GSC STUDENTS ARE NOW WITNESSING the fulfillment of an editorial written in the MERCURY four years ago by Robert W. Miller who suggested that the campus fraternity paddling be abandoned for a more helpful initiation program.

IN PAST YEARS, FREQUENT "BOARD" MEETINGS were held during which a splat sound could be heard echoing on campus. This sound was that of a wooden paddle connecting with the backside of a pledge. At the termination of the initiation, pledges who could endure the frequent "board" meetings were accepted as members of the fraternity.

THE ECHO OF THE PADDLE WILL NOT BE HEARD this year because a new look in social fraternities is presently gracing the campus as a result of the recent state law against hazing. Fraternity members have swapped their paddles for a "bucket" of paint.

THE HOLY ROLLER COURT PLEDGES have done some constructive work for the campus. They have painted the television room in Louis Bennett Hall and many of the light posts on campus. The past Saturday they cut and put up the traditional Christmas tree on Verona Maple lawn.

KAPPA SIGMA KAPPA PLEDGES have been busy working in downtown Glenville. Recently they swept and cleaned the streets and painted the curbs. They have also cleaned up the graveyard behind Louis Bennett Hall and whitewashed the KEK Rock on Mt. Kappa Sigma Kappa on Route 119 South. Plans for a Christmas party for needy children are underway.

PRAISE SHOULD BE GIVEN to the fraternities and pledges this year for behind the initiation program lies an entirely new idea which required a great adjustment to a new set of circumstances.

HOLY ROLLER COURT AND KAPPA SIGMA KAPPA from all outside appearances have faced the reality that the hazing ruling has been banned. Instead of acting like a group of high school boys on campus with a chip on their shoulders, they appear to have faced facts like college men and have sincerely changed from PADDLES TO PAINT.

# Pioneers Open Basketball Season With 76-66 Victory Over Fairmont

Glenville officially opened the 1959-60 Basketball season with a 76-66 victory over Fairmont State at Fairmont. The Pioneers found themselves behind 33-30 at half-time but caught fire in the second half to win going away. The Pioneers were led by Freshman Forward Mike Eberbaugh who tallied 27 points and Sophomore Larry Gandee who canned 17 markers. Fairmont's top scorers were Guin with 25 points and Conaway with 15.

During the first half, the G-Men played mediocre ball and were unable to find a consistent scoring punch. However, Gandee flipped in 10 and Eberbaugh 8 to account for 18 of the 21 points scored by the Byrd-men in the third period. This spurt put the G-Men up by one point 51-50 at the beginning of the fourth quarter.

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Fred Smith, who tallied 19 points led the Pioneers in their victory over Concord. Thirteen of Smith's points came in the second half to push the Pioneers to victory. Smith received able assistance from Eberbaugh who scored 12 and Lambert who chipped in with 10. Concord's Hamerick took high point honors for the game with 20.
