The preliminary sketch for expansion entails the addition of a radio broadcasting room, a recreational area, possible to include ping pong and pool, a bowling area to include two lanes with a possible expansion later. ### For Effort, We Offer Praise

Efforts are many; rewards are few. Student Council officers and adviser spend time-consuming hours in serving students and the college. Frequently they feel as if they have accomplished little and seldom do they receive any recognition for work well done. If there is criticism, it is more often negative than positive.

The Council strives to serve the students, for it is the representative voice of the students. The Council has made several efforts during the current year to improve student life at GSC.

EFFORTS ARE MANY . . . Glenville students were dissatisfied with the entertainment available on campus; the Council sponsored a performance by the Four Freshmen . . . REWARDS ARE FEW . . . a financial loss was suffered because students did not attend.

OFFICERS AND ADVISERS GIVE TIME-CONSUMING HOURS IN SERVING . . . the Council meets every Tuesday evening, sometimes spending hours in discussions and making plans for improvement at GSC. Much of an officer's spare time is used to carry forth Council buisness.

The Council officers are a modest group; they never boast about their accomplishments. Occasionally, someone thinks to congratulate the group, but more often, officers RECEIVE LIT-TLE OR NO RECOGNITION FOR A JOB WELL DONE. Such events as the Homecoming, Who's Who election, even the Council election itself, are taken for granted by students. Students apparently think the events have always been and will continue to be; they never stop to realize that much planning and work by the Council lies behind the success of each of these

IF THERE IS CRITICISM IT IS MORE OFTEN NEGA-TIVE . . . the Council ruled that married women would not be eligible for selection as cheerleader or Homecoming Court member in an effort to consider the financial burden such a choice might place on some of the couples if the wife were chosen; married women on campus looked upon the ruling as an attempt to exclude them from the social life of Glenville State . . . THAN POSITIVE . . . the MERCURY received one letter early this fall praising the Council for its efforts to make Homecoming a suc-

Student Council officers are usually slighted and neglected simply because rather than praise, we tend to gripe.

The position of a Student Council officer is a precarious one he is open to criticism, degradation, attacks, even ridicule by disgruntled students. But it is also a rewarding position, for the officer is trying to make Glenville State College better and bigger.

If reward can come through effort and dedication, then we think the 1961-62 officers have earned that reward. Many times defeat and disillusionment are the result of their work. Few times success and satisfaction are the result-

Gassaway High School and Sutton High School participated in the Fair. One of the directors, Mr. Lowell K. Knight, is a Glenville State graduate.


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
