Hager Chosen to Head Department of National Education Association

Education Association In what was acclaimed today as a mile-stone in the history of Am-erican education, the three leading national teacher organizations be-gan functioning as a single, unified organization to be known as the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education. Among the 260 colleges and uni-versities affected by the merger is Glenville State college, which is re-presented in the new association by Pres. Harry B. Heflin. Officials estimated that 75 per-cent of all teachers entering the profession will be prepared by col-leges in the new association which will expand services formerly car-tional Association of Colleges and Departments of Education, and the National Association of Teacher Education Institutions in Metropo-litan Districts.

Representing Glenville State college as a member of this Representing Glenville State college as a member of this nationwide organization which has as its purpose that of raising standards of the teaching profession is Pres. Harry B. Heflin who was present at the meeting of the National Education association last week in 'Atlantic City. This merger brings together for the common purpose of improving teacher training institutions the American as-sociation of Teachers Colleges, the National association of Teacher Education Institutions and the National association of Colleges and Departments of Education. Membership in the newly formed organization is com-

or Colleges and Departments of Education. Membership in the newly formed organization is com-prised of 260 colleges and universities engaged in teacher preparation. Officials estimate that 75 per cent of teachers entering the profession will graduate from colleges or uni-versities in this group. A first step of the organization will be that of reduc-ing the hugh number of sub-standard and emergency teach-ers who comprise an estimated 450,000 of the 875,000 teach-ers in the United States.
