A discreet person develops his power to discriminate one dosely related meaning from another through practice. Adequate and eloquent ex-pression, both orally and written, delight both the speaker and the listener or the writter and the reader. Himmmmmm . . . reckon it's time to quit dilly-dallying you might have noticed that a great many of the key words begin with the letter "D." This illustrates the applicability of the English language. It also demonstrates why it is easy for a person who can recognize and use a great number of words to be able to understand complex subjects and to ex-press himself fluently.—HL

By BILL LILLY A two day road trip is in store for the Glenville State Pioneers on January 18 and 19 when they motor to two Eastern Panhandle towns, Keyser and Shepherdstown, to play the Potomac State Catamounts and the Shepherd State college Rams,

January 19, in all probability, will be the last West Virginia Inter-collegiate Conference game in which Sid Adelsberg, one of the best all-around athletes ever to don the Blue and White school colors of Glenville College, will compete. Last year the Catamounts finished up with a season record of 10 games won while losing 17. The Bisons, on the other hand, won 8 games and lost 12 to end up in nineth place in the WVIAC con-ference standings. This was su-perior to the Potomac season rec-ord. The Catamounts finished out the season in eleventh place. But the Catamounts have the knack of incocking off the top-running teams in the conference, and the Pioneers have such a standing.
