Glenville State College has a total enrollment of 957, an increase of 104 over the past year. Men out-number women 453 to 343 on cam-pus, but the women hold a lead of 86 to 23 in extension classes. All classes except the freshman class had substantial increases over last year. The freshman class dropped 97 year. 27.

27. There are 300 freshmen: 174 men, 126 women; 217 sophomores; 126 men, 91 women; 146 juniors; 72 men, 74 women; 130 seniors; 80 men, 50 women. There are three special students making full-time campus enrollment of 796. Part-time resident enrollment is 52 and the 957 total. the 957 total






