### Pioneer Spirit Continues

## 16th Pioneer Has Long Line Of Ancestors

In 1867 the state legislature authorized a state normal school at Huntington, W. Va. Five years later a branch of the normal school was authorized to be established at Glenville. It was then known as Glenville State Normal School, later as Glenville State Teachers college, and finally as Glenville State college. One, then, can see that GSC is really a pioneer in its field. We have maintained that title "Pioneers" through the years.

It was at the third annual Homecoming in October 1933 that further manifestation of this pioneer spirit was noted, when a member of the student body was chosen to represent the college in the role of Pioneer. Since that year, the Pioneer has been the major attraction of the Homecoming parade and game.

The Pioneer has always worn the regalia suitable to his title—buckskin clothing, moccasins, fur headpiece, a large jug, and firearms reminiscent of the days of Daniel Boone.

With all of Gilmer county's schools, business houses, civic and social units cooperating, the annual Homecoming parade will be the largest ever featured here. The parade will start promptly at 10 a. m., forming on Bouderman Boulevard, continuing down College Street to Main and will end at the intersection of Main and Lewis streets.

Leading the parade will be Homer (Tiny) Moore, riding marshal, and Sheriff Drexel Frame. Parade marshals, making plans for the annual event, are Jack Luzader, Leon Reed and Iz Nachman. Stanley Hall, an instructor in the College, is acting as the coordinator of campus-alumni arrangements.

For the second year, George W. McQuain is serving as president of the Association and he will ride with Dr. Harry B. Heflin, college president, in one of the leading units. They will be followed by Dr. E. G. Rohrbough and Dr. John C. Shaw, past presidents of the College.

Brent Cool, Webster Springs, president of the Student Council, and Billy Hanlin, Sistersville, vice president, will follow in a convertible. Bill Boram, Weston, treasurer, and Bob Motchie, Grantsville, sergeant-at-arm, will ride in the next unit. Shirley Porter, Gauley Bridge, secretary of the council, will ride with the queen's party as she is the Junior Class princess.

#### Eighteen Campus Units

In all, eighteen units from the campus will be included in the line of march. All of the county's five high schools will have floats and four driver's education cars will also be seen. Two of the county's newest school buses will be driven by Joe Matheny and Roy J. Conrad.

Taking part in the parade for the first time will be the Gilmer County Farm Women's Council of which Mrs. Bertha Bush is president. The Council will feature a 6-car unit with members from Stewart's Creek, Cox's Mill, Cedar Creek, Conings and Flat Run completing the unit.

Josephmen Will Be in Top Shape For 18th Annual Homecoming Game

Remembering the humiliating 39-0 pasting the Pioneers absorbed at the hands of the Shepherd Bisons last year, the experienced upper classmen—especially the seniors—should be keyed to perform to the acme of their ability.

Fellows like Bill Hanlin, Sid Adelsberg, Frank Stanevich, Fred Gainer, and "Dike" Janiszewski have been putting forth everything they have in practice this week. With the exception of Hanlin, this will be their last Homecoming game.

Another fellow, Cecil Johnson from Grantsville, who has been in school the past four years but hasn't played football until this year, will also be included on the graduating list.

### Will Use Regular Backfield

Coach Joseph's plans to stick with his present backfield of Hanlin at left half, Ron Godfrey at quarterback, and Jack Tennant at quarterback.

Coach Joseph's emphasis on conditioning has been paying off for the Pioneers. During the games played by the Pioneers this year, they have been improving consistently because they are in good condition.

### Stanevich Dependable On Line

One of the boys who has been playing good consistent ball during every game this year is Frank Stanevich. Stanevich isn't colorful when it comes to the general run of stand-out tackles because he isn't huge. But with Stanevich out of there, Coach Joseph's would be faced with the problem of filling a hole as wide as the Little Kanawha. Frank will be depended on a great deal to help the Pioneers come through with a victory Saturday.

Another Pioneer who is being depended on to help the Glenville State cause is "Hodge" Hissam. Hissam, not an eye opener on the field as far as coming through with a sensationally spectacular play, is one of the best defensive quarterbacks in the state. Besides that, Hissam comes into his own when it comes to running back kickoffs and punts.

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## GSC Has Won Seven Homecoming Games

Glenville State Homecoming football games have resulted in a record of 7 wins, 8 losses and 2 ties for the Pioneers.

From 1931 to 1942, the string of Homecoming games remained unbroken. In 1943, 1944, and 1945, no Homecoming games were played due to the Second World War, but in 1946 the Pioneers picked up where they left off in 1942, playing Concord to a nothing to nothing tie.

Since then, the Pioneers have played four consecutive games, two with Shepherd in 1947 and 1949, one with Concord in 1948, and one with D & E last year.

Last year, Coach Michael Joseph's eleven pulled one of the biggest upsets in the West Virginia Intercollegiate Conference when they trimmed the powerful Davis and Elkins Senators in the Homecoming game 14-6.
