## Commencement Plans Made High School Seniors Visit GSC Campus Thursday

### Area Students Attend Events

Glenville State College's annual "Senior Day" will welcome more than 600 high school seniors and their sponsors to the campus tomorrow to participate in the college's tenth program of this type, according to Registrar Brown Trussler, over-all director of the event.

Forty-four central West Virginia high schools have been invited to attend the conference, and approximately 600 students have indicated their intent to attend tomorrow, according to Trussler. The Senior Day activities began in 1948 when former Registrar Michael E. Posey became the originator.

#### Assembly at 10 a.m.

Tomorrow's Senior Day program will open with a general assembly in the college auditorium at 10 a.m. Music will be played by the Glenville State band while the students are gathering in the auditorium. The program will officially be opened by Registrar Trussler who will introduce Student Council President Dave Posey. Posey will greet the visiting seniors.

President Harry B. Heflin will then present the welcoming address. Announcements will be made, and guides will be introduced to direct the students on campus tours and class visitations. The introduction of the administrative college personnel will also be conducted at this time.

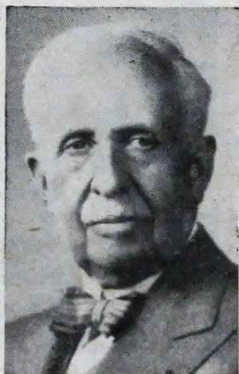
Shortly after 11:30, luncheon will be served to the visiting groups in Kanawha Hall dining room. All seniors and their sponsors will be guests of the college.

Seven music students will leave this afternoon for Miami, Fla., to attend the Southern Conference of Music Educators' Association. The meeting will continue nine days, April 24 - May 2, according to Dr. Harold S. Orendorff, who will accompany the group.

Curtis Fleschman, Fred Batten, Stanley Pickens, Jack Kaufman, David Arbogast, Joyce Brannon, and Junior Boyles comprise the local MENC Student Band, who along with Dr. and Mrs. Orendorff and two of their children, will represent Glenville State at this meeting.

#### Both Band And Chorus

These students will participate in both band and chorus, and will rehearse in the Alcazar Hotel Ballroom. The band will be directed by Dr. Harold Bachman and the chorus director is Dr. Lara Hoggard. Students will be all-conference student members of the Golden Anniversary of Southern Divisions Music Educator's Association.

Dr. Orendorff, as president of the state association, will attend the Board of Directors' meetings Thursday, April 25 and Tuesday, April 30. On Saturday, April 27, he will deliver a talk on "Development of Wholesome Attitudes in Prospective Music Educators." On April 30, he will speak on "The State Music Association as an Agency for Inservice Education." Professor Orendorff will also act as chairman for all lobby sings.

### Summer Term Opens June 3

Glenville State College is offering 21 courses this summer that may be taken by incoming freshmen, according to Dean Delmer K. Somerville.

Courses that graduating seniors may choose upon entering Glenville State this summer for two terms are Art 302, Biology 101 and 102, Business Education 101, Chemistry 101 and 102, Education 101 and 102, English 101 and 102, History 101 and 102, Mathematics 209, Music 208, Physical education 101 and 102, Physical education 103, Physical Science 209, Physical Science 210, and Social Science 101 and 102.

More than 50 other courses will be offered during the term, according to Dean Somerville.

The first summer term will begin on June 3 with registration and end July 12, while the second summer term will begin on July 15 and continue through August 23. Classes will meet Monday through Friday. There will be no Saturday classes this summer.

#### May Earn 6 or 12 Hours

High school seniors who are graduating this spring may enter Glenville this summer for six or 12 weeks to earn credits.

#### Native of Missouri

The prominent business man was born in Hamilton, Mo., on Sept. 16, 1875. He is a graduate of Hamilton (Missouri) High School and holds the following honorary degrees: Doctor of Science in Business Administration at Kansas Wesleyan University and Bryant College; Doctor of Commercial Science at Boston University and Drexel Institute of Technology; Doctor of Laws, Rollins College, University of Wyoming, Westminster College, Shurtleff College, University of Missouri; and Doctor of Humane Letters, Hastings College and Coe College.

#### Author and Speaker

In 1926 Penney founded the Memorial Home Community at Penney Farms in Florida for retired ministers, full time religious workers, and their wives. He has also been proclaimed a noted public speaker and he is the author of numerous articles and the autobiography published in 1950 by Harper & Brothers entitled, "Fifty Years with the Golden Rule."

#### Frizzell Delivers Sermon

The Rev. John Frizzell, active in church work for many years, will deliver the baccalaureate sermon Sunday, May 26 in the college auditorium.

A native of Easthampton, Mass., the Rev. Frizzell graduated from the Williston Academy in 1898 at the age of 17, and from Amherst College in 1902. He received his M.A. degree from Pennsylvania State University in 1912.

He was licensed as Lay Leader in the Episcopal Church in 1905 where he organized the first student work in the churches of State College and conducted the work of the Episcopal Church there until 1911.

