Governor Barron Speaks At Banquet Tonight

Dr. Everett M. Rogers Gives Keynote Address

Dr. Everett M. Rogers, rural sociologist, Ohio State University, is addressing the Educational Development Conference being held today on the Glenville State College campus.

Conference members who are attending this all-day meeting today are concerned with carrying out the theme, "Community Action in Area Development."

Other keynote speakers are Governor W. W. Barron and H. Cliff Hamilton, coordinator, W. Va. Cooperative Program in Educational Leadership.

The Honorable Governor W. W. Barron will deliver the banquet address at 6 p.m. in the Dining Hall to climax the day's activities. Governor Barron was inaugurated the 26th governor of West Virginia on Jan. 16, 1961.

The last time a West Virginia governor appeared on the GSC campus was Nov. 20, 1957, when Governor Cecil H. Underwood dedicated the Student Union-Dining Hall Building.

Mr. Hamilton will present a summary of the conference during the banquet session also.

Dean Delmer K. Somerville, director of the conference, will preside over the morning session beginning at 10 a.m. in the college auditorium. Welcoming address will be given by Dr. Harry B. Heflin, president of Glenville State College. Dr. Rogers will follow President Heflin with the Keynote address. Also featured in the morning session is a panel discussion on the topic, "Current Issues of the Conference."

Discussion groups will meet at 1:30 p.m. to discuss problems in areas of agriculture, civic affairs, education, human resources, natural resources, and local community action.

Two competent professors of art from a surrounding college will serve as judges for the event.

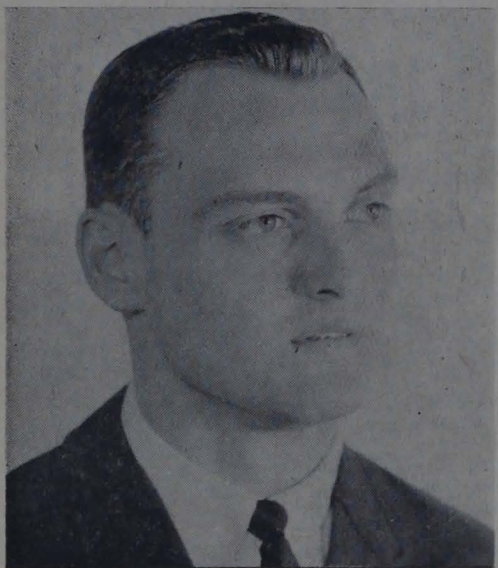
First prize in the oil paintings category is \$25.00; second prize is \$15.00; and third prize is \$10.00.

Some of the things he mentioned along with this idea were equipment for a bowling alley, extension to the dance floor area, enclosed TV room, and greater quantity and variety of refreshments served at the snack bar.

ANOTHER OF METZ'S ideas is to further relationships with other colleges through debates, assemblies, plays, and lectures. Metz feels that improvement of the quality of week-end activities and more liberal dormitory policies would make GSC a better campus community and would keep it up to

date with other colleges.

IF ELECTED, METZ plans to assist the Inter - Organizational Council in its endeavors to make the organizations on campus more closely related.

HE ALSO PLANS to promote better school and community relations in the following ways: 1. Interesting Glenville stores in carrying college styles in clothing. 2. Interesting the community in attending college programs and activities. 3. Interesting college students in helping the community.

Metz feels that the Freshman Orientation program could be made more meaningful and he will endeavor to do this. He also plans to voice ideas and opinions of the students to the faculty and administration and put these ideas into action.

METZ, SON of Mrs. E. C. Metz of 1602 16th Street, Parkersburg, is president of the college and a member of the activities committee.
