






When Pickens Hall was first opened in 1961 it was only four stories high, but in 1966 two more floors were added. In 1971 Scott Wing was opened for women and Wagner was changed to a mens' wing. This project cost approximately \$1.6 million. Pickens Hall has three lounges on first floor for all residents to relax, study and watch television. Once in a while there is a dance held in the main lounge. On the Ground floor of the Scott Wing there are laundry and kitchen facilities for the women.


In 1937 Louis Bennett Hall was completed. It was named after Mr. Louis Bennett, the first principle of the Glenville State Normal School. When it was first built, it was L-shaped. In 1965 the other two wings were added. It is a residence hall for men only. The rear wing houses the social science offices and financial aid offices. Also, some apartments are available there. On the first floor there is a lounge for residents to relax, study or watch television. In the basement there are laundry facilities and a ping pong table.












Contrary to what most people think, college can be the best time of a persons life. Many people can cope with the pressure and handle the responsibilities, while others let these lifestyles overwhelm them.







Greetings were given by Cathy Harbert, president of GSC Student Congress.



Glenville State College offers a host of clubs and organizations. New organizations formed this year included the Society of Petroleum Engineers and Alpha Rho Tau.






Cross Country

The team overcame this horrible tragedy by working hard and working together. The team ended the year with a winning season of 17-11.
















Making Tracks








WV Symphony

Hilgenberg Authors Book


Dr. James Hilgenberg will soon be adding to his long list of accomplishments. From Enemy to Ally, written by Higenberg, w be published by University Press of America.


From Enemy to Ally examines Japanese-American relations during the early years of the Cold War when the United State occupied Japan. Hilgenberg is an authority on this topic, as it was the focus of his doctoral dissertation.


Hilgenberg explained that a focal point of the book was the United States' desire to become allied with Japan. He explained "We wanted (Japan) to be our allies instead of the Soviet Union's."

Hilgenberg recieved his bachelor's degree from Baker University in Kansas, and his master's degree from the University of South Dakota. In 1978, the same year he began teaching fulltime at GSC, he recieved his Ph.D. from West Virginia University Hilgenberg is also the Faculty Advisory Council representative to the State College System of West Virginia Board of Directors, member of Faculty and Course Developement in International Studies organization, involved with Elderhostel and the West Virginia Historical Association.

Fron Enemy to Ally will be available next winter in both hardback and paperback, and will be disributed nationally-includin Glenville State College's bookstore. In addition, Hilgenberg is writing a textbook for Prentice Hall publishers on moder Japanese history due next fall.







Teacher Exchange Program

Dr. Peter Tjekpema, and exchange instructor from the Netherlands, arrived in August to take his place as a proffesor in the Glenville State College Business Division. Tjekpema exchanged with Glenville State college insructor Jerry Hough. Hough lived in Tjekpema's house in Holland while Tjekpema lived in Hough's home in Glenville.

To qualify for the exchange program, Tjekpema had to engage in a rigerous application procedure. Tjekpema stated that he liked the American educational system better than that in the Netherlands. In Holland everyone follows the same curriculum whereas in America the system allows students to choose their own curriculum. Tjekpema spoke highly of the students of GSC by saying, "American students don't talk back so much. Dutch students talk back much more. I noticed the phenomenon in Holland as well. Country students are friendlier than urban students.



Yankee Peddler Festival

The eighteenth century was the theme of the annual Yankee Peddler Festival, attended by Associate Professor of Art, George Harper. The festival which spanned the weekends of September 7-22 was held at Clay's Park Resort in Canal Fulton, Ohio.

Harper, who participated by exhibiting landscape design pottery, was dressed in the fashion of the pioneers of the 1700s. Prepared with and inventory of approximately 250 pieces, he exhibited, sold and demonstrated the actual creation of this type of pottery.

In addition to the Yankee Peddler Festival, Harper was invited to submit two paintings to the 1991 Juried Mountain State Forest Festival Fine Art Exhibit. The exhibit ran from October 2-5, in Elkins, West Virginia.

Of the two works submitted, Harper received a merit award in the proffessional painting category for "Spiritual Glow," which he painted in honor of his mother, who died in 1990.

Traveling Mask Exhibit



A mask exhibit called *Ceremonial Faces: The Magic of Masks* came to GSC October 7-31. The exhibit is the person collection of Mr. Rick Tubesing. Tubesing is the Library Director, and an adjunct associate professor of anthropology at GSC It took Tubesing over 30 years to compile his vast collection. They have come from such exotic places as Japenese temples the far east to the northern parts of Mexico. Tubesing commented, "Art is not the main reason for the masks, but mainly they were made for cultural and soci purposes."


Glenville Grad Opened Art Gallery Season

Black speaker shared Unconventional Views

On February 24, Dr. Greg Smith, athletic director of West Virginia college gave a presentation as part of Black Awareness Week. Smith shared his personal experiences with racism.

His presentation included definitions of diversity and racism. Smith pointed out that in *Webster's New World Dictionary*, "black" is defined as "...soiled, evil, angry, disasterous, and serving dishonor," while "white" is defined as "decent, fair, positive, and pure."

Smith felt that tests such as the ACT and SAT are culturally and racially unfair. "Black peoples' language is not English," he said. "I challenge students here to earn their degrees and go forth to make a positive difference," he added.

Smith's idea of reparations for the slave's suffering is a nation within a nation, separate but equal. The Southern United States would be taken back for black people to have their own nation, including seperate atomic and nuclear warefare. He also suggested that the Constitution be rewritten.

The presentation was open to questions and answers. Several students and faculty asked questions and voiced their opinions.

Facilitators for the forum were public school teachers form Braxton and Lewis County who are trained as "Mentor Teachers" for their respective county.


Debbie Simon and Deanna Foxworthy, assistant professors of education at GSC, coordinated the 1991 forum.

This year GSC leased a fleet of ten Chevrolet Luminas as part of a pilot project for use of natural gas as as automobile feul. The vehicles, which were leased from the Travel Management division of the state government, were to be converted from gasoline carburators to a dual natural gas and gasoline system.

According to David Camilletti, director of administrative services for the college, "The addition of these cars to the college fleet should alleviate current automobile transportation problems. We are excited about this pilot project and the fact that we can use our natural gas resources to benefit the college."

New Buses Purchased for College-sponsored Activities

GSC purchased two new buses to be used for transportation for all regular scheduled college activities. Each bus accommodates 25 passengers. The buses are equipped with large diesel engines, automatic transmission, cruise control, overhead luggage space, and air conditioning.

The buses were purchased from Roher Bus Service in Pennsylvania. They were purchased on a five year lease at the end of which they will pay \$1, and the buses belong to the school. The price of each bus was \$42,000. One bus will be paid for through Alumni Foundation funds, the other by regular colege funds.

Mollohan was born in Fairmont where ne resides with his wife, Barbara Whiting Mollohan of Glenville, four sons and


one daughter.


