Development Conference Meets On Campus Today

Council Election Will Be April 21

Officers for the 1960-61 Student Council will be chosen April 21 in an all-campus election to be held in the Student Union from 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m.

Candidates for the Student Council offices presented their platforms in an assembly the past Thursday.

Seventy-eight per cent of all full-time students voted in the 1959 election. This vote marked the largest number of students voting in a student council election since 1943. An 80 per cent vote was recorded in 1943.

The 1959 election saw the first woman president named since 1945 when Iolene Harding was selected for the top campus post.

Annual Senior Day Is Set for April 28

Registrar Brown Trussler, director of Senior Day activities, indicated that 27 high schools have been invited to participate in the 13th annual Glenville State College Senior Day program, Thursday, April 28.

The Senior Day activities began in 1948 with former Registrar Michael E. Posey as over-all director. This program is sponsored to provide an opportunity for high school seniors who are interested in attending college to visit the campus while classes are in session.

The administration believes this will provide them with an opportunity to observe student activities, make necessary pre-college arrangements, become familiar with the campus, seek information concerning a chosen vocation, and aid in making adjustments for college life.

The conference is an annual national 4-H event attended by representatives from every state in the Union, and provides an excellent opportunity for meeting and exchanging ideas with other 4-H members of the nation.

Miss Hawkins is a member of SNSEA and a member of the Louis Bennett Hall governing board.

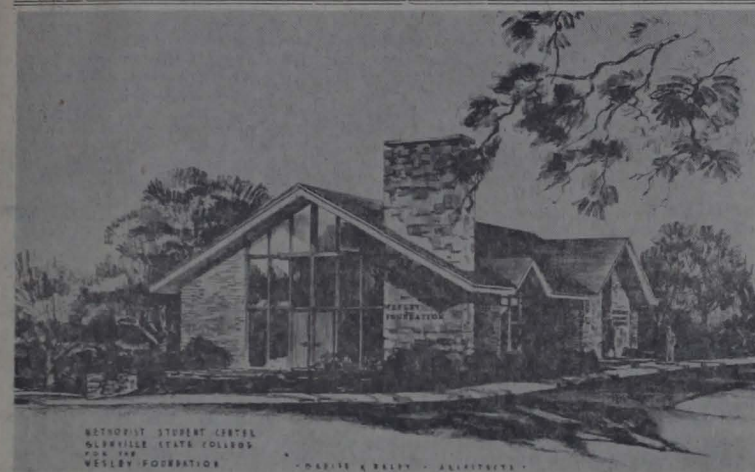

Wesley Foundation Plans New Building On Court St.

Preliminary drawings for a new Wesley Foundation Building have been completed by, Greife & Daley Architects of Charleston. The proposed new building is two story, with entrances on each level. Present plans call for the building to be erected on the site of the now existing Wesley House, on Court Street between Linn & Church Streets.

Architect's drawings call for a building 42 by 87 feet with a terrace in front. A large lounge, with a stone fire-place in the corner will be located on Church Street

level. Also on the Court Street level will be a seminar room, a library, a chapel, a cabinet room, and two offices.

On the level entered into from the Church Street entrance will be a kitchen, large game room, mechanical room, storage, rest rooms, and an apartment for the Associate Director.

The Wesley Foundation work is sponsored by The Methodist Church. Although students of many types of religious background take part in Wesley Foundation, the support comes almost entirely from

Methodists throughout the State of West Virginia.

The Methodist Annual Conference will meet at Buckhannon during the first week of June. At this time they will set plans for many types of work throughout the State; the planning is done every four years and 1960 is the time for this quadrennial emphasis.

At the present time no one knows whether all planned projects will be included in the final plans or not; however the Glenville Wesley Foundation stands a good chance of remaining in this fund-raising drive indicates the Rev. Lawrence Sherwood. If this project remains in the plans, it will not be long before the preliminary drawings may be submitted to the architects for the drawing of the specifications and the letting of bids.

No date can be given at this time as to the probable time when the building may be erected. Pending favorable action by the Annual Conference, there is a possibility that ground may be broken in the not-too-distant future.

A survey team composed of Dr. Harvey Brown, director of Wesley Foundation at Ohio State; Dr. T. Leroy T. Hooper, executive secretary of the Board of Education at Fairmont and others visited with Dr. Hefflin, Dean Higgins and Dean Pickens, Rev. Sherwood and members of Wesley Foundation recently. Topic of discussion was the proposed plan for the new Wesley Foundation.
