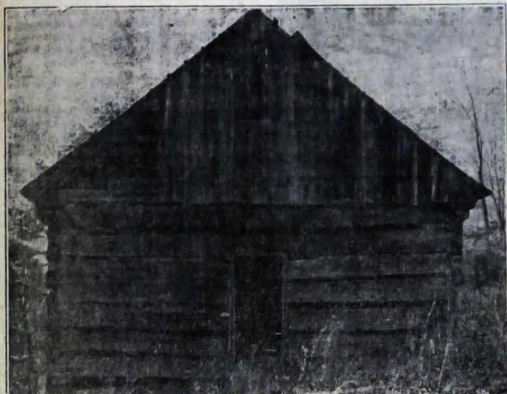


## Heflins Get New Home

## Heflential Ban Sends Frat Crew Underground

Sigma Tau Gamma fraternity has been banned as a Glenville State campus organization, according to an announcement by President Harry B. Heflin.

Heflin stated that the reason for the organization's dismissal was the discovery that one of the fraternity's members was caught walking under a beer sign in Buckhannon.

According to President Heflin, no further punishment (other than a \$30,000 fine, fifty lashes for each member, and the confiscation of the group's comic books) will be levied.

Sigma Tau Gamma President William A. Harper, in a desperate move for the fraternity's security, pleaded that the guilty man would be executed if the group could remain active, but his appeal was denied.

Meanwhile, the disgraced student, James Potts, strongly insists that he did not realize that it was a beer sign he was walking under. Potts states, "I had just finished drinking a double coke and I was a little dizzy."

After his appeal had been denied, Harper announced: "They can't do this to us; we'll go underground."

## 3 Are Jailed On Charges Of Contempt

Three Glenville State students have been jailed on contempt of court charges for refusing to answer questions asked them by college crime investigating committee chairman, J. Edgar Heflin.

Dan C. Anderson, Brent Cool, Grant Schoolcraft have been placed in Glenville State Prison under \$139 bail for refusing to answer the question: Are you, or have you ever been a card-carrying member of the communistic organization, Kappa Sigma Kappa?

Kappa Sigma Kappa was the first campus organization to be banned when it was discovered that its members possessed definite left-wing tendencies last year. Racket-buster Heflin led the crusade which completely demoralized the organization following the discovery that they were behind the plot to dynamite the Science Hall.

Since that time, several of the Kappa Sig party leaders have been found guilty of conspiracy in the attempted crime. The following confessed Kappa Sigma Kappa members are now serving a three-day term in the Old Mill Prison for the Alcoholicly Insane: Gerald Beckner, Harry Smith, James Laughlin, Lawrence Cooper, Allan Seene, Robert Metz, Cecil Johnson, and Carlton Gandee.

## Officials of Women's Prison Accused Of Viscious Mis-Treatment of Charges

Three inmates of Verona Mapel Prison for Women, who said they had been locked in a dungeon-like basement room of the prison for several weeks without food, sobbed out a terrorizing story of shocking treatment received at the hands of VMP officials yesterday as the expose of conditions existing at the fortress on the hill continued.

Inspector Edwin "Ketchum" Adkins of the State Department of Prisons and Privies said "The startling revelation is all the evidence we need to put Head Warden Hazel K. Marshall behind bars for keeps."

"We were forced to go to bed every night at 3 o'clock, Annie 'The Doll' Martin, who is finishing the twenty-fifth year of a 20-year sentence (the book-keeper has been drunk for five years) for smuggling narcotics, cried bitterly during an inquiry in the office of Inspector Adkins.

Leta Gregory, a newcomer to the Prison, who was convicted last September for the six murders of 13 persons, sobbed out the sordid story of her life in the bastille during the investigation.

"Three days a week they kept me in solitary," she cried, "and the other four days I was chained to a wall in the alcoholic ward."

