Glenville State College broke ground on Tuesday, July 12, 2011 for the new Pioneer Center. This \$25,000,000. facility will house the college's Land Resources Department, a 9,000 square foot health care facility for the college and community, a 3,000 seat sports arena, and other athletic facilities and offices.

"The groundbreaking for the Pioneer Center is a milestone occasion that expresses our confidence in a bright future for Glenville State College," said GSC President Peter Barr.

When completed, the Pioneer Center's main lobby will be adorned with glass, stone, wooden beams, and a large central skylight. The building, complete with an indoor walking track around the sports arena, will be located just off of Mineral Road in the area currently occupied by the college's tennis courts, Eberle Hall, discs throwing area, and softball field.

Several honored guests were on hand to watch the turning of the soil led by major benefactors Ike and Sue Morris, who kick-started fundraising efforts for this project as part of the Transforming Lives Now!!! Capital Campaign in

2007 with a donation of five million dollars. In speaking of his contribution, Morris said "This has probably been the finest thing I've ever been involved with."

Soon after the Capital Campaign started, other donations rolled in that, in combination with state bonds, have brought over twenty million to the project.


Although unable to attend the ground breaking ceremony, United States Senator Joe Manchin III sent a note that expressed his regards. Upon completion of the Pioneer Center, we will be "improving educational opportunities so our students, communities, and businesses can thrive," said Manchin.



Associated Architects of Charleston and Edward Tucker Architects of Huntington are the partnering architects for the building.

Construction of the building is expected to be completed in phases with the Land Resources classroom section being done for the start of classes in August 2012, the sports arena in time for the 2012-2013 basketball season, and the rest of the building, sometime in the spring of 2013.



Williams and Montrose Award Winners Named

Glenville State College will be honoring two former student athletes during Homecoming festivities on October 22nd.

Rachael Stewart '11, a native of Hurricane, is the 2011 recipient of the Clarissa Williams Award. After graduating from Hurricane High School, Stewart enrolled at GSC where she was a four-year member of the Cross Country and Track and Field teams. She was a member of the 2009 GSC 4x4 relay team that holds the school record. Rachael was chosen as the team's captain in both her junior and senior years. In 2010 she won the WVIAC Senior Scholar Athlete award which is given annually to a student athlete from each conference school. While at GSC, Stewart was a



member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and the Student Government Association. She also was a Queen candidate on the 2010 GSC Homecoming Court. Stewart graduated Cum Laude from GSC in December 2010 with a Bachelor of Arts in Physical Education and Health. She is the daughter of Allen and Susie Stewart of Hurricane and is employed at GSC as an Admissions Counselor.

GSC Cross Country and Track and Field Coach **Cam Perry '01** says Stewart was a cornerstone of the program. "Rachael was an important member of the female recruiting class that laid the foundation to help us recruit outside of the realm of our student body. She was always a reliable athlete and was always involved in community service. One of her major attributes was that she was always smiling and in a good mood and positive about what she had to do."

The Williams Award is given each year during Homecoming to a female graduate of the preceding class who not only was an outstanding athlete but also a scholar, a leader, and a person of high moral character. This award was established in 1983 and is named for Miss Clarissa Williams, an Associate Professor of Physical Education at GSC who began her career at the college in 1947 and served as cheerleader sponsor until her retirement in 1964.

Tommy Mutter '11 is the 2011 recipient of the Frank Montrose Award. Mutter is a native of Lewisburg where he graduated from Greenbrier East High School. After high school he attended GSC where he was a five-year member of the Pioneer football team as a defensive lineman. Tommy was a member of the 2008 Pioneer Football team that won the WVIAC Championship. He was honored as an Outstanding Business Student in 2009-2010. Mutter



received a Bachelor of Arts in Business Administration with concentrations in Marketing and Management from GSC in December 2010. He is the son of Wayne and Brenda Mutter of Lewisburg and is employed by City National Bank as a Personal Banker.

"Tommy Mutter was an excellent student-athlete here at Glenville State College. He was one of our captains as a senior starting on the defensive line. Tommy is one of those guys that makes everyone around him a better person. He also knew exactly how to balance his football, his school work, and his personal life to be successful in all three phases of his life," stated GSC Head Football Coach David Hutchison.

