

History of GSC Buildings

The opening of this college was fought for by many Gilmer County residents. Their efforts paid off with the formal opening on January 14, 1873 of the Normal School at Glenville. The first classes were held in the court house. This facility became too small and money from the legislature made it possible to build what was called the "Old Building" in 1885. In 1893 a clock tower was added. In 1893 the college name changed to the State Normal School. The present-day Administration Building remains standing and in use.

With money appropriated from the legislature, the President's House was constructed in 1929 for \$20,000. After this the college was renamed again in 1931 to Glenville State Teachers College.

As the college grew, need for more housing arose. A dormitory was completed in June, 1937 and was named after the first principal, Louis Bennett. Money from the legislature permitted construction of the two most modern building in the state at the time. In 1939 the Science Hall was dedicated and put into use. In 1943 the college made its final name change, thus far, to Glenville State College. In 1952 the Health and Physical Education Building was dedicated at the most modern gymnasium, with two gyms, a swimming pool, classrooms and offices.

In 1956 a dining hall and student center was constructed.


In 1956 a dining hall and student center was constructed. And in 1964 the building was enlarged and named the Pioneer Center. As of April 1990 it was rededicated to the Hellin Student Center. A women's hall was constructed in 1960 and in 1964 it was remodeled to house both men and women and another wing was added. Pickens Hall was named for Pearl Pickens, Dean of Women.

Kanawha Hall was acquired in 1913 for dorms and a dining hall. This building used to occupy the site of the Robert F. Kidd Library. The library was completed in 1967 and named after the fourth college president.

On the site near present-day Clark Hall, Verona Mapel Hall used to be housing for 80 students in 1926. The old library was replaced by the new library. In 1968 the name of the old library was changed to Clark Hall and was reconstructed for class-rooms.

The present-day Alumni House was previously owned by John Arbuckle. This man did many things for the college and when he died, his house was bought by the Alumni Association.

The newest building, the Fine Arts Building, will be dedicated in Fall 1990. This building was constructed for art and music classes. It houses an auditorium, a smaller auditorium, practice rooms, classrooms and offices.



The front view of the Administration Building with one of its many large maple. The tall white columns are a symbol of Clark Hall. This building used to trees dating back to when the building was built in 1909.




The Science Hall is a fourstory building containing classrooms and laboratories. It was considered the most modern in 1939 when it was opened for school use.




The President's House built in 1929 is occupied only for special events.



Robert F. Kidd Library was built in 1931 and named after the fourth GSC President.




The Health and Physical Education Building was the most modern type of building in 1952 with two gyms, a pool, and classrooms.










Teachers Leave the Classroom

March 7: Teachers Leave the Classroom. Teachers in five counties walked off the job on March 7, 1990. By March 8, teachers in 47 of West Virginia's 55 counties put down their pens, pencils, chalk and grade books for picket signs as the first teacher's strike in WV was in full swing. Many counties were forced to cancel class, while others operated with teachers who crossed the picket lines. Teachers walked off their jobs after the legislature and Governor Caperton refused to address any of the educational problems in the legislature. Teachers were upset over being 49th in the country on the pay scale, and the teachers retirement fund was already \$300 million in debt.

During the strike, the two teachers' Unions- West Virginia Education Association (WVEA) and the West Virginia Federation of Teaching and Gaston Caperton made three attempts to end the strike, but each proposal was either rejected or withdrawn. As things were beginning to "heat up" between the teachers and the Governor, State School Superintendent Henry Marockie

WV's Royal Couple

June 8, 1989: WV's Royal Couple Divorce. On June 8, 1989 Governor Gaston Caperton announced he would seek divorce from his wife; however, Mrs. Dee Caperton beat her husband to it and filed on July 19. They were officially divorced after 23 years of marriage on October 24, 1989. In less than seven months from his divorce, Governor Caperton announced his engagement to Wheeling Symphony conductor Rachael Worby on May 11, 1990.

