Ohningohow Celebrates 35th Anniversary

WITH THE OPENING of "R.U. R", the Ohningohow Players, the oldest organization on campus, celebrated their 35th anniversary. According to the minutes of the organization, Miss Margaret Dobson, speech instructor, called a meeting on Oct. 8, 1926, of all people interested in forming a dramatics club. Later that year the group adopted their present name, the Ohningohow Players.

THERE WERE 16 charter members who met that night to form the club which has been active ever since.

THE FIRST PERFORMANCE by the organization was given on Dec. 3, 1926. This performance included three one-act plays: "Station YYY" by Booth Tarkington; "Good Night" by Marion Spencer

Smith; and "The Valiant" by Hall and Middlemass. Music for the occasion was provided by the Kanawha Serenaders.

ONE OF THE better known alumni includes Mr. Stanley Hall who joined the Players in 1927. Mr. Hall was the second vice-president of the organization. Dr. Max Ward belonged to the group in 1939 and 1940. Mr. George Howard, a former GSC instructor now at Morris Harvey College, was a member from 1947-49.

SINCE THAT NIGHT in 1926, the Ohningohow Players have made great strides. For the past six years they have been host to the Little Kanawha Drama Festival.

In 1959 THE OHNINGOHOW'S produced "Monique" by Dorothy and Michael Blankfort. The gross

receipts for the play were \$206.00. The audience totaled over 430 which was the largest paying audience ever to attend a play at Glenville State College.

THE ANNUAL AWARDS BANQUET, to which every performer looks forward, was begun in 1960. Awards are presented to Glenville State thespians for best actor, actress; best supporting actor, actress; best student achievement in technical work; best freshman debut. In 1961 an additional award was presented to the best one-act performance.

SINCE 1955, MR. W. S. E. COLEMAN, associate professor of speech and English, has brought to the GSC stage six comedies, nine dramas, five fantasies, five folk plays, two verse plays, plus seven (Continued on Page 2)

The Function of a College

A COLLEGE is, or should be, a place dedicated to the adult pursuit of learning. It is not an advanced high school. Neither is a college a place to be taught the rudiments of education. These basic elements should have been learned in earlier years.

BUT TODAY, our college is confronted with the task of teaching the basic rudiments of education, simply because students were permitted to neglect this learning in early years.

COLLEGE SHOULD remain the capital and fortress of thought and the scholar, as Emerson once said, must be a man thinking. Scholars must think fundamentally, philosophically, and morally.

TRUE, THE NOISE of campus activities fills our ears, but at the heart of the college, there should always be a zone of silence. This quiet and protected place is where our best men can discover truth, preserve it, and diffuse it, not as service but as idea.

THIS SEARCH for truth begins in curiosity, but dedication to curiosity should not end in indecision. It has been said of indecision that "there are two schools of thought on this question, and the truth probably lies halfway between them." This is not to insinuate that the truth lies halfway between right and wrong, but rather, that the truth lies between two extremes.

CURIOSITY ULTIMATELY ends in communication, and for the scholar only two methods of communication are available — writing and speaking.

AND SO, this brings us to what is expected of a college student. Above all, the faculty expects four years of scholarship and they will be satisfied with nothing less.

A COLLEGE expects us to join in the search for truth. Be curious, follow our minds into the gaps. Nobody will learn all the answers, but we will learn some truths and they should help to change our opinions.

OUR COLLEGE YEARS will be wasted if we leave college thinking very much the same way that we do when we enter, or if we leave the college faculty thinking the same way they do now.

CHALLENGE THE faculty, challenge learning, challenge college. Be curious. Search for the truth and communicate it to others.

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Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor:

Recently I have heard much discussion on and off campus concerning the various discriminations against married women at Glenville State College. If these reports are true and I say if, then surely some change needs to be brought about, and quickly.

At Glenville State College it is impossible for a married woman to be a cheerleader, a Homecoming Queen, or a member of the Queen's court; yet there are no such restrictions involved in being a majorette. At one time last year, GSC was represented by seven female majorettes; three were married.

Is there that much difference between a majorette and a cheerleader? Both represent the college at public events. One is condoned; the other forbidden.

The names of the married women in the senior class (who were otherwise qualified) were omitted from the ballot for 1961 Homecoming Queen. Yet the first Homecoming Queen ever crowned at Glenville State College (1938) was MRS. Lois Mason Mace at the time of her coronation.

Perhaps many students thought a particular married woman was the best choice for a Queen, but there was no chance to voice such an opinion. These names were omitted from the ballot.

The same was true in the other classes. Class presidents announced that those having below a 2.0 average or those who were married were automatically disqualified as candidates for Homecoming princess.

Those responsible for this decision no doubt had a good reason for their action, but the reason was not announced with the decision. This lack of explanation caused the dissatisfaction.

Married women living on campus pay the same dormitory fees and are expected to follow the same rules and regulations as the single women. But there is a difference—the married women have no choice as to their preference for a residence hall as do single women. All married women are automatically placed in Verona Maple Hall. Again those making the decision had their reasons, but these reasons are not always explained.

Glenville State College is a state-supported school, supposedly free of all discrimination toward its student body, but is this true? It seems to me that discrimination is

here in one of its worst forms — discrimination because of someone's personal life.

Every student attending GSC should expect and should receive the same privileges, regardless of marital status. In classes this is true. No division is made between married and single students. EVERY student is expected to study and to learn.

But then, turn to non-scholastic activities and discrimination rears its ugly head. A neat line is being slowly drawn between who can do this and who MUST do that, who can live here or there and who MUST live there.

These are a few of the topics under discussion on the GSC campus today. In the future I hope there is adequate explanation to accompany decisions of this kind. May the lines of communication be kept open between those who advocate what to do and those of us who have to do.

