President Heflin Endorsed For WVEA Presidential Seat

AHE Will Back Heflin As Candidate; Election Set For Assembly On May 2-3

Dr. Harry B. Heflin, president of Glenville State college, has been unanimously endorsed by the West animously endorsed by the West Virginia Association of Higher Education as a candidate for president of the West Virginia Education Association. This was announced by MHE President Raiph Brabban, head of the department of education, Morris Harvey college.

Action was taken at the fifteenth annual meeting of the Association here March 28 and 29. The state president will be chosen at the delegate assembly of WYEA on May 2-3, in Charleston.

Since 1934, when he assumed his first teaching position in a one

Since 1934, when he assumed his first teaching position in a one room school in Ritchie county, Hef-lin has had a varied experience in the schools of West Virginia. His wide experience has given him a thorough experience with the problems of education in the state.

Born in Ritchie county, Heffin received his public school training there. He earned his A. B. degree at Glenville State college, his M.A. degree at George Peabody college, and his Ph. D. degree at th University of Pittsburgh.

He is a member of the West Virginia Education Association, her herican Education Association, and the Association of Higher Education. He is at present a member of the committee on tax education and finance of the WYEA.

In presenting Heffin as a candidate for the office of president of the WYEA, the Association declared that the forthcoming year will be a critical one for education and that dynamic leadership is essential. The Association believes that Dr. Heflin will furnish that leadership.