Pete Rose

on March 14 decided to close schools in the state on March 15 and 16 for what he called a "cooling off" period. On Saturday March 17 the WVEA and WVFT agreed to end the strike when legislative leaders said they would ask Governor Caperton to call a special session to address long term education needs. Schools on Monday, March 19 began to return to normal when teachers returned to the classroom. The teachers' strike also affected many students here at Glenville State College. All student teaching, observations, and practicums were suspended during the strike. The education department then began to come up with alternatives to student teaching to guarantee timely graduation and certification in case the strike was prolon-

All in all, the first teachers' strike in WV's history lasted less than two weeks and student teachers returned to the classroom on Wednesday, March 21, 1990.

Arch Moore

May 8, 1990: Arch Moore Pleads Guilty to Political Corruption. On May 8, 1990 former Governor Arch A. Moore, Jr. pled guilty to a five-count political corruption indictment. He rendered his plea to U. S. District Court Judge Walter Hoffman, who was called in from Norfolk, VA, after all WV Federal judges had asked not to be assigned to the case. Moore pled guilty to two counts of tax fraud and one count each of extortion, mail fraud, and obstruction of justice. These crimes apparently took place during his 1984 campaign and his term as governor from 1985-89.

Moore was previously indicted in 1975. The former governor was sentenced July 10, 1990.

Douglas

February 10, 1990: Douglas Breaks Tyson's Reign as Champ. James "Buster" Douglas knocked out undefeated heavyweight champion Mike Tyson in Tokyo, Japan.

Noriega

December 20, 1989: U. S. Government Overthrows Manuel Noriega. President Bush sent troops to Panama to overthrow Noriega's government.

Earthquake

October 17, 1989: Earthquake Demolishes San Francisco Bay. A major earthquake occurred in the San Francisco area causing the postponement of the third game of the World Series and causing over 2500 casualties.

Hugo

September 21-22, 1989: Hurricane Hugo Does Major Damage to East Coast. Hurricane Hugo swept across the southeastern coast causing severe flooding and major damage in South Carolina.



MARCHING THROUGH THE JUNGLE


The 1989-90 Homecoming parade was a great success. The rain held off permitting many wonderful floats, banners and groups to participate in the annual celebration.




Homecoming



The Fine Arts Building is the newest attraction on the Glenville State College campus. It will serve as the new home for the Music, Theatre and Art Departments.







Rich Rodriguez - New Head Coach



Mr. Rich Rodriguez, former head football coach of Salem, has been hired to rejuvenate the Pioneer Football Program at Glenville State College.

Coach Rodriguez will enter this position at GSC with several years of football experience, including an impressive playing and coaching career. During his college football days at WVU, Rodriguez played in four different bowls including the 1981 Peach Bowl, 1982 Gator Bowl, 1983 Blue Bonnett Bowl, and 1984 Hall of Fame Bowl. Rodriguez was awarded the "Ideal Mountaineer Man" during his senior year by the WVU coaching staff and was a three-year letterman.

Following his college career, Rodriguez remained at WVU and joined the coaching staff as a graduate assistant. He was hired as the defensive coordinator and assistant head football coach at Salem College in 1986. Two years later he accepted the position of head coach of the Tigers making him "the youngest head football coach in the nation."

When Salem became Salem-Teikyo and dropped its football program, Rodriguez became a volunteer assistant coach at WVU and returned to North Marion High School as a teacher. He helped coach the Mountaineers on their path to the Mazda Gator Bowl. Rodriguez will draw on his coaching experience with Don Nehlen as a basis for improving the GSC Football Team. "Don Nehlen is my mentor," Rodriguez stated at a press conference in March.

Rodriguez feels there are "a lot of positive things the team and community has to offer." His first priority is to make sure everyone is ready to make a commitment to the football program.

Coach Tim Carney was selected WVIAC Golf Coach of the Year for the ninth time.




The Men's and Women's Track Teams had an eventful year at Glenville State. The teams put tremendous effort into the season and it paid off for some members.


Katrina Riggleman broke the GSC school record in the 10,000 meter relay with a time of 40:42.4.




