Student body of Glenville State college, let us all rally around the Pioneers as they make their last stand of the season at the West Virginia Inter-collegiate tournament at Buckhannon.

Through a series of pre-tourney pep meetings with strong student attendance we may be able to polish up a cheering section, often times sluggish in enthusiasm, and give this White Wave team a mental attitude conducive to spirited competition.

Then, we must give this underdog basketball aggregation, so the money boys say, our full backing at the tournament and collectively yell like hell. Indications are that as soon as drawings are announced, college officials will excuse students who wish to attend sessions in which the Pioneers will play.

Delving into this problem somewhat deeper, we can easily note a certain antipathy or indifference on our campus toward belonging to the group. Why is there this feeling of not belonging to?

Hardman, Tarasuk, Lilly Spark Pioneers' Twin Conference Victories

For the second night in succession the Glenville Pioneers eliminated a team from the inter-collegiate title race, their second victims being Alderson-Broaddus Battlers. The White Wave took an early lead and although they were outscored in the final two periods hung on to win 56 to 52 in their Friday contest.

Two times during the third period the Pioneers held a 14 point margin but the effects of the Davis and Elkins game began to show as Broaddus closed the gap in the final minutes of play. This marks the first time the Pioneers have defeated the Battlers since the war. Earlier in the season A-B downed Glenville 72-56.

With only two minutes remaining in the contest the Battlers moved to within one point of the White Wave at 51-50 but two free throws by Bob Hardman put the game on ice for Glenville. Fred Pennington added another free throw for the Pioneers and Paul Tarasuk came through with the final two-pointer. Wave Meets Falcons Tonight

Tonight the Wave will have its third opportunity to knock an opponent out of the conference lead when it meets Fairmont's Falcons on the Glenville court.

Freshman Paul Tarasuk topped the scoring with 21 points and Bob Hardman claimed second honors with 16. Jesse Lilly remained the spark of the White Wave with his brilliant passing the floor game that constantly kept them in the contest.

TEACHER GROUPS MERGE TO RAISE, EXPAND SERVICE

Hager Chosen to Head Department of National Education Association

In what was acclaimed today as a mile-stone in the history of American education, the three leading national teacher organizations began functioning as a single, unified organization to be known as the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education.

Among the 260 colleges and universities affected by the merger is Glenville State college, which is represented in the new association by Pres. Harry B. Heflin.

Officials estimated that 75 percent of all teachers entering the profession will be prepared by colleges in the new association which will expand services formerly carried on by the American Association of Teachers Colleges, the National Association of Colleges and Departments of Education, and the National Association of Teacher Education Institutions in Metropolitan Districts.

The new organization, which will operate as a department of the National Education Association, will be headed by Dr. Walter E. Hager, president of Wilson Teachers College, Washington, D. C. The newly elected vice president of the united

Choral Group Will Sing Spirituals, Chants, Motets

Clarksburg symphonic choir, under direction of C. C. Arms, will sing a varied program consisting of chants, spirituals, motets, and dances, in the college auditorium on Monday, March 8, at 8:15 p. m. under the sponsorship of Glenville Woman's club.

Included in the program will be a "Song Cycle for a Cappella Choir," by a West Virginia composer, E. W. James, which is made up of three songs.

In a setting depicting the scenes of the fifteenth century, complete with costumes of that period, the English singers will present madrigals by Morley, Purcell and Weelkes in as nearly the same informal style as the people of that era.

Featured in combination with the Clarksburg symphonic choir and the English madrigal singers will be Mrs. George Popp, pianist, performing the works of Debussy, Chopin and Grieg. Mrs. Popp was a student under David Lieber, Cleveland, Ohio, before coming to Clarksburg.

Arms, founder and director of both the symphonic choir and the English madrigal singers, is a native of Boston and a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music. Organized in the fall of 1939, the choir gave its first concert Jan. 29, 1940, and gained recognition within the next three years as one of the country's finest A Cappella organizations.

PIONEERS CLOSE SEASON TONIGHT FACING FALCONS

White Wave Out to Even Score With Conference Leading Fairmont Five

Tonight at 8 o'clock in the college gymnasium the Glenville State Pioneers will play their last opponent in regular season games when they tangle with the conference leading Fairmont Falcons.

Last Tuesday night the Falcons moved into the number one spot when they took a 55 to 40 contest from Davis and Elkins after the Senators had run up a victory string in 12 straight games.

The Blue and White will be out to avenge a 66-42 thumping meted out by the Falcons early in January at Fairmont.

Fairmont boasts a record of nine wins and three losses for a .750 percentage, while Alderson-Broadus and Fotomac State share second with nine and four for .692. The loss dropped the Senators into third place with 12 and six for .567.

Lilly Plays Last Home Game
Captain Jesse Lilly will be playing his final game in a White Wave uniform in regular season play. Lilly is the only senior on Coach Caris Ratliff's entire squad and is the leading scorer with a total of 320 points for the first 20 contests.

Only the tournament games at Buckhannon, to be played March 8-10, remain for the White Wave this season.

Probable starters for tonight's game are: Jesse Lilly and Bob Hardman at forwards, Glennard Vannoy at center, Paul Tarasuk and Bill Wilfong at the guard positions.

Others likely to see action in the Falcon scrap are: Fred Pennington, Bob Conley, Tex Gainer, Rolla Burke, Jack Lilly and George Voloshin.
