### Through the Years

#### With The Student Council

STUDENT COUNCIL was first organized on Sept. 16, 1935. Lloyd Matheny of Terra Alta was the first president.

IN THE SECOND ELECTION April 28, 1936, more than 95 per cent of the student body voted. This election climaxed a week of campaigning in which parades were held and student speeches were made. On election eve both factions sponsored parades which went through Main Street and ended at Verona Mapel Hall where students spoke briefly. Bantz Craddock, Jr., of Glenville was selected president.

FIRST WOMAN PRESIDENT was Catherine Withers of Glenville elected in 1943. There have been two other women presidents: Janette Cunningham 1944 - 1945, and Iolene Harding 1959 - 1960. In 1943 - 44 and again in 1944 - 1945 all members of the Council were women except the sergeant at arms.

MR. NICHOLAS MURIN was sergeant at arms in 1941 - 1942 and Mr. Murin was SC president 1946 - 1947.

DR. ROBERT HIGGINS served as president 1948 - 1949; Dr. Clarence Maze, Jr., was secretary 1952 - 1953.

APRIL 29, 1952, the Council's proposal to raise the activity fee from \$5 to \$10 was voted on by the student body. The proposal carried 181 - 59.

### In Campus Election

## Officers Will Be Named, SU Expansion At Stake

Polls will open at 9 a.m. and close at 4 p.m. tomorrow in the Student Union. More than the election of student government officials is at stake in this student election. In addition to the listing of candidates, the ballot will also contain a provision for the extension of the Student Union.

No student announced his candidacy for the top position President of the Council, by April 1, deadline for candidates to submit their names and platforms. At the time the MERCURY went to press the names of Larry Wolfe and Bill Maxwell were being mentioned as possible write-in candidates.

Wolfe, a junior from Glenville, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Woodrow Wolfe; Maxwell is a junior from Dunbar and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles B. Maxwell.

Students will also vote tomorrow on the tentative plans to expand the Student Union. Plans for the extension of the Union were carried in the April 4 MERCURY, and a special assembly was held the past Thursday for further presentation of these plans. Student leader, Dr. Heflin and other spoke concerning these plans.

At this special assembly, candidates spoke briefly and presented their platforms.

Preliminary sketch for expansion entails the addition of a radio broadcasting room, a recreational area to include ping pong and pool, a bowling area to include two lanes with a possible expansion later. Also included in the recreation section of the tentative plans is the addition of a new ballroom.

In the new plans the Book Store would be located on the street level. Additional study booths could be provided, snack bar would be enlarged and an enlarged TV area

would be included in the plans.

Students are being asked to vote on this proposal and if they indicate that they desire these changes by a good showing of votes, the tentative plans for the Union expansion will be recommended to the State Board of Education for consideration. If the Board accepts the plans, the student union fee will be increased by \$5 each semester or a total semester fee of \$8.

On Oct. 31, 1955, Glenville State College students were asked to vote on a proposed new student union for the campus. At that time, the students gave an overwhelming vote in favor of the proposed project. Recorded in the Nov. 9, 1955, MERCURY: "... an overwhelming vote of 245 votes to five in a balloting staged in the Club Pioneer." Students were asked to pay a student union fee of \$2.50 a semester. In this manner students indicated the desire for the new building which was dedicated by Governor Cecil Underwood on Nov. 20, 1957.

## 4th Annual Art Exhibit Is Set for 5-Day Showing

The fourth annual Art Exhibit and Sale, sponsored by the art department and by Tau (Palette and Brush Club) will be held from Thursday, May 3, through, Monday, May 7. Showing will be in Louis Bennett Lounge and the hours for the exhibit on Sunday will be 1 to 6 p.m.

Exhibits entries will be in water color, graphic arts, sculpture, ceramics, oil paintings and crafts. Prizes will be awarded and Glenville business establishments are again "backers of the show."

All Glenville State College art majors and minors are required to have at least four entries in the show. Any other Glenville State College students who are interested in art may submit work for the exhibition. Paintings and work will be for sale.

The deadline for entries is April 28 and the entry fee is \$1. Entry forms may be obtained from Carolyn Brisendine, Sandra Williams or James Rogers.

The first sidewalk art show was held here on May 10, 1959, under the direction of the Palette and Brush Club and Mr. John Cooley, assistant professor of art at that time. "Sea Scape" and oil painting by Mary Ann Graham won the best in the show that year. There were 123 entries for exhibition and sale.

Dr. Miller took over the presidency of WVU the past January, and he is the first alumnus to assume the office in more than half a century.

