- ii. She informed the assembly that the Social Science department plans on building a master's program for psychology students. The newest development is that it will be a Masters in Clinical Psychology, which is not for the benefit of the students. - iii. She informed the assembly that she spoke with Dr. Ensor, who brought up the Clery Act. The Clery Act requires colleges and universities to report campus crime data. GSU's information can be found on the Glenville website, but the data is inaccurate. Glenville State can be fined for the issue, and SGA needs to find a way to fix it.
