FACDIS International Studies Summer Institute for Teachers Teaching East Asia: Classroom Ideas for a Dynamic Region

Blackwater Falls, June 26-July 1, 2016

For the twenty-eighth summer, FACDIS organized an outreach program for pre-collegiate educators. This year's International Studies Summer Institute for Teachers on Teaching East Asia: Classroom Ideas for a Dynamic Region brought thirty-seven public school teachers from twenty counties to Blackwater Falls State Park, June 26-July I, to expand teachers'

Highly talented presenters offered numerous sessions during the five-day institute. They included Julie Oakes, professor of history from the University of Maryland in Baltimore County, Matthew Roberts, teacher of AP Psychology and Asian Studies at Pine-Richland High School, Gibsonia, Pennsylvania, and Mitchell Lerner, associate professor of history at The Ohio State University and the director of OSU's Institute for Korea Studies.

knowledge and enhance teaching about China, Japan, and Korea. Although the institute was directed towards high school and middle school social science teachers, it was open to all teachers K-12 as well.

West Virginian teachers - with the guidance of three top scholars - examined how the East Asian nations present themselves to the wider world and how the world views the East Asian nations. The institute was designed to provide practical information and hands-on instruction in how to more effectively teach select curriculum-based units on East Asia. Teachers received three hours of professional development graduate credit, free lodging and meals, and teaching resource materials.

As in many years, Tom Collins, retired director of Project LINKS (Linking International Knowledge with Schools), part of the Elliot School of International Affairs of the George Washington University, was of considerable help in providing teaching resources for the institute participants.

In addition to the many hours of classroom experience, the participating teachers also interacted with each other during sessions, meals, and evening conversations, gleaning suggestions on how to better integrate international issues into the classrooms. Teacher participants then translated materials from the summer experience into teaching units which will be posted on the FACDIS web page. Teachers were eligible for three hours of professional development graduate credit, in addition to free lodging, meals, and teaching resource materials. Funding from the West Virginia State Legislature helped to support this annual summer professional development program.

News and Notes

Katherine Aaslestad, West Virginia University, recently attended "The Persistence of Civic Identities in the Netherlands, 1747-1848," at the University of Leiden. Aaslestad served on the Expert Committee contributing her expertise on German Central Europe.

Bethany College welcomed two Fulbright scholars to campus for the 2016-17 academic year. Wei Qu of the People's Republic of China and Mohamed Ezouine of Morocco will serve as teaching assistants in Chinese and Arabic through the Fulbright Foreign Language Teaching Assistant Program.

Bluefield State College continues to internationalize its campus. This year's activities include:

- (1) Hosting in AY 2016-17 Fulbright Scholar in Residence Dr. Mariya Kharina from its partner institution, Kazan National Research and Technological University in Russia;
- (2) Sustaining its collaboration with Cultural Vistas by hosting two German students through the Congress-Bundestag Youth Exchange Program;
- (3) Signing agreements with Kazan National Research and Technological University (Russia), National Ilan University (Taiwan), Holy Cross College (India), and William V S Tubman University (Liberia) to promote student and faculty exchanges; and,
- (4) Launching English for International Students, a two-semester intensive English program as a pathway into the college's degree programs.

Concord University has welcomed three Pakistani students on the Global UGRAD-Pakistan Program and two Tunisian students on the Thomas Jefferson Scholarship Program to its campus this semester. Both programs are through the U.S. Department of State.

Megan Gibbons, Glenville State College, has been selected as a Fulbright scholar through the Core Fulbright U.S. Scholar Program. She will be studying the impact that the COIL program has on students' intercultural skills. COIL is an acronym for Collaborative Online International Learning. The students usually connect through a video chatting program or online meeting software and exchange cultural and academic questions to learn more about one another as an introductory activity.

From **Arand Holtslag**, Shepherd University:

- In the Fall of 2016 the Global Studies Program has become an official program at Shepherd with Holtslag as the Program Director and eight official majors for the inaugural semester. The program consists of four tracks: "Global Governance & Peace," "Global Economics & Development," "Global Environments," and "Global Culture & History." Students can choose a regional specialization from "Europe," "Africa & the Middle East," "Asia," and "the Americas." All students will have to complete an international experience and two years in a foreign language. The program is interdisciplinary and includes courses from most departments around campus.
- The Political Science Department at Shepherd University is hosting the International Studies Association Southern Region Annual Conference at Shepherd University 14-15 October 2016. Holtslag is the Program Chair for the Conference which will host about 100 scholars from around the country and the world.
- The Shepherd University Model United Nations Organization under the guidance of Holtslag will host the first annual Rams Model United Nations Conference for High School students in April 2017.

