STUDENT COUNCIL was first organized on Sept. 16, 1935. Lloyd Matheny of Terra Alta was the first president-

IN THE SECOND ELECTION April 28, 1936, more than 95 per cent of the student body voted. This election climaxed a week of campaigning in which parades were held and student speeches were made. On election eve both factions sponsored parades which went through Main Street and ended at Verona Mapel Hall where students spoke briefly. Bantz Craddock, Jr., of Glenville was selected president.

FIRST WOMAN PRESIDENT was Catherine Withers of Glenville elected in 1943. There have been two other women presidents: Janette Cunningham 1944 - 1945, and Iolene Harding 1959 1960. In 1943 - 44 and again in 1944 - 1945 all members of the Council were women except the sergeant at arms.

MR. NICHOLAS MURIN was sergeant at arms in 1941 - 1942 MERCURY went to press the names and Mr. Murin was SC president 1946 - 1947.

DR. ROBERT HIGGINS served as president 1948 - 1949; Dr. Clarence Maze, Jr., was secretary 1952 - 1953.

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Book Review

BLACK LIKE ME (1960) tells the true experiences of author John Howard Griffin when he became Negro for seven weeks.

Mr. Griffin, in 1959, decided to find out what it is like to be a Negro in the deep South. In New Orleans, a dermatologist gave him a medication which, along with sun lamp treatments, made his skin the color of a dark Negro. This changing process took only five days.

Taking a duffel bag and a supply Taking a duriel bag and a supply
of the drug, Griffin hitchhiked through the deep South, Alabama, Mississippi, Loulsana and seven weeks,
BLACK LIKE ME is a diary of
his journey through the South and
the treatment he received there.

He learns what it is to always ride in the rear of a bus, to search for miles across a city for a glass of water or a restroom, to buy a bus ticket, to try to cash a travler's

Often times Griffin stops taking

is white, Griffin is welcomed by the white citizenship, treated with kind-ness and consideration; and he is hated and feared by the Negroes In contrast, when his skin is dark. Griffin is ridiculed, ignored, hated by the white citizens and taken into the Negro homes, loved and aided by all members of a family.

The book presents a look at the enormous barrier still existing between black and white that high wall of hostility and prejudice. Mississippi and Alabama are like prisons for the Negro; only in At-lanta does the author find a ray of hope. Here the Negro has progress-ed to a mote equal level with the white race; there is understanding and instice

When Griffin hometown of Mansfield, Texas, and publishes the articles about his experiment, he is cut off from the society of the town. His family received threatening phone calls and Griffin is burned in effigy on Main Street.
