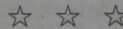
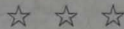
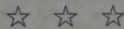

Homecoming Set for Saturday

Activities Begin With Parade;
Mr. Toth Is General Chairman

Homecoming activities will begin at 10 a.m. Saturday with the annual Homecoming Parade. The parade will feature campus organization floats, the freshman class, the GSC band and visiting bands.

Bands expected to participate in the activities include Burns-ville High School (Queen Betty Ann's Band), Elkins Junior High School, Jane Lew High School, Sutton High School, Wanama High School, Weston High School and Wirt County High School.

Mr. Lonnie Fitzpatrick of Glenville will serve as parade chairman. Mr. Frank Toth, GSC assistant professor of science, will serve as general chairman for the Homecoming activities.

Prizes will be awarded to campus organization floats in the parade. First, second, and third prizes will be given.

Immediately following the parade, Miss Brown and her Court, college officials, alumni, students, and guests will move to the coronation site on the college campus where Dr. Heflin will crown Queen Betty Ann.

Following the coronation there will be a coffee hour in Louis Bennett Lounge. Time is 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Coffee and doughnuts will be served at the informal gathering.

The GSC Agriculture Club is sponsoring a barbecue dinner as a part of Homecoming activities. Chicken dinners, at \$1.25 per plate, will be served from 11-1 and from 5-7.

Theta Xi men are holding an Open House as a part of the day's activities. This is the first fraternity house associated with the GSC campus. House will be open prior to and following the football game.

The annual Homecoming football clash will be played this year between the Glenville Pioneers and the W.Va. Wesleyan Bobcats. The Pioneers have not lost a Homecoming game for the past six years.

Davis and Elkins fell to the White Wave 36-0 in the 1960 contest and the Pioneers downed the Concord Mountain Lions 20-14 in the 1961 clash. Game time is 2 p.m. at Rohrbough Field.

Johnny Vass and His Orchestra, Uniontown, Pa., will provide music for the Annual Homecoming Dance to be held in the College Gymnasium from 9-12 p.m. Saturday. Tickets will be \$4 for couples and \$2.50 single. The Johnny Vass Orchestra is one of the top dance bands in the tri-state area.

James Rogers, senior from Marlinton, formerly of Summersville, was selected by the student body to serve as Pioneer for the 29th-annual Homecoming.

Rogers, 20-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. S. F. Rogers of Marlinton, is an art student. He is a member of the Holy Roller Court, Alpha Rho Tau, IOC, "Kanawhachen," MAA, and was selected to "Who Who's" his junior year.

Rogers began his career as 23rd GSC Pioneer on Saturday, Sept. 22, when he attended the home game between the Glenville Pioneers and Potomac State. He also attended the Pioneer-W.Va. State game here Saturday, Oct. 6 and the high light of his career will be Homecoming.

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Film Society Will Present 'Rosemary'

"Rosemary," starring Nadja Tiller, Peter Van Eyck and Carl Radatz will be shown in Louis Bennett Lounge on Monday, Oct. 22 at 3:35 and 8 p.m.

The film is a satire look at upper and lower strata life during the 'economic wonder,' the post-war boom and recovery in Germany.

The film is also interesting because it includes authentic cabaret music. The ironic detachment, a major German characteristic, is enhanced in this film by the use of musical interludes, asides, and commentary not directly related to the story.

It might be noted that "Rosemary" actually existed, and once created a scandal similar to the scandal in the film.

This is the first year that this film has been released for foreign film societies.

SEVEN CLASSES ARE OFFERED IN EXTENSION

Glenville State College extension classes have been organized for the fall semester, 1962-63. Seven classes are offered in five locations.

The number enrolled in extension classes has been released by Mr. Beryl Langford, registrar. There are 109 students enrolled; 86 women and 23 men.

Cedar Lakes — The courses taught are Art 306, 311, 326. Mr. Charles Scott, assistant professor of art, is teaching these classes. There are 16 students enrolled; classes meet Wednesday night.

Clay — World Geography (Geography 303) is taught Thursday night by Dr. James G. Jones, professor of history and social science. Twenty-one students are enrolled in the class.

Craigsville — American History, 1865 to present (Hist. 208) is taught each Tuesday night by Mr. Judge Watson, assistant professor of history. There are 16 students in the class.

Parkersburg — Mr. Ira McDowell is teaching Human Development (Educ. 101). Enrolled in the class which meets each Monday night are 33 students.

Webster Springs — Geography 303 is being taught by Miss Mabel Nichols each Monday night. The number enrolled in the class is 23.

Pioneers Lose to Concord Hold 13-6 Halftime Lead

The Concord Mountain Lions scored 13 points in the last half to overcome a 13-6 Pioneer lead at halftime and retain the lead in the conference, when the teams met at Athens Sept. 29. Concord scored the winning touchdown on a 38-yard reverse pass from Quarterback Cassidy to End Tom Munsey with 6:24 left on the clock.

Glenville scored first as Ernie Moore recovered a Concord fumble and returned it to the Lions 19; a pass interception and another fumble gave the ball to the Pioneers once again.

A 13-yard pass from Pottmeyer to Duncan put the ball on Concord's 21; three plays later, Pottmeyer hit End Paul Anderson with the first touchdown. Duncan's pass to Anderson was good for the extra point.

Yontz scored from 38 yards away, after a Glenville punt fell

short, to make the score 7-6 after one quarter. Concord then tried to score the go-ahead touchdown by passing, but their attempt failed as Harold Erwin intercepted a Cassidy pass and raced 43 yards to pay-dirt, with 13 seconds left on the clock. Extra point try was blocked.

After Louie Nocida fumbled following the second half kickoff, the Mountain Lions hit rapidly as fullback Hicks scored on a 16-yard off-tackle play. Glenville once again was unable to move the ball and punted. Concord followed with a punt which landed on the Glenville two.

Nocida then fumbled on the nine-yard line, but a strong White Wave defense held and took over on the three. After Nocida quick-kicked, three plays later Concord scored the clinching points. The Pioneers then drove to the Concord 21, but a pass failed to end the drive. The Mountain Lions were in a possession and the clock ran out.

Summers Gets Montrose Award

Robert Lee 'Summers, a 1962 graduate of Glenville State College, has been awarded the tenth annual Frank Montrose Award. This coveted honor is based upon scholarship as well as athletic ability.

Summers played two years of football for the Pioneers, and in his senior year was named to the All-Conference Team. He also lettered in basketball for one year.

During the last semester of the past year, Summers taught physical education here and assisted Coach Jess Lilly in baseball. This year Summers is an assistant coach at Williams-town High School in Wood County.

The Frank Montrose Memorial Award was established by the Student Council in honor of the late Frank Montrose, former Glenville student and athlete. In his one year here, 1939, Montrose established himself as an all-time Pioneer great.

In the spring of 1940 the 21-year-old Richmond youth went blind and shortly afterward, in June, died in a Baltimore hospital. It was later learned that Montrose had been affected with nephritis.
