Mary Frances Summerville, soprano; Elsie A. Elswick, contralto; Myron Lee Mason, tenor; and Prof. Harold S. Orendorff, bass, will be the featured soloists in "The Messiah" when it is presented by the music department tonight at 8:15 in the auditorium.

Under the direction of Professor Orendorff, this will be the choir's third annual presentations of Handel's immortal oratorio, "The Messiah," which usually draws a large crowd from the college and town, since it has come to be known as one of the greatest sacred vocal works.

Prof. Bertha Olsen, of the music department, will be the organ accompanist, with Mally Ann Mackey and Mary Faith Holbert furnishing the piano accompaniment.

Through special invitation, the choir performed the oratorio at Grantsville Sunday night and Webster Springs last night where they received much worthy praise due to the time spent in rehearsal.

The famed vocal composition was presented for the first time in England in 1743, and during this performance, the King and his subjects were so enraptured by the "Hallelujah Chorus" that they rose to their feet in reverence. The custom of rising during the Chorus has been practiced since that time.

No admission will be charged for the performance, but a silver offering will be taken to help defray expenses.

The true meaning of Christmas can't be described through the use of words. It must be felt. But if you seek out a person who realizes the real reason why we celebrate December 25, then, there is room for enlightenment.

Miss Arbuckle, GSC Librarian, is such a person who can convey a meaning of Christmas so it can be understood by you or me. Without hesitation she came forth with an answer which is simple in meaning, but with a direct and profound thought. "Too often people are prone to forget what Christmas actually is," she said. "True meaning for Christmas day should be stressed more and more. It is God's gift of the Christ Child to man. . . ."—BL.

Glenville's Pioneers came from behind to upset Morris Harvey's Golden Eagles, 66 to 64, Thursday night here.

Deadeye Dick Barrett swished the shot for 16 points as Glenville outlasted Morris Harvey's first defeat in four conference starts.

Jack Tennant and Cecil Johnson, with 13 points each, and Sid Weissberg, with 12, also figured prominently in the Pioneer attack. The underdog White Wave trailed 18 to 5, before drawing the curtains on its Jack the Giant Killer.

The Pioneers were behind, 19 to 17, at the end of the first quarter. They were on the short end of a 20 score at half-time, after a late in the third period, after a late inspired basketball that can't be forgotten here soon, they overhauled the visiting Eagles, at all.

Pandemonium reigned during the closing minutes of the ball game as the lead changed hands repeatedly. Tennant scored the winning goal with just eight seconds of the game remaining.

It was noted in the Clarksburg papers the other day that Bob "Hooks" Hardman, who ended up a brilliant basketball career for the Glenville State Pioneers last year, is still dumping them through the hoop at a rapid pace. Hardman is now playing for the Clarksburg Tiremen.

Last week when the Tiremen entertained the nationally famous Boston Whirlwinds at Clarksburg, big "Hooks" led his team in scoring with twenty-two points. With little effort that same Tiremen quintet trounced the Glenville State Pioneers earlier this season in a practice game by somewhere in the vicinity of thirty points. Hardman collected 28 in that game.

As early in the season as it is, the Pioneers are naturally going to look rugged in spots. But so did the 1951 football team. With freshmen like Jack Tennant, Bob Poole, and Bob Reed taking on polish as the season progresses, it is this writer's opinion that the White Wave is going to be hard to handle by mid-season.

Also on the squad are sophomores Don Merriman and Walt Slate, who have potentialities of becoming a combination of double trouble under both bankbooks.

Both Slate and Merriman are over six feet tall. Both can jump, and both possess a pair of big hands. That's all it takes to play basketball with the exception of a good eye for the bucket and they have that, too.

Walt Slate, especially, is a shot maker of doom-sealing accuracy once inside the foul line. Although not a fancy ball-hawk, Slate can rip the cords. Don't be surprised if he breaks loose and goes wild some night by racking up twenty or thirty points.

A new sport has been introduced on the Glenville State campus during the month of December. Jim Ball, blood-brother of the pigmy chieftain, Llew Retsrag, who lives in the wilds of the darkest Australian forest, was given a boomerang to practice with during the balmy weather that prevailed here in mid-winter a few weeks ago.

It was interesting yet disappointing to watch him try his skill at throwing and controlling the thing. It was interesting in the sense that it always glided back and landed near the place from which he threw it. Veteran W. Va. Tech Team Will Be Played at Spencer; Concord, Alumni to Be Met

A long vacation is in store for the Glenville State Pioneers during the Christmas holidays as they face three tough teams in West Virginia Tech's Golden Bears, probably one of the greatest teams ever to compete in the West Virginia Intercollegiate Conference; the Concord Mountain Lions, whom Glenville has already beaten this season; and the Pioneer Alumni, which will feature most of last year's championship squad.

Journeymen back to Glenville, the Pioneers will play their second and last non-conference game when they take on a highly touted Alumni quintet. The Alumni team will be headed by Bob "Hooks" Hardman, Glenville State great who graduated last year after playing four straight years of varsity ball.

January 4 will be the date for a Glenville-Morris Harvey tussle to be held in the Golden Eagles gym across the river from Charleston. On January 8 and 11, respectively, the Pioneers will entertain the Salem Tigers and the Concord Mountain Lions in the newly constructed Health and Physical Education building.

P-Ed. Building Needs State O.K.

In complying with regulations set forth by the State Board of Education, the college found it necessary to abstain from using the recently completed health and physical education building until after the last meeting of the State Board which was held Dec. 14.

The Glenville-Morris Harvey game which was tentatively scheduled as the debut for the new gym, reverted to the old gym; swimming classes were postponed another week, and will be made up by more frequent meetings.

Preliminary inspection and approval of the new structure was made by the architect and a representative of the State Board Dec. 6, but the new regulation forbids the use of any new building for any purpose until after a formal acceptance by the State Board of Education.

According to official reports, the structure met with the architectural specifications at the time of inspection, and will likely be in use for all previously intended purposes after Dec. 14.

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Examinations For Aid Positions Announced

The United States Civil Service commission today announced an examination for filling cartographic and cartographic aid positions at salaries ranging from \$2,500 to \$8,360 a year, and for cartographic draftsman positions paying from \$2,500 to \$4,205 a year. The positions are located in Washington, D. C., and vicinity. A few field-service-at-large positions will also be filled.

Applicants will not be required to take a written test but they must have had from 3 months to 8 years (depending on the kind and grade of position) of appropriate experience. Appropriate education may be substituted for all of the required experience for positions paying up to \$3,410 and for part of the experience required for the higher level positions.
