Damaged Boiler Disrupts Classes

Failure of automatic controls in the Administration building heating plant last week resulted in the damaging of a steam boiler beyond use.

Classes normally held in the building were dispersed to other buildings on the campus, and the first grades of the elementary training school were moved in with the high school. Some rooms were heated by means of gas stoves, and the office force remained intact.

Science Hall Boiler Disabled

Dean Edwin P. Adkins reported that at the same time a boiler in the science hall, which supplies both that building and Kanawha Hall was disabled, but it was back in operation last Tuesday. Dean Adkins stated that it will be three weeks before a new boiler can be installed and that reshuffled classes will continue as scheduled until installation is complete.

An auxiliary heating system of gas stoves was set up in the auditorium for the first lecture program in order that the event would not have to be cancelled.

WHITE WAVE FALLS BEFORE TECH ONSLAUGHT IN SEASON FINALE

Glenville is Unable
To Score as Golden Bears
Register Six TDs.

West Virginia Tech, unleashing a powerful ground attack that accounted for 19 first downs, defeated the Glenville Pioneers, 32-0, here Saturday in a WVVC contest that closed the season for both clubs.

Bob Pulitner scored twice and Bob Thomas, Walt Kapko, and Joe Fullinier once each as the Technicians rallied twice in the second period, once in the third canto, and twice again in the last stanza.

All touchdowns, except the last followed long drives. After a scoreless first period, Bob Pulitner put the southerners ahead to stay by capping a 45-yard drive in the second period with a scoring jaunt from the ten yard line. In the same period, the winners ended a 65 yard march with a scoring pass, Bob Burrus to Bob Thomas.

The third score came in the third canto when Tech drove 95 yards, Rapko scoring from the eight. Pulitner tallied the first touchdown of the last period by going over from the seven.

Joe Fullinier, a Glenville high product, set up and scored the last counter when he intercepted a Jack Tennant pass on the Glenville 37 and raced to the Pioneer four. He scored from there. Thomas made good two of five extra-point tries from placement.

Tech's defense was as strong as its attack, holding the Pioneers to only two first downs and stopping completely the usually strang passing of Tennant. The Glenville quarterback did not complete a pass in eight tries. Two were intercepted.

Johnson on defense and Sid Adelsberg on offense and defense stood out for the pioneers who ended their season with three wins and four losses.

If a Glenville State College football star ever did more than his share for the team and received a minimum of recognition for his efforts, then, that football player's name was Frank Stanevich.

A veteran of three years of college experience and four years of Oak Hill high school football (now Collin's high school) under the expert tutelage of Coach Bill Moore, Stanevich possesses the experience and other necessary qualifications (six feet, three inches tall and shaving two-hundred pounds) which contribute toward his being one of the best tackles—offensively and defensively—to don the Blue and White of the Pioneers of Glenville State.

The state in which Stanevich played the game went unnoticed by many of the fans because he worked with the team instead of by himself. This can be exemplified by his "right-way" techniques of defense. Stanevich's main objective was to force the runner inside the tackle position or to cut down the interference. His second objective was to tackle the ball carrier. He did both.

Frank Stanevich, in the writer's estimation, is the ideal football player. He played hard; and, he played clean. At all times, Stanevich performed as a unit of the team rather than as an individual. He worked as a member of the team; and he played to win. That's enough . . .

In the Concord—Glenville game, Bill "Willie the Zig-Zag" Hanlin picked himself off the turf after having been tackled by three of the Mountain Lions to find he had suffered a dislocated shoulder. What did he do . . . He continued playing until he was forced by command of Coach Josephs, who at the time was unaware he was in such bad condition, to leave the game.

You've gotta give 'im credit, boy! When a guy like Hanlin can take that kind of punishment and still not give up, you almost have to concede him the victory because he is going to take it, anyway . . .

It's a shame all football players can't be made out of the stuff of which Hanlin and Stanevich are composed. Foul tactics would be the thing of the past, but man . . . it sure would be rough!

The game of volleyball couldn't

GSC FOOTBALL SENIORS HAVE GOOD SEASON

Five Graduates Players
Retire With Sparkling
Performance Records

Five Pioneer lettermen, who welded the Glenville State football machine into a late-season powerhouse, hung up the Blue and White last Saturday after the Tech-Glenville game for the last time of their collegiate football careers.

The senior lettermen are: Ed "Dike" Janiszewski, defensive line-backer; Sid Adelsberg (captain) and Frank Stanevich, left and right tackles, respectively; Brent Cool, quarterback; and Cecil Johnson, the Pioneer fullback on offense, and right half on defense.

Naming one as the outstanding senior letterman would be naming them all since all of them performed equally well.

Ed "Dike" Janiszewski was a slow starter during the early stage of the 1951 campaign. But against D & E, Janiszewski hit his stride by showing his ability to hold down the strong side defensive line-backer position.

Contributes to Win
Janiszewski played one of his best games of his collegiate career when the Pioneers humbled the Shepherd Rams 19-13 before a Glenville Homecoming crowd of approximately two thousand fans. "Dike's" performance was superbly executed, contributing greatly to the Pioneer win.

Sid Adelsberg, captain and left tackle on the Glenville eleven, has been a regular for three consecutive seasons. Sid put in his best showing against the Concord Mountain Lions at Athens.

Besides being a sixty minute man for the Glenville team, Sid is notorious for his ability to rank among the top ground gaining tackles in (Continued On Page 4)