The Frank Montrose Award is given each year during Homecoming to a male graduate of the preceding class who not only was an outstanding athlete but also a scholar, a leader, and a person of high moral character. Established in 1952, this award is named for Frank Montrose who came to Glenville in the fall of 1939 from Richwood High School where he had established himself as a grid great under the guidance of former Pioneer Coach 'Babe' Jones. Shortly before final examinations in the spring of his freshman year, Frank went blind. A month later, on June 21, 1940, the 21 year old Montrose died in a Baltimore hospital, a victim of nephritis.

The 2011 Clarissa Williams and Frank Montrose Awards will be presented to Stewart and Mutter during pre-game festivities of the Pioneer Homecoming game with West Virginia Wesleyan College at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday, October 22nd at Morris Stadium.

Bill Niday Honored as Alumnus of the Year

William A. "Bill" Niday, a Kanawha County native and long time Wood County educator and administrator, was honored as the 2011 Alumnus of the Year at the Glenville State College Alumni Banquet on April 16th. He received his Bachelor of Arts in Education (Major – Mathematics, Minor General Science) from GSC in 1971.

Niday received his masters degree in counseling and guidance from West Virginia College of Graduate Studies in 1974 and in 1984, obtained his Permanent Professional Secondary Administrative Certificate from West Virginia University.

His teaching career began in 1971 at Washington Junior High School in Parkersburg where he was a teacher/coach until 1974.

From 1974-1980, Bill continued at the school but in an administrative role as counselor. Additionally he continued his coaching duties.

Niday went on to serve as assistant principal at Hamilton Junior High School in Parkersburg from 1980-1988, principal at Blennerhassett Junior High School in Parkersburg from 1988-1999, and principal at Parkersburg High School from 1999-2003.

Bill assumed the Wood County Superintendent of Schools position in 2003, a position he held until his retirement in 2010.

His professional honors include being named the 2001 West Virginia Middle Level Educator of the Year, the 2003 West Virginia Secondary Principal of the Year, and the 2009 West Virginia State Superintendent of the Year.

Niday has co-authored two articles, "A Student Recognition and Incentive Program," *NASSP Bulletin*, Vol. 505, No. 72, February 1988 and "A School Where Everyone Gets Involved," *Principal*, Vol. 65, No. 5, May 1987.

His professional affiliations are many and include being a past member of the American Association of School Administrators; a member of the West Virginia Association of School Administrators; past member of the National Association of Secondary School Principals; past member of the West Virginia Association of Secondary School Principals; past president of the West Virginia Association of Secondary School Principals; a past member of the National Middle School Association; past president of the West Virginia Association of Middle Level Educators; past president of the Wood County Principals' Association; and past member of the Board of Directors for the West Virginia Secondary Schools Activities Commission.

Bill is married to Susan Daugherty and resides in Parkersburg. His family includes his son, Patrick Niday, daughter-in-law Danielle, granddaughter Caroline Niday, and step-daughter Jessica Linville and her husband Mitch.

He is a member of the YMCA Board of Directors, the Chamber of Commerce Education Business Foundation, the Salvation Army Board of Directors, the Volunteer Action Committee Board of Directors, and the First Presbyterian Church Session.

Niday said he was both surprised and honored to have been chosen as Alumnus of the Year out of so many graduates from his alma mater. "It is an honor I will always cherish," he said.

Alumni Achievement award(s) were presented that evening to **Jody Hopkins '88** and **James Oppe, II '82**. **Carla Overfield Cosner '89** received the Community Service award; **Deanna Brown Stewart '81**, the Outstanding Teacher award (public schools); **John Hoover '66**, the Alumni Chapter award; and **Dr. G. Former Glenville State College Head Football Coach and 2003 Curtis Elam Hall of Fame inductee Rich Rodriguez was the Guest of Honor at GSC Football's Alumni Golf Outing Fundraiser on May 20, 2011. "Coach Rod", along with coaches and players who were part of the amazing Rodriguez era at GSC, were invited to participate in the event as were alumni, fans, and friends of GSC Football.