When asked by Adkins whom she meant by "they," the girl began to gurgie incoherently. Adkins gave her a nasty look, knocked her over in the corner and went on to the other witnesses.

Warden Marshall only glowered and now and then pulled at the black patch over her eye as the endless questioning went on.

The sensational investigation began last week when Hunter Whitling, aide to Inspector Adkins, visited the prison for a routine (Continued on page 2)

## Atomic Energy Work Started By Scientists

BEWARE! ENTER AT YOUR OWN RISK! Read a sign erected in front of the Science Hall this week upon orders from John A. Wagner, noted Glenville State scientist.

Prof. Wagner requested the sign as a precautionary safety measure because of the increased activity in the further development of Atomic energy by Glenville State scientists.

The famed group, which had a prominent role in the unfolding of the original A-bomb, are devoting their ability and knowledge in an effort to expand the powerful explosive so as to manifest some economic benefits from the valuable power.

According to Wagner, he and his proteges are working principally on a project that will reduce the power of the atom to an extent that it can be developed as a source of fuel for use in the motivation of automobiles, all types of war machines, and possibly for numerous home benefits.

Wagner revealed that an assemblage of outstanding scientists throughout the United States are working together so as to delineate to mankind some benefactions of an energy that is new and untired in the present age.

Receiving the "green light" from Oak Ridge authorities the past week, the local group immediately began work on the project.

According to Wagner, "Developing an energy of this value for economic consumption would improve immensely the American standard of Living and provide an excellent foresight on the future world."

If a favorable result is attained from the experiments, the scientists may attempt the further development of the explosive power of the A-bomb.

## Prof. Eckman Awarded Pulitzer Prize

Prof. Frederick Eckman of the Glenville State college English department has been awarded the Pulitzer prize for literature for his work, "Lower Slobbovia Diplomacy During the Peasants' War."

The heretofore unknown author was also presented with a 10 dollar bill by the GSC Committee on Selection of Comic Books for the magnificent work. A digest follows:

The first ominous rumblings of Slobbovia popular discontent were heard in the remote principality of Red Dog, near the Etruscan border, August 7, 1946 (St. Lana's Day), when a poorly-organized mob of farmers, goatherds, and egg-candlers, led by Petrov Schmetrov, held a 30-minute demonstration before the Deputy Gesundheit's castle in Brfix. However, officials paid little attention to the uprising at that time; only when it was too late after Lower Slobbovia withered in the throes of bloody civil war, did its significance

become apparent. Today, l'affaire Schmetrov stands as the first official battle of the dread Peasants' War.

By September a dozen or more local revolts had been staged across the nation; and in addressing his House of Degenerates on September 8, King Noodnick IV observed patriotically that "... them scum gotta be stepped on, fellas!" The quick-acting House of Degenerates forthwith passed a resolution to consider discussion of a bill authorizing a committee on peasant rebellion to be set up some time before the close of legislative session. The American press was swift to take cognizance of the crucial situation; indeed, it was the Glenville Mercury correspondent, Hill Barber, who made journalists history with his front-line dispatches from the battle of Canasta Ridge, in December. In fact, it became a truism of the times that Americans knew more about the Slobbo-

An unidentified Glenville State student, passing Judge Marsh (King of Gilmer province) on the street, merely smiled and said "Good morning, sir." He did not salute; he did not take off his cap; he did not fall upon his knees.

Fortunately, this disgraceful incident was not witnessed by many persons. However, the seriousness of the deed cannot be overlooked merely because no one witnessed it.

One of the few persons who happened to see this terrible scene was President Heflin. President Heflin, naturally shocked to a state of hysteria could only moan, "Dreadful, disgraceful, outrageous . . . this humiliating offence shall not go unnoticed. This student is undoubtedly a member of that new underground campus organization, the Sour Grapes. vian war than the Slobos themselves; but then, as everyone is aware, no Slob knows very much about anything.