From Chiquita Howard-Bostic, Shepherd University:

- Howard-Bostic was appointed for a three-year term as a board member of the American Civil Liberties Union of West Virginia (ACLU-WV) in May, 2016.
- On September 15, Howard-Bostic presented the keynote address, "Education across Generations" at the Advena World *International Conference on Leadership, Ethics, and Urban Issues* in Washington, DC. Howard-Bostic introduced a transformational leadership strategy to address disenfranchised generational socialization processes.
- On October 10, Howard-Bostic was a facilitator and panelist for the event, "Dialogue on Race Relations: Challenges and Way Forward." Strategic leaders and participants raised awareness and shared promising initiatives about challenges that inhibit constructive race-related discourse.
- On November 5, in the Storer Ballroom following a viewing of the film, *He Named Her Malala*, Howard-Bostic will facilitate a discussion about the collective role of educating girls across the globe.
- Howard-Bostic was also selected to participate in the 2nd Annual Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL) Fellows Program sponsored by WVHEPC. Howard-Bostic will be trained to implement online courses with an international partner during a six-week online COIL course.

A number of our FACDIS faculty members presented papers at the Pearl S. Buck Living Gateway Conference in Morgantown, WV, in September. Born in West Virginia, Pearl S. Buck (1892-1973) was a Nobel Prize-winning author who was raised in China and wrote primarily about that country. FACDIS presenters included: **David Gordon**, Shepherd University, 'Always in Love with Great Ends': Pearl S. Buck's Response to Sun Yatsen and His Nationalist Revolution; **T.J. Park**, West Virginia State University, Pearl S. Buck's Promising Legacy in Korea: The PSBFK and the Growth of Multiculturalism in South Korea; and **Mark Wilson**, WVU Institute of Technology, West Virginia's Nobel Laureates: Pearl Buck and John Nash.

Ann Marie Legreid, Shepherd University, was a keynote speaker at the annual meeting of Phi Beta Delta, Honor Society for International Scholars, held in June in Denver. The title of her presentation was "Potholes and Strategies on the Pathway to Campus Internationalization." Legreid has been elected to the national Executive Board of the honor society, and serves as the vice president for the Southeast Region.

James Natsis, West Virginia State University, was interviewed by the French service of Radio Canada this past summer on two occasions for the Toronto and Montréal news segments regarding Muhamed Ali's death, and what he meant to his hometown Louisville, Ky. He was interviewed in French for both news segments. Natsis resides in Louisville, KY, while commuting part of the week to Charleston, WV. He is active in the francophone community in Louisville as a member of the *Alliance Française de Louisville*, and as organizer of the *Cercle Français* at the Iroquois Public Library in Louisville.

Shepherd University will be able to significantly expand its study abroad program thanks to a \$49,963 grant from the U.S. Department of State. Shepherd is one of only 18 higher education institutions nationally awarded a one-year Capacity Building Grant for study abroad.

Also, **Shepherd University**'s Department of Social Work had a successful service learning course in Guatemala again this summer. Students learned from social service activities, worked with the local populations, and had homestays.

Michele Stephens, West Virginia University, has been awarded a Max Planck Institute for European Legal History Fellowship in Frankfort, Germany, for 2017. Stephen's current scholarship focuses on the ways Yucatec Maya women have developed into legal advocates for themselves and how male legal professionals have viewed these women who have initiated legal action against others. While at the institute, Stephens will have the opportunity to partner with some of the world's leading legal historians.

The Holocaust Educational Foundation has invited **Richard Weeks** and other retired Holocaust scholars to this fall's *Lessons and Legacies Conference* at Claremont McKenna College, where the Holocaust Educational Foundation will honor them for their distinguished careers as a Holocaust educators. The award ceremony will take place on November 4, on the Claremont McKenna College campus in California. Professor Weeks recently retired as Professor of History *Emeritus* at West Virginia Wesleyan College and currently lives in Milford, Pennsylvania.

University of Charleston and Jagiellonian University of Krakow, Poland, will sign a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) recognizing common interests between the two schools. The MOU will allow the two universities to exchange students and faculty on a yearly basis and will provide UC students the opportunity to study abroad at one of Poland's most historic universities.

Leslie Ward, Glenville State College, recently traveled to Puebla, Mexico, for two days to speak to faculty and administration at Benemérita Universidad Autónoma de Puebla (BUAP) about Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL). COIL is different from online learning because the focus of COIL is cultural exchange, whereas online courses and massive open online courses (sometimes simply referred to as MOOCs) focus solely on course content and students interact very little, if at all. Under COIL, the original course content remains wholly or partially unchanged, and the partner teachers work together to develop collaborative modules that help meet the goals of the individual courses while enriching cultural awareness of the students enrolled in the courses.

