President Harry B. Heflin has announced that Mr. Dale E. Shaffer, Salem, Ohio, became GSC Librarian at the beginning of second semester. Mr. Shaffer received a BS degree in business administration and an MA degree in library science from Kent State University. He also received an MA degree in economics and psychology from Ohio State University.

Prior to coming to GSC, Mr. Shaffer was employed by General Electric Company (1958-57); by Bethany College (1958-59) where he taught various courses in economics; by School City of South Bend, Ind., where he was Business and Technical Research Librarian (1960-61); and by the State of Ohio as Administrative Trainer and/or writer (1962).

Mr. Shaffer has begun to reorganize certain areas in the GSC Library. He is checking, screening and rearranging the periodical collection and vertical file. Two vertical files are being developed. One will contain government documents (local, state, and federal); and the other subject file will include information of a more permanent value.

## MR. COLEMAN GETS GRANT FOR STUDY

Mr. William S. C. Coleman, Assistant Professor of Speech and English, has been selected as one of forty in the nation to receive a 1963 Danforth Teacher Grant. Faculty members were chosen from 461 nominations provided by the deans of accredited colleges and universities.

This scholarship will enable him to do graduate work in theatre arts in the department of speech. He will receive tuition and a substantial percentage of regular salary for 12 months for full-time study toward a Ph.D.

Mr. Coleman will take a year's leave of absence from Glenville State College beginning in the fall of 1963. From August 19-25, he will attend the Danforth Teacher Conference at Camp Minniewa, Stony Lake, Mich., before going to the University of Pittsburgh to begin his studies.

Mr. Coleman received his MA in 1953 from Pennsylvania State University, and has done graduate study at Pennsylvania State University, New York University, and Westminster College. He has been a member of the GSC faculty since 1953.

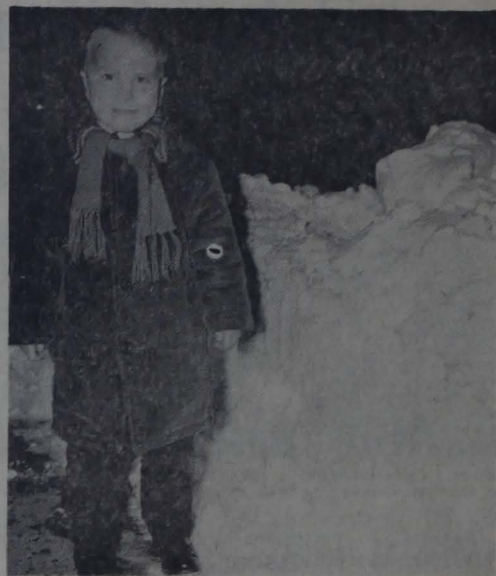

## Men Students May Secure Summer Jobs

The W. Va. Centennial Commission will employ 24 top college students for the summer of 1963. The students employed will work on the W. Va. Centennial Train for three months, starting in Washington, D. C., on May 31 and ending in Huntington the last of August.

These students will work a week and be off a week. They will be paid at the rate of \$300 per month for the time actually worked plus all food and expenses. Five dollars a day will be provided for meals. On the off weeks, expenses will be paid to and from the students' homes. One or two students will be chosen to stay with the train for the full three-month period.

A training period for one week just prior to May 31 must be attended. Men hired will go first to Washington, D. C., for the dedication of the train and then come back to West Virginia for the remainder of the summer.

## Pioneers Win Four, Lose Five In January Cage Contests

Fairmont, Jan. 31

The Pioneers played a good first half and played good ball for 15 minutes of the second half. But, as in the past, they did not continue the strong pace required to win and lost a thriller Jan. 31 to Fairmont State, 87-82.

The game was a seesaw battle as the score changed hands five times in the first half. An interesting note during the half was that the two Conway brothers netted all but two of Fairmont's points in the first ten minutes. The Pioneers widest margin during the half was 38-32 with 1:56 remaining. Glenville led at halftime 42-40.

Again in the second half a seesaw battle of scoring continued. With 6:57 showing on the clock, Fairmont tied the score 61-61 and from that point, they went ahead to win. Glenville did manage to come within two points of Fairmont with 43 seconds left 81-79; however, two charging violations by Glenville gave Fairmont's Ted Darius the opportunity to shoot a number of foul shots. Darius made five straight to clinch the win for Fairmont.

Two guards for Glenville, Bill Maxwell and Chuck Eddy shot well from the outside in an attempt to break the zone Fairmont used. Maxwell and Eddy ended the game as the scoring leaders for Glenville with 19 and 18 points respectively. Mike Eberbaugh scored 15 points.

Alderson Broadbush, Jan. 28. After playing 17 basketball games this season, the Pioneers finally displayed their ability to win big. Big it was, as Coach Byrd's charges completely annihilated the A-B Battlers 96-74, Monday, Jan. 28.

This meeting was the third for the two clubs this season. Glenville won the two games played previously.

The Pioneers started slowly, but

## Lynch, Messenger Write Original Opera for Contest

Harry D. Lynch and Darrel Messenger have been combining efforts and talents over the past six weeks in writing an opera for the West Virginia Centennial Opera Contest. The name of the opera is "Forgotten Spirit" with the theme West Virginia (contemporary). Messenger composed the music while Lynch served as librettist.

The concept of "Forgotten Spirit" was kindled by the thought that in times of war and strife, little recognition is given the person that fights the battles on the homefront. It seems to be second nature to credit victory only to those who bear arms. However, victory does not come only from the firing of a cannon. Victory is the product of work both at home and away from home. The story of "Forgotten Spirit" deals with this idea.

West Virginia has always ranked high in the nation in times of war in scrap drives, salvages, selling of war stamps, and in wartime production. Much deserving credit is given to those that fought, but very little credit is given to those that stay home. Recognition for those who stayed at home is the theme of this folk opera.

The music of "Forgotten Spirit" is a combination of the formal with looseness of contemporary. The music at the beginning of the folk opera is direct and straight. As the opera progress, so does the

form of the music, until at the end, it has moved into a form of contemporary jazz. The predominant chord throughout the opera is E minor, thus giving the tonal quality needed to represent a time of strife.

No attempt has been made to place the setting of "Forgotten Spirit" in an exact time. Costumes, buildings, and music have been juxtaposed in time dating from 1863 to 1963.

Messenger, a senior music student from Glenville, had the honor of performing an original composition over station WSAZ-TV in Huntington on Nov. 15. This composition was based upon contemporary triads built on seconds and fourths—making use of extreme dissonance.

Although different from the traditional 18th and 19th-century harmonies, it is this type of composition which is being accepted as a natural development and creative endeavor representing our reaction to the various voices present in culture today.

Lynch, a senior speech and English student from Burnsville, has written two plays—"X+Y equals Z" and "Plums for the Plummer." He is currently writing a folk-drama which Messenger has contributed to by composing two folk songs. At present Messenger and Lynch are combining their efforts in writing jazz art songs.
