The Physical Education Building is where you will spend most of your time, if you are an athlete or a physical education major. All of GSC's home basketball games are played here.








The jazz band closed with its encore, "Lord, I Wanna Be A Christian," which was an interesting and lively mix of rock, jazz, and pop.

The performance was topnotch and all involved should be proud of themselves. The jazz band is a shining example of the musical talent present on GSC's campus.






#### LITERARY




Above: Some of the members of the Literary Society are dicussing Beloved, written by Toni Morrison.
















#### SENIOR ART

He describes his work as "a journal. It provides a constant reminder of what to avoid in my life."



On May 15th, 1999 in the Glenville State College gymnasium over 200 students graduated with bachelors and associate degrees from GSC.




Dr. Bruce Flack, the interim president of Glenville State College, presents the class of 1999 to faculty, family, and friends.








#### STUDENT CONGRESS




#### NICHOLAS COUNTY CENTER








