For the past two years, the paper has been edited by William A. Boram, an English, journalism, and speech major from Weston. His exceptionally fine work has done much to make the paper what it is today.


Veteran's

Frank Montrose Memorial Award

for

Outstanding Senior Athlete of the Year

This year it was decided that some recognition should be given to the senior athlete of each graduating class who was most outstanding, not only as an athlete, but as a scholar, a leader, and a person of high moral character. It was also decided that the selection would be made from the previous year in order to include the entire basketball and baseball seasons.

The next question which arose was what to call the award. A diligent examination of the past records of the school's athletic history by Jim Robinson, freshman sports writer, revealed the following.

Frank Montrose came to Glenville in the fall of 1939 from Richwood High School where he had established himself as a grid great under the guidance of "Babe" Jones, a former Pioneer.

In the gridiron campaign of Frank's freshman year, during which he was used sparingly at first before he came into his own, he established himself as one of the most promising backs in the school's history.

Frank's first touchdown in collegiate competition came in the first period of the Fairmont game on a 63 yard punt return. Perhaps his greatest performance came in the following game against Shepherd, when he passed and ran his team to a 34 to 0 victory.

Shortly before the final examinations in the spring of his freshman year, Frank went blind. A month later, on June 21, 1940, the 21 year-old Montrose died in a Baltimore hospital, a victim of nephritis.

Just before Frank left school, Earl McDonald, *Mercury* sports writer, shook hands with him and said, "See you in September at the training camp, Frank."

"Don't worry, I'll be back," Frank said.

And now, with the newly instituted "Frank Montrose Memorial Award," he is once again back at Glenville.

As this yearbook goes to press, the recipient of the award from last year's graduating class has not been selected. We can only hope and feel confident that the athlete who is chosen will carry on in a manner befitting an all-around good fellow, Frank Montrose.

Football Resumé

Glenville State College's 1952 gridiron edition, standing on the brink of an imminently disastrous season, bounced back from the throes of defeatism to establish the best Pioneer football record since 1942.

Although the Blue and White gridders ended their brief season with a seemingly mediocre three won, three lost record, the won and lost column does not stand as an indication of the year's proceedings. Opening on a dreary note, and then dropping the two succeeding contests, the Pioneers lashed into the latter half of their six-game card with three defeats on the ledger, and prospects for a dismal future with two major foes occupying two-thirds of the remaining games.

Then came the change with a feline-like suddenness that clawed two favored foes into submission and buried the third under a touchdown deluge, controlled only by last-half restraint. The mid-year awakening was a thing of surprise to all local followers, and it forecast bad news to future Pioneer opponents if Uncle Sam will keep his beckoning hands off the young men who last year found themselves when the going was the roughest.

Opening the season without a pre-school training camp and on foreign soil, the White Wave was vanquished by the traditionally powerful Rams by a two-touchdown margin.

Glenville scored first on a Tennant to Godfrey pass, but Shepherd bounced back to take a 7-6 half-time lead and then added two quick third period tallies to waltz off with the victory.

GLENVILLE 6 FAIRMONT 26

The powerful Falcons, eventual state college champions, traveled to the Pioneer lair and wasted little time in showing their prowess. They registered three times in succession before the locals had hardly more than touched the oval. This was enough to secure victory although rampaging Jim Cherocci added a 65-yard third period gallop to the total. "Bullet Bill" Hanlin, offensive captain and stalwart Pioneer rip-runner, scored for Glenville besides playing his usual magnificent game.

GLENVILLE 7 CONCORD 25

Homecoming Day dawned on GSC with gala celebrations and evening faded into dark despair. Concord's Mountain Lions, following the Fairmont pattern, scored the first three times they touched the ball and then turned on the defense, matching the Pioneers last-half tally with their own. Mistakes cropped up again in the Wave attack that spelled early disaster, and the Pioneer offense fell apart completely under the opponent's much larger defensive line.

Bill Hanlin again led the Glenville offense and scored the only touchdown on a short jaunt.

GLENVILLE 14 POTOMAC STATE 0

With three defeats and 150 miles of travel behind them, the Pioneers hit the victory trail with an incentive, team-victory that left Pioneer fans aghast and Catamount rooters dismayed.

An airtight defense that refused to yield at the right moments, and an air attack that functioned when the going got tough on the ground provided the margin of victory. Gene Spadaro was the individual hero of the day, grabbing off two Tennant passes for scores besides several other brilliant catches and an irreproachable defensive game.

Spencer, Vincent, and Jolley are three other individuals who appeared often to throw back Catamount threats, while Hanlin, Riddel, and Hissam bore the brunt of the hard-moving ground attack.

GLENVILLE 25 DAVIS & ELKINS 7

Seemingly taking inspiration from their Potomac State victory, the Blue and White moved on to greater heights the following week by pulling one of the top WVIAC upsets in many years.

The highly favored Senators ran into an early rampaging Pioneer machine that cast back their every effort and then marched 91 yards for a first quarter score with Godfrey carrying the last four yards.

Spadaro snatched a second quarter Tennant aerial for a score before D. and E. retaliated. Hanlin ground out the third Pioneer marker and the Blue and White held tight the rest of the way. Riddel's last quarter touchdown gallop was anti-climatic as the Pioneers walked off the field with one of their sweetest victories ever.

