Dr. Ward is 1962 'Alumnus of Year'

Dr. Max Ward, chairman of the division of science and mathematics and professor of botany, has been selected by the Alumni Association as their "Alumnus of the Year" for 1962.

Dr. Ward is a native of Calhoun County. He joined the staff at Glenville State College in 1948. He earned his AB degree at Glenville State, and his MA and PhD degrees at Harvard University. Since

that time, he has spent two years at Harvard University on a research grant from the National Science Foundation. During the current year, and the coming year, he is a recipient of additional grants from the National Science Foundation to continue his research projects.

In April, 1962, he was invited to London to present a paper to the Linnean Society dealing with his

research project. While there, he visited the laboratories of fellow researchers of Paris and England.

Dr. Ward is married to the former Grace L. Winarski, of Stevens Point, Wisconsin. They have two daughters, Marjorie and Barbara.

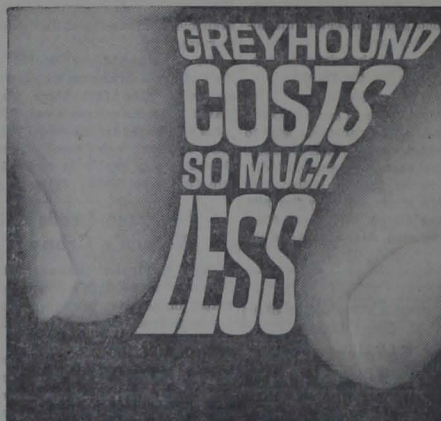
ON SUNDAY, May 13, Mother's Day, the girls attended church services with Mrs. Payne and then ate dinner with her at the Colonial Dining Room.
