









One thing will remain after promotions have happened and steps are made — underclassmen memories, and those are certainly times to remember.











- 7. maintained strong enrollments.

Despite a rocky start in the fall due to campus controversies, President William K. Simmons, along with Rolanna Gumm, administrative assistant, managed to bring the year around to one that saw many accomplishments (see box, left).

"Overall, the college has achieved its highest level, despite insufficient funding, to accomplish all the projects that should be done," President Simmons said.

And who better to get the college at its highest level that a Glenville State College graduate. Dr. Simmons first came to GSC as a student, serving as the Pioneer. He returned in 1964 as an English instructor, after earning his Ph.D. in English literature and language at Ohio University. Dr. Simmons quickly moved up the ladder, being promoted to associate professor, then professor, then dean of academic affairs. In 1977 he was named President. As is evident, Dr. Simmons has devoted his whole life to this college, and, from the beginning, demonstrated his pride in the institution.

Gumm has also made a committment to the college from which she graduated summa cum laude with a degree in business administration. Immediately after graduating, Gumm began working in various campus offices before becoming administrative assistant to the President.

In looking to the future, which Dr. Simmons is constantly mindful of, despite his long history at the college, the President sees plans which "include developing a five-year Strategic Plan mandated by Senate Bill 547, finalizing the Nicholas Counter Center expansion, and continuing to integrate technology efforts into instruction."

Although Dr. Simmons is known throughout the college system and state for his positions as President and Interim Chancellor, he is a simple man at heart, enjoying farming, woodworking, hunting and fishing.

The previous season's success, coupled with the return of several key starters and the acquisition of a handful of talented transfers, was enough to convince coaches throughout the land that the Pioneers would be the team to beat in 1994. GSC also began the '94 season as a heavy favorite to repeat as WVIAC champions. The Pioneers were set to embark on a season-long pursuit of a goal that had never before been attained in the annals of Glenville State football history: back-to-back WVIAC titles.


GSC kicked off the season with a convincing win over California (PA). In that game, Pioneer wide receiver Chris George moved past the great Jerry Rice (now of San Francisco 49er fame) to become college football's all-time reception leader. After another non-conference win at home, the Pioneers began their '94 conference schedule with a thrilling win over perennial foe Shepherd. By the season's fourth week, an impressive victory over WV State, it had become evident that the Pioneers were a force to be reckoned




For the 1995 Men's track & field team, the 95' season will be one not easily forgotten. After strong performances throughout the season, the men entered the WVIAC Championship Meet prepared to battle it out with conference rivals West Virginia Wesleyan.

With ten events completed, the Pioneers were faced with a 37 point deficit. Though the championship seemed to be out of reach, the Pioneers pulled together as each individual reached deep within himself to produce the largest comeback in conference history. The Pioneers dominated the remaining nine events to win the conference title, it's third in the past five years. Senior Kent Pilant also was the co-recipient of the WVIAC Track Athlete of the Year Award.

Besides capturing the conference title,















Pioneers in Nursing is a student organization for anyone interested in pursuing a career in the health field.




Collegiate 4-H once again had a banner year at Glenville State College. Everyone is welcome to join and the organization is very busy during the school year sponsoring many activities.





FRESHMAN COUNSELORS







Alumni Awards



The end result, is happy audiences, satisfied performers and a magnificent reputation that leads to sold-out shows yearly.







The GSC Concert Band delighted audiences at Music Fest in the fall and during their own concert in the spring.



Each year, the GSC department of student services brings a plethora of talent to the GSC stages in the form of hypnotists and comedians. The performances are open to all of the college community.



The department of art and art club sponsor these exhibits every year.







GSC misses Lyons and expresses sympathy and best wishes to his family and friends.