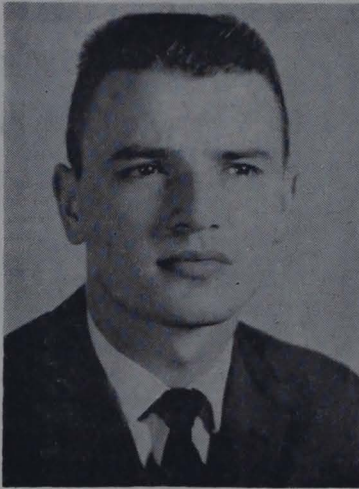


## John Hopson Vies for V-P

## Reese Pitches G-Men to Victory; W. Va. State Falls 8-2 in Opener

Despite mud, cold, and rain the Pioneers won their opener against West Virginia State 8-2. Before the game played here April 11, there were many doubts on the minds of coaches, fans and players. When the game was over most of these doubts had vanished.

Bill Reese hurled his way to a 3-hit victory for his initial win. Reese pitched the first seven innings when Larry Kitzmiller came to finish. Reese's pitching was one of the outstanding features of the game as he allowed only two runs on three hits and struck out six. For his two innings, Kitzmiller allowed no hits and no runs.

The Pioneers did well for themselves offensively with nine hits. Joe Duncan and Bud Hammett were the big sticks for the cause with 2 for 4 and 2 for 3 respectively. Shortstop Paul Taylor made a fine showing as he blasted a two-run homer in the fifth. Both Duncan and Taylor are freshmen.

Lack of experience was more recognizable when the Pioneers took the field. Errors were frequent but more on the order of carelessness than lack of ability. This is only to be expected when breaking in three freshmen and two upperclassmen at new positions. The team in general showed good potential and promise of a good season.

Most of Glenville's scoring was done in the fourth inning. Terry Dutton started it all off with a double. Reese, Proctor, and Taylor walked; the first run of the inning came on Taylor's walk. Young followed by rapping out a single to drive home two. Hammett then drew a base-on-balls and Duncan came through with a two bagger for the final two rbi's of the inning. The other scoring was on a double by Hammett in the first and Taylor's homerun in the fifth.

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## Book Review

**BLACK LIKE ME** (1960) tells the true experiences of author John Howard Griffin when he became a Negro for seven weeks.

Mr. Griffin, in 1959, decided to find out what it is like to be a Negro in the deep South. In New Orleans, a dermatologist gave him a medication, which, along with sun lamp treatments, made his skin the color of a dark Negro. This changing process took only five days.

Taking a duffel bag and a supply of the drug, Griffin hitchhiked through the deep South, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and seven weeks. **BLACK LIKE ME** is a diary of his journey through the South and the treatment he received there.

He learns what it is to always ride in the rear of a bus, to search for miles across a city for a glass of water or a restroom, to buy a bus ticket, to try to cash a traveler's check.

Often times Griffin stops taking the drug, stays indoors until his skin is white again, and then goes back through the same places he visited as a Negro. When his skin

is white, Griffin is welcomed by the white citizenship, treated with kindness and consideration; and he is hated and feared by the Negroes. In contrast, when his skin is dark, Griffin is ridiculed, ignored, hated by the white citizens and taken into the Negro homes, loved and aided by all members of a family.

The book presents a look at the enormous barrier still existing between black and white, that high wall of hostility and prejudice. Mississippi and Alabama are like prisons for the Negro; only in Atlanta does the author find a ray of hope. Here the Negro has progressed to a more equal level with the white race; there is understanding and justice.

When Griffin returns to his hometown of Mansfield, Texas, and publishes the articles about his experiment, he is cut off from the society of the town. His family received threatening phone calls and Griffin is burned in effigy on Main Street. The South, surprisingly, responds to the articles in just the opposite manner — only one letter out of every hundred which Griffin received was abusive.

"The Serpent's Tooth," excerpts from Shakespeare's plays, will compete against other college plays at Fairmont State College on May 5. Mr. Coleman will direct the play with the assistance of Pat Horner. Percy Wilcox is in charge of stage and sound.

"Smythe," a one-act play, is being directed by James Booth. Cast is Smythe, William Spelbring; Jameison, Linda Lambotte; Bentley, Michael Posey; Mary, Mary Beil. "Smythe" was written by Mr. Coleman.

"Plum to the Plums," written by Harry Lynch, is the second of the twin bill. This play will be directed by Mr. Coleman and contains a cast of six. Terry Kennedy will portray George; Pat Britton, George; Frank Beall, Harry; Marg Hofmann, Harriet; Bill Shinn, the plumer; and Phil Ramsey will be the clown.

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## Book Selection Will Be Taught During Summer

Dean Delmer K. Somerville has announced that all students who plan to graduate with the class of 1963 (this will include those students who are completing their junior year or who have completed six semesters of work or its equivalent) will be expected to take the comprehensive examinations this spring. Dean Somerville has also announced that English 430, Book Selection, which is required for library science students, will not be offered during the 1962-63 school year.