General Fieldpack's massive monograph on actual battle tactics leaves little to add on that subject. While visiting the cells, Whiting uncovered evidence which proved beyond a doubt that lifer Wanda "Bebe" Burkhammer had been conducting a dope ring behind the prison walls, and that the hardened criminal had been receiving the "stuff" from Warden Marshall.

Whiting immediately brought in Inspector Adkins and other officials of the State Prisons and Privies department, who began a wide-scale probe of the alleged racket. 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## PIONEER SHELL BESTS OXFORD

Glenville Crew Will Go To London Boat Regatta

Swift-stroking oarsmen of Glenville State college rowed to a 16-length triumph over Oxford university's faltering shell here on the choppy waters of the Little Kanawha River late yesterday evening thereby gaining the right to enter the Churchill Invitational Regatta scheduled for London this April 12-13.

As a result of yesterday's convincing display of handling the heavy oars, the crack-Glenville racing crew vaulted itself in the favorite's role for the impending London Regatta which will be held on the Thames.

With the crack of Starter Alma Arbuckle's pistol, the Pioneer stokers broke with a rush and they steadily pulled away from the outmanned Oxford crew who had difficulty maintaining an even sweep.

Coxswain Wanda Burkhammer, substituting for sidelined Harry Smith, steered and directed the Glenville stalwarts with amazing skill and deftness. As the Glenville shell glided swiftly under the Kanawha River bridge and across the finish line, a great roar went up from the overflow mob that lined the banks to watch the crews match strokes.

In besting Oxford by 16 lengths, the Burkhammer-directed shell established a new record for the five mile course, covering the distance in 25 minutes, 38 seconds. The previous existing record was a flat 28 minutes.

Oarsmen manning the Pioneers shell were: Jim Laughlin, Jim Shively, Sid Achesberg, Jim Cook, Woodrow Paxton, Frank Stanovich, Bernard Jolly, and Ralph Payne.

The course, as mapped out by Race Director Michael E. Posey, encompassed the Kanawha River from the city limits of greater Grantsville to the edge of the Kanawha River bridge.

Galgani has already reserved the television rights for the Old Mill Tavern national broadcasting hookup while the concession rights have been granted to the Holy Roller Court.

The bookmakers are in a dither as to how to place the betting odds. So little is known of pugilist Weaver that the odds-makers are afraid to name the gambling odds. The current betting trend in the pubs and emporiums is giving Charles the nod by a heavy 11-2 margin.

But towel-waving Manger Gerald Beckner, who has been grooming Weaver for this bout every since he broke out of the Burns-ville Reformatory, is strong in his belief that "My boy will cut that nigger to ribbons."

A glance at burr-headed bomb-shell Weaver's fistic record tends to bear out the statement by Promoter Beckner that his lad will be tough to take come this Friday night.

Weaver, a husky built lad who denis the Toledoes at 187 and stands an even 6' on stilts, has exchanged punches with some aggressive battlers in the squared circle.

Will-o-wisp fighter Weaver, who once outpointed Jack Dempsey with a broken arm, holds decisions over Kid Gavilan, Rocky Marciano, Sandy Saddler, Joe Maxim, Jersey Joe Walcott, and Weaver once kayoed Esther Williams in badly-staged tag match.

Dancing Don, who often confuses his opponents with the Australian holo punch, has a professional fight record listing 98 knockouts, 11 split decisions, one jump ball, and one rained out.

# Inspector McKnight Arrests Dr. Heflin; Huge Syndicate Is Cracked by LBH Bureau

Manager Edsil Robinson Cancels All GSC Varsity Games; Others Questioned

Inspector Byron McKnight, famed syndicate-wrecker and head of the LBH Investigation Bureau, shook this ivy-covered institution right down to its mossy foundation last night with the scathing proclamation that: "Dr. Harry B. Heflin, erudite head of GSC, is the sinister figure in the recently-exposed college gambling syndicate that has ruined athletics on an inter-collegiate scale here at Glenville State college."