As the head coach at GSC, Coach Rodriguez led the Pioneers to WVIAC Championships in 1993, 1994, 1995, 1996, and 1997. GSC advanced to the national playoffs in 1993 and 1994 and was the 1993 NAIA Runner-up. Rodriguez coached at GSC from 1990 to 1997 and is regarded nationally as one of the innovators of the Spread Offense.

The turnout for the event was one of the biggest fundraisers that Glenville State College has ever had. This helped the GSC Pioneer Football team raise a significant amount of money for the football program.

In speaking at the event, Coach Rodriguez stated "It's a real honor for me to come back and see everyone, I had some great years here in Glenville and I am very happy to see Glenville State College thriving." He went on to say "I would just like to thank the community of Glenville, Coach Hutchison, and Ike and **Sue '66 Morris** for making this wonderful event happen."

The Pioneer community was very excited to have the former coach return to Glenville.

Glenville State College inducted five alumni into the Curtis Elam Athletic Hall of Fame on May 21st at its annual Hall of Fame Banquet and Induction Ceremony. The Class of 2011 inductees were: **Keith Smith '64**, **Harold Erwin '65**, **Donna J. Newberry '73**, **Charles "Chup" Robinson '01**, and **Tracy Wyatt Raban '05**.

Keith Smith, a native of New Martinsville graduated from Glenville State College in 1964 with a Bachelor of Arts in Education. He was presented for his induction by long-time friend and former classmate, **Dr. Carl Nichols '64**.

While at GSC, Keith was a four year letterman in football as a defensive end, punter, and place kicker. He led his team in scoring with 29 points in 1961. In 1962, Smith was the Sixteenth Ranked Small College Punter in the Nation. He was named Second Team WVIAC All-Conference in 1961 and First Team WVIAC All Conference in 1962. He was also selected to the Second Team Little All American Academic Football Team in 1961. After completing his eligibility, Smith served as a student assistant football coach for the Pioneers in 1963. In addition to football, he also played tennis at GSC and served as Vice President of the GSC Student Council.

After graduating from GSC, Smith taught at Wheeling Central High School where he coached football, wrestling, and tennis. He led the high school's tennis team to the State Catholic School Championship. He also played two years of Semi-Professional Football for the Wheeling Ironmen.

After his stint in Wheeling, Smith went back to school. He holds a masters degree in counseling from the University of Toledo and a doctorate from Ohio State University.

He served as Director of the Division of Special Education and Student Support Service at the West Virginia State Department of Education and later as the Assistant State Superintendent for Instruction. After his work at the State Department, Smith was involved in writing two National Science Foundation Grants for improving math and science in rural places in the Appalachia Education Region. He has worked with the Appalachia Rural Systemic Initiative which covers six states, including West Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, Virginia, southeast Ohio, and western North Carolina. Since 2001, he has worked with the Appalachian Coal Field Rural Systemic Initiative in southern West Virginia and southwest Virginia.

Smith coached competitive club soccer for ten years in Kanawha County and was named the West Virginia Boy's Soccer Coach of the Year in 1988. The West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference named Smith to the WVIAC 50th Anniversary All Conference Team.

Keith is married to **Mary Jo Nocida Smith '64**, who was homecoming queen and also a cheerleader while at GSC. They are parents of two children, Julie Potter of Reisterstown, MD and Michael Smith of Knoxville, TN and have one grand-son, Brett Potter.

While at GSC, Erwin lettered in football during all four years of his playing career. He was named All WVIAC First Team as an offensive guard in both 1963 and 1964. Harold was also named All WVIAC Second Team linebacker in 1964 and received Honorable Mention NAIA

All American. Erwin was co-captain of the 1964 Pioneer Football team. Additionally, he was named to the WVIAC 50th Anniversary All Conference Team.

Upon graduating from Glenville State College in 1965, Erwin served on GSC's staff as an instructor and as an assistant football and baseball coach during the 1965-1966 season.

Harold holds a masters degree in physical education and a masters plus 45 in guidance, counseling, and physical education, both from Marshall University.

Early in his teaching and coaching career, he taught and served as the assistant football and track coach at Robert E. Lee High School in Staunton, VA. Erwin then taught at Buffalo High School for 31 years and served as the school's head football coach from 1972-76. He was also head track coach from 1972-79 and again from 1984-2001. Additionally, he was the school's head golf coach for seven years. Erwin was Buffalo High School's Athletic Director from 1972-2001.

