1961 Graduation Festivities Will Begin Saturday

143 Graduates Complete Degrees; Largest Class in GSC History

A TENTATIVE list of 143 graduates has been released from the registrar's office by Miss Erma Edwards, assistant registrar. This is the largest graduating class in the history of the college.

ONE HUNDRED thirty-six seniors will receive their A.B. degrees during the commencement exercises in the college auditorium May 26 at 10:00 a.m. Seven students will also complete associate in arts degrees at this time.

Research Findings Of Dr. Max Ward Published Recently

Dr. Max Ward, professor of biology and Chairman of the Division of Science and Mathematics at Glenville State College, has published three of his articles on research work in basic botany.

"Callus Tissues From the Mosses *Polytichum* and *Atrichum*" was published in *Science Magazine* in Washington, D. C. Nearly forty reprints of this article have been sent to interested botanists all over the world.

"Some Techniques in the Culture of Mosses" deals with aseptic culture of moss tissues in glass. This article was edited in Ottawa, Canada, then published in *Phytologist*, a widely circulated magazine in the United States.

"Vegetative Propagation From Intact Leaves of *Polytichum*" was published in India at the University of Delhi. This article dealt with original findings in vegetative generation of new plants from parent-plant tissues.

These papers represent the latest research work completed in these areas. Dr. Ward has more articles in preparation. The papers are the outgrowth of research for two years at Harvard University under the financial support of the National Science Foundation.

Dr. Ward received his AB degree from GSC, and his MA and Ph.D. degrees from Harvard University.

Rogers, a junior art student at GSC, is the 19-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. S. F. Rogers of Summerville. A Nicholas County High School graduate, Rogers has won the first prize in art in the Nicholas County Fair for the past four years.

Three hundred guests registered for the show, which was held in the art room. There were 109 entries for exhibition and sale.

First prize in oils was won by K. T. Burnside of Parkersburg with "Bird In Space." Second prize painting was "Burst of Life" by Edward Husk, Jr. "City Scene" by Patsy Ashley Given captured third prize in oils.

In the medium of water colors "Boat and Dock" won first place for Dorelene Page Cottrill. "Flower" by Shao Fang Sheng, Williams-town, won second prize. "Black Table" by Sara Broughton of Parkersburg won an honorable mention.

"Age" by Patsy Ashley Given won first prize in graphic arts. Second prize was awarded to Janet Mae Fields for "Loneliness." "Winter Landscape" by Edward Husk, Jr., won an honorable mention.

First prize in crafts was awarded for a mosaic table to Earl B. Moore. In ceramics and sculpture Lewis Snyder, a graduate of GSC who now lives in Athens, Ohio, won both first and second prizes with "Jar with Lid" and "Form Relief Plaque," consecutively. A vase by Earl B. Moore won third prize.

Art show was sponsored by the Palette and Brush Club. Mr. John R. Cooley, assistant professor of art, is the club adviser.

Mr. R. J. Cronauer, judge of this year's exhibition, is associate professor of art education, painting, and crafts at Indiana State College, Indiana, Pa. He received his MFA degree from Columbia University in 1950.

Mr. Cronauer is a member of the Indiana, Pa., Art Association, the Pittsburg Water Color Society, Associated Artists of Pittsburg, and Eastern Art Association. Some of his paintings are in the permanent