The latest release by McKnight caused ominous rumblings deep within the administrative setup here on the hilltop and the GSC Board of Governors was called into a special, eleventh-hour session last night by Chairman Jim Cook as an aroused public demanded a wholesale house cleaning.

It was known that the corrosive gambling setup here in Gilmer county had corrupted almost every phase of public office but it was heart-rending to hear that such an esteemed man as Dr. Heflin was entangled in the sordid scandal.

President Heflin, who has already been evicted from office by impeachment charges brought against him by the Downtown Brewers Association, is currently being held in a padded cell in Kanawha Hall.

This reporter, by means known only to the journalistic clan, gained admittance to Dr. Heflin's cell last night and what follows is an exclusive expose of the whole deplorable mess.

"I know I was going to have a tight squeeze when it came to meeting my income tax deadline," spoke Dr. Heflin, "so I turned to the most lucrative field of endeavor I could envisage. . . gambling."

I contacted Joe Bokovitz, "Doc" Riley, and Jim Shively, all no-

torious characters who have long been known to formulate shady, nefarious plots. I explained to the syndicate boys that I was short on lucre and that I was eager to gain admittance to the organized gambling racket that existed on the campus.

At first the malefactors were alert for some underhanded action on my part but after they saw that I was on the level, they gave me a membership card and the latest bundle of parley cards. After that it was easy."

The condemned man went on to explain how he had bought off members of Joe Bokovitz's Bo-

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## 3-Way Verbal Battle Ends In All-Out Free-For-All

A three-way verbal battle between science teachers, the student council and Lloyd "Sleazy Thumb" Jones erupted into a free-for-all yesterday after council agreed unanimously to convert the science hall into a new student union.

hemian Storm Troopers to throw ball games within a certain point spread. Unofficial figures have it that Heflin's rakeoff on the Bohemian fix was in the neighborhood of \$35.

Heflin also averred that he had used ruthless tactics, force and violence in overpowering Georgia Reed student union manager, to allow him to install slot machines in the Pine Ear. "The net take from these 'one-armed bandits' in the union was tremendous," so continued the disheveled Heflin.

Dr. Heflin, in closing the interview, gesticulated with his hands and hurled invectives at other college faculty members who

were entwined in the scandal. He did not mention names but mounting evidence tends to incriminate Prof. Clarissa Williams, Asa Anderson, Michael Josephs, and others.

The far-reaching repercussions arising from this erupting gambling scandal are portentous. McKnight confirmed the report that hundreds of Pioneer cage fans are under vigilant supervision by his copious quantity of underlings but he would reveal nothing more.

"It is necessary to keep this investigation cloaked in a web of secrecy. Several key figures are yet to be nabbed but my investigation sleuths are cautiously closing in," added ex-FBI man McKnight.

Meanwhile Pioneer Athletic Manager Edsl Robinson has ex-

claimed, in a raving voice: "I have cancelled all Pioneer varsity matches in baseball, golf, tennis, and track and have withdrawn Pioneer athletic teams from the collegiate scene. Until this gambling menace, that has permeated to every corner of the college, has been wiped out, we will confine the athletic program here at GSC to checkers, chess, canasta, and blackjack."

Terms of Rupp's 35-year contract were not known at press time.

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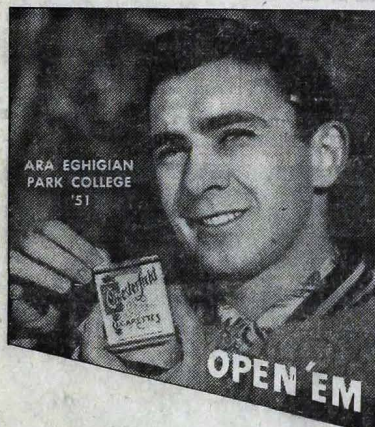


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
