Talented Pianist Will Appear Here

Stephen Barwick, talented pianist, will be featured in the next lyceum program on Nov. 14 at 8:15 p.m.

Born in Lincoln, Nebraska, Barwick presented his first public solo recital at the age of 11. Barwick began his musical training at the University of Nebraska, later continuing his studies at Coe College in Iowa and earning a M. Mus. degree from the Eastman School of Music and a Ph. D. in music from Harvard University.

For a period of several years his pianistic development was under the direction of the eminent Chilean pianist Claudio Arrau whom he met while he was in Mexico and Central America on the John Knowles Paine Traveling Fellowship from Harvard, which he was awarded twice.

Studied Abroad

Earlier, he had studied with Cecile Gernhart in Rochester, New York; with Beveridge Webster in Boston; and with Lazare Levy in Paris.

Steven Barwick made his first European tour during the spring of 1956. Reviewers and audiences alike in Germany, Holland, Denmark, England, and Italy have praised the artistry of this young mid-western pianist.

Old Report Cards Found Signed By Verona Maple

Report cards from State Normal School of Glenville found in an old bookcase and bearing the dates 1891-92 were on display recently in the MERCURY office.

Signed by Verona Mapel, Carrie Wisenfeld, T. J. Hardman, R. W. Tapp, and M. D. Helmick, the four report cards belonged to Jackson Arnold.

According to the Alumni Directory, a T. J. Arnold received a Standard Normal Degree in 1891. His grades on the report cards ranged from 79-100, most of them in the high 90's.

The report for the term ending June 9, 1891, was signed by Verona Mapel, principal.

Miss Mapel, Principal

Graduated from Fairmont State Normal School in 1879, Miss Mapel taught in W. Va. public schools from 1879-1882. She was a first assistant teacher at Glenville Normal from 1882-94. In 1891 she succeeded R. W. Tapp, who died while in office, as principal. She left Glenville in 1895 to teach at West Liberty College. During the same year she was married to Linn Brannon, a Glenville lawyer and judge.

Verona Mapel Hall, the largest dormitory for women on campus, was named in her honor. This building was constructed in 1926.

Another principal whose signature was on the report cards was Robert W. Tapp. Tapp was graduated from WVU and taught in Vicksburg, Miss. for three years following his graduation. In 1890 he was elected principal of Glenville Normal School but died in 1891.

M. D. Helmick was also a principal of Glenville Normal. Mr. Helmick received his AB degree from Adrain College, Adrain, Mich. in 1888. In 1892 he was elected principal of Glenville Normal. He resigned in 1895. A minister, Helmick was pastor of churches at Harrisville, St. Marys, Buckhannon, and Elkins.

Some of the subjects on which students were graded in 1891 were spelling, elocution, penmanship, composition, mental science, Latin, drawing, school economy, and grade of neatness in work.

Jackson, Stein Named For Grant

Dr. Harry B. Hefflin has announced that the names of Joyce Jackson and Randolph Stein, seniors, have been presented to the State Board of Education as applicants for a Fulbright Grant.

Miss Jackson, a math and physical education major from Valley Chapel has applied for the study of mathematics in Norway, and Stein an English major from Cumberland, Md., has applied for the study of English literature in Great Britain.

Flu Strikes GSC; Vaccine Is Given

Students, are you given to chills, headaches, and high temperatures? No, you're not in love; you most likely have the flu.

Yes, flu has struck GSC. At the time the MERCURY went to press, 144 students had received the vaccine and many who had not received the vaccine had the flu. Mrs. Mary Agnes Fest, college nurse, also had the flu.

The onset of the disease is rapid chills and a fever of 102 to 104 degrees. If one has the flu, the best thing to do is get plenty of rest, drink plenty of liquids, and take aspirin if a headache occurs.

With the fever lasting from three to five days, it may be accompanied by a headache, cough, sore throat, and muscular aches. There is weakness for several days after the fever breaks.

The only known preventive for the Asian Flu is the vaccine which lasts for approximately one year.

Total school and college enrollment in the United States in the school year 1957-58 is expected to reach a new all-time peak of approximately 43,135,000 according to the U. S. Office of Education. It is estimated that one of every four persons in the U. S. will attend school or college this year.

Sputnik Speaks!

Russia's launching of "Sputnik" over a month ago has finally awakened the American people to the fact that this country is longer the world leader in science.

But the United States government appears to be answering the challenge of Sputnik with more than words.

The report comes that the Navy has fired successfully the first stage engine of the Vanguard missile which is to launch an American satellite into space. It reached an altitude of 109 miles and a speed of 4,250 miles an hour. The December calendar calls for two more such tests, a second rocket succeeding the first and a third as the second missile rises.

The first of six fully-instrumented satellites will be launched in March. But by December it is expected that any one of four experimental vehicles can eject a miniature satellite into space.

A new naval weapon with an atomic depth charge has been developed, according to word from the Defense Department, and the Navy reports that its Sidewinder infra-red air-to-air missile is so accurate that it can shoot a flare pot off the wing of a target drone plane.

And the same service announces the awarding of a 61 million plus contract for development of its intermediate range missile called Polaris.

Maybe the U.S. was not completely asleep at the switch when the world's first earth satellite was shot into outer space, but we think we will all agree that her eyes were sadly drooping.

Columnist Bob Considine tells the American people to "cheer up." "The Russians aren't ahead of us in everything scientific. Take the matter of fixing races. There's been recently an expose in the U.S.S.R. to the effect that a number of Moscow trotting races probably have been but seamy travesties on the truth.

"We beat them to that kind of fraud by a good century and now have gone into a state of being in which the trots are so profit-making that hardly nobody cheats any more, in fear of being boosted into a new tax bracket."

We think it is evident, now more than ever, that a great number of trained scientists are needed.

The little cartoon in the September issue of *New Yorker* Magazine has something when a lady in the upper "400" bracket announces convincingly that "Russia has the intercontinental guided missile, but we've got the EDSEL!" —Connie Sams.

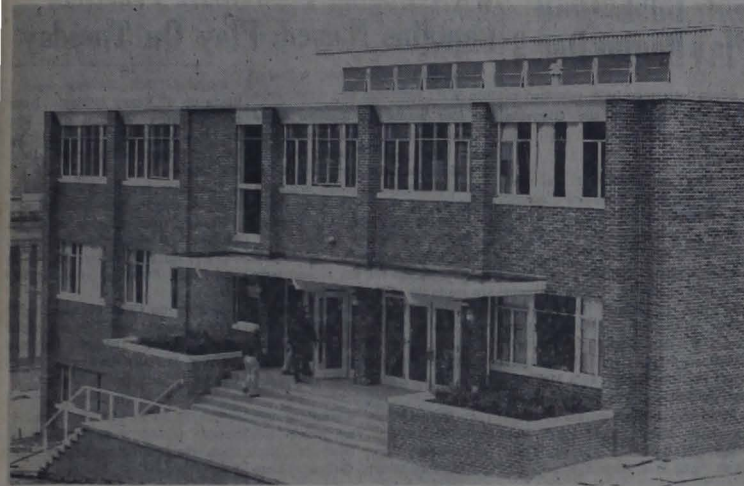
