

Metz Is Named President Of '61-'62 Student Council

Harold Metz, junior social studies and speech student, was elected president of the Glenville State College Student Council for the coming year in a recent election.

Other officers elected to represent the student body in the Council were Keith Smith, write-in candidate for vice president; Janie Fox, secretary; Edward Grose, treasurer; and Claire Morehead, sergeant-at-arms.

A 66-percent turnout of the GSC enrollment was noted at this year's election. This figure is much smaller than last year's turnout of 79 percent.

Junior class led the number of students voting with 72 per cent of the class participating in the election. Freshmen had 68-per cent turnout, the sophomore class had 63-per cent and the senior class had 50-per cent voting.

Metz, president of the GSC Choir and a member of the activities

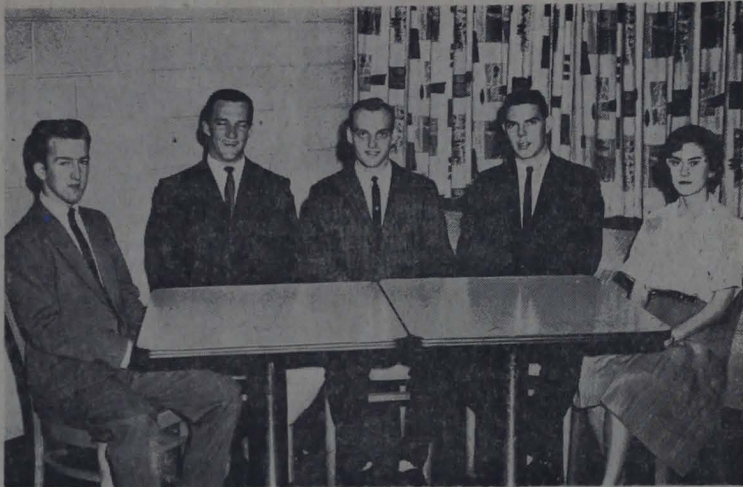
committee, is the son of Mrs. E. C. Metz of Parkersburg.

Following his election, Metz said, "I should like to thank all the people who worked for me during my campaign, as well as those who voted for me. Everyone elected seems to be capable of doing a good job and I believe that we can accomplish much."

Metz has begun making plans "to make my campaign ideas become a reality." Plans are under way to meet with the administration to discuss the idea of an extension to the Student Union. Metz is also making plans to open up more facilities and obtain longer hours in the gymnasium and the library.

Another plan consists of furthering GSC's relationship with other colleges and universities throughout the state with an exchange program. Metz will initiate this

Dr. Boggs Is 1961 Alumnus

Dr. Earl R. Boggs, Dean, College of Education, West Virginia University, has been selected Alumnus of the Year by the Glenville State Alumni Association. Dr. Boggs came to his position at WVU recently from Longwood College, Farmville, Va., where he served as Dean of the College.

Dr. Boggs was graduated from Glenville State College in 1932 with an AB degree with fields in English and social studies. He was granted an MA degree at West Virginia University in 1938; received his Ph.D. degree from George Peabody College in 1949; and

later received an honorary Ph.D. from Morris Harvey College.

Dr. Boggs has served as an elementary teacher in Gilmer County; principal Rosedale Junior High School, Troy High School, and Glenville High School; assistant superintendent of schools, Morgan County; assistant state supervisor high schools; and educational consultant for Roanoke City Schools, Roanoke, Va.

While principal at Glenville High School, he served as director of the teacher training school and a member of the educational faculty (Continued on Page 4)



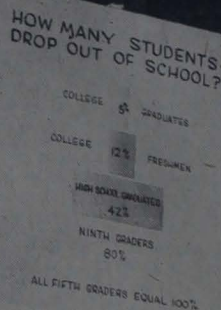
SCENES FROM THE 1961 EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT CONFERENCE

TOMORROW, SEVERAL HUNDRED high school students will be visiting our campus for the entire day. What they see here, what impression they gain, will be largely up to you, the GSC students. College Employees Historical Society Number Eighty-six Will Meet Apr. 28

The total number of full-time employees at Glenville State College is 86 according to a statistics release prepared by Lloyd M. Jones, business manager. This number includes administrative, faculty, clerical, maintenance, and cafeteria workers. Forty-seven of these are men and 39 are women. Sixty-six of these employees are native-born West Virginians, while 19 were born in 12 different states; one employee was born in England.

