




Top: Mrs. William K. Simmons cuts the cake. Below: The AB Building before the tower was built.

Glenville State College The Beginnings

Thirty-two residents of Gilmer County met in the red brick courthouse in Glenville to establish a branch of the WV State Normal School. The group included two legislators, one of whom--Fifth District Senator Preston Pow--introduced Senate Bill Number 15 which became an Act of the WV Legislature establishing the Glenville Branch Normal School, February 19, 1872. A proviso of the act was that the citizens should furnish a suitable building without cost to the state. That summer the Normal School Association was formed. The president of that association was Harrison Cain, who was a blacksmith, farmer and the clerk of the county court. Fifty-six area residents donated from \$5 to \$100 for a building and land.

The first students were enrolled on January 14, 1873, by acting principal Thomas Marcellus Marshall. A young man at the time, he is described as intelligent and highly eccentric yet equally industrious. When the legislature did not vote sufficient funds, Marshall worked for nothing and dug coal and hauled it to the school.

The first year, 120 students ranged in age from 12 to 30. Tuition ranged from \$20 to \$32 the first 25 years. The average age of students in 1918 was 13.5.

Each year a female student is nominated by a campus organization to become Miss Kanawhachen. She symbolizes the spirit of Glenville State College. The name derives from the Little Kanawha River which flows through the glen from which Glenville takes its name. "The river that flows through the woods," one Indian tribe's translation goes.

The event, originally held by *The Kanawhachen* staff as a fund raiser for the yearbook, is carried on with votes for nominees taken in the Heflin Student Center, at a penny a vote. The crowning of Miss Kanawhachen now takes place at the last home basketball game of the season.
























Business








Coach for all Seasons....

Coach Rich Rodriguez entered his sixth season at the helm of the Pioneer football team in 1990. At the time, the program was completely decimated and even on the verge of being eliminated.

Things began to change when Rodriguez and his staff arrived at Glenville State College in 1990. The once prevalant apathy that consumed the program was quickly replaced with newfound enthusiasm. Since Rodriguez's tenure began, GSC football has regained respect not only in the WVIAC but on the national level as well.

Coach Rodriguez and his staff completely turned around a program and produced a great football with true Pioneer spirit.




New Head Football Coach

Men's Cross Country

Glenville State College is rich in track and cross country tradition. We are currently a member of the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WVIAC) and an affiliate of the NCAA Division II. The 1995-96 academic year was the first year GSC athletics became a full member of the NCAA. Prior to this, the school was a member of the NAIA (National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics.)

In the 90's, the men's track and field team has enjoyed much success. In the eight years of this decade, the men have captured three conference championships and four runner-up titles. Since Coach Harold took over the program in 1990, 15 athletes have advanced to NAIA national championship competition, with two of those individuals becoming All-Americans. The men's cross country team virtually dominated the conference in the 80's. After rebuilding from that period, the men are on the verge of returning to the top.

In 1994 and 1995, the men finished second in the conference. In 1994, the team had three individuals qualify for NAIA national championship competition. In 1995, this team became the first GSC program to compete in NCAA post season competition. Placing 22nd out of 54 teams in the eastern region. In 1996 the men returned to the top of the conference by winning the WVIAC Championship and in its second year of NCAA post season competition, place 10th in regional competition.








Rick Conklin is both men's and women's track and cross country coach, as well as Sports Information Director and Publications Manager.





The Jesse Reed Collection



Featured at this year's Fine Arts Gallery, Jesse Reed shows his audience a painting influenced by one of the many countries he has visited and brought to life in watercolor.




