

## **Pioneer Football Schedule to Include Five Special Games**

The Glenville State Football program will be doing a lot of traveling for their fall 2025 campaign. In addition to the six away games that are part of schedule, the Pioneers will also be on the road for the other five games due to construction taking place at Morris Stadium. All five football games that would have been played at home during the 2025 season will now be played at alternate sites in various communities around the area.

When asked what Glenville State means to him, AJ said, "Glenville State College is a place that will always hold fond memories of friendship and an exemplary education. The professors treated me like family and helped develop the beginnings of my career path. The memories of people and good times will always mean the world to me and facilitated the person I am today."

We are pleased to feature AJ in this month's Alumni Spotlight and are proud to call him an alumnus. The Pioneers will open the season at Herbert Hoover High School in Elkview, West Virginia against Emory & Henry University on Saturday, August 30 before traveling to Lock Haven (Saturday, September 6) and Millersville (Saturday, September 13) in consecutive weeks.

After a bye week, Glenville State opens the conference slate at Roane County High School in Spencer, West Virginia on Saturday, September 27 against back-to-back MEC Champions, the University of Charleston. The Golden Eagles went (11-1, 9-0 MEC) in 2024, having their season ended by Ashland on a game-winning field goal in the first round of the NCAA DII Playoffs. Mike Tesch was promoted to head coach after former UC head coach Quinn Sanders left to take the Offensive Coordinator position at Northern Illinois.

GSU will defend the Battle for the Bit trophy against Fairmont State the following week at Robert C. Byrd High School in Clarksburg, West Virginia on Saturday, October 4. The Falcons finished the 2024 campaign (7-4, 6-3 MEC), winning five of their last six. The following week, the Pioneers are scheduled for a matchup with Frostburg State on Saturday, October 11. The Frostburg Bobcats had an unusual 2024 season, going (6-5, 4-5 MEC) after winning their first six games of the year and losing their remaining five games.

On Saturday, October 18, the blue and white will meet Concord University for a matchup at Nicholas County High School in Summersville, West Virginia. GSU has beaten Concord eight of the last nine times. CU had a rough 2024, finishing (1-10, 1-8 MEC) and eventually leading to new leadership in Athens with Cody Edwards taking over. October 18 has been designated as the homecoming game for Glenville State.

The Pioneers will head to West Liberty on Saturday, October 25 and West Virginia State on Saturday, November 1. The Pioneers beat both squads at home last year but fell on the road to them in 2023.

Senior Day will be Saturday, November 8 against Wheeling University where the two teams will meet at Parkersburg South High School in Parkersburg, West Virginia. This will be the sixth overall meeting since Wheeling started their program in 2019. GSU has won the last two matchups and will look to do the same in 2025. The regular season will come to an end at West Virginia Wesleyan with the two teams scheduled to meet on Saturday, November 15. The Pioneers have dominated this matchup, winning eight of the last nine, including the last six.

Glenville State is coming off of a (7-4, 7-2 MEC) 2024 season, finishing second in the Mountain East Conference, the highest finish in program history since the formation of the league in 2013.

The Morris Family Health and Fitness Complex, which will be the new home for Pioneer football, women's soccer, and track and field, is slated to be complete by the summer of 2026.

#### Gazal Named 2025 Faculty Award of Excellence Recipient

Glenville State University Professor of Forestry Dr. Rico Gazal has been named the 2025 Faculty Award of Excellence recipient. Gazal was recognized at the spring 2025 Commencement Ceremony on Saturday, May 10.

"Being selected for the Faculty Award of Excellence is incredibly humbling. It means a great deal because it reflects not just my work, but the trust and support of my colleagues and students," Gazal said. "I've always believed that teaching is more than delivering lectures—it's about mentorship, connection, and helping students discover what they're capable of."

Gazal earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Forestry from the University of the Philippines Los Baños, and then completed graduate studies in Japan and at Mississippi State University. He came to Glenville State in 2005 and teaches courses in natural resource management, environmental science, and forestry.

"My journey has taken me across the globe, but West Virginia has become home. My wife and I are raising our daughter here, and she's now starting her own college journey at the University of Southern California," Gazal added.

Outside of his classroom obligations, Gazal serves as the Academic Coordinator for the Global WV Consortium and coordinates study-abroad opportunities and Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL) projects. Gazal says that he is passionate about giving students the chance to see the world through education. "Through our international partnerships and virtual exchange programs, they're able to explore science, the environment, and different cultures in ways they might never have imagined. I'm proud to be part of Glenville State University that supports both tradition and innovation," he said.

He has also served a stint as Chair of the Department of Land Resources, has helped secure grants for his department, and has been a member of campus committees related to curriculum, academic

appeals, international education, and student research.

"I love the sense of community here. Glenville State feels like family. I get to know my students not just in the classroom, but through fieldwork and travel. Seeing them grow in confidence and find their path is one of the most rewarding parts of teaching," Gazal said.

Each spring, the campus community is invited to nominate an outstanding faculty member for this award. Faculty Award of Excellence recipients must be full-time and have taught at Glenville State for at least two years to be eligible. Names of the honorees are displayed on a permanent plaque in the Heflin Administration Building.
