

## AA Pathway - Associate's Degree Program

Students who wish to earn an Associate's Degree in General Studies by the time they graduate high school will need to begin taking courses in the fall of their junior year of high school. Students will take either Dual Enrollment courses face-to-face at their high school or enroll in Dual Enrollment Online Courses.

Students will take <u>15</u> credit hours each semester, totaling <u>60</u> credit hours to complete the program. If a student wishes to take a lightened load of credit hours one or each semester there will be summer course options available.

As a requirement for an Associate's Degree, students will need to choose an area of interest as it will take up 12 credit hours out of the 60 required.

They are as follows: <u>Business, Criminal Justice, Education, Fine Arts, Health Sciences, Land Resources, Language and Literature, Science and Math, or Social Science.</u>

EDGE Credits; AP Credits; and Transfer Credits can be accepted for Program Completion.

Each semester students who have enrolled in the GSU Dual Enrollment AA Pathway (Associates of Arts) Program will be advised by the Director of Dual Enrollment/Dual Credit - Rachel Clutter.