He is very active with the West Virginia Athletic Directors Association and the West Virginia Secondary Schools Activities Commission. Erwin has served on the Board of Directors of the National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association and the National Federation of High Schools.

Harold and his wife Linda have two daughters: LouAnn Godbey and husband Bill in Hurricane and Meredith Calhoun and her husband Doug of Olive Hill, KY. They have two grandchildren, ages two and seven.

Donna J. Newberry, a Parkersburg native, was inducted posthumously into the Glenville State College



Curtis Elam Athletic Hall of Fame. She graduated from GSC in 1973 with a Bachelor of Arts in Education. Donna was a member of the GSC Women's Basketball and Volleyball teams when ladies competitive sports were just getting started. She was presented for induction by her former coach and GSC Faculty Emerita Kay Chico. "Donna played with great focus and gusto. She put her whole self into whatever she was doing. She was as good a human being as she was a student athlete," said Chico.

Newberry received a masters degree from Ohio University and went on to become a legendary softball and basketball coach at Muskingum University where she coached softball for 36 years.

During her tenure at Muskingum, she served as an instructor and coached multiple sports including volleyball, women's basketball, softball, and field hockey but softball was her passion. She was also women's athletic director for a while and more recently, served as assistant athletic director. In 2001, she led the Muskies to their first ever Division III National Championship in softball. Her teams went 906-419-1 and she won 18 Ohio Conference championships. Newberry also had a record of 403-216 as Muskingum's women's basketball coach, becoming the only Division III coach to win more than 400 games in more than one sport. In basketball during her tenure as coach, the Muskies won three Ohio Athletic Conference championships and were National Runner-up in 1991.

Newberry held numerous state and national athletic affiliations and offices and was the All-Time Career Wins Leader in NCAA Division III. She was inducted into the National Fastpitch Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2008.

Donna spent the summer of 2010 writing the story of her illustrious coaching career. Her book, *You Must Play to Win: A Coach's Journey from the Pit to the Pinnacle*, was released in December 2010. Newberry passed away on November 10, 2010 after an extended battle with cancer. She was preceded in death by her father, Earl Newberry. Survivors include her mother, Juanita Newberry of Parkersburg; brother Rev. David Newberry of Washington; and three sisters, Diane Wooten of Cambridge, MD, Debbie Jarvis of Oak Hill, and Dale Ann Dye of Coolville, OH.

Charles 'Chup' Robinson '01, a native of New Martinsville has been posthumously inducted into the Glenville State College Curtis Elam Athletic Hall of Fame.



"Chup loved Glenville, and especially Coach **Steve Harold '87** and his wife **Renee '93**. He would want to be remembered for his work to help young athletes succeed," said his mother Karen McGinnis Robinson.

After a standout career at Magnolia High School, Robinson enrolled at GSC in 1990 where he competed in track and field, and also in cross country. During his stellar career he was a two-time WVIAC and NAIA District 28 Champion in the 100 Meter Dash (1993 and 1994), a three-time WVIAC and NAIA District 28 Champion in the 200 Meter Dash (1992, 1993, and 1994), a four-time WVIAC and NAIA District 28 Champion in the 4 x 400 Meter Relay (1991, 1992, 1993, and 1994), and a three-time WVIAC and NAIA District 28 Meet High Point Individual in 1992, 1993, and 1994.

Robinson helped lead Glenville State College to consecutive WVIAC Track and Field titles in 1992 and 1993. As a sophomore in 1992, he scored in seven different events in the conference championship meet to earn WVIAC Track Athlete of the Year honors, an award he repeated in both 1993 and 1994. Robinson's 200 meter GSC record is now tied; however he still holds the school's 100 meter record.

Following his competitive career at Glenville, Robinson served for five years as an assistant volleyball coach and as an assistant track coach for the Pioneers.

Steve Harold '87, Robinson's former GSC Track Coach, presented him for induction in the Hall of Fame. "Chup"

loved life, loved Glenville State College, and was one of the most popular student athletes to ever attend GSC. He was a very hard working and dedicated athlete and one of the greatest competitors that I have ever coached. He was a winner in everything he did," said Harold.

