## Glenville State College Preservice Teachers Participate in YMHFA Training

Preservice teachers within the Department of Education at Glenville State College recently participated in Youth Mental Health First Aid training. The day-long course is designed to teach parents, family members, caregivers, teachers, school staff, peers, neighbors, and health and human services workers how to help adolescents (ages 12-18) who are experiencing challenges with mental health or addiction.

Topics addressed within the training include an overview of common mental health challenges for youth, a review of typical adolescent development, and teaches a 5-step action plan for how to help young people in both crisis and noncrisis situations. Topics covered include anxiety, depression, substance abuse, disorders in which psychosis may occur, disruptive behavior disorders (including AD/HD), and eating disorders.

While a student at Glenville State, Eric was involved with the Blacks United Together Student Organization and was a member of the Pioneer Basketball Team.

It was the experience of a lifetime to have met and played with my teammates from other cities and states. I was the first of my family to be able to graduate from college. The experience and memories of GSC will be with me always. Being a part of the African American community at GSC will forever be a part of me. Now, I am one of those Pioneers of GSC."

Eric currently resides in Clinton, Maryland with his wife Brenda.

### Glenville State College SSS Program Continuing to Assist Students

Glenville State College is among six other higher education institutions in West Virginia that, combined, have received over \$2.3 million from the U.S. Department of Education to support TRIO's Support Services Program.

The funding is made available through the Department of Education's competitive Student Support Services (SSS) Program. U.S. Senators Shelley Moore Capito (R-W.Va.) and Joe Manchin (D-W.Va.) announced the continued last month.

"This grant means that our SSS program at Glenville State College has five more years of service to low income, first generation, and/or handicapped individuals. It means a quiet refuge, full of fun, help, and understanding where our students say it feels like family and a real place to belong," said GSC SSS Project Director Jerry Burkhammer '88.

Student Support Services provides opportunities to assist students with basic college requirements, for academic development, and to motivate students toward the successful completion of their postsecondary education. The goal of SSS is to increase the college retention and graduation rates of its participants.

In their office, which is located in the Health and Physical Education Building on campus, Glenville State's Student Support Services program offers their members access to mentoring and tutoring, priority class registration, a state-of-the-art computer lab, virtual reality tools, a Glowforge Pro laser printer/engraver, textbook loans, free printing, FAFSA assistance, and more. SSS staff members also plan educational and cultural workshops for students.

Dr. Mari Clements has joined the staff at Glenville State College as the Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs.

Clements comes to Glenville State after most recently serving as Provost at Fuller Theological Seminary in Pasadena, California. Before her academic career, she was a girl from Bowmantown, Tennessee, a small town outside the TriCities. "I grew up in the foothills of the Appalachians, so I feel right at home here in Glenville," she said.

Trained as a Clinical Psychologist, Clements has also previously served as a faculty member, department chair, and academic dean. She holds a Ph.D. in psychology from the University of Denver.

A problem-solver by nature, she says that skill is one of the things she hopes to bring to her new role at GSC. "That isn't focus on problems, but I know that all institutions have challenges and we want to see how to take on those challenges and create opportunities to advance Glenville State," Clements said.
