Swimming Pool Is Open to Students, Faculty; Schedule Is Now in Effect

The following tentative proposal for recreational swimming for college students, faculty, and their families, has been set up. The periods during which the pool will be used will be determined by the expense involved; number of persons using the pool; and whether the college is able to provide adequate supervision. At present, two periods per week are scheduled—Wednesday evenings from 7:30 to 8:30 P. M., and Saturday afternoons from 2:30 until 4:00 P. M. At times when these periods conflict with a regularly scheduled college activity the pool will not be open.

Children under 12 years of age must be accompanied by a parent. A certified life guard will be on duty at all times when the pool is in use.

The following regulations are to be observed:

1. No smoking in building.
2. One-piece bathing suits for girls; trunks for men.
3. Any person showing evidence of skin disease, lesions, bandaged wounds, boils, inflamed eyes, discharging of nose or ear passage, or communicable disease, is to be excluded from using the pool.
4. A cleansing bath without soap, including warm water and soap, is required.
5. Spitting, spouting water or blowing nose is prohibited.
6. Boisterous or rough play, such as running around the pool or pushing others into the pool, is not allowed.
7. Divers are advised to wear athletic caps, or use greased cotton or wool to close ear passages.
8. Life saving and first aid equipment are to be used by life guard only.
10. No diving is permitted in the shallow end of the pool.

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Classes To Be In New Building

The health and physical education building will be open next semester for classes, swimming, and games. Classes to be held in the new building are Correction of Remedial Defects, Written and Spoken English I, Advanced First Aid, Elementary Swimming, Elementary Folk Dancing, Poultry Husbandry, Org. and Admin. of Health, and Phys. Ed., Club Leadership, Written and Spoken English II, Phys. Ed. 412, Advanced Swimming, Individual and Dual Sports, Agronomy, Camp Admin. and Counseling, and Officiating Sports.

The only recreation being offered in the new building at present is swimming. Other sports and recreation will be available as other equipment is installed. There will be announced later.

The infirmary officially opened January 3. This department contains two four-bed wards. It will accommodate up to four men and

New Instructor Will Be Added

Prof. Somerville Will Replace Dr. Underwood

Delmar K. Somerville, former GSC student and graduate with the class of 1936, will be added to the faculty the second semester as a member of the education department.

Professor Somerville will establish residence in Glenville and assume his duties about one week after the beginning of the second semester. He received the M.A. degree from West Virginia university and is presently completing work toward the doctorate degree in education at Cornell University, with specialities in rural education and supervision.

Professor Somerville will replace Dr. C. L. Underwood as general supervisor for all secondary directed teaching and coordinator for secondary supervisors. He will also teach classes in high school administration and supervision.

Before entering Cornell, Mr. Somerville served as assistant superintendent of the Jackson county schools, during which time he was prominent in the state conservation program.

D-D-Doggone Right

Did you ever desire to discuss a topic (by order of an instructor) that was divided into many sub-topics in which differences among them correlated to the point where one could hardly be distinguished from the other? If so, then a determined attempt to discern differences in the difficult reading material is your only out.

Don't discourage easily; be direct with your self. Dismiss from thyself dilatory notions of dawdling around and doing nothing. Diligence of one's attention directed toward the subject, and not dodging or evading the subject because it is difficult, is one method of solving the problem.

A discreet person develops his power to discriminate one closely related meaning from another through practice. Such types of topics are subject for deliberation. He consults a dictionary to detect differences in definitions of words and to find their origin from which the words are derived.

Such a person is likely to be able to defer one's opinion in a group discussion or debate. Adequate and eloquent expression, both orally and written, delight both the speaker and the listener or the writer and the reader.

Hmmmmmm . . . reckon it's time to quit dilly-dallying around and come to the point. In the preceding paragraphs you might have noticed that a great many of the key words begin with the letter "D." This illustrates the applicability of the English language. It also demonstrates why it is easy for a person who can recognize and use a great number of words to be able to understand complex subjects and to express himself fluently.—BL

MOUNTAIN LIONS TROUTONED 74-64 BY FAVORED GSC

Pioneers Blow Early Lead;
State 2d Half Comeback;
JV's Beat Mt. State 53-42

With the Concord College Mountain Lions leading 36-30 at the half, Mike Joseph's mountain men fought back to take the contest 74-64 here on Friday night. The Pioneers, who were pre-game favorites, jumped into an early six point lead in the opening minutes of the game only to see their lead dwindle to one point at the end of the first period. The lead changed hands in the second quarter after the game was knotted at 21. Unable to slow down the Concord onslaught the Lions soon had an eleven point lead. GSC pitched in two goals and a foul to cut the margin to 36-30 at half time.

GSC RALLY CONTINUES

The Wave continued to rally as they came back in the third quarter pitching in three straight field goals and tying the score at 36. On a lay up shot Dick Barrett broke the ice and Glenville went into the lead at 38-36. Five minutes and 58 seconds had elapsed in the third quarter before Joe Friedl's men were able to tally a point. With four minutes and two seconds remaining in the period Atwell pitched in, one from the charity loss stripe to make the score read GSC 45-Concord 37.

PIONEERS HAVE 8-2 RECORD

Never in too great a danger after this the Pioneers walked off with the win, 76-64. In doing so Glenville ran their overall season's record to 8-2 and their WVLC league record to 6-2. This was the Wave's third win over the Concord quintet this season. Adelsberg and Mills lead the Glenville team scoring with 16 and 15 points with Dick Barrett and Jack Tennant getting 12 each in this well balanced scoring attack. Lowe had 16 for Concord.

Last Friday night when the Glenville State Pioneers entertained the Concord Mountain Lions was, in all probability, the last home game in which Sid Adelsberg, last year's only holdover of the Pioneers' first state championship five, wore the Blue and White in conference competition. During the past three years in which Sid has attended this school, he has marked up a fine record in the athletic department. Transferring from Duquesne University as a sophomore, Adelsberg went on to make both the varsity football and basketball teams three years in a row.

This year has been Sid's best. In football, he was captain and also made the West Virginia Intercollegiate Conference's second team. This team is picked by the coaches and sports writers all over the state. Adelsberg was the only Glenville representative to be selected on any of the first three teams.

Overshadowed by such Glenville greats as Bob "Hooks" Hardman and Tex Gainer last year, Sid has come into his own on the hardwood during the 1951-52 season. Up to and including Glenville's last win over Morris Harvey, Sid has compiled a total of 121 points for an average of 13.4 per game. In the foul shooting department, of which Sid was the state's leader in percentages last year, Adelsberg has dropped 29 out of 36 attempts through the hoop for almost an average of 80 percent.

It is regrettable that Sid is leaving this institution at mid-term. But, like everybody else, Sid's primary purpose for being here in the first place is to obtain an education.

Pioneer fans will miss the expert play-making and leadership of Adelsberg. His consistent scoring and aggressiveness have won many games for the White Wave. If Sid would finish out the season he would be a "sure bet" selection on the WVLC's all-conference basketball team; but, as it is, here's wishing a lot of luck to a great competitor ... the "Pittsburgh Kid!"

The Glenville fans are certainly getting their moneys' worth this year while taking in the Pioneer home games.

In three games—Glenville 66-Morris Harvey 64, Glenville 67-Beckley 64, and Glenville 69-Salem 66—there has been a mere eight points in difference among them. Also during the halves of all three games, the Pioneers were behind.