Tragically, his young life was cut short in December 2000 when he died in an automobile accident. He is survived by his parents, Charles G. and Karen McGinnis Robinson; his maternal grandmother, Martha McGinnis of Sistersville; two sisters, Kelli Stackpole and her husband Kenny of New Martinsville and Andrea Fuchs and her husband Scott of Westerville, OH; also two nephews, Austin and Andrew Stackpole of New Martinsville. Chup was preceded in death by his paternal grandparents, Joseph and Geraldine Robinson; and his maternal grandfather, John McGinnis.

The Chup Robinson Shelter at New Martinsville's Magnolia High School Track is named in his honor. Additionally GSC's Pioneer High School Track and Field Classic was renamed in his honor (April 2008).

Tracy Wyatt Raban of Kegley, WV, graduated Magna Cum Laude from GSC in 2005 with a Bachelor of Arts in Education. While at GSC, Tracy excelled in women's basketball and took the program to a whole new level.

"Glenville State College was blessed and very lucky to have Tracy choose to play for the Lady Pioneers. She made all of her teammates better players and she made me look awfully smart. She was an extension of me on the floor. She was like having a coach playing. Tracy was a great leader, had tremendous self discipline, and was a true role model. I don't know how anyone could deserve this honor more," said **Steve Harold '87**, former GSC Lady Pioneer

Basketball Coach, who presented Raban for induction.

Tracy was a three-time First Team All WVIAC Performer in 2002, 2003, and 2004; a two-time WVIAC Player of the Year in 2002 and 2004; a three-time WVIAC All Tournament Team member in 2002, 2003, and 2004; a two-time WVIAC Most Valuable Player in 2002 and 2003; a three-time East Region All Tournament Team member in 2002, 2003, and 2004; East Region Most Outstanding Player in 2002; three-time Daktronics All East Region in 2002, 2003, and 2004; Kodak First Team All East Region in 2002, 2003, and 2004; and a three-time NCAA All-American. Additionally, she was a member of the Elite Eight All Tournament Team in 2002 when she set the National Elite Eight Tournament Record in Free Throws making sixteen for sixteen. Tracy was a two-time Honorable Mention NCAA All American and an NCAA All American in 2002. She contributed to 21 of the 64 consecutive home victories in women's basketball at GSC (the 3rd longest streak in NCAA II history). She is currently 4th on GSC's All Time Scoring List, is GSC's All Time Assists Leader, GSC's All Time Steals Leader, and 7th on GSC's All Time Field Goal's List. Tracy received the 2002 and 2003 Neal Baisi Award given to the top native West Virginia female basketball player.

Raban was named the Clarissa Williams Award Winner in 2005 which is given to the top female athlete who graduated the previous year from GSC. In 2007 she was named to the WVIAC "25 at 25" Anniversary Team for Women's Basketball. She was the only unanimous selection to the team.

Tracy is employed by Tazewell County Public Schools where she currently teaches physical education at Graham Middle School in Bluefield, VA. Additionally she is Graham Middle School's Volleyball Coach and Graham High School's Girls Basketball Head Coach. Her record at the high school is 84-43 with two state tournament appearances.

Tracy and her husband, **Dana Raban '07**, live in Kegley, WV with their daughter Peyton Alexis Raban, who was born in November 2009. She is the daughter of Robert and Pam Wyatt, also of Kegley.

Plaques of each member of the Curtis Elam Athletic Hall of Fame are displayed in the lobby of the GSC Physical Education Building. The Curtis Elam Athletic Hall of Fame was established in May of 2001 through the generosity of Curtis Elam, a 1949 graduate of Glenville State College. The program was one wonderful report after another of updates at Glenville State College and snapshots of what the student body would find upon their return to campus from summer vacation.



GSC Experiences Earthquake

Glennville State College students, faculty, and staff were among the many who felt the tremors of the east coast earthquake that occurred on Tuesday, August 23rd. The epicenter was in Virginia and measured at 5.8 on the Richter scale. Effects of the earthquake could be felt between Canada and Georgia.

“It felt like my walls were bending and everything in my office started to shake. I have never experienced anything like it before,” said GSC Admissions Counselor **Adrian Duellley '08**, whose office is located in the Goodwin Hall residence building.