#### Penn State Instructor

The Rev. Frizzell served successively as instructor and Associate Professor in English at Pennsylvania State University. He then served as principal of the High School for Boys at Reading, Penn. While here he was active in Boy Scout work. He was associated with the National Scout Executive as Scoutmaster, Scout Counselor, and Director of Scoutmaster Training in Berks County.

While Field Secretary of the Episcopal Church during the years 1923-1926, he conducted and directed 11 camps for teen-age boys of the church, devoted to the development of church workers, in six (Continued on page 4)

shop in Public School Play Production, will be offered from July 15 to 26, under the supervision of Prof. William S. E. Coleman. The class is for two hours credit and will meet daily, Monday through Friday, from 10:40 to 12:10 a. m., according to Dean Somerville.

The class is a practical, applied approach to play production subdivided into separate short courses in traditional and new rehearsal techniques, play selections, scenic painting and construction, advanced make-up, lighting, and the use of sound and music. The course is adapted to aid experienced and novice directors in meeting the problems and limitations encountered while producing plays in the average public school.

Dean Somerville stressed that students may also take a 7:30 and a 9 o'clock class, along with the workshop.

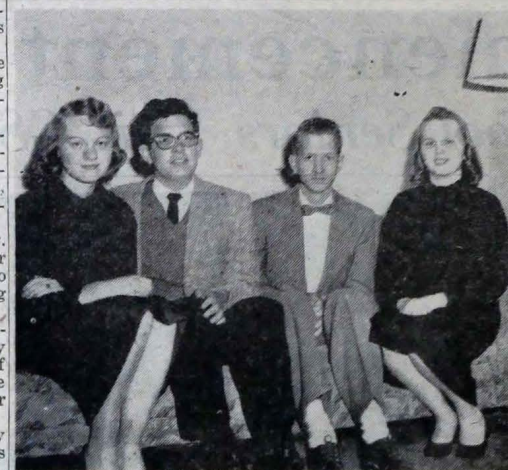

Over forty scholarships and loan funds are available to high school students who plan to attend Glenville State College next fall, according to President Harry B. Heflin.

Four Claude Worthington Benedum Foundation scholarships are available to state high school students; five scholarships offered by Kanawha Union Bank of Glenville are available to students at the five county high schools; and the State Board of Education awards an average of ten scholarships to Glenville College each year.

### Four For Glenville High

Glenville Woman's Club and Glenville Rotary Club will present a scholarship to a Glenville girl for this fall. The local Civic Club and the Glenville High School Student Council will also present Glenville students with scholarships.

The Spencer Bank and Trust Company will offer a scholarship covering tuition only for one student at each high school of Calhoun County, Walton, and Spencer.

### Other Donors Listed

Dr. Waitman F. Zinn of Baltimore will offer \$75 for a graduate of Troy High School, and the William McKinley Lodge of Richmond offers one for a graduate of Richmond High School. Nicholas County Teacher's Association, Farmers Building & Loan Association, Ravenswood, Lions Club of Elizabeth Calhoun County Insurance Agency.

Veteran of Foreign Wars, Geoffrey L. Cabot, Inc.; W. Va. Society of Daughters American Revolution, Alpha Delta Epsilon of the campus, and National Merit Scholarship Corporation are among other donors of the scholarships to Glenville State.

Lynn S. Hornor usually awards three scholarships to incoming freshmen. Dale's Drive-In will award \$100 to a Gilmer County band student; and the Charles Samuel Whiting scholarship is awarded to the winner of a photography contest.

Other loan funds and scholarships are available for those who qualify. Those interested should inquire in person soon.

Those students who have proved themselves capable of maintaining at least a "C" average may apply for a workshop. Since the number of workshops available is limited, they are assigned on the basis of individual need for financial aid.

### Workshops Available

Applications for a scholarship workshop, or loan should include transcript of high school work, a letter from the principal pointing out need, leadership, personality and academic standing in class, a letter showing moral characteristics and home background; a letter stating goal for a college education; a picture and letter from the parents stating need for financial assistance and educational desires for the applicant. Applications for secondary students should be in soon, and will not be considered if submitted after May 1. They should be addressed to Scholarship Committee, Glenville State College, Glenville, W. Va.

Recently the pool saw a hard life for a week during the Water Safety Instructor course. This is an annual function of the pool, with several students stroking away each year, attempting to obtain their "instructors" certificate.

Our pool is one of the few of its kind in any of the state colleges, and is modernly equipped with water safety devices, aqua boards, and other items that are used in teaching swimming and water safety.

According to Athletic Director Carlos Ratcliff, student use of the pool is much greater than that of last year. Open to the public for the fee of 25 cents on Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday, the pool is frequented most often by students and families of faculty members who pay only on Friday nights. During the summer months, Friday nights are set aside as community nights.

Two life guards and two dressing room attendants are on hand during each swimming period to take care of the bathers.
