Alpha Xi chapter of Sigma Tau Gamma fraternity, a national social organization, was founded on the Glenville State college campus March 14, 1950 with a charter member group of 20 men. William Harper from Parkersburg was elected first president of the fraternity, the third men's social organization to be established on campus.

The fraternity has as its aim to foster social activity and color on campus by participation and cooperation in school events.

The fraternity annually sponsors many social events, including student mixes, stag parties, picnics, smokers, and their top social event of the year, the annual White Rose Christmas Dance. The colorful event was held this year on December 1, at which time Miss Marita Spicer was officially crowned 1954-55 Rose of Sigma Tau.

Lanham, who was an outstanding student as well as a brilliant athlete, becomes recipient of the award which is symbolic of high athletic achievement combined with high scholastic ability.

Lanham was a guard on the football teams of '51, '52, and '53, and was one of the outstanding performers on the powerful Pioneer line in addition to sharing the captain's duties with end Don Merriman.

In baseball, Lanahan was one of the finest hitters ever to play for the Gee Men. Patrolling his right field post with great defensive skill, Lanham was a consistent .300 hitter. During the summer vacation periods, Lanham continued his baseball playing with the Ripley Independents, state semi-pro champions. With Ripley, Lanham's batting continued at such a torrid pace that he gained a spot on the all-state baseball nine.

Football Resume'

Five members of the 1954 Glenville football squad received mention on the ALL-WVIC honorary football team. Center Frank Vincent and End Ed Tekieli landed berths on the first team; Jack Tennant, an all-league selection in 1953, received a second team position, and Tackle Sam Ballato and Guard Mike Popp were awarded honorable mention.

Vincent, a 210 linebacker from West Newton, Pa., was the backbone of the Glenville defense this season and was considered one of the state's top linemen. A veteran of four seasons at the center position on the Pioneer line, Vincent moves up from the second team of a season ago.

Tekieli was an easy selection; he held the league's leading mark in pass catching. On the receiving end of most of Tennant's passes, the Fairview junior snared 19 passes and was a Trojan on the defense.

Resume' of Football Games—1954

Shepherd (7-7)

The G-Men travelled to the Eastern Panhandle for the season's lid-lifter with the always powerful Rams. In a struggle as hot as the day it was played, the teams fought to a deadlock. Two outstanding features of the game were the phenomenal kicking of "Bullet" Bob Weaver, and the tough line play of Glenville's "7 Back Breakers." The White Wave had a wide edge in statistics, gaining 169 yards rushing to Shepherd's 48, and passing for 104 yards as compared to 70 for the Rams.

Fairmont (0-6)

In a steady down-pour of rain, the Falcons capitalized on a blocked kick and an end zone recovery to hand Glenville its first defeat of the season. Again the outstanding feature of the game, besides the rain, was the play of the line. Fairmont smashed through the first half for a total of 55 yards; however, the last half they were held for a minus three yards rushing and a game total of 52 yards. After three seasons of raising havoc with opposing defenders, "Passmaster" Jack Tennant was finally halted by the elements.

Concord (7-26)

Glenville travelled south to play in the first "Coal Bowl" game ever to be played at the municipal stadium at Gary, W. Va. The Pioneers failed to live up to pre-season predictions and suffered one of their worst defeats in recent years. One of the bright spots of the game, however, was a 61 yard run by John Shock with a lateral on the 12 yard line to Weaver who carried over from there. Avis Partain threw a smashing block, which cleared two Concord defenders from the path of this touchdown run.

Potomac (rained out)

Pluvius, the sender of rain, opened the floodgates of heaven to flood not only the football field, but the town of Glenville as well. The game was cancelled and an abbreviated parade was all that left to honor the old grads on Homecoming Day.

W. Va. Wesleyan (27-12)

The Glenville Pioneers suddenly came to life at Buckhannon and lubbed the Wesleyan Bobcats into helpless submission. Playing their finest game in two years, the team handed hard-working coach Nick Murin his finest college victory. Freshman halfback Eddie Armstrong gained 72 yards rushing for the team's best individual mark of the season.

Salem (13-0)

Despite playing under adverse weather conditions, Glenville's football machine snapped Salem's two-game winning skein by slamming home two second-half touchdowns. Once again the Pioneer line stood out as one of the best among the nation's small colleges by limiting the Tigers to a mere 34 yards overland. "Jar'n" Jack Tennant passed for his 21st touchdown aerial in a four-year career, and tossed an additional 103 yards for the game's final total of 218 yards.

West Liberty (0-19)

Glenville's football eleven failed to realize a pre-season dream of breaking the .500 mark (a jinx since 1942) when the Hilltoppers of West Liberty smashed through for three touchdowns and then went on from there to shut out the C-men completely. The Pioneer attack sputtered throughout the game, and the usually efficient line leaked like a sieve. Vincent, the year's defensive standout, shone like a diamond on the otherwise drab afternoon.

New Coaches

Nick Murin, who gained his undergraduate football education under the old master "Nate" Rohrbough, returned to his alma mater to assume the football coaching chores. Murin, who was a mainstay on the Pioneer baseball, football, and basketball teams of 1939 and 1940, served as an assistant football coach and was head basketball coach at Calhoun County High School for five years.

Following two fine seasons at Glenville, Murin's college career was interrupted by World War II, when he entered the Air Corps and served with the 9th Air Force in Europe.

Continuing his undergraduate work following his discharge in 1946, Murin was named president of the student body, and, in addition to his studies and athletic activities, he found time to coach the Glenville High School Red Terrors to a 21 won, 2 lost season.

