .



Board of Education and was the President of the Calhoun Co. Band Boosters to which she devoted many hours of her time. She was the mother of three children: a son, Robert, and two daughters, Mary K. and April. Susan Ross Schoolcraft, 36, of Cox's Mills, her husband, Dennis Stephen Schoolcraft, 36, and their three children, Joseph, 12, Melanie Nichole, 9, and Jennifer Yvonne, 3, were killed in a head-on collision on U.S. 33 near Glenville. The family was on its way to visit relatives in Clendenin. Susan was an honor math student and tutor at Glenville State College. She had been taking double course loads so she could begin her teaching career as soon as possible. In December, with just one semester to complete before accepting her degree, she, her husband and their 3 children were tragically killed.









"Ohnimgohow" means the joining of two rivers. The two rivers, theatrically speaking, are technical and acting, which come together to produce enjoyable plays!






















Miss Tracy Legg was crowned Miss Kanawhachen 1989 when the Glenville State Pioneers hosted Shepherd on Feb. 23.

Mrs. Linda McKown is the Director of Publications and Alumni Affairs while Mrs. Thelma Samples is the office manager.





# ELMER ISELER SINGERS



The world renowned Elmer Iseler singers came to Glenville State College on Monday, April 17, 1989.

Based in Toronto, the Elmer Iseler Singers recently returned from an Asian tour which included performances at the Summer 1988 Cultural Olympic Festival in Seoul, Korea, as well as in Hong Kong, Singapore and Tai Pei. Other tours in the past season have included a triumphant series of performances in Vienna where they were specially invited guests at the First World Symposium on Choral Music sponsored by the International Federation of Choral Music and, in January 1988, performances at the Calgary Olympic Arts Festival.

Renowned for their remarkably expressive phrasing and luxurious tone, the Elmer Iseler Singers, under the leadership of Canada's preeminent choral conductor, Dr. Elmer Iseler, has leaped to international prominence since its birth in 1979. Making over 100 appearances annually, the Elmer Iseler Singers present concerts throughout Canada and the U.S., and in 1985 they completed a highly successful tour of Holland. They are frequently involved in radio and t.v. broadcasts for the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation and a wide variety of recording projects. As the professional core of the 170 voice Toronto Mendelssohn Choir, they perform frequently with the Toronto symphony, winning great acclaim at the Edinburgh Festival, London's Royal Albert Hall and Carnegie Hall.

The singers are recent winners of three Grand Prix du Disques Canada, and Juno nominees for their album, 'Serenade in Harmony,' recorded in conjunction with the Netherlands Chamber Choir. Currently, they can be heard in the soundtrack of the Jane Fonda-Norman Jewison film, 'Agnes of God.' Soon to be released is the Singers' performance on the soundtrack of 'Millenium.' The choir was a major par-

ticipant in the 1989 International Choral Festival, held in Toronto during the month of June.








Elena Lowe blocks a kick in the kumite competition.













Pioneers Go To Final Four Finish Strong

The Glenville State College Pioneers headed into the WVIAC Tournament Championship with an outstanding 11 wins of their last 14 games. The Pioneers battled Shepherd at the Charleston Civic Center during the first game. GSC raced to an 8-0 lead and Bernie Rees' four three-point goals in a seven minute span gave the Pioneers a 39-28 half-time lead. Bernie Rees and David Hall both notched 16 points, and Paul Grier added 12 markers to lead the Pioneers to a 76-64 win. Glenville then advanced to the quarter finals against Alderson-Broaddus. The score was either tied or AB was ahead the biggest part of the first half until Paul Grier hit his fifth three-point goal to pull GSC ahead 37-34 at the half.


With Paul Grier's game high 34 points, Coach Gary Nottingham's squad went on to win 76-71. Defensively, Clinton Hinton had a superb game in limiting WVC scoring leader Willie Davis to 17 points. GSC moved into the final Four and met second-seeded Concord. The Mountain Lions sprinted to a 30-13 lead. The determined Pioneers refused to fold, but instead ran off four consecutive points to cut the deficit to 30-22 when Dwayne Williamson hit two free throws. After half-time, GSC came within six (49-43). Will Jackson's free throw tied the score at 54. Bernie Rees nailed a three pointer, giving GSC its first lead. The Pioneers failed to hold their lead, but placed four players in double figures in their memorable and well-played 66-65 loss.

D. Hall pumped in 18 points, while B. Rees netted 15. Paul Grier and D. Williamson added 12 and 11, respectively. In the consolation game, Glenville fell to WV Tech 78-70. GSC finished its season with a 17-14 record, including a very impressive effort in the tournament.












#### Individual Titles


#### Bubby Dent: An Established Name.






