Jesse Lilly, oroclaimed one of Glenville State college's all-time athletic greats, was named by sports writers at the eleventh annual West Virginia Inter-collegiate basketball tournament as the first man listed on an all-tourney selection. For the second straight year Lilly, graduate of Woodrow Wilson high school in Beckley, has captured sooring honors for the Glenville State college Pioneers.

With tournament games Lilly netted a total of 420 points for the 1941-43 season, ending his college career with a grand total of 129 markers.

Career Started in 1941

Starting as a freshman in 1941, Lilly has been a regular for his four years of college ball. During the 1941-42 season, he accounted for 203 points under the leadership of A.
