# Pressley Ridge Honors Two Alumni as Employees of the Year



Glenville State graduates Aimee Asbury '20 and Allen Gregory '14 were among the 23 employees of Pressley Ridge and Texas Family Care Network staff who were honored as 2024 Employees of the Year at a reception held last month at The Renaissance Hotel Pittsburgh.

Following her graduation from Glenville State, Asbury went on to receive a masters in counseling from Marshall University. Since graduation, she has been a therapist and clinical liaison in the Pressley Ridge residential program. She has been a therapist for almost three years and works with youth and their families. Asbury facilitates individual, group, and family therapy focusing on building skills that help youth reach success in the home, at school, and in community settings. She is also working toward licensure to become an LPC. Asbury says that she owes a lot

of her knowledge to the education she received at Glenville State.

Gregory also works with youth and families to help them build their relationships and to improve their home life. He mostly works to teach coping skills or life skills to the youth to help them manage their emotions and to help prevent them from going into residential placement.

Pressley Ridge works to empower families, youth, and individuals with hope, healing, and happiness. Their aim is to help give others the right tools, skills, and support to thrive. Pressley Ridge integrates a trauma-informed perspective into their services, providing the foundation for a basic understanding of the psychological, neurological, biological, and social impact that trauma has on individuals.

### Music Across the Miles: From W.Va. to Wisc., Alumni Bring Two Schools Together

Two schools, 637.5 miles apart. One rural, one inner city. One a public school, the other a public charter school. One with a majority of white students, the other primarily made up of Hispanic students.

Students and teachers from these two schools, Bridgeport High School in West Virginia and Carmen Southeast High School in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, have been collaborating for what their instructors - Dr.

Jeremiah Smallridge '07 and Seth Gillis '15 - are calling a musical cultural exchange.

"This exchange focuses on Appalachian and Hispanic music, examining not only the roots of each, but their common themes and elements as well," Smallridge said. Last month, the students met for the first time at Carmen Southeast, starting their day with ice breaker games before performing for one another and rehearsing together. Next, they visited an art museum and had lunch before returning to Carmen for rehearsals and dinner. The day culminated with a joint concert.

This month, the students from Wisconsin will visit West Virginia. The next concert will be at Bridgeport High School on Friday, May 16 at 7:00 PM. While in West Virginia, the Carmen students will do some sightseeing and will play at the WV State Strawberry Festival.

## Graduate Continues Work with Mountaineer Baseball Program

Justin Oney '17 joined the coaching staff for the West Virginia University baseball team as their Director of Player Development in the summer of 2022. He is currently serving as an Assistant Coach/Pitching Coach. Oney assists the team with daily activities, implementation of technology and data, and camp functions.

He arrived in Morgantown following a four-year stint as the pitching coach at Eastern Oklahoma State College. While at the junior college, he was part of a staff that compiled a record of 142-39 in the four seasons, all while helping 55 Student Financial Aid Advisory Board for three years, was a member of the NASFAA Peer Review Team, and was a conference presenter and moderator.

GSU's current Financial Aid Director, Stephany (Harper) Amos '13, nominated Lay for the honor. "It was my honor to nominate Karen for Lifetime Membership into WVASFAA. Personally, without her dedication to Glenville and financial aid, her guidance and knowledge, her confidence in me, and her push for me to achieve more, I would definitely not be in the position I am in today. I cannot thank Karen enough for providing me an opportunity to make a difference in our students' lives and to instill my commitment into my staff members to be able to do the same," Amos said.

Several current members of Glenville State's Financial Aid Office, including Amos, Amanda (Roberts) Lamb '10, Sheri (Connell) Goff '04, and Lora (Gordon) Stump '13, were on hand at the conference to help congratulate Lay on the recognition. players move onto a four-year school - 21 of which were at the Division I level. Eastern Oklahoma State won two NJCAA Region II Tournament Championships as well as two Regular Season Championships, both coming in 2021 and 2022.

Prior to Eastern Oklahoma, Oney served as the Graduate Assistant for Oklahoma Wesleyan where he primarily assisted with the pitching staff. He is a native of Logan, West Virginia.

# **Professor Emeritus Serves as Adjudicator at Southeastern Theatre Conference**

Glenville State Professor Emeritus Dennis Wemm recently attended the Southeastern Theatre Conference in Baltimore, Maryland to serve as one of three people adjudicating eight shows at the Community Theatre Festival.

Community theatres bring a short play to the conference as a part of the competitive festival, and the adjudicator panel gives feedback to each group, a process that Wemm describes as being like *Chopped* without the eliminations.

"It's a busy two days in the regionals, and the two winners go on to the national American Association of Community Theatres festival in Des Moines, Iowa," Wemm said. He added that West Virginia was represented by two theatres when most states sent only one or none.


Professor Wemm is a past president of SETC and received their prestigious Suzanne M. Davis Award in 2010. The award recognizes extraordinary service by an SETC member over a number of years. It is not given out annually, rather only when an SETC member has earned such recognition. He served in Glenville State's Department of Language and Literature for 34 years until his retirement in 2020.