Coach Murin received his Master's Degree at West Virginia University and hopes to someday complete work for his Doctor's Degree. Good luck for the future, Coach Nick Murin.

George Stopp, a native of the "Windy City" of Chicago, brings to Glenville almost 20 years of experience in the game of basketball. During his senior year at Transylvania College, at Lexington, Kentucky, Stopp was picked as the all-conference center on the all-star team.

During his four-year stay at the Lexington school, he came under the influence of Adolph Rupp, head mentor of the Kentucky Wildcats. Playing against the Wildcats on numerous informal occasions, Stopp became sold on the tactics employed by Rupp, particularly the fast-break style of play.

A call from Uncle Sam interrupted Stopp's career in 1943. In a short time he rose to the rank of lieutenant in the U.S. Navy.

Following his discharge in 1946, he became an Industrial Recreational Director for the Bemis Brothers Company in Talladega, Alabama.

In 1949 he accepted a student assistantship at Peabody College. After receiving his Master's Degree in 1950, Stopp taught physical education and coached at the Georgia Teachers College Laboratory School. In 1952 Stopp accepted a graduate assistantship at Indiana University and began work on his Doctor's Degree.

This is Coach Stopp's first head coaching assignment at the college level; he was formerly assistant coach at Georgia Teachers College. Best wishes for a successful future, Coach George Stopp.

Basketball

Best Basketball Season Since 1943

Coach George Stopp's first year as head basketball coach proved to be the finest season Glenville has enjoyed since 1943 when the Pioneers raced undefeated through 13 games.

This season's mark of 14 won and 8 lost is a shade better than the 14-9 slate of the 1951 team which won the state championship in the tournament held in Buckhannon.

One reason for the big improvement in team play is the addition of Rudy "Cool" Poole, whose tremendous rebounding and scoring aided the Gee Men both defensively and offensively. Poole set the school's freshman scoring record by pouring 423 points through the hoop. By scoring 47 points against West Liberty, he also shattered the one-game total set by Bob "Hooks" Hardman.

Another change in the first-team personnel was the return of "Bounding" Bob Turner from army service. Turner was a member of the 1951 championship team, and he is considered to be the best man-for-man defender in the entire state.

Another major factor in Glenville's rapid improvement was the return to form of Harry Smith, another holdover of the 1951 team. Following a tenure in the armed services, Smith set a torrid pace this seeason by scoring 50 percent of his field goal attempts.

Although having an "off" yeear by Tennant standards, "Dynamite" Jack continued to break scoring marks by tallying 392 points for the regular season. His 1,654 points scored in conference games, and 1,788 points during the regular season are new records for the college. His life-time total of 1,893 points ranks second only to Hardman's 1,894.

It is generally felt that Glenville's record would have been much better if they had not lost the services of Bill Reit near the close of the season. The slender, Pennsylvania sharpshooter tossed in 179 points to bring his two-year total to 466 points.

The outstanding game played by Glenville was against Salem when they won 118 to 85. The Pioneers played not only a near flawless game, but set a new field house scoring record as well.

Entering the final week of play, the Glenville Pioneers were in firm grip of second place in the conference with a 14-5 slate. However, they fell from the pace to drop the last three games and skidded to fourth.

Basketball All-State

Four members of Glenville's highly-successful 54-55 basketball team received mention on the 1955 All-WVIC team.

Veteran Jack Tennant and Freshman Rudy Poole led the Pioneer delegation by being named to second team berths. Tennant was a first team choice last season while Poole was an all-state, high school player.

Bob Turner, one of the loop's foremost rebounders, and Harry Smith, one of the few players in the state to card a 50 percent field goal average, were accorded honorable mention on the team picked by conference coaches.

Smith and Tennant have climaxed their collegiate careers, but both Poole and Turner will be back to anchor the 1955-56 Glenville quintet.

Golf



Salem 8-Glenville10

With two men out and runners on second and third in the ninth inning Norman Fisher got a pinch hit single to drive in two runs and give Ralph Holder his second win of the season.


Davis Elkins 3-Glenville 4

Hunter Whiting



Dedication

Hunter Whiting, born in Glenville, March 1, 1890, first entered Glenville State Normal School as a music student in 1900-1901, under the principalship of Mr. W. J. Holden. In the spring of 1903, he was enrolled as a regular student, a special fee being required because of his youth. Mr. Whiting remained in the Normal School until 1910, completing some preparatory classes, four years of academic work, and, after his first graduation, further courses enabled him to enter West Virginia University as a sophomore.

In 1908, he was graduated in the modern language course. In the same year he received a certificate in speech, called in those days elocution. In 1909 he was graduated in the normal course. This same year, he received a certificate in piano music.

In 1910 Mr. Whiting entered West Virginia University, choosing French as his major study. In 1913 he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa and was graduated with the bachelor's degree.

In November, 1913, Mr. Whiting came to Glenville State as an instructor. He remained on the faculty until his retirement in 1954. The classes of 1919 and 1930 were both named for him.

During his many years in this college, Mr. Whiting taught French, Latin, Spanish, and English, serving also as Assistant to the President, 1925-1932, as Dean 1932-1935, and as Chairman of the Division of Language, 1950-1954. Although the official record at his retirement in September 1954 read for a little more than thirty-nine years of service, his connection with the institution really lasted fifty-four of the eighty-one years since its founding.

It is to this man that we, the Kanawhachen staff of 1954-1955, humbly dedicate our annual, for his many services to the college and to the students as individuals.

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