The average length of employment at Glenville State College for these employees is seven years and eight months. The length of service ranges from one to 31 years. Fifty-seven of the employees are married while 29 are single. The average age of all employees is 44. Seventy-eight of the employees own an automobile, and 42 own their own homes. The total number of persons in the families of these 86 employees is 235. The total monthly payroll for the employees is \$39,380.16.

Gilmer County Historical Society was founded in 1957. Purpose of the Society is to collect and preserve materials of Gilmer County history and to promote interest in family history. Meetings are held quarterly on the fourth Friday evening in January, April, July and October.

The Society has collected and placed material of interest in the West Virginia Room of the Robert F. Kidd Library. These materials are used frequently by students.

Nation Observes Library Week

Americans of all ages, in all 50 states, were alerted to the importance of reading and libraries of all types during the fourth annual celebration of National Library Week, April 16-22.

This year, special emphasis was focused on school libraries. Why are good school libraries more important than ever before to American children? What is a good school library program? How can communities act to secure good school libraries and librarians?

Service Limited in W. Va.

Here in West Virginia, especially, it is important to take a look at our school libraries — where only the high schools and some junior high schools have libraries, where there is no top level supervisor of school libraries who could coordinate work at state level among all schools.

During National Library Week observance in West Virginia, it was hoped that all school librarians made an effort to interpret the school library program to their principals and to the community. Using "Standards for School Library Programs" as an evaluative tool and as a set of goals toward which to strive, the School Library section of WVLA is hoping to raise its standards to meet the minimum requirements.

Glenville Thespians Do Summer Work

Glenville students definitely set for theatre work this summer. Marilou Locke and Rodney Busch will both be technical assistants at the Mateur Playhouse, Standing Stone, Pa. The Mateur Playhouse is operated by the Pennsylvania State University, and it is a professional summer theatre connected with Actors Equity. New York actors are hired for major roles. Randolph Stein, another Glenville graduate, has been in charge of sound and lights at Mateur for the past two years.

James Troy, a senior speech and physical education student, has been hired as a staff announcer for Channel 5, WJPB-TV, Weston. Troy will take over the 6:00 p.m. news on May 1. He has been announcing on the weekends for the past several weeks.

1961-1962 Glenville State College freshman women can look forward to living in the most modern building on the GSC campus. Ground was broken in July, 1960, for this four-story L-shaped building on Court Street, and freshmen women are expected to move into the new residence in September 1961.

Pioneers Lose Opening Contests

Glenville Pioneers dropped the baseball opener to the Wesleyan Bobcats by a 3-1 decision at Buckhannon. Bobcats had six hits to 5 for Glenville. The Pioneers had five errors in the field while the Wesleyan nine had a total of three errors.

Paul Skidmore was the hitting star for the Glenville team as he smashed out a double and a single. He also had the lone RBI for the Pioneers. Carney was the only player scoring for Glenville. Russ Shepherd, the losing pitcher, gave up two runs in the sixth inning and one in the first.

Fall to State
The Pioneers lost their second game of the season at the home diamond April 15 when they were defeated by a W. Va. State team 12-3. The game saw the Pioneers leading after five innings of play 3-1. In the first half of the sixth inning the State nine scored a total of six runs. One of these six was a grand-slam home run hit by Goff, the winning pitcher. This hit came off Jim Stalnaker, the losing pitcher.

Bill Reese saw relief action in the last three innings. He gave up two runs in the eighth and one in the ninth. In the hitting department the Pioneers were led by John Napolitano who connected for a double and a single. Bill Young led in RBIs with two. Tim Carney added the third. The Glenville nine again had 5 errors; they had a total of six hits.

President Heflin reports that plasterers started work the past week on the fourth floor of the building and that a buzzer system has been installed in each room. Marble for the interior of the building has arrived and is ready to be installed.

Furniture orders will be opened on April 25. Each room in the new dormitory will contain two beds; duet desks; two chairs; chest of drawers; a lounge chair; table; built-in-book cases, six feet by eight inches with adjustable shelves; and walk-in closets.

Other features of the dormitory will include an elevator; a recreation room and lounge on the first floor; a laundry room on each floor except first; and a sun deck which has been completed. Kitchenette will be located on third floor. Individual mail boxes

will be available and will be operated by room key. Telephone will be located on each floor and there will be a communication system to each room.

Cold-water fountains will be installed on each floor and venetians shades will be used on the double-hung aluminum windows.

Dr. Heflin as well as Miss Pearl Pickens, Dean of Women, pointed out that all freshman women will be required to live in dormitories next year. Reservations for the new dormitory are still being taken.
