'Two Women' Set for Oct. 8

Sophia Loren will star in the academy award winning film "Two Women" Oct. 8. The Italian film, a powerful drama of a woman and her 13-year-old daughter trying to stay alive in strife-torn Italy during World War II, brought Sophia Loren the Best Actress award from both the Cannes Festival and U.S. Academy Awards.

Leaving Rome for a small mountain village because of Allied bombings, Cesira (Sophia Loren) there falls in love with a disillusioned school teacher (Belmondo). One day a group of retreating Germans force the teacher to guide them across the mountains, and Cesira decides to return to Rome with her daughter. Enroute in a terrifyingly realistic sequence, they are brutally raped by some Moroccan soldiers in the ruins of a bombed-out church.

French Film First

"The Sheep Has Five Legs" starring Fernandel was shown on Sept. 24. The French comedy demonstrated Fernandel's mighty skill as a comedian as he played the part of six characters. This film opened the most successful foreign film series of the three years that the series has been in existence.

Mr. W.S.E. Coleman, associate professor of speech, has declared the membership drive for the foreign film series an overwhelming success. The enthusiasm shown for the foreign film series has been greater than ever before.

Enrollment Reaches 957 For Semester

Glenville State College has a total enrollment of 957, an increase of 104 over the past year. Men outnumber women 453 to 343 on campus, but the women hold a lead of 86 to 23 in extension classes. All classes except the freshman class had substantial increases over last year. The freshman class dropped 27.

There are 300 freshmen: 174 men, 126 women; 217 sophomores: 128 men, 91 women; 146 juniors: 72 men, 74 women; 130 seniors: 80 men, 50 women. There are three special students making full-time campus enrollment of 796. Part-time resident enrollment is 52 and the extension enrollment is 109 for the 957 total.

Pioneers Defeat Potomac; Fall Before West Liberty

A stout defense led the Glenville Pioneers to their first win of the season as they defeated the Potomac State Catamounts 20-7, Sept. 22, at Rohrbough Field.

The Pioneers, who lost to a strong West Liberty team in the opener, broke on top in the first quarter when John Lustig went around end for a 15-yard score, after a 78-yard drive. Tom Gunnoe added to the drive with an 18-yard scamper. Keith Smith made the extra point and the Pioneers were ahead to stay.

In the second quarter, Joe Duncan hit Tom Gunnoe with a pass on the Catamounts 2-yard line, after a punt by the visitors. Following a five-yard penalty, Larry Legg hit the middle of the Potomac State line twice, going over from the two in his final attempt. Smith's extra point try failed, giving the Pioneers the lead 13-0 at the half.

Legg Scores

After a fumble by Louis Nocida, which was returned 23 yards, the Catamounts scored on a nine-yard pass. The Pioneers then added their insurance touchdown when Larry Legg scored from the three-yard line, after a pass from Ernie Moore to Keith Smith put the ball on the three.

Statistically, the Pioneers dominated the contest, outgaining the visitors 191 to 66 on the ground and 113 to 40 in the air. Glenville also was superior in the first-down column with 15 as opposed to 6 for the Catamounts.

Nocida, who gained 44 yards; Legg, and Keith Smith, who caught five passes for 77 yards, led the Pioneers on offense, while Gunnoe, Legg, and Erwin led in the number of tackles on defense.

Hilltoppers Prove Strong

The strong and reserve-deep

West Liberty Hilltoppers defeated the Glenville State College Pioneers 28-13 at West Liberty in the opening game for both teams, Sept. 15. Although trailing 13-7 at the half, the Hilltoppers came back strong with three second-half touchdowns.

Glenville drew first blood when Nocida scored on a two-yard plunge, after Harold Erwin had picked up a West Liberty fumble on the five-yard line and plunged to the two. Smith's try for the extra point was wide.

The Hilltoppers came storming back with a march of their own after a return of punts by both teams. They hit pay dirt with a 31-yard pass from Quarterback Hamilton to end Prantel. Burns then hit his first of four straight extra point tries.

In the second quarter, Larry Legg broke up a West Liberty drive with a pass interception that he returned 36 yards, to the Hilltoppers' 23-yard line. Short yardage plunges into the line paid off for Glenville as Ernie Moore went over the goal line from the one-yard line. Smith's extra point try was good, making the score 13-7 at the half.

W-L Passing Effective

In the third quarter, the Hilltopper's passing combo of Hamilton to Prantel scored the second of their three touchdowns. After a fumble by Gunnoe on the Glenville 29-yard line, West Liberty hit pay dirt three plays later on a 19-yard pass.

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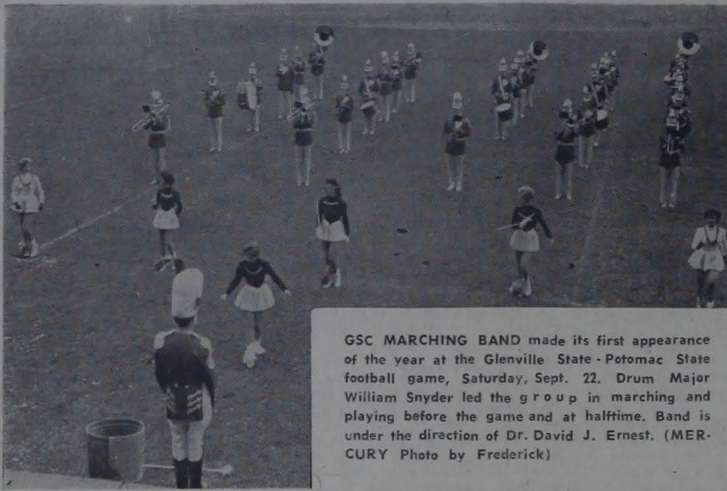

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W. Faulkner Is Literary Society Discussion Topic

The late William Faulkner was the topic of discussion at the first meeting of the Glenville State College Literary Society on Sunday Sept. 23 in Louis Bennett Lounge. Faulkner, who died of a heart attack the past summer, is considered to be one of America's greatest authors.

He spent most of his life in Oxford, Miss., and used that locale as the setting for many of his works. Faulkner's background corresponds roughly to the pattern of his work. He wrote about the world he knew.

In Malcolm Cowley's "Viking Portable Faulkner" Cowley said, "No author has a higher standing among his fellow novelists. Faulkner's novels have the quality of being absorbed, lived, remembered, rather than merely observed."

The stimulating discussion of William Faulkner's life and works was led by Barbara Jafferles, Janet Long, Judith Depoy, and Carol Cosby.

Among those present at the meeting were Dr. B. W. Miller, chairman of the division of language and William Coleman, associate professor of speech.

The topic for discussion at the next Literary Society meeting will be satire.

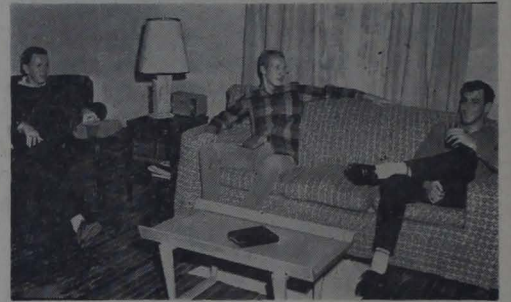
Mrs. Eva Taylor, assistant house director at Women's Hall in 1961-62 is now head house director at the same dormitory.