Dr. David Ernest, director, points out that many activities including a spring tour are being planned. Any student who can play an instrument and is interested in band is invited to attend practices of the concert band.

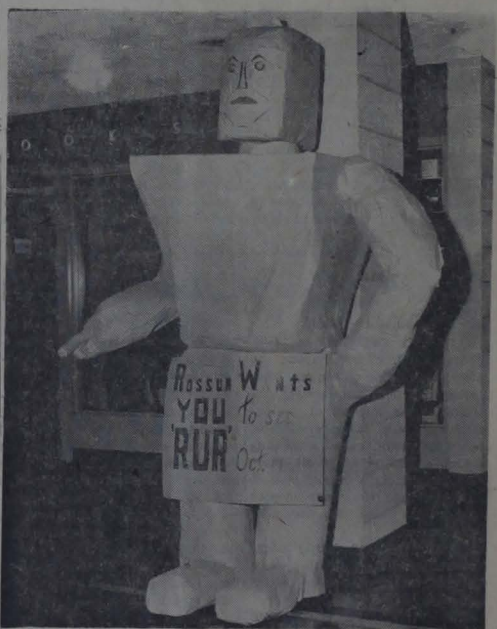

Tom Gunnoe Scores Glenville Touchdown In Bobcat Contest

West Virginia Wesleyan Bobcats handed the Glenville Pioneers their second setback of the season 20-6, Saturday, Oct. 14, at Buckhannon.

The Wesleyan homecoming affair was played through a cold and constant drizzle, but the Bobcats turned on their own heat to capture the hard-fought game.

Pioneers could not contend with the Wesleyan ground game as Jim Hawkins, Bill Wood and Dan Pearce constantly tore holes in the usually strong Pioneer defensive line.

Bobcats dominated the first and second quarters with two long touchdown drives. The first score was registered by Bill Wood on an eight-yard run over left tackle ending an 80-yard march. Gene Rall converted for a 7-0 score.

After Wesleyan had moved 64 yards in the second quarter, Bobcat Quarterback Charles Emery sneaked over from the one. The extra point was wide and Glenville trailed 13-0.

Pioneers threatened seriously just once in the first half. Quarterback Ollie Pottmeyer hooked up with end Romeo Williams on a 46-yard pass play to take the ball to the Bobcat 22. Wesleyan then took over on downs and the half ended 13-0.

In the third quarter fullback Jim Hawkins plowed over from the six. Rall split the uprights and the score was 20-0.

With four minutes left, Tom Gunnoe, playing a great game, struck paydirt with a 26-yard burst around left end. Keith Smith's conversion try was wide and Wesleyan led 20-6.

Passing of freshman Paul Taylor, Tom Gunnoe, and Joe Duncan, plus the fine receiving of Bob Summers engineered a final Glenville threat which ended on the Bobcat four-yard line as the clock clicked off the final seconds.

White Wave defense was led by guard Bill Shinn, tackle Pete Spencer, end Keith Smith and line-backer Larry Legg. Gunnoe led the offensive rushing with 77 yards in 12 carries. Pottmeyer threw three strikes for 76 yards while Summers snared four passes for 40 yards.

Wesleyan led in first downs 19-11 and rushing yardage 236 to 95. The

passing favored Glenville 127 to 81.

Davis - Elkins

Glenville Pioneers shut-out the Davis-Elkins Senators 13-0 Saturday, Oct. 7, at Elkins.

G-Men scored early in the first quarter as linebacker Larry Legg blocked a punt on the Davis-Elkins eight-yard stripe and end Keith Smith recovered the loose ball in the end zone. A fumble resulted in the try for the extra point and Glenville led 6-0.

Neither team could spark an offensive threat until the third quarter when D-E drove to the GSC 16-yard line. Seconds later Legg came to the rescue again by recovering a Senator fumble on the 15-yard line.

Ollie Pottmeyer then engineered an impressive 85-yard Pioneer flight which ended with a four-yard scoring loss from Pottmeyer to end Bob Summers. Keith Smith converted and Glenville jumped ahead 13-0.

During the previous drive solid blocking by Bud Hammett, Paul Anderson, Bill Kinzer, Pete Spencer and John Napolitano opened gapping holes which saw Tom Gunnoe and Phil Clarke eat up valuable yardage.

The exceptional passing of quarterbacks Don Fowler and Dave Pingley, plus the neat receiving of end Bill Howard were the D-E bright spots.

Pioneer defense was led by Bill Shinn, Vince Post, John Quintrell and Larry Legg. Ed Drake picked off a Senator pass for Glenville's only interception.

White Wave led in rushing yardage 166 to 78 but trailed in first downs 12-11 and passing yardage 105 to 44.

With five games completed, Glenville State College has three backfield men with 100 yards or more rushing. Freshman halfback Joe Duncan leads with 231 yards for a 6.6 average.

Sophomore halfback Tom Gunnoe is second with 163 for a 4.7 average and Senior fullback Phil Clarke rounds out the list with a 5.5 average from 125 yards.

Bob Basso, who dropped out of school two weeks ago, was the leading Pioneer passer. He had completed 14 tosses in 28 attempts for a total of 293 yards and four touchdowns.

Ollie Pottmeyer has hit 6-13 for 105 yards.

Bob Summers, senior end, has caught 10 aerials for 114 yards while the other end Romeo Williams, has snagged 6 for 175 yards.

*Keith Smith, junior end, leads in the punting department with 693 yards in 18 kicks for a 38.5 average.

Smith and Duncan lead the scoring parade with 19 and 18 points respectively.

Gene Lilly and his wife, the former Amanda Jo Stalnaker, 1961 graduates, are living in Buffalo Gap, Va. Lilly is assistant coach at Craigsville (Va.) High School.