Bringing Global Learning to West Virginia

Megan Gibbons and Heather Ward look at how making international connections through online learning is transforming Glenville State College, a small, rural campus in West Virginia.

Glenville State College in West Virginia is bringing global learning to its rural Appalachian campus—where 85 percent of students come from the surrounding counties—by connecting Glenville faculty and students online to teach and learn with their peers in Spain and Mexico.

In 2014, Glenville was one of three institutions selected for its potential to advance internationalization through Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL), part of the ACE-State University of New York (SUNY) COIL Center Internationalization Through Technology Awards Program.

"COIL has literally opened the world to our students," said Milan Vavrek, interim vice president for academic affairs. "They've gained an appreciation for other cultures, expanded learning in content areas and developed international friendships without leaving campus."

The COIL method has been adopted by scores of institutions in the United States and abroad as a way to expand students' cross-cultural skills, enhance language learning, tap the expertise of faculty at international institutions and contribute to comprehensive internationalization. For institutions like Glenville State, it is proving to be a cost-effective, scalable way to deliver global learning to students who might not have other opportunities to experience the world.

Since Glenville State launched its COIL program in the spring semester of 2015 with two courses—one in Spanish Conversation and Culture and one in U.S. History—the college has increased COIL course offerings to six per semester and formed partnerships with two universities in Mexico, reaching over 100 students a year. By comparison, just one Glenville State student studied abroad in 2014, and—while it marks a significant increase over a two-year period—only nine will go abroad during summer 2016.

For Glenville State, providing students with 21st century global learning meant first taking a step back in time. By rediscovering the story of Spanish immigrants who settled in nearby Anmoore, whose descendants still form part of the local community and continue to speak Spanish, Glenville helped students see a direct connection between their West Virginia roots and a foreign culture.

Luis Argeo, a filmmaker from Asturias, Spain, created a documentary about the small community that migrated from Asturias—also a rural mountain region—to West Virginia, and helped with the initial introduction between Glenville State College and the Universidad de Oviedo. Faculty at Glenville State and Oviedo agreed to make the partnership official by jointly creating and delivering the first COIL courses for both institutions.

Alicia Laspra, professor in the Department of English Philology at the Universidad de Oviedo, met Glenville State faculty and staff in person during the ACE-SUNY COIL Center site visit and faculty workshop in October 2014. Dr. Laspra, who continues to serve as COIL project coordinator at Oviedo, was instrumental in securing a memorandum of understanding between the two institutions in April 2016.

The partnership with Oviedo will be sustained by Glenville State's institution-wide commitment to developing its COIL Program. During the first year, John Peek, then provost of the college, authorized a \$1,000 stipend to faculty who developed COIL course modules. In 2015-16, Glenville State faculty and staff participated in a special fellows program supported by the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission (WV HEPC) to create two additional COIL course modules. Gibbons will continue deepening the partnership between Glenville and Asturias as a Fulbright Visiting Scholar at the Universidad de Oviedo during the spring 2017 semester. The award will enable her to conduct research on the Glenville State-Oviedo COIL program and the effect it is having on students in both Asturias and Appalachia.

The initial impact of the program is best expressed by the students themselves. One of the students at Oviedo asked for "more" in her end-of-project video reflection—as in more time to COIL, which means additional activities and a longer module. In this video reflection submitted by a Glenville student, similar enthusiasm for the project is expressed in the desire to take more classes with COIL modules.

Recognizing Glenville State's relatively quick success in expanding global learning through the COIL method, the WV HEPC is now tapping the college's expertise in replicating the program at three other public institutions—Bluefield State College, Concord University, and Marshall University—and supported a second cohort of COIL Faculty Fellows during the 2016-17 academic year. Gibbons shares the training she received with these COIL fellows both in person and in an online course hosted by Glenville State. Some of this training began in Puebla, Mexico, during June 2016, when she and several faculty members traveled to visit new partner institutions.

Since the launch of the pilot courses in Spring 2015, Glenville State's COIL program has included successes and failures, but perseverance and flexibility have led to more widespread excitement on campus about the program's potential.

"When I first heard of COIL a couple of years ago, it was new and folks were a little bit confused by the concept because it is so different. Now that it's more familiar and we understand it better, there's a definite buzz," said **Leslie Ward**, a COIL fellow and the college's web design specialist. "I recently had the chance to travel to Puebla, Mexico, to meet with professors at one of our partner institutions. I've also had fellow faculty members stop me to ask questions about COIL and how they can get involved."

Further lessons and insights from Glenville State and other institutions selected for the Internationalization Through Technology Awards are discussed in the latest installment of ACE's online *Internationalization in Action* series, "Connecting Classrooms: Using Online Technology to Deliver Global Learning."


