Since its inception in 1935 the Student Council has continually expanded its function and importance upon the campus. Its growth and fulfillment of the need for a responsible student governing body is a demonstration of the character of leadership and the ability of its officers in the past and at the present time. Presently, the duties of the Council include the administration of the Student activity Fund, supervision of Freshman initiation, and organizational pledging. The Council also oversees the election of the Homecoming Queen, Princesses, and Pioneer and organizes the Homecoming Parade. The governing functions of the Council are carried out in conjunction with the president of the four classes. The Dormitory Governing Boards and Council.

The formulation of policies and regulations for the betterment of dormitory residents and co-operation with the college and administration in the taking of disciplinary action is the common objective of the Council of Louis Bennett Hall and the Governing Boards of Kanawha and Verona Mapel Halls. 

Football

The season lidlifter saw a well-drilled Glenville eleven battle the Potomac State Catamounts to a 6-6 tie. The single pioneer tally came in a pass interception and a 52 yard sprint to pay dirt by Halfback Paul McKown. Following the opener at Potomac State, the Pioneers played host to a tough team from West Liberty. The G-Men, their lack of reserve power evident, bowed to the Hilltoppers by a 25-6 score. Glenville's lone tally came on a one yard plunge by Halfback Ron Stonfer. The scoring play was set up by a pass interception by Jack Campbell and carried by Stanley and McKown to the 19 and 1 yard line.

After the loss to West Liberty, the Pioneers traveled to Fairmont and suffered their second setback. A powerful Fairmont eleven subdued the G-Men by a 32–13 score. Behind 14–0 at the half, Glenville's initial TD came in the third quarter on a pass from Quarterback Jack Campbell to End Steve McMillian. Fairmont tallied twice again before substitute Quarterback Steve Taylor hit paydirt on a quarterback sneak. Emory Elkins' conversion ended the Glenville scoring. Glenville's first 1957 victory was over the Concord Lions in the annual Homecoming Game. The initial Pioneer score came in the second quarter with the Lions holding a 7–0 lead. Harris intercepted a Concord pass on the 20 and carried to the five. Larry Stanley cracked the Concord forward wall for three and on the next play Harris bulled over to make the score 7–6. Elkins' conversion knotted the score only to have Concord mount a sustained drive for their second touchdown. The Mountain Lion conversion was wide and the half ended Concord 13, Glenville 7.








With five minutes remaining in the game Glenville took over on their own 23. Campbell promptly cracked through to the Pioneer 43. Ronnie Peters carried for 13 and a first down. Quarterback Campbell then handed off to Wilson who sprinted 20 yards to the Concord 24. The Concord defense stiffened but Peters bulled through for five and Wilson loped around end for the second Pioneer TD. With the score knotted at 13-13, Emory Elkins converted to give Glenville the margin of victory. Final in the Homecoming tilt: Glenville 14—Concord 13.

The Blue and White made it two victories in a row with a 25-7 triumph over Davis and Elkins. The Pioneer scoring started early with a spectacular 90 yard run by Stanley. Glenville's second tally came on a quarterback sneak by Jack Campbell. Both points after touchdown were wide and the half-time score stood Glenville 12, D and E 0. The Pioneers final two TD's came on sprints by halfback Paul McKown of 27 and 15 yards.



The season's finale saw an alert Glenville eleven dominate a hard-fighting Salem team. Following a quick series of plays leading to the sole Tiger score, the Pioneers struck back and were never headed. McKown tallied Glenville's initial TD on a two yard plunge following a 52 yard drive. Elkins converted and Glenville led 7-6. A sustained drive in the second period brought the ball to the Salem two where Eddie Armstrong cracked over. Elkins' successful conversion gave the G-Men an eight point lead. The Pioneers scored again in the third period in a sweeping 40 yard sprint to pay-dirt by Larry Stanley. Again Elkins' kick split the uprights and Glenville enjoyed a 21-6 lead. The Pioneers' final score came in the fourth period on a hand-off by quarterback Jack Campbell to Ron Stonfer who charged over from the seven. 
The 1957-58 season opened with the Pioneers facing the powerful West Virginia Tech squad on the White Wave's home court. Tech rolled up a dominating early lead and went on to a 110-84 victory. Rudy Poole and Bob Reynolds led the Pioneer offense with 23 and 19 points respectively. Glenville next played host to the Salem Tigers and with Poole hitting for 20, the Pioneers managed a 77-71 triumph. The two subsequent Glenville opponents, West Virginia State and Morris Harvey, played on successive nights proved too tough for the G-Men.

The State game on December 13 went to the men from Institute by an 87-69 score and Morris Harvey took the subsequent contest on the 14th by a 91-76 margin. Larry Barker took scoring honors for the Pioneers in both encounters. Glenville's final tilt of 1957 saw the G-Men play host to the West Liberty Hilltoppers and tally their second win of the season. Reynolds meshed 23 points as the Pioneers prevailed 75-67. On January 7 Morris Harvey journeyed to Glenville and trounced the G-Men for a second time. The score was 93-85. The Pioneers tasted victory the following night, however, overpowering the Davis Elkins Senators by the

margin of 94 to 83. Again Poole led the Byrd-men in the scoring columns, netting 29, followed by Reynolds with 24. The Pioneers returned to their home court to meet Alderson-Broadus on January 10. The White Wave turned in one of their top performances of the season, coming from behind at the half to tie the game in the final seconds and then snatch victory by two points in an overtime period. Poole connected for 29 points in the 97-95 victory. Playing next a non-conference contest with a service team from Camp Lejune, the Pioneers watched victory slip from their fingers in the closing moments. The final showed the Marines on top, 85-84.


On January 16, the Byrd-men again met the high scoring Golden Bears of West Virginia Tech. Tech prevailed with ease and poured in 127 points to Glenville's 80. The Pioneers next dropped their third in a row on January 18 to the West Liberty Hilltoppers. Reynolds meshed 21 as the Hilltoppers took the contest 84 to 68. The White Wave finally returned to winning ways on January 21, topping a Davis Elkins aggregation for the second time of the season. The win came on the Glenville boards with Poole hitting for 20 and Reynolds for 19 in the 96-69 victory. Playing again before a home audience, the Pioneers racked up their second conquest in a row, trouncing Concord by 24 points for a 93-69 victory. Poole led the GSC scorers with 24 points.