GLENVILLE 38 SALEM 6

Salem's oft-beaten Tigers provided little opposition to a sweeping Glenville offensive which scored almost at will during the initial half. Hanlin's 65-yard gallop on the third play from scrimmage set the night's pattern which later let to a 32-6 Glenville halftime lead. Salem's Beto matched Hanlin's jaunt moments later to tie the score 6-6 momentarily but Spadaro and Hanlin grabbed off two of Tennant's long heaves for additional first period scores.

Then in the second period, Spadaro caught a short Tenant pass for the fourth Pioneer tally, and moments later intercepted a Salem aerial which he returned 50 yards for the score.

Godfrey registered the sole second-half marker on a twisting 45yard third quarter run, and Coach Josephs emptied the bench, giving the reserves valuable experience.

Gone via graduation from the Pioneer ranks next year will be eight seniors who formed the experienced nucleus of the past year's squad. Co-Captains Bill Hanlin and Gene Spadaro will be badly missed along with the following: Charles H. Spencer, tackle; Lonnie Miller, guard; Frank Fultineer, back; Joseph Riddel, back; Donald Weaver, guard; and Fred Gainer, defensive end.

However, on the brighter side, many experienced men will return to the fold, which, barring their military call, should provide Coach Josephs with a unit around which to build his future clubs. The most prominent among these are: Frank Vincent, Bernard Jolley, Jack Tennant, Harold Hissam, Ronald Godfrey, Donald Merriman, Michael Popp, Edward Tekieli, Oliver Hunt, Paul Lanham, Danny Hall, Charles Sturgill, Robert O'Dell, James Robinson, Dick Barrett, "Bud" Huff, and veteran returnees, Avis Partain and Marlin Snyder.

At the end of the season seven Pioneers were honored with mentions on the All-WVIAC selections. Two of these boys, Charles Spencer and Gene Spadaro, received first-team berths for their great 60-minute play.

Two others, Frank Vincent, center, and Jack Tennant, quarter-back, were named to the second eleven. Captain Hanlin received particular honorable mention and Bernard Jolley and Joe Riddel were given honorable mention to the select group.

Basketball Resumé

While the 1952-53 edition of the Glenville basketball team failed to win any conference laurels, they did present a colorful, aggressive style of play that made them a serious threat throughout the campaign.

The Pioneers won seven and lost 13 in conference competition, and split even in two non-conference engagements, for a season total of eight victories and 14 defeats.

Led by Jack Tennant's 27 points, the White Wave opened the season famously by whipping Fairmont, 88-68, at Glenville. The Wave then fell into a three-game losing streak which was not checked until they registered a 64-61 win over the Alumni.

Wesleyan, West Liberty, Tech, and Alderson-Broaddus beat the Josephsmen in succession following the Alumni victory, but the Glenville quintet found Davis & Elkins an easy mark in their next outing to annex their third victory, 85-80.

Concord was the next foe to appear on the local court, and the most exciting battle of the season ensued. The Pioneers raced to an early lead only to have the Mountain Lions overtake them in the final seconds to send the game into overtime. The teams finished the first overtime in another deadlock, and in the second extra session the visitors outlasted Glenville to win, 86-84.

Sparked by Tennant's 26 points and Bob Poole's 25, the Pioneers rebounded from the Concord defeat to edge Beckley, 77-67.

The team then journeyed to Marietta to do battle with their namesakes, the Pioneers. The Ohioans, one of the leading quintets in the Ohio Valley region, faced some stern opposition before finally overcoming the White Wave, 68-63.

The conference champions, Morris Harvey, were the next visitors to Glenville, and although the Pioneers were impressive in the first meeting of the two teams in Charleston, the locals were completely outclassed in this one, 85-66.

Things began to look up when the Wave trounced Davis and Elkins and Beckley on successive nights to open the longest road trip of the year, but defeats by Concord and Fairmont evened matters as the Pioneers returned home for the last leg of the campaign.

Playing against some of the strongest opposition in the state, the Wave gave out with their finest efforts. Alderson-Broaddus started things off by barely eeking out an 87-84 win over the locals. Once again the Pioneers came back from defeat to tame the Salem Tiger, 92-85. High-flying Wesleyan was forced to pull out all stops in nudging the Wave, 73-63, at Buckhannon. The White Wave ended the season in a blaze of glory by taking the measure of the defending champions, West Liberty, 90-82.

The Pioneers failed to survive the first round of play in the WVIC tournament at Buckhannon as the home forces, Wesleyan, ran wild in burying the Glenville team, 105-75.

Leading the Glenville squad in scoring for the second straight year was their talented forward, "Dynamite" Jack Tennant. Tennant racked up a total of 516 points to set a new Glenville regular season scoring record. The old record was 499 points, scored by Bob "Hooks" Hardman during the 1950-51 season.

Tennant's 516 points came in 22 contests for a 23.4 game average. The "Fairview Flipper" scored over 20 points in 16 games during the year, including four contests in which he scored 30 or more points. His highest output for the campaign was against West Liberty when he poured in 39 points.

Following Tennant was sophomore Bob Poole, who counted 368 points for a game average of 16.7. Poole went over the 20 point mark five time and hit thirty or better twice.

Diminutive Dickie Barrett, playing in only 21 tilts, scored 344 points to raise his career total to 671 points.