“I was sitting in my chair and it began to move uncontrollably. An earthquake was the last thing I would have guessed was happening,” said Senior Management Major Melissa Pursley of Parkersburg. Pursley was working in the Harry B. Heflin Administration Building at the time of the earthquake.

“I saw the concrete walls move like they were made of water and the floors were shaking everywhere,” said GSC Instructional Technology Manager and Database Administrator **Annaliza Lane Marks '04**, whose office is located in Louis Bennett Hall.

“I felt the building move and put my feet on the floor and hands on the desk. I felt an indefinite shake and then it stopped. After class, the campus and internet were buzzing about an earthquake on the east coast,” said Freshman Marketing Major Charlie Dodrill of St. Albans. Dodrill was in a Clark Hall classroom at the time.

No damages resulted from the tremors felt on the GSC campus. According to several news reports, this was the most powerful earthquake to hit the east coast in 67 years.

Hidden Promise Summer Camps

Glennville State College hosted a five week run of summer camps for Hidden Promise Scholars this past summer. This was the fourth consecutive summer for these camps.

The Hidden Promise Consortium is a program for eighth through twelfth grade students that helps prepare them for higher education. Students are recommended to become Hidden Promise Scholars by their principals, counselors, and/or county school superintendents. Twenty West Virginia counties and Belpre City Schools in Washington County OH make up the Hidden Promise Consortium with more counties expressing interest in joining the consortium.

Each summer camp taught things specific to the age group . The students were exposed to a variety of activities including Math and Language Arts tutoring, ACT prep, Career Exploration workshops, a Skype session with NASA astronauts, Leadership and Team Building activities, Financial Aid Counseling, and sports.

GSC Receives Top 10% Rating in National Survey

The 2011 National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE) results are in, and Glenville State College was highly ranked in several categories.

Glenville State College seniors rated the college in the top 10% of the 751 participating institutions for providing a “Supportive Campus Environment”. Glenville seniors rated the college highly in terms of the support they received in the areas of academic success, non-academic responsibilities, social activities, and the quality of relationships with other students, faculty, and staff.

Both first-year students and seniors rated Glenville State College in the top 50% in student-faculty interaction. This reflects how students feel about their interaction with their professors in and out of the classroom including academic pursuits, career plans, and student life issues.

In the “Enriching Educational Experience” category, our students ranked the college above peer institutions for providing complementary learning experiences, diversity experiences, use of technology to enhance collaboration between peers and instructors, and opportunities for curricular activities and community service.

Glenville State College also was rated above peer institutions in the category of “Active and Collaborative Learning”. The results show that GSC students learn with others to address academic and social issues that they may encounter in and out of the classroom and during and after their college experience.

In other NSSE results, 79% of first-year students felt that Glenville State College placed substantial emphasis on academics, 87% of first-year students reported a favorable image of Glenville State, and 89% of seniors said they would choose Glenville State College again if they could start their college career over.

Overall, Glenville State College received high marks across the board from first year and senior students when asked about the nature and quality of their experiences at GSC.

“NSSE confirms what Glenville students have long known, that the faculty and staff of Glenville State are committed to the success of GSC students and are willing to give freely of their time and talent in accordance with the college’s motto of ‘Where You Belong’,” said Glenville State College Provost Dr. John M. Peek.

The National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE) was conducted by Indiana University. The student survey annually collects information at hundreds of four-year colleges and universities about student participation in programs and activities that institutions provide for their learning and personal development. The results provide an estimate of how undergraduates spend their time and what they gain from attending college. The results also reflect behaviors by students and institutions that are associated with desired outcomes of college and point to areas where colleges and universities are performing well and aspects of the undergraduate experience that could be improved.



Nearly all of the facility's old cardio equipment was removed and replaced with five treadmills, five elliptical trainers, two recumbent bikes, two spinner bikes, three new strength machines, kettlebells, and a decline bench.

"Our hope is that the new and improved GSC Fitness Center will allow everyone to strengthen their bodies and minds as well as be a stress relieving and relaxing outlet. It has and always will be our endeavor to provide an atmosphere of learning and to promote healthy choices to achieve a balanced and successful lifestyle," said Dean of Student Affairs **Jerry Burkhammer '87**.

"The wellness and fitness needs of the campus and community are very important and we will continue to

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
